Blame La Niña for dry, windy April

Last month's weather on Kwajalein can be summarized in three words: dry and windy.

April's weather was very similar to conditions experienced during April of last year, when La Niña first arrived on the scene. La Niña persists over the Pacific Ocean and is the most likely culprit in last month's abnormally dry and windy weather.

Only 2.33 inches of rain fell on Kwajalein last month, 31 percent of normal. It was the driest month experienced on Kwaj since April 1999, when rainfall totalled 2.18 inches. The wettest day last month was on April 11, in which half of the month's rain fell, 1.16 inches. April had 15 days with measurable rainfall (0.01 inch or more), which is close to normal (17 days); however, only two days, April 11 and April 25, had rainfall that exceeded the 0.25 inch Kwajalein normally receives during an April day.

The average wind speed last month was 16.9 knots. This is higher than the normal April average wind speed of 13.7 knots, but very similar to what was recorded during April 1999 (16.5 knots). April's average temperature was 82.3 degrees Fahrenheit, identical to last year's.

The wet season normally returns to Kwajalein during May. On average, nearly 10 inches of rain (9.98 inches) fall in May, with three days receiving over an inch of rain. The wettest May on record occurred in 1980, when 26.86 inches of rain fell. In 1984, rainfall totaled only 0.53 of an inch during the driest May on record. Normally, the high temperature during May is 86 or 87 degrees Fahrenheit, with low temperatures between 77 and 78 degrees Fahrenheit.

SAR training exercise is a team effort

As he prepares to plunge from the vibrating helicopter skid into the choppy seas 10 feet below, fireman Dave Bustamante feels a carnival ride of emotions — excitement, fear, and awe. A couple of seconds later, he's in the salty maelstrom along with the rest of his rescue team, swimming toward a possible drowning victim as a police rescue boat speeds to his assistance.

Search and Rescue (SAR) training, viewed from the safety of the SR-001

police boat hundreds of yards away, appears as a well-rehearsed Hollywood movie scene, though there is nothing fictional about what the exercise is designed to accomplish — the safe and efficient coordination of a sea rescue among various departments.

The SAR team members — firefighters certified in scuba diving, first aid, CPR, and lifeguard techniques, among other skills — take the lead role, with personnel from the

police and aviation departments playing key parts in the exercise. Personnel from Kwajalein Hospital and other departments also get involved in the case of a real emergency.

Saturday's SAR exercise, the culmination of two months of intense training for the firefighters, involves rescues at sea. The five scenarios — multiple victims adrift in the lagoon — call for coordination among the marine police department, aviation, and SAR team members.

"It takes all three of us to make a success," explained Lt. Tom McGinnis of the Kwajalein marine police. "We try to do this every six months. We make it as hard on the whole team as we can in the scenarios."

The day's action begins both at the helicopter pad, where SAR team members are standing by, and down at the marina, where the volunteer victims arrive for a safety briefing

The exercise consists of five rescues, with the number of victims in the water — all wearing life vests — gradually increasing with each jump made by the SAR team.

Less than an hour later, both boats are headed to the windward side of Carlson. The winds are blowing at more than 15 knots, and the waves are white-capped, promising a difficult day for everyone involved.

Soon, the first victims are in the water. Moments later, the sound of a helicopter making its first pass intrudes upon the slapping of the waves against the boat and the exercise is underway. The conditions are assessed — and, in a real emergency, smoking flares are dropped into the water to mark the area. On the second pass, a 20-man raft is released from the helicopter to assist with the rescue. Finally, on the third pass, SAR members start hitting the water and quickly have the three victims safely aboard the rubber raft.

And then they do it again and again ...


"Everybody was ready to go to bed by 5," said Bustamante, SAR team leader and jump master.

The aerial ballet, tiring for the jumpers, is also challenging for the pilots responsible for the safety of everyone involved in the complex drill. The exercise requires constant com-

munication between the jump master, helicopter captain, and first officer, according to Roy Howard, pilot training officer.

"There is an ongoing dialogue between those three people," he explained.

The exercise also stresses the helicopter, which slows to about 10 knots and hovers 10 feet above the

and police boats SR-001 and *Guardian* are prepared for the exercise.

