Policy changes made to retail sales regulation

More than just the numbers changed Jan. 1 when the policy regulating the unauthorized sale, resale, possession, transfer, and removal of retail items from USAKA/KMR was updated.

USAKA Policy No. 20 is now USAKA/KMR Regulation Number 190-41. Jumping from three pages to 10, the new regulation better defines what retail commerce is and is not allowed between USAKA/KMR and the Republic of the Marshall Islands. This policy covers the transfer of everything from diapers to cigarettes to more than two candy bars per day.

Further, the policy does soften some provisions. For example, the maximum value of a bona fide gift between USAKA/KMR residents and RMI citizens was increased from \$25 to \$50.

Kwajalein Police Chief Terry Hardy explained that the regulation supports the Compact of Free Association, the economic, political, and social alliance between the U.S. and RMI. He said the regulation is intended to stem black market operations and support the RMI government and retailers. Tobacco and alcohol products tend to be the primary contraband.

"Ultimately, we are here to assist the host nation in their customs effort in finding this contraband," Hardy explained. "If [contraband] gets over to Ebeye, it takes away [sales] from their retailer."

Hardy emphasized that products sold on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur are tax-free and subsidized by the U.S. government, meaning many items are significantly cheaper here than they are on Ebeye and Enniburr. Black market prices undermine the

MIMSOE to replace Gold+

Finding that elusive item your organization needs will become easier by the end of the calendar year as Supply and Transportation installs Mincom's Information Management System Open Enterprise, or MIMSOE for short.

A Project "KEAMS" (Kwajalein Enterprise Asset Management System) team has been formed to implement the new system under an RSE steering committee headed by Paul Savage, Information Technology manager, and led by RSE project manager Angie Dickson and Mincom project manager David Maley.

The new software will replace Gold+ software, which has served the island as the Supply Department's primary management system since 1992.

"(Gold+) was not designed to meet our needs and had to be continuously

modified. That was the source of a lot of problems," Savage said. "MIMSOE is designed to meet the needs of organizations similar to ours."

Mincom's MIMSOE has been implemented for many customers worldwide, including remote mining sites, utilities, and defense contractors, to meet asset management requirements, according to Maley.

The commercial off-the-shelf software meets 93 percent of Raytheon's stated work requirements and includes many other benefits. MIMSOE was selected in 1999 after an extensive review of many other commercial off-the-shelf products.

"Mincom's strong and proven implementation methodology was an added benefit in the selection process," Dickson said.

Consider that in excess of 70,000

line items are stocked in warehouses on the atoll and that approximately 12,000 line items in General Stores Kwajalein (GSK) alone are manually checked monthly and reordered accordingly. It is envisaged that MIMSOE will automatically review and order a high percent of the current orders. Orders will be checked against demand, and routine orders will be automatically created and faxed where appropriate. Presently items with expiration dates must be physically checked every month, as expiration dates are not recorded in the current system. With MIMSOE, shelf life and batch lots will be recorded. This will help reduce losses due to spoilage. Fresh produce and other specialty items will still be manually reviewed and ordered.

Stock items are carried in several different locations, such as GSK, Aviation, Automotive, and Roi-Namur, to name a few. As part of the KEAMS project, all common items will be consolidated under one stock code.

"If you need a particular bolt, and they have it on Roi-Namur, you will be able to see that and get it from there, rather than order it from the

states," Dickson said. In fact, in a demonstration, Dickson showed how users can, with a click and drag of the mouse, follow the computer trail from an initial query to a bin number in a particular warehouse, with the number of parts available.

The program puts the Supply organization in the forefront technologically and addresses best business practices, not "just what works," Dickson said.

Also, the program meets Army regulatory requirements. In addition to material management, MIMSOE can manage operations, maintenance, and associated financial requirements.

Maley and his wife, Anne, of Australia, have relocated to Kwajalein

for the duration of the project and will be working on-site with RSE staff to install the system. Several other Mincom staff from Australia will be on island for shorter periods.

The project is currently in the orientation, planning, and business requirements stage. Following this are the business solutions, conversion, and configuration stages.

After MIMSOE goes on line, a review will be carried out, and many new features and business opportunities will be implemented as part of the continual improvement program.

