Aloha Airlines expanding service to Kwaj

New flight to offer non-stop connection

Aloha Airlines announced this week it would expand service between Honolulu and the Marshall Islands, offering the first non-stop service between Hono and Kwajalein.

"Plans have been around for some time to expand service to that area," said Julie King, Aloha Airlines Public Relations manager. "There is a market demand for it."

The new service begins April 9 and will offer residents a second flight op-

tion on Wednesday. Continental Air Micronesia flies to Honolulu via Majuro on Wednesday, departing at 5:25 p.m.

The proposed schedule for Aloha shows Flight 353 departing Honolulu on Mondays at 3 p.m. and arriving at Kwajalein on Tuesdays at 6:34 p.m. Flight 353 continues from Kwajalein at 7:20 p.m. and arrives in Majuro at 8:12 p.m.

On the return, Aloha Flight 354 departs Majuro on Wednesdays at 9:45 a.m. and arrives in Kwajalein at 10:35 a.m. It continues from Kwajalein at 11:25 a.m. and arrives in Honolulu on Tuesdays at 6:53 p.m.

"These flights will have the distinction of being the first direct flights

from Hawaii to Kwajalein Atoll in the Marshall Islands," according to a company press release.

King said she could not comment on whether or not fares could change as a result of the expansion. Round-trip airfare on Aloha Airlines and Continental Air Micronesia is \$871.60 for government contractors.

The new service will feature the brand new Next Generation Boeing 737-700 aircraft. Seats will be configured with 12 in first class and 112 in the coach cabin.

Joe Johnston, Aviation Department airfield manager, said he had been aware of Aloha's plans, but the offi-

New firewall in effect 24 hours

Pornography off-limits on free Internet

The command is trying to make the information highway a little safer for young people by expanding the firewall filter service this month.

The free Internet service, offered to all residents, will no longer allow users to access pornographic sites after 5 p.m., according to Rick Huber, RSE Information Technology Division Systems Support manager.

"If you call to an Internet pro-

vider back in the states, you can go anywhere you want,"

Huber said. "I think they're saying, this is a free service provided by the government, so they want to make it appropriate for everyone."

The free Internet service has long had filters aimed at criminal activity, gambling and hate speech. As a government system, those topics may not be viewed on government-provided systems. A pornography filter has been in place

E-mail accounts shut down while virus eradicated

Anna Kournikova came to Kwajalein Tuesday — not the tennis player, but instead a computer virus using her photo as a cover to sneak into e-mails around the world.

Information Technology technicians shut down e-mail accounts for around 1,000 USAKA/KMR and KLS users for about four hours while the technicians obtained the virus' signature and installed the computerized inoculation, according to Jason Fuller, manager of RSE PC Network Support.

The virus is a derivative of the "Prolin" virus that hit Kwaj Dec. 5 and the "I Love You" virus that came on-island in May. Arriving with the subject lines, "Here you are ;-)", "here you have ;o)" and "here



Shark attacks worldwide on the rise

Shark attacks around the globe hit a four-decade high in 2000, with 79 reports, according to a report released by the International Shark Attack File. Ten of those attacks were fatal.

The state of Florida earned the dubious distinction of being the No. 1 site for unprovoked shark attacks, with 34, the report said.

Unprovoked attacks are defined as incidents where an attack on a live human by a shark occurs in its natural habitat without human provocation.

Last year was the bloodiest one on record since ISAF began keeping track in 1958. In 1999, 58 unprovoked attacks were recorded. The

yearly average in the 1990s was 54.

The last attack to occur against a USAKA resident was in 1997, according to the RSE Safety office. A Marshallese man was hospitalized in August 1999 following an attack while he was fishing.

ISAF has four attacks on record against divers in the Marshall Islands.

Worldwide, swimmers-waders and windsurfers-surfers accounted for the majority of the attacks in 2000. Divers and snorkelers were targets less than 20 percent of the time.

ISAF is a compilation of all known shark attacks and is administered by the the American Elasmobranch Society and the Florida Museum of Natural History.

Weather in 2000 deviates from normal

A quick review of the weather in 2000 in terms of actual numbers and comparison to normals reveals a "close to normal" year, almost void of variations. The variations lay in the details.

For example, precipitation totaled 98.02 inches, very close to the average of 102.09 inches. But it occurred in an unusual pattern.

The first two months of the year, normally the heart of the dry season, were quite wet, with total rainfall through the end of February 13.53 inches above normal. After nearly normal rainfall in March, things took an abrupt turn April through June. Well below normal rainfall in these months completely erased the earlier surplus and resulted in a deficit of 4.10 inches by the end of June.

A "seesaw" monthly rainfall pattern of above and below normal developed and continued for the remainder of 2000 and resulted in the annual deficit of 4.07 inches. Kwajalein wound up with about 96 percent of the precipitation for a normal year.

Despite being deep in the tropics, the Kwajalein temperature pattern during 2000 was also an interesting one. The average temperature was 81.6 F, really close to the climatic average temperature of 82 F.

A close examination of the average daily maximum and minimum temperatures for the year will raise some eyebrows, however. In particular, the average daily maximum temperature was 85.4 F, 1.3 degrees below the long-term normal of 86.7 F. This is a large difference for an island station deep in the tropics.

