Team NMD adds new elements

Set for Wednesday, IFT-4 will test additional assets

The National Missile Defense Team is set to incorporate some new members in its next play.

Team NMD will conduct Integrated Flight Test 4 (IFT-4) 2:00 p.m., Wednesday.

IFT-4 takes the NMD program one step further than the successful IFT-3 conducted Oct. 3, when the team hit an incoming reentry vehicle with exoatmospheric kill vehicle.

"This is the first time we'll be using multiple NMD elements in the program," said Jim Hill, KMR site manager for NMD. "Before, we were using NMD representative assets to launch the (payload launch vehicle), which was really a test of the EKV.

Wednesday, Team NMD will bring into the test the highly technical Battle Management Command, Control and Communications center (BMC3), along with the Ground-Based Radar Prototype on Kwajalein.

"KMR and uprange sensors will also be used and will track the test for further data collection," Hill added.

Joining them will be the U.S. Navy's *Observation Island*, a tracking ship that supports a variety of missions, and the Airborne Surveillance Testbed, a Boeing 767, and the HALO-IRIS aircrafts, each loaded with scientific equipment that also

Ebeye inaugurates newly elected mayor and council

At one point, newly reelected Ebeye Mayor Wilmer Bolkeim looked as if he might disappear beneath the *marmar* placed around his neck. But that was just part of the pomp and circumstance surrounding his inauguration. Shortly after the presentation, he rose to take the oath of office, officially installing him as mayor for the next four years.

Residents on Ebeye, joined by USAKA/KMR officials, gathered at the United Church of Christ Monday morning to inaugurate Bolkeim and other city council members.

"I was glad to be invited," said Col. Gary K. McMillen, USAKA/KMR

commander. "It was nice to experience and different, especially in the laying of the *marmar*."

"They had a mixture of experienced councilors and some younger," McMillen added, describing the officials. "This mixture should do them well, with the experience for ideas and youth for enthusiasm to implement them."

In fact, five of the nine council members are returning incumbents — Jeban Riklon, Jack Akeang, Irumne Bondrik, George Luther and Ranney Bolkeim — and four are new to the council — Noda Lojkar, Togo Langrine, Aruo Aluka and Johnsay

Mayor Bolkeim enters into his third term.

The inaugurations follow the November national elections in which the United Democratic Party gained the majority and voted Speaker of the *Nitijela* Kessai Note as president. Note took office Jan. 3.

The ceremony opened with a processional of dignitaries. McMillen and the USAKA team followed. Bolkeim led the council members to the front of the sanctuary, taking decorated chairs.

The Rev. Lawson Matauto, pastor of the church, gave an invocation and the crowd sang the Marshallese national anthem.

Next, ladies from the crowd approached the seated councilors and presented *marmar*, garlands and shell necklaces. Councilors were buried under numerous *marmar*. Some removed a few, placing them around their arms.

Kwajalein Atoll District Court Judge Tony Korab administered the oaths of office to the councilors, and then to Bolkeim, who stood at the front of the group, with his wife,

Bernice, standing beside him.

In a brief speech, Bolkeim thanked those in attendance "on behalf of the newly elected officials, and especially those who elected us so that we might give you four more years of service."

Matauto closed the service with a benediction, and the elected officials gathered at the front in a reception line, allowing all attendees to come forward and shake hands with them.

visited Kwajalein for the IFT-3.

The target, a single reentry vehicle with one decoy remains the same as in IFT-3.

"You have to keep some constants in any test program to reduce risk," Hill said.

The goal remains similar, as well - hit the RV, while bringing online the new elements.

The test comes after the critical and highly successful IFT-3 last October.

"We didn't find too much wrong after IFT-3," Hill said, adding the kill vehicle and GBR-P software was modified slightly to improve performance. "There's some other minor changes made in test support areas to handle the additional complexity of the test."

The success boosted the program to national prominence, and in June following the IFT-4 and -5 (set for May), the team must also prepare for a deployment readiness review. President Bill Clinton will decide whether to proceed toward deployment of the NMD system.

"These flights play an important role in the decision-making process," Hill said.

If all goes well, the initial NMD system could be deployed in the United States as early as 2005.

Meanwhile, construction crews on Meck halted work on the silos needed for the new ground-based interceptor designed for use in the NMD Program. The work was interfering with the booster rocket currently placed in launch hill for the test. Construction will resume after the test Wednesday, and the two silos will be tested in a booster validation test scheduled later this year.