Currently more than 300 people in various organizations hold Gold+ accounts. Account numbers could rise as MIMSOE unites the various departments with supplies.

Marshalllese economy, as well as deplete the limited supply of goods on Kwaj and Roi, he said.

"Our heart, obviously, goes out to the Marshalllese people, but if we open up our door, we wouldn't have anything in our shops here," Hardy noted.

Only K-badge holders or special badge holders, such as RMI employees authorized to remain on island overnight, are allowed to purchase items from posted retail facilities, like Ten-Ten, Surfway, Macy's, Macy's West, and Gimbel's. RMI citizens can purchase consumable items at the snack bars on Roi and Kwaj and are now allowed to take home one individual meal.

"We're trying to be a little more open about that," Hardy said.

Also, Marshalllese are now allowed to remove leftover food from command-sanctioned events, such as holiday parties or birthdays. Additionally, a USAKA/KMR private organization may transport and remove home-prepared foods and drinks (except alcohol) for celebrations or other events on Ebeye or Enniburr with written permission from the command.

Bona fide gifts, defined as retail items transferred voluntarily from

one person to another (except certain items, such as alcohol and tobacco), are allowed up to \$50. However, the maximum amount in gifts one USAKA/KMR resident can give to one RMI citizen is still \$100 per calendar year.

While patio sale regulations have not changed, Hardy reiterated that items must be sold at fair market value and must be at least six months old. Combined sales of over \$200 require the resident to be present at the Dock Security Checkpoint when the item is transported to Ebeye or Enniburr; this is the responsibility of the resident. A Property Clearance Form signed by the USAKA/KMR resident must be presented at the DSC for any sale regardless of value.

Violations of these or other provisions in the regulation could result in loss of privileges, being administratively barred from the USAKA/KMR, and possible prosecution in the U.S. Magistrate's Court at Kwajalein.

There are signs posted at the DSC in English and Marshalllese explaining the regulation, according to Hardy. The chief said there should be no reason for a violation, as the policies have been well defined.

"Like they say, ignorance of the law is no excuse," he said.

End of an Era

FPQ-19 was witness to moon landings and missile launches

As an eyewitness to history, FPQ-19 radar had the eyes to see quite a bit.

It watched with the rest of the world as the first lunar module landed on the moon. As the celestial traffic jam of satellites began, the Q-19 silently observed this new phenomenon. And few missions on Kwajalein took place without the Q-19's powerful array of instruments collecting data.

But those eyes are now blind, as FPQ-19 was put in caretaker status in May of last year and mothballed in October. It is scheduled to be bagged in March. Tom Krasuski, system engineer at GBR-P and the last sensor leader at Q-19, laments the ending of an era on Kwaj.

"It's like owning a Volkswagon. You really become attached to it. It's a really beautiful piece of equipment," he mused. "Being an engineer, you start to see that beauty more and more as you work on these old things."

Built in 1961 by RCA and stamped as the first of its kind by the serial No. 1, the FPQ-19 was originally

called TPQ-18 because it was a transportable radar. It island hopped for the next 14 years to Antigua, Ascension, and Kanton before coming to Kwajalein in 1975.

"It sort of has an interesting history," said Gerald "Cactus" Meyer, MPS-36 site supervisor and an original member of the team that was on Kwaj in 1976 when FPQ-19 was put into operation. "It was very accurate."

Perhaps more than most people, Meyer was intimately familiar with the Q-19. He was with it on Ascension Island, where an extensive facility of radars was located. At that time, between 1963 and 1971, it tracked satellites for NORAD and supported early orbital missions. It even watched the famed moon landing July 1969.

"It tracked the command module for hours," Meyer said. "I know because I was sitting at the console at that time."

After about a four-year stint on Kanton in the Republic of Kiribati, the FPQ-19 — still the TPQ-18 at that time — arrived on Kwaj. When Meyer

came to the island, the pedestal was being assembled.

"I followed the radar halfway across the world," he noted. Other FPQ-19 alumni from that era who are still on Kwaj include Chuck Lesniak (MPS-36), Wally Burbine (Communications), and Herb Harris (Alcor).

Lesniak likened the experience to that of working on a classic car. But instead of spark plugs and oil pans, the Q was fitted with vacuum tubes and diodes.

"It was unique in that sense," said Lesniak, site supervisor at several radars on Kwaj.

