## Smokin' — Fire drill gets hot

Less than two minutes elapsed from ignition by a gas-soaked burning rag to red and orange flames shooting out the trailer windows and licking the silver exterior. The rooftop air conditioner vents belched heavy yellow and gray smoke. Two firefighters, weighted down and unrecognizable in the heavy gear, pulled a hose through the front door of the trailer, while two more waited just outside in the hot sun in case help was needed. Another few minutes and the flames were extinguished, the smoke turned white and gradually ceased. Then another rag was lit and fire consumed more of the trailer.

The scene was part of the USAKA Fire & Emergency Services live-fire training exercise, held near the barge ramp at the west end of the island Monday. Starting

## Events highlight Memorial Day

Kwajalein's traditional Memorial Day ceremony will be held Monday, May 28, at 10 a.m. at the flagpoles. The ceremony serves as a special time to remember and thank the men and women who have given their lives in defense of their country.

Col. Curtis L. Wrenn, Jr., USAKA/KMR commander, will be the featured speaker. He will pay tribute to men and women in uniform throughout the past 226 years, the soldiers who fought at Kwajalein's historic battlefield and made the sacrifices that allow people to meet here now, as well as today's soldiers protecting freedom around the world.

The master of ceremonies at Monday's event will be 1st Lt. (P) Jeff Emhuff, USAKA/KMR installation transportation officer, and Mike Paris will speak on behalf of the veterans' organizations.

The Memorial Day service also includes the Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School band and the symbolic

## Kwaj Kids unite for education

Currently there are 44 of them on Kwajalein Atoll, there are hundreds more of them worldwide and annually some of them migrate to different parts of the world and mingle. Periodically, a few return to reside on Kwajalein Atoll again. They are Kwaj kids and they have existed on and off Kwajalein since dependents were first allowed.

As of last Friday, the Kwaj Kids are an officially chartered group on island with a goal of annually awarding scholarships to high school seniors, said Jeff Beckley, RSE Kwajalein Technical manager and former Kwaj kid who returned 26 years ago. "It's for the consummate Kwaj kid."

"Our focus is to give scholarships to seniors that weren't based on the typical GPA or SAT scores," said Michael Potts, Kwaj Kids presi-

dent who graduated with the 1992 Kwajalein high school class. "There are 44 of us out here.... For me ... it took going away to realize how much I loved this place. I think a lot of the people that came back feel that way. Our goal was to try and recognize people that ... realized that ahead of time ... and took advantage of their time here."

The recently formed board plans to give the first scholarships at this year's graduation, Potts said. On May 9, seniors planning to attend a four-year college received information about the scholarships. Six applications for the "minimum of \$500 scholarships" met the May 18 deadline.

"We weighted it heavy on a [500 word] essay ... "What makes Kwajalein special to you," Potts said.

In addition to the essay there are two other criteria — time spent on



# 58,000 electric drills under recall

### From RSE Safety

In cooperation with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, Milwaukee Electric Tool Corp. and DEWALT Industrial Tool Co. are recalling about 58,000 electric drills.

The switches on these power tools, which were manufactured by Eaton Corp., can stick. The drills can continue to operate after the trigger is released, posing a risk of injury to consumers.

Milwaukee Electric Tool Corp. has received four reports of drill switches sticking in the on position and one report of a hand injury. DEWALT has received three reports of drill switches sticking in the on position but no reported injuries.

The drills were sold under the brand names Milwaukee Electric Tool 1/2-inch drills and DEWALT 1/2-inch Stud & Joist Drills.

Model Numbers of Recalled Tools: 1610-1, 1630-1, 1670-1, 1675-1,

DW124 or DW124K.

Owners can call the recall hotline number at (866) 473-2288, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. (Central Time), Monday through Friday.

The model number and serial number/date code are written on an identification plate attached to the drill or stamped into the drill body.

Home center and hardware stores, industrial tool distributors, and factory service dealers sold these drills with the Eaton switches nationwide from May 2000 to April 2001 for between \$300 and \$555.

Consumers should stop using these drills immediately and contact the tool manufacturer to receive a free tool repair.

# KHS' Burt named as Presidential Scholar

Kwajalein High School senior Mary Etta Burt was named a 2001 Presidential Scholar last week.

This honor was given to only 140 American high school students, from both the U.S. and overseas. The award is based on academic achievement, personal characteristics, leadership and service activities and an analysis of the students' essays.

Burt will be honored during National Recognition Week, June 23-28, in Washington, D.C., during which the scholars are awarded the Presidential Scholars' medallion at a ceremony sponsored by the White House.

One of three female overseas semifinalists, Burt found out she had been selected while browsing the Internet late one evening.

"I didn't believe it," she said. "I ran upstairs and woke up my Dad. I was

happy I got to the semifinals, and I hadn't even considered it."

All Presidential Scholars are asked to identify the educators who have most influenced them, and those selected are also invited to attend National Recognition Week. Burt chose Scarlett Scholte.

She explained that although she had Scholte as a teacher for eighth- and ninth-grade English, it wasn't so much the academic influence, but it was "getting me involved in all the other stuff at Kwaj.

"When I first got here, I wasn't very happy," Burt said, "and she really listened to me and got me involved in soccer and drama.

"I called her the day after I found out and said, 'We're going to Washington.' I'm excited that 'Scholtz' is going with me," referring to her nickname for Scholte.

The U.S. Presidential Scholars program was established in 1964 to recognize and honor some of the nation's most distinguished graduating seniors.

Semifinalists for the honor are chosen based on their SAT or ACT scores. From the 500 semifinalists, 120 academic scholars and 20 arts scholars were selected in April by

the Commission on Presidential Scholars.

