

# AAFES warehouse transition update

Due to facility and pest control issues at AAFES warehouse 816, located next to the Sunrise Bakery, there will be various maintenance and renovation projects conducted in that area over the next few months. The initial phase of the projects has already begun, and all products are being removed from the warehouse. Each item will be inspected to comply with food quality and sanitation standards, and then moved to other facilities for safe and sanitary storage in other locations while the renovation to the warehouse is being completed. Contaminated items discovered in this process will be written off as a loss and disposed of and WILL NOT be offered for sale to the community.

Taking care of this issue is a complete team effort involving USAKA, AAFES and KRS. All involved parties have a hand in implementing the comprehensive solutions to restore the ability to house and safeguard goods in the vacated



warehouse in a safe and sanitary manner.

While the renovation work is being done to 816, as a safety precaution, residents should try to avoid this area. Community patience and understanding are appreciated while these necessary actions are taken to enhance the facility for the future storage of AAFES products. The health and safety of the members of this community is a top priority to the leadership team involved in this effort.

We are doing everything as safely and quickly as possible to get all products transferred from this facility and checked to ensure that they still meet all health and safety standards. The quality of service expected from AAFES will continue during this evolution. # Projects abound

The light pole installation by San Juan Construction is well underway. The new poles are replacing the existing ones, and they will be outfitted with new lights by the end of the year.

Other projects include the replacement of the fire suppression system in the fixed-wing and rotor hangars, and the barge slip ramp repair began this week. San Juan Construction has completed quite a few projects this past year at USAKA, including the plumbing/carpenter shop and the water tank removal at Roi-Namur.

# Kwaj senior attends forensic conference

Nearly everyone has seen some version of the popular television shows centering on the career field of forensics. Some watch for the mystery, others for the excitement, but Kwajalein High School senior Kori Dowell was inspired. When Dowell started researching careers, forensics caught her attention. She wants to specialize in forensic anthropology, saying, "I've always been interested in history, and the field ties social and physical sciences together. I also love the study of bones, so it seems like a perfect career path for me."

Dowell was nominated then invited to attend the National Student Leadership Conference in Forensic Science at the University of Maryland, in College Park, Md., over the summer. The 10 day program hosted nearly 40 students in Dowell's conference, from all over the U.S. During the conference, attendees learned about the different fields of forensics, including pathology, crime scene and computer forensics, as well as Dowell's favorite, forensic anthropology. Her favorite part of the course, though, was the crime scene simulation. She commented that the realistic simulation "...was a lot of work, but it was a lot of fun as well."

Dowell has already been accepted to Northern Arizona University, located in Flagstaff, though the university doesn't offer a degree program in forensics. Dowell's plan is to study anthropology, then go on to study in her chosen field.

On Oct. 12, Dowell gave a presentation of her course in the Davye Davis Multipurpose room at the high school. Teachers, counselors, friends, family and members of the Quality of Life committee were in attendance to hear about Dowell's participation in the impressive conference, and heard her passion for the field. Now that she is an alumni of the conference, Dowell is able to recommend others for the different programs offered at the university.

The United States Postal Service and Military Postal Servicing Agency authorizes Kwajalein 1150 post office receptacles for the number of residents on island. Therefore, if you currently own a box after 1150, your address will no longer exist in the future.

Although this permanent change may cause a bit of inconvenience, this will require a change of address. You may request to be assigned a new Post Office box.

Your mail will be forwarded from your previous address to your new address for one year to allow you time to completely change your address.