Safety is stressed throughout the exercise, according to Fire Chief Ragnar Opiniano. The name of the game is redundancy — buddy checks on the ground, in the air, and in the water.

"Every step has a safety check," Opiniano stressed.

water as SAR members make their jumps. The salt air can brutalize the helicopter like any other machine on island.

"It picks up the spray pretty good," Howard said. "We can't stay low or slow for long."

Personnel in each department train individually, bringing their special skills to the table for the SAR exercise. For instance, the pilots are trained in scanning techniques, flight patterns, and minimizing drift. Police personnel on the boats are trained in first aid and CPR, and are qualified oxygen providers.

Meanwhile, SAR members have been training seven hours a day, three days a week over the last two months. The all-volunteer unit undergoes extensive training in lifeguarding techniques, dealing with panicked victims, and a number of other skills and stamina tests.

The training also help builds confidence, Bustamante noted.

"You're working more as a team," he said. "It worked out pretty well for this class."

Generator returns to Kwaj power plant

Talk about a heavy load and a long haul.

After more than eight months state-side for major generator rework, No. 6 prime generator unit arrived back on Kwajalein April 27.

Last week, using an overhead crane, power plant personnel secured and hoisted the 22-ton generator into the air and slowly moved it to its place behind the diesel engine that powers it. The generator is expected to go online this month after it is inspected, correctly aligned with the engine, and tested throughout its full load range in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations, according to Sam Dunahoe, plant superintendent.

As part of the plant's preventive maintenance program, the plant generators are sent off-island after about 18,000 operational hours for complete disassembly. That's about four to five years of real-time use, Dunahoe said.

"It makes the generator in a like-new condition or better," he noted.

The diesel engines are also over-

hauled as part of the preventive maintenance program, but that work is done by plant personnel on island.

"Since we have the expertise ... all maintenance work [in the future] will be accomplished on island as long as it is cost efficient to do so," Dunahoe said.

The power plant has seven diesel

engines and generators that keep the proverbial lights burning on Kwajalein. However, only three of the seven units are in use at one time during peak periods. During off-peak times at night, the power plant occasionally drops down to two units.

"But that's very seldom," Dunahoe said.

Farmer's Market to feature fresh fruit and veggies

"We're trying to make this for everyone," said Ellen Smith, Kwajalein merchandising and marketing director of Sodexo Marriott. "We're trying to come up with some new ideas, things that haven't been done here before."

Next on the menu: A July 4th celebration featuring five-foot-long barbecue beef sandwiches hot off the grill, and a number of other goodies, at Emon Beach. There will also be a chili and rib cook-off, along with a pie-baking contest, in the near future.

Hospital comes to community

If high blood pressure, excess weight, or even how to choose safe toys are concerns, Kwajalein Hospital can help. Starting this month, the hospital will be coming to the community instead of the community going to the hospital for answers.

The Health Awareness Committee has designated a specific health and prevention focus for each month of the coming year, according to Kathy Campbell, Health Awareness chairperson and director of Occupational Health.

The idea of giving each month a special emphasis was "to get [the hospital] more involved with the community. Show more what we're about as well as promote preventative methods," said Casey Laprade, director of nurses.

May has been declared National Hospital Month. A blood pressure screening station will be held on the mini-mall porch, Monday, May 22, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. as part of this month's emphasis, according to Laprade and Julie Schmidt, out-patient nurse manager.

The background for National Hospital Month, which has been extended to a month-long emphasis on Kwaj, is especially fitting to kick off the year-long Health Awareness program.

"The vision for National Hospital Month, which can be traced back to 1921, was to take the mysterious aura out of hospitals by getting the community involved...the first National Hospital Day was held on Florence Nightingale's birthday, May 12," Laprade said.

"The key word [at the hospital] is 'care' —Care that ensures the best available treatments are used, and care that makes sure patients are comfortable and well informed," said Schmidt.

As part of keeping the community well informed, both Schmidt and Laprade emphasized the variety and versatility of the services that the combined hospital and dental clinic



staff offer.

According to Campbell, each month of the coming year the Health Awareness Committee will offer the community information on how to prevent, identify, or help with common diseases and health concerns. The next three months' focus will be: June, skin cancer; July, arthritis; and August, mental health and alcohol awareness.