On top of this, the average daily minimum temperature for the year was 77.9 F, 0.7 degree above the normal of 77.2 F.

So, although the annual average temperature was close to normal, the average daily range in temperature was compressed by a full 2 degrees — quite remarkable for the deep, tropical Pacific.

Winds experienced on Kwajalein during 2000 caught the attention of all island residents. The date of Aug. 20 is particularly memorable for the peak wind of 67 mph associated with a squall that caused significant property damage.

The honors for the windiest month go to December, when speeds averaged 20.5 mph. These strong winds resulted in unhappy boaters for 10 continuous days as a Small Craft Advisory was in effect from Dec. 17 to 27.

Kwaj finished the year with an average wind speed of 14.9 mph, about 9 percent above the annual normal of 13.7 mph.




Range mission is Thursday

A range operation is scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 22. Caution times are 5:27 a.m. through 10:56 a.m. Thursday.

In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within Kwajalein Atoll, defined by the area bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr Island on the west reef, and bounded on the south by a line drawn north of Bigej Island on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E, and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the west reef.

Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor. All mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands. Additional caution areas are specified on the mission maps on this page.

In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, Kwajalein police island clearance procedures will begin at approximately 7:30 a.m. on Sunday and continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all air and seacraft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in

effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following days:

- 5:27 a.m. to 10:56 a.m. Friday, Feb. 23.

you go ;-)", the e-mail includes an attachment marked AnnaKournikova.jpg.vbs. Once activated, the virus infects the home computer, copies e-mail address books and sends itself out to new victims.

The virus reportedly hit thousands of computers worldwide at various

government agencies and private industries.

For Kwajalein's IT, the virus represented an inconvenience, as the system shut down, but no damage was reported, Fuller said.

As major viruses proliferate on the Internet, computer users are advised to take precautions, such as don't

open e-mails from unknown sources and report any unusual looking e-mails to IT's Help Desk at 52444.

Also, maintain your home computer like a professional; buy anti-virus software and keep that software up to date by downloading the latest signature files from your anti-virus software website.

during business hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., because the school system shares the same Internet service, but came down after hours. That topic too, is restricted under government regulations.

Two weeks ago, Col. Curtis L. Wrenn Jr., USAKA / KMR commander, ordered the pornographic filter to remain in place 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

"The island Internet server is a government system," said John Jorgensen, USAKA Automation Security Specialist. "We are required to follow policies and procedures." He added that this does not affect those who have their own Internet service provider.

"In addition, if there are other legitimate sites that cannot be accessed," Jorgensen said, "call the IT Help Desk and give them the information. They will verify the site, open

the associated firewall port, and allow access."

Since the changeover, both IT and the command have received a few complaints, and IT is referring all calls to the Commander's Hotline, Huber said.

The filters consist of a private company software program installed into the firewall system. The company creates the software by reviewing sites and plugging their address into the software, and is regularly updated. It is not foolproof, however, Huber added.

"You could have a photography site, for example, that gets blocked because it has, or once had, one artistic photo," he said. On the other hand, "The Internet is very dynamic, and just because there's a filter doesn't mean it will catch all pornographic sites. Thousands are being created daily, so adult supervision of young people is recommended."

KRC sponsoring sweetheart of a race

Where else but Kwajalein could a 10-year-old and 40-year-old compete in the same sporting event?

One of the Kwajalein Running Club's most popular events, the annual Sweetheart Relay Run, is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. Tuesday. Check-in is between 8:30 and 8:45 a.m. in the lawn area between the Bowling Center (Building 805) and Brandon Field.

The Sweetheart Relay is a handicapped, four-mile race featuring teams of four runners. There's a staggered start based on each team's handicap, which is computed by the age and gender of its members.

Ed Hillman, event organizer, said the relay is more about participation than competition and is open to the public, not just KRC members.

"We want to get more people off the couch," he said. "The Sweetheart Relay is one of the more fun runs."

The event, like many of those sponsored by KRC, enjoys a long history.

It was originally called the Kwajalein Carnival Relay Race when Kwajalein sponsored a large carnival that attracted the entire island, according to Hillman.

"After the carnival was no longer held, the race was called the Non-Carnival Relay Race," he said, add-

ing that the name was changed several years ago to the "more positively themed, Sweetheart Relay."

The handicapped format of the event has never changed, however. Hillman said the start of the race is staggered, per team handicap, with the idea being that the anchor leg runners will finish closely spaced. The team with the largest handicap starts its first runner some 10 minutes before the first runner on the team with the lowest handicap.

"The handicapped nature of the event makes it fun for runners, joggers and walkers of all ages," Hillman said. "During the Kwajalein Carnival Relay days, the relay race would attract as many as 60 teams — 240 runners. Recently, we usually have 10 to 15 teams."

Last year's event featured 11 teams, with Fast Company, made up of Sharon Greenbaum, Charles Greenbaum, David Zakeri and Derek Brower, taking first place. They ran away with the competition, posting a time of 23:08, more than five minutes better than the second place team of Larry Krone, Dana Cocchi, Ed Hillman and Larry Krone, also known as Sum-Ting Special.

The deadline for registration is noon Monday. Forms can be turned into Hillman at Qtrs. 112-C or call him at 52454.


