Yuk Club lounge to close for renovations

You can't make an omelet without breaking a few eggs, and you can't redesign the dining scene on Kwajalein without temporarily sacrificing convenience.

The Yokwe Yuk Club lounge will be closed from June 6 until July 8 for a major remodeling job. The restaurant will remain in service during that period, and the Oceanview Club will be open longer hours while the Yuk bar is renovated.

"We'll have the same services as [the Yuk]," said Paul King, Sodexho Marriott Food Services district manager. In other words, DJs like Rich Feagler will spin their tunes until the wee hours at the Oceanview.

The Yuk bar is going to be recon-

figured and expanded, making room for two new bar stations. Beer and ice coolers will be added, along with fresh paint, carpets, a sound system, lights, reupholstered furniture, and a new dance floor. As previously reported, regular food services will be transferred from the restaurant to the bar's Taro Grill. Redesigns are also underway at Sunrise Bakery, Oceanview Club, and Emon Beach Snack Bar.

The Yuk lounge is expected to be back in business in mid-July, with a grand opening tentatively scheduled for July 15. "We're formulating plans now for a variety of grand openings for the operations," King said.

Until the grand opening, the Yuk




Local police pause to honor fallen comrades

Kwajalein Police Officer Bruce Whitcomb, along with fellow Kwajalein Police personnel and Kwajalein Atoll Local Government officers, took a few moments Monday evening to remember fallen comrades during National Police Week. May 15 is designated National Peace Officers Memorial Day, and the week of May 15 is National Police Week. This is the third year the observance has been held on Kwajalein. Already this year in the United States, 46 police officers have been killed in the line of duty. Since 1794, more than 14,000 law enforcement officials have been killed.

Range operation scheduled for Wednesday

A range operation is scheduled for Wednesday, May 24. Caution times are 7:01 p.m. Wednesday, May 24, through 4:01 a.m. Thursday, May 25.

In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within Kwajalein Atoll, defined by the area bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr Island on the west reef, and bounded on the south by the line drawn north of Bigej Island on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude

08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E, and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the west reef.

Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor. All mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands.

In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, Kwajalein police island clearance procedures will begin at approximately 7:30 a.m. on Sunday, May 21, and continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress

of all air and seacraft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following days:

- 7:01 p.m. Thursday, May 25, through 4:01 a.m. Friday, May 26.
- 7:01 p.m. Friday, May 26, through 4:01 a.m. Saturday, March 27.

Cholera epidemic in Pohnpei requires extra caution by travelers

A cholera epidemic has broken out on Pohnpei. According to the May 12 issue of *Stars and Stripes*, the outbreak reportedly was from tainted water used at a gathering to make sakau, a traditional beverage.

Travelers to Pohnpei need to be aware and take certain precautions when visiting, according Kathy Campbell, director of Occupational Health.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, cholera is a bacterial infection resulting from contaminated food or wa-

ter. Travelers who develop severe diarrhea and vomiting should seek medical help promptly, CDC recommends. Without treatment and rehydration, death can occur in hours.

The risk of contracting cholera is very low, and a vaccine is not the answer, according to Dr. Eric Lindborg, chief medical officer.

"Currently licensed vaccines for cholera have limited effectiveness and often cause reactions. I do not recommend them," he said.

What can be done is to stay away from certain foods and types of food

preparation. CDC's simple rule of thumb on food is to "Boil it, cook it, peel it, or forget it." They recommend that raw fish or seafood, raw vegetables, salads, ice in drinks, and fruits that a traveler did not peel should be avoided.

"The best way to guard against the disease is to use bottled water when traveling," Campbell added. "Remember to brush your teeth with bottled water, and wash your hands."

"With proper attention to intake of hygienically prepared food and liquids, the disease is completely preventable," Lindborg said.

restaurant will remain open for business as usual. Regular food service will then be available during lounge hours in the evenings, as well as at lunch on certain days of the week. Wait service — which was to be discontinued entirely as part of an earlier dining concept proposed — will also be available on some evenings.