Those wishing to view IFT-4 can do so at North Point on Kwajalein.

Said Hill, "They'll hopefully see the same thing they saw on the last one (IFT-3), and that's our missile streaking up there for a hit."

University survey shapes class offerings

The results of the recent survey conducted by the University of Maryland at Kwajalein determined the courses offered for the upcoming term and will help dictate courses offered in the future, according to Eve Cran, field representative.

About 95 people have responded to the survey so far, suggesting specific courses they need to complete a degree program. Although each student's needs were different, Cran said that math, accounting, English and computer studies courses were generally popular.

Current and prospective students also identified which courses they would take from the new core instructor, William Schrade, in the upcoming term, which runs from Jan. 24 to March 18.

"Their responses entirely determined the courses to be offered by the core instructor next term," Cran said. The courses are Business and Management 380 and Economics 201.

When asked what subjects they would take for general interest, respondents gave the most votes to computer studies, at 34 percent of the total responses. Foreign languages were not far behind, and business and management courses came in third.

In response to the reported interest in computer studies, the third course to be offered this term is Introduction to Problem Solving, Algorithm Design and Programming, which will be taught by Joe Baldassini.

It's not too late to return the surveys.

"I encourage all who have not completed a survey to do so, as survey results will dictate future course offerings," Cran said.

Copies of the survey are available outside Cran's office in the school administration building or via e-mail at umkwaj@kls.usaka.smdc.army.mil.

Cran plans to offer a survey every year to stay abreast of students' needs.

She is also looking for qualified instructors living at Kwajalein or Roi so that more courses can be offered. All subject areas are needed. The minimum requirement is a master's degree in the subject to be taught. Potential instructors can contact Cran at 52800 after Feb. 1.

Registration for Term III will be held from Jan. 17-22.

Aeromet highlights Kwajalein's 1999 weather events

Kwajalein finished the last month of the old millennium with slightly less than normal rainfall — 6.77 inches of rain. Normally, the atoll should receive 8.10 inches of rain in December.

For the entire year, Kwajalein received 86.36 inches of rain — clearly an astounding figure nearly anywhere on the U.S. mainland. However, in the tropics, 86.36 inches of rain is still 15.73 inches below our average rainfall for the year, or about 85 percent of normal.

In 1999, much of Kwajalein's weather was influenced by a meteorological event called "La Niña." La Niña refers to cooler than normal sea-surface temperatures along the central equatorial Pacific, which disrupts normal precipitation patterns.

A strong La Niña during the first five months of 1999 produced unusually dry conditions across the atoll.

From January through May, Kwajalein had received only 54 percent of its normal rainfall. However, by June, the La Niña event had weakened considerably and the rains returned to the atoll. June was

Kwajalein's wettest month of the year, when 12.34 inches of rain fell.

In July, August and September, the Tropical Rainfall Measurement Mission (TRMM) came to the island, bringing over 200 scientists and support staff. It was an exciting and busy time at the weather station, as scientists gathered valuable meteorological data using three aircraft, one ship and several remote weather stations.

The data collected is to be used to improve weather satellite estimates of precipitation totals over the tropics. To the delight of the TRMM scientists, Kwajalein received 88 percent of its normal rainfall during the project.

The weather for October through December was fairly typical for Kwajalein. October turned out to be our second wettest month of the year, with 11.95 inches recorded. Kwajalein saw slightly above normal rainfall in both October and November.

Other notable weather remarks

about last year: 88 and 73 degrees were the highest and lowest temperatures recorded on island. The largest one day rainfall total occurred on June 20, when Kwajalein received 3.60 inches of rain. The highest recorded wind gust was 45 knots. March was the driest month of the year, when only 1.84 inches of rain fell. In May, Kwajalein received 3.58 inches of rain, but this was 6.40 inches below normal — the largest rainfall anomaly of the year.

The new year promises to bring yet more exciting and pleasant weather to the atoll. In January, the dry season continues. Normal precipitation for the month is 4.56 inches over the 15 days in which measurable precipitation falls. The average wind speed is 15 knots from the east-northeast. The average daily maximum and minimum temperature is 86 and 77 degrees, respectively.

Also, the highest and lowest recorded rainfall for Kwajalein in January is 15.66 and 0.48 inches, recorded in 1951 and 1977, respectively. The maximum 24-hour rainfall in January is 6.46 inches, recorded in 1979.

