Roi Rats meet with colonel at town hall

The commander is responsible for all the people on his installation, not just the soldiers, said Col. Gary K. McMillen, USAKA/KMR commander, at the Roi-Namur town hall meeting Wednesday night.

The comment was in response to questions from attendees about funding sources and how projects that involve only a small segment of the Kwaj population, such as the proposed skateboard park, take priority over other projects. A spirited question-and-answer session followed a slide presentation by the commander.

McMillen opened the well-attended meeting by outlining the accomplishments of the last 90 days, including three successful missions. In addition, he said the Strategic Plan 2000, used to determine the installation's course of action for the next three to five years, has been finalized.


The next 90 days, according to McMillen, will bring three missions; a contingent of dignitaries, including Lt. Gen. John Costello, SMDC commander; and a change of command ceremony on July 27.

McMillen demonstrated the practical use of the Army Performance Improvement Criteria (APIC) with the results of two surveys. An e-mail survey about APIC and Strategic Plan Awareness showed that 81 percent of the surveyed population knew about APIC. Also, a very high percentage agreed with the validity (more than 90 percent) and the achievability (more than 80 percent) of APIC goals.

The mail-in housing survey indicated that Roi residents are pleased with their housing, while Kwaj accompanied and unaccompanied are not as satisfied.

Concerns and issues from the last

Graduates take center stage

Jason Loeak knows a thing or two about melding two worlds. For 13 years, he has commuted to Kwajalein High School every day from Ebeye as part of the Guest Student Program.

"It was a real challenge. Being in two cultures was real hard. Speaking English here and then going back and speaking Marshallese there — it was real hard," Loeak said.

Friday night, the hard work paid off. Loeak received his diploma along with 23 other graduates of the class of 2000.

The graduates marched into the multi-purpose room to the familiar strains of Pomp and Circumstance.

They wore traditional caps and gowns. But this was graduation Kwaj style. The students arrived barefoot, wearing celebratory leis.

Scarlett Scholte, a witness to 26 Kwaj graduations, said it is the personalization that makes the ceremony really special. Students plan the entire program, from flowers to music. They also produce a slide show with pictures of each student.

According to the class history, 10 of the graduates began kindergarten together on Kwaj. They were only the second class to include students from Ebeye, five in all, in the Guest Student Program.

town hall meeting were then addressed.

"I have not received one call on the Hot Line in the last month," McMillen happily stated, indicating that issues are being handled by the normal chain-of-command instead.

Issues and concerns now resolved include: Flyer inserts for the *Hourglass* are being received bi-weekly; Roi has it's own POW/MIA flag; the trays used to self-clear the tables in Café Roi are on-island and will be delivered within the next week; and work will begin on the patron restrooms at Café Roi by the end of the fiscal year.

McMillen also announced that USAKA/KMR Regulation 210-10 has been modified to allow guests from Third Island to be sponsored at 8 a.m. on Sundays, Mondays, and holidays, rather than waiting until 9

a.m.

The Adopt-an-Area program is still being investigated and results will be forthcoming.

In response to questions about priorities on monies available from the Recreation Fund, the commander showed a slide outlining the per capita expenditures for residents on Roi (\$909) versus Kwaj (\$507). During the same discussion, the commander indicated that, although more than \$100,000 was spent on the beautification of downtown Kwaj, \$60,000 of that was spent on paving and safety issues.

"Many projects were put together. I don't want [the pavement] dug up for the next two to three years," McMillen explained. Additionally, he outlined the plan to clean up Kwaj, Roi, and Meck, as well as get rid of eyesores, such as concrete slabs left from demolition of old buildings, in order "to bring [the islands] back to

a natural state."

Simone Smead, Community Activities manager, fielded the question about the status of movie projectors. "Goal No. 1 is to [fix existing projectors]. Goal No. 2 is determining what we're going to do long-term."

According to McMillen and Smead, the long-term goal is to update from 16 mm to a new format; otherwise, Kwajalein and Roi will not be able to show new movies.

A question about the status of a Roi Marina fueling station was the other hot topic on the mind of Roi residents. The answer will be available before the next town hall meeting, according to McMillen.

Finally, the commander introduced John Jorgenson, USAKA/KMR Automation Security specialist. Jorgenson has been tasked to upgrade software that will allow K-badges to be used whenever an ID is required.

Range operation set for Friday, June 9

From Command Safety Office

A range operation is scheduled for Friday, June 9. Caution times are 7:01 p.m. Friday through 4:01 a.m. Saturday, June 10.

In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within Kwajalein Atoll, defined by the area bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr Island on the west reef, and bounded on the south by a line drawn north of Bigej Island on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E, and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the west reef.

Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor. All other mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands.




In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, Kwajalein police island clearance procedures will begin at approximately 7:30 a.m. on Tuesday, June 6, and continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all air and seacraft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following day:

•7:01 p.m. Saturday, June 10, through 4:01 a.m. Sunday, June 11.



"They're fun to take pictures of," Hamill added.