During National Recognition Week the scholars meet with government officials, educators, authors, musicians, scientists and other accomplished people. They also have a chance to visit museums and monuments and attend recitals, receptions and ceremonies.

"The scholars represent excellence in education and the promise of greatness in young people," according to the program's website.

"It will be a chance to meet people in government, but also other students," Burt said. "One of the neatest things is getting to meet other kids my age."

Last year the ceremony was held on the south lawn of the White House, and the President presented the award.

"It's going to be a very memorable experience," she said, "and it may help me decide which direction to go in."

Burt plans to attend Williams College in Massachusetts in the fall and said she will major in math, physics or possibly government.

She is the daughter of Chuck and Sue Burt.

island and community service.

"If two people are essentially equal after the essays [are judged] ... we'll lean towards the person who has been here [longer]. The other criteria is community service or extra curricular activities that benefit Kwajalein Atoll."

Stan Jazwinski, vice-president, Fred Cunningham, treasurer, and Tyler Shields, secretary, along with Potts meet this evening to read each application and determine the scholarship winners. The number of scholarships has not been decided yet, Potts said, adding the board is made up of people "that wanted to get it started."

The original idea for Kwaj Kids scholarship was not his; it was

Beckley's and Simone Smead's, Potts said. "Jeff has been a lot of help ... he is pretty much our sounding board."

Smead, who left Kwaj at the end of 11th grade in 1984, has spent a total of 16 years on island.

"Jeff and I came up with it about four years ago, but didn't have time to put it together," Smead said. "Michael has done a great job. I know he will keep tweaking the criteria."

Potts said that there has already been a lot of discussion. "If we can change anything [next year]... it will be to include anybody going on to any kind of degree.

"The generosity of the Kwaj kids on island made this work," Potts said.

laying of memorial wreaths at the Kwajalein battlefield memorial plaque to honor those who have died for their country.

The Kwajalein Pipes and Drums will play a tribute to departed heroes, and the ceremony will end with a 21-gun salute and taps.

The tradition of honoring soldiers who have died in war began during the Civil War, when Southern women visited the battlefields to strew flowers on the soldiers' graves. On May 30, 1868, the first national day was observed.

In case of rain, the ceremony will be held at Island Memorial Chapel.

## Burning trailer training prepares firefighters ...

early in the morning, trainers prepared the second of two excess office trailers and briefed the participants on the exercise and safety precautions.

"Apparently these [trailers] were in such poor condition, no one wanted them," said F&ES Chief Ragnar Opiniano, explaining that the first trailer was burned in a similar exercise two months before. "This is invaluable fire training."

Eight years ago, USAKA sent all its firefighters to Miramar Naval Station for such live-fire training since Kwajalein does not have an EPA-approved fire pit and the training is required by the Army and DoD.

"This is a controlled environment," Opiniano said. "We prepare the trailer here for certain conditions. We set the fire and control it."

The firefighters first knocked out all the windows with fire axes and poles during a ventilation class taught by Lt. John Finley.

Breaking windows when a fire has already started "gets rid of the hot gases, but it adds more oxygen," Opiniano said. "It's a tradeoff ... it's a tactical decision."

Assistant Fire Chief Jerry Leverett said that residents shouldn't break windows during a fire because a serious situation called backdraft could develop.

"A fire will burn until there is not enough oxygen to maintain the fire," Opiniano said. "At that point the temperature is rising and there are unburned flammable gases produced by the initial fire. If you introduce oxygen from the wrong direction ... that's where the backdraft comes in ... unburned gases violently ignite and expand, causing a fire of potentially explosive force. When a backdraft situation is evident, vertical ventilation is the preferred method to reduce the hazards."

In all the trailer fires that have happened on Kwajalein, it is fortunate that they were sealed because of air conditioning, Leverett said. Each trailer fire has almost smothered itself, then "all we have to do is open a back window and let the unburned gases escape and come in the opposite way with our hoses ... It will start burning like mad if you [break windows] ahead of time."

By 10 a.m., the first team of four Roi-Namur firefighters geared up for the initial live-fire exercise.

"We put pallets, mattresses, combustibles ... in there," Finley said. "We do one room at a time; [we] call it an evolution. Start that evolution, then [firefighters] go in and extinguish that. Then we'll send another crew in.

"Hopefully, we'll get four evolutions out of it," Finley said. "That's one thing about training fires, they don't always work out. May get less or more than expected."

F&ES Capt. Steve Chick started the first fire quickly, and just as quickly students extinguished the blaze.

"See how fast that went up," Finley said as he adjusted his helmet, readying himself for the next fire.

A trailer could easily go up within five minutes, Opiniano said. "Actually [a fire] is more dangerous in a residential environment. Last trailer fire we had, there was a lot of decorations and class A fuels ... aerosol cans, paper

products and knick-knacks."

The teams performed both offensive, putting out the fire using short blasts of water, and defensive fire fighting, protecting the surrounding area, Opiniano said.

In this case, the Fire Department tried to save two palm trees directly behind the trailer.

While the third team was donning their heavy garments and air tanks, a fire hidden in the ceiling of the trailer broke through the roof. Flames leaped up as water was sprayed up through the roof. Climbing a ladder, Finley extinguished the flames by spraying water down onto the roof.

"This is excellent [training]," Leverett said. "[The fire] was hidden and rekindled during the training exercise."

At the end of the day, the department had extinguished three set fires and the hidden roof fire, accomplished ventilation training and saved two palm trees behind the trailer.

"It was great training," Finley said.
