Meat resupply under way

No shortage expected after shipments rejected

Kwajalein residents will have meat for the table, despite rumors to the contrary, and some will be fresh, not frozen.

Talk of a shortage began after two consecutive barges — March 3 and March 30 — arrived with meat that did not conform to food safety standards.

No shortages are expected with the resupply effort under way.

Instead, some fresh meat will be available to supplement the frozen stock. Perhaps there will be less-than-normal selection, but still plenty of meat.

"Instead of filet mignon, for example, you may have to have sirloin," said Annette Thibodeau, manager of

Stock Materials Management.

"We should have this smoothed out by May," said Matt Graham, manager of Procurement and Transportation.

Residents shouldn't notice any price changes either, beyond the previously announced and unrelated increase in meat prices.

The current meat supply situation began when, on the March 3 barge, within three vans, the 24-foot refrigerated containers that sit atop the barge, the meat showed signs that somewhere in the supply chain it had not been maintained at the proper temperature. It appeared that the meat had thawed and been re-frozen, said Pat Zurick, food safety and sanitation specialist. Zurick routinely inspects food shipments as they arrive on Kwajalein.

The varying temperatures threat-

Kwajers learn from a distance

Online programs offer educational opportunities

When she came to Kwajalein three years ago, Susannah Jones took some courses on the Internet to complete her bachelor's degree at University of Maryland. Now she has earned half her master's degree without setting foot in a classroom.

Jones is one of a growing number of students using distance learning — taking classes and earning degrees on the Internet.

"I arrived at Kwaj newly married and signed up for classes as soon as I stepped off the plane," Jones said.

In fact, an important factor in her decision to come here when she did was her ability to continue the college education she began in Alabama.

Julia Olson, who is beginning her fourth year at Kwaj, agrees.

"Chances are by now I would have left to pursue higher education if it wasn't available here. It's an important goal," Olson said.

She's close to halfway through her master's degree in occupational safety from East Carolina University.

The idea of distance learning originated nearly two centuries ago at the University of London. Until the mid-1980s, printed textbooks and the postal service were mainly used. But with the rise of personal computers and the growth of the Internet, a mushrooming number of students have access to thousands of courses and almost any degree right at their computer.

Some courses require proctored exams in a classroom. Tim Merkel, adult education coordinator at Kwaj, receives and proctors exams and or-

ders college level exams for students here who need them.

International Data Corporation predicts that in 2002, the number of college students enrolled in distance-learning courses will reach 2.2 million, up from 710,000 in 1998, and 85 percent of two-year colleges and 84 percent of four-year colleges will offer distance-learning courses.

According to a recent Time Magazine article, the number of schools granting online degrees has doubled in the past year. "Cyber only" schools have cropped up, such as Jones International University based in Colorado, which offers online courses to 500 students in 30 countries.

A growing number of Kwaj residents are attending these online campuses.

Eve Cran, site representative for University of Maryland at Kwaj, is a student at University of Maryland's College Park.

"My remote location on an island in the Pacific is no longer a barrier. I am working on my MBA right now via the Internet," Cran said. "Even more, distance learning is extremely flexible. I can finish school work, download assignments, and post completed homework at any time convenient to me."

In addition to its on-site classes, University of Maryland offers bachelor's and master's degrees in a number of areas through distance education. Information is available at the site office on island or online at www.umuc.edu.

For Olson, the hardest part of distance learning was finding the right school. Her first requirement was a good staff. She looked for highly qualified, well-known professors who were published in the field. She's been very happy with the experience.

"The school has their program together," she said. "They are very organized, publish assignments way ahead, and my questions are answered right away."

Jones, who completed her bachelor's degree in English and is currently working on her masters in

language education from Indiana University, used the Internet as her main resource for finding a school.

"My biggest question was accreditation," she said. "A lot [of schools] sounded great, but their accreditation was not complete. Make sure before you start that they already have accreditation."

Other useful resources are magazines that have annual lists of school rankings and catalogs such as Peterson's Distance Learning Guide, available at Grace Sherwood Library.

Jones also recommends checking how long the school's Internet program has been established. Some schools have been using the Internet for a longer time and have worked out the kinks in conducting classes online.

Also, it's important to check if the program requires at least some classes to be taken on campus.

Although for some people it's more motivating to be in a real classroom, sitting in a virtual classroom doesn't mean you can't communicate with class members or the teacher.

"From the beginning it was hard with the teacher not being right there, having to wait for a response, and not being able to continue a conversation," Jones said. "I thought nothing could replace the classroom."

But Jones says they have done a good job, and online learning actually has some advantages.

Teachers can be more accessible

because they can respond in their own time by e-mail. The response is usually not immediate, however.

Adjusting to the demands of the computer classroom can take time if your computer navigational skills aren't up to speed.

Jones said, "At first it was tough. The hardest part was communicating totally through the computer and things like making class distribution lists, navigating, and using attachments."

Developing navigational skills for the classroom may pay off later on the job, as well.