"It really depends on business needs," King explained, adding there will probably be some staff cuts, but the restaurant waitstaff will be retained for gourmet dinners and other special occasions. "We're going to be working very closely, as a team, to maintain employment for all of our employees."

The menu at the Yuk Taro Grill will get a new format and look, as well. Executive chef Bob Baker plans to introduce a wide variety of items, from Snake Pit Kalua pork quesadillas to Reefwalker ribeye to Pacific Rim vegetable stir-fry.

"There will be something there for everybody," Baker said. Other items include chicken tortilla soup, lasagna al forno, nachos, Kwaj burgers, baby back ribs, fudge brownie sun-

daes, a Marshall Islands pineapple-carrot cake, and much more. Menu items will be available at both lunch, Thursday through Saturday, and dinner, seven nights a week, along with a variety of daily specials.

Also expect menu changes at Sunrise Bakery, where doughnuts and bagels will share shelf space with items more commonly found at a stateside bistro.

"The concept there is truly going to be the French sidewalk café," King said. "We're going to have real pennini sandwiches, really upscale desserts, and focus on cappuccinos and espressos, so that we have a little coffee house to go to."

The Oceanview Club will get a fresh coat of paint, outside lights, volleyball court, horseshoe pit, and wind-break wall, among other additions.

At the Emon Beach Snack Bar, the concrete slab will be removed and a new deck built to replace it. Renovations there will be finished by the end of July, according to King.

Finally, expect to see a fountain soda system in Café Pacific, Café Roi, Dock Security Checkpoint, Three Palms Snack Bar, and the Yokwe Yuk

Club by Sunday.

Of course not all the changes in food service are limited to the facilities. King said that based on the success of last weekend's Farmer's Market, such events will become de rigueur on Kwaj. He said more than a thousand people attended Sunday's Farmer's Market. It will reappear on a quarterly basis.

"It really showed us that we can definitely get the island support for the right types of functions, as long as we aim it at the full gamut of island residents — from the bachelors to the families to the couples," King noted. "We're going to really focus on things for the island, something unusual and unique."

Wine and food expos, featuring the dishes and hors d'oeuvres of island chefs, will also be held in the future. Cooking and baking contests are also planned. Gourmet nights at the Yuk restaurant will feature various Sodexo Marriott chefs and their specialties.

"We have a lot of talented individuals on the island," King said.

And soon they'll have the facilities and opportunity to prove it.

D.A.R.E.ing to be different

Sixth-graders pledge to avoid drugs, violence

Sixth-grader Melissa Burt wants to someday become president of the United States. That's why she's made a vow to stay drug-free.

"Staying drug-free is important to me because I have many goals in life," she said during Friday night's D.A.R.E. graduation of three sixth-grade classes, held in CAC Room 6.

D.A.R.E. stands for Drug Abuse Resistance Education, a program designed to instruct kids on the dangers and ways to avoid drugs, alcohol, and violence. After 17 weeks of instruction, 46 youngsters graduated from the program.

"They had a great time," said Sgt. Roger Reed, Kwajalein Police Department training officer and D.A.R.E. instructor. "It was a very fun class for me to do, as well."

The curriculum included classroom assignments, as well as homework. Subjects ranged from drugs and alcohol to gang violence. The course even included information about smoking cigarettes, with visits from role models who shared

their personal stories with the children.

Reed said the program received tremendous support from both teachers and parents.

"It was very evident ... that the families took this very seriously," he said. "[The teachers] were so supportive."

Friday's graduation included skits by all three sixth-grade classes — students in the classes of Kathy Dorr, Lynn Kortz, and Barbara Terry — and essay readings by several students about what the program had taught them.

"D.A.R.E. taught me the way to say 'no,'" declared Hannah Marshall, essay winner in Dorr's class. Sarah Holzrichter in Terry's class was recognized for her essay, while Burt was the top essayist for Kortz' class. The overall essay winner was Laura Peters. All the students were given certificates for their successful completion of the class.

The D.A.R.E. program was developed in 1983 by the Los Angeles Police Department and the Los Angeles school system. It is taught worldwide.