Animal Planet plans three-day atoll tour

Ready for a "thundering and sweaty wall of fist-clenching rhythm and blues?"

The answer better be "yes" because the up-and-coming band Animal Planet will be here next week for a three-day tour of Kwajalein Atoll.

"I'm expecting a very rich, full, soulful sound," said Steve Snider, superintendent of Entertainment Services.

Animal Planet appears to have the credentials of a band on the rise.

Led by guitarist and lead vocalist Michael Lee Jackson, who recently finished an eight-month stint with the group 10,000 Maniacs,

Animal Planet has released two CDs, "Dawn" and "Wag," over the last two years. The band played Woodstock '99, and took four of the top awards at November's Artvoice Music Awards, including Outstanding Band, Outstanding Record, Outstanding Drummer (Gordie Rogers) and Outstanding Bassist (Michael Swain).

"Our sound is rock and roll-based rhythm and blues," Jackson explained over e-mail. "We've been described as AC/DC meets James Brown. We've got a unique blend of influences in the band that creates our distinctive sound."

"We attract a wide spectrum of people because of the diversity of sounds we crank out," he added. "It's high energy to be sure, and it rocks. We've got gospel singers, horns, thundering guitars, and a devastating rhythm section. It's a wicked soup."

The eight members of Animal Planet just wrapped up a tour of the Middle East. They will arrive on Kwajalein Jan. 20. The first performance will be 8 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 22, at the Outrigger Club on Roi-Namur. The band will play again Jan. 23 at the Yokwe Yuk Club, and finish out their stay with a beach concert at Emon Beach Jan. 24,

beginning at 5 p.m. The Monday party will begin around 2 p.m. with DJ Neil Dye.

After Kwajalein, the band will move on to Guam and then Korea. Jackson said the group enjoys playing the military circuit.

"We played for what seemed like several thousand troops for the millennium in Saudi Arabia at the Prince Sultan Air Base. It was a raucous show and we had a blast. It's been going great," he said.

While Animal Planet does play classic tunes just about anybody can sing along to — AC/DC's "Back in Black" and Aretha Franklin's "Respect," for example — they will also perform original music. Some of the songs include "State of Mind," "Killing Zone" and "Carpe Diem."

Said Jackson, "We've found this set of material to have great flow to it,

and audiences have really dug in. They listen to the originals and enjoy them, and flip when they hear our interpretation of classics we play."

And if you feel like becoming a star for the night, feel free.

"We've had guest singers, bass players, sax players and dancers for many of these shows, and we'll end up doing things that weren't on the list at all," Jackson said. "Much spontaneity is the rule."

Next up in March: The Hollywood Stars, a group of musical celebrity impersonators. From Elvis to Madonna to Cher, this troupe of 11 will bring their show of musical illusion to Kwaj for one night only. The date will be announced at a later time.

In the meantime, prepare for Animal Planet.

"This is a band not to miss," Snider said.

AMI flight returns after losing tire part

A passer-by saw something unusual on Ocean Road near Holmberg Fairways Thursday. He saw part of an airplane fall out of the sky.

In fact, what he saw was part of the Air Marshall Islands aircraft's tire that fell as the plane took off around 1 p.m. The passer-by, who was not identified, called Bucholz Army Airfield, said Steve Wallace, Aviation Department manager. Airport officials inspected and identified the piece of rubber as part of the right tire and notified the AMI flight.

The aircraft carried two crew members and 13 passengers bound for Ujae and Lae atolls, before a scheduled return to Kwajalein the same day, and then on to Majuro. Capt. Jason Langidrik, pilot of the plane, chose to return to Kwajalein. It landed shortly afterwards without incident.

"It was good (the passer-by) called and we could notify them," Wallace said. "Otherwise they might have tried to land the plane without knowing."



According to Capt. Walter R. Gandy, USAKA/KMR installation transportation officer, AMC announced Jan. 8 that the government will pay for the flights.

Dan Thibodeau, Air Force reservist, welcomed the news. "It's fantastic, a positive impact. Since it costs \$1,000

to get to training, most people don't go ... This is the only place where you could be on active duty as a reservist and not get travel benefits."

Travel reservations can be made up to 30 days in advance as long as the reservist has travel orders for the training. Both the travel orders and an authorizing letter from AMC need to accompany the traveler.