Many classes include synchronous discussions, e-mail communication, and chat rooms.

Classes typically get to know each other the first week, before starting actual academic work. Everybody posts discussion topics, personal profiles, and a picture, if possible. Some class members end up e-mailing each other directly.

Olson participates in a chat room about once a week at a designated time with both online and on-campus students.

Because distance education is often used as continuing education by people already in the workforce, class members can bring real work experiences and broad backgrounds to the table.

Jones said, "I've met a diverse group of people, from on campus to all over the world."

Battle of wits
Students compete in quiz bowl

What do these questions have in common?

These and more than 300 other questions were posed to the competitors at Knowledge Bowl 2000, held by the Kwajalein Junior/Senior PTO the evening of April 8.

A crowd of families and well-wishers gathered in the MP room to watch the excitement as 42 junior high and high school contestants competed in the second annual event, which allows students to test their knowledge and also have a good time.

"The group as a whole were good sports, had fun, and had a good sense of humor," said Jeanne Cummings, who organized the event along with Vera Fisher.

"It's not just about who won," Cummings added. "Overall, they had fun."

Everyone interested was eligible to participate; the participants were signed up on a first-come, first-served basis.

Students were divided into teams of two or three at the junior and senior high school levels. After preliminary rounds, the top two teams faced off in the finals at each level.

Eight teams of three junior high school students competed for the top position. Brandon L'Esperance, David Barbella, and Spencer Barrs took first place, outscoring runners-

up Rory Scott, Anthony Poirier, and Richie Grant, 13-8.

At the senior high level, six teams competed, with John Clayton and Eric Pichler edging Mary Etta Burt, Eric Corder, and Tanner Duncan 8-7 in a close match for first place.

All the contestants received certificates for ice cream, and the winning team members were awarded a gift certificate to Amazon.com and will receive a trophy at the school awards ceremony at the end of the year.

The bowl, modeled after the old TV quiz show, "College Bowl," was initiated at Kwajalein last year by Vera Fisher.

For this year's event, the PTO purchased a software package that Cummings and Fisher used to organize balanced rounds of questions. The audience followed the questions and, after a few seconds, the answers, on a computer screen, while the students vied for the winning answer on stage.

An electric light and buzzer system was used, Jeopardy-style. The first team to buzz in had 10 seconds to answer the question through their spokesperson.

Cummings said they learned early on that it didn't pay to push their button before the question had been completely read. If their team couldn't answer in 10 seconds, then the other team had a chance to hear the whole question and answer it.

Dave Conrad was the host, and Steven Cummings operated the computer program. Dick Shields set up lights in the MP Room for the evening.

New USAKA/KMR policy limits meals for accompanied personnel

Recent changes in policy regarding base food services will affect the eating habits of some accompanied Kwaj residents.

USAKA/KMR Policy Memorandum 30-1, Use of Cafés Pacific, Roi, and Meck, dated April 1, was enacted this week by the command.

Lloyd Jordan, Residential Support manager, said, "There are three new major changes at Café Pacific for accompanied personnel: Workers in accompanied status can eat lunch only, not breakfast, on workdays; families can eat special holiday meals and brunch on Sundays only, not Mondays; and children under 18 years of age must be accompanied by an adult in Café Pacific."

The guidelines for accompanied employees are simple. Permanent, accompanied employees are welcome for lunch on required workdays only after presenting a K-badge, paying the meal charge of \$6, and signing the entry register.

Family groups, authorized unofficial visitors, and children 18 and over can enjoy Sunday brunch and special holiday meals by showing proper identification, paying the meal charge, and signing the entry register.

"Dining facilities originally were for unaccompanied personnel. The commander has allowed some accompanied personnel to use those facilities," Jordan said.

Policies for unaccompanied and TDY personnel and employees escorting official visitors have not changed at Café Pacific.

Café Meck is authorized for use by official visitors and workers only.

Café Roi continues to serve USAKA/KMR employees, their families, and authorized visitors who show proper identification, pay the meal fee, and sign the register.





KWAJALEIN ISLAND non-potable, or reclaimed, water system is experiencing increased levels of turbidity, which is cloudiness in the water. USAKA/KMR environmental standards require the turbidity to be 2.0 turbidity units or below. Since late March, turbidity has risen above 2.0 turbidity units and has remained elevated. This is not an emergency. If so, you would have been notified immediately. Turbidity levels are low, but the persistence is of concern. Turbidity has no health effects but can interfere with disinfection and provide a source for microbial growth. Reclaimed water is tested daily for bacteria, and results show no evidence of bacterial growth. Turbidity is measured to monitor the reclaimed water filtration system. Currently, the system is experiencing high demand levels, which puts greater stress on filters. One cause of high levels is leaking toilet valves, which waste water around the clock. The system is undergoing maintenance to reduce sediment and fouling of the system, which may be causing the high turbidity. The chlorine amount for disinfecting the water has been increased, and bacterial testing has been doubled. If the problem persists, the system may be switched to another water source, such as groundwater or salt water, until the problem is resolved. 