In 1982, the radar was moved from trailers into a permanent building on Mount Olympus, which used to be a missile launch site for the Zeus missile program and is the highest point in the Marshall Islands. About two years later, it was upgraded and redesignated as FPQ-19.

"Its primary purpose was a beacon tracker," Krasuski said, explaining that the radar sent out an encoded pulse that would be picked up by an RV, which then responded with its own signal back to the radar. It also had skin tracking capabilities, as well as telescopic abilities. Krasuski said his team had installed a coherent signal processor shortly before it was shut down last March that allowed the Q-19 to track satellites as far away as 23,560 miles or 38,000 kilometers.

"It still works like a charm," he said. "I was always amazed that a 38-year-old hunk of metal could actually be as good as it was."

But all good times must come to an end. A contract with Specialty Bags Corp. has been negotiated to install a shroud over the radar to protect it from the environment.

Before that happens, a "PCS" party has been planned for Monday at FPQ-19 by Krasuski for friends of that "hunk of metal." It's a final act of responsibility, you might say.

"I felt like the keeper of a lighthouse, believe it or not. It was that kind of feeling," Krasuski said.

Kwajers dive in to help with DAN research

Who knew science could be so much fun?

Some Kwajalein divers who traveled to Legan Monday for a two-tank excursion volunteered to lend their dive profiles to a research project for the Divers Alert Network (DAN).

Using recording dive computers to collect information on dive profiles, DAN researchers have begun to create the largest database of its kind to provide more insight into the behavior, dive profiles, and characteristics of recreational scuba divers in relation to decompression illness (DCI).

While DAN has been collecting such data since 1987, much of the information was gleaned following dive accidents.

"Unfortunately, that is remembered data. Because it's remembered data, it is unreliable," explained Randy Sietzes, a representative of the organization, who was recently on island to kick-start the program here.

According to Sietzes, Kwajalein is the first overseas location to be included in Project Dive Exploration. Four local divers — Amy LaCost, Darryl McKinley, Jonathan Miller, and Mitsi Andrews — were trained to be field research coordinators (FRCs) by Sietzes. FRCs are responsible for collecting completed research forms from participating divers, uploading data from dive computers, and sending the data to DAN.

"They'll carry on this research after I leave," Sietzes said. Five dive

computers will be left with the Kwajalein Scuba Club so that data can be collected on a weekly basis.

"It sounded interesting," said Miller, 13, when asked why he volunteered to be an FRC. "I just get the information from the people I'm diving with."

Monday's dive trip to Legan, which included 54 recreational divers, provided a large pool of test subjects for the program's first run on Kwaj. Twenty divers volunteered to fill out short survey forms detailing medical conditions before the dive. They each carried a special dive computer with

them that recorded various information, such as the depth of the dive and water temperature.

"I think these are worthwhile projects," said Bob Carson, one of the 20 volunteers. Carson, 52, said he volunteered to ensure "the older crowd" was represented in the study.

Sietzes said the program is hoping to accumulate at least a million dive profiles worldwide. Kwaj, he noted, is an excellent source of data because of the large and consistent number of dives done each month.

Kwaj divers go through about 1,200 tanks per month, according to tank house manager Tom Hall.

"You guys are in a unique situation in the scuba club," Sietzes said. "This is what we really need."

Sietzes emphasized the project is a "long-term analysis" that will not produce any quick answers to DCI.

Eventually, however, the organization hopes to produce statistically accurate analyses of diver characteristics and behavior that is associated with DCI, according to the DAN Web Page.

DAN was founded in 1980 at Duke University and is dedicated to improving recreational diver safety and health.

Kindergarten immunization requirements for the Kwajalein School System

If you have a child who will be starting kindergarten for the 2000-01 school year, certain immunizations are required:

- Diphtheria, tetanus, acellular Pertussis #5 (DtaP)
- Inactivated polio vaccine #4 (IPV); must have one polio after age 4
- Measles, mumps, rubella #2 (MMR)
- Varicella (chicken pox vaccine)
- Hepatitis B vaccines: series of three shots (HBV)
- Tuberculosis skin test

Written documentation must be provided to the school for the immunizations received. Immunizations must be verified by the school nurse at Kwajalein Hospital.




