New child abuse policy in place

Following an Army evaluation team's visit to the Kwajalein Child Development Center last week, the Kwajalein community now has a new procedure for reporting suspected cases of child abuse.

In a change from previous procedure, all residents with concerns about child abuse should now call 52224 at Kwajalein Hospital, said Trina Tiffany, CDC director. Callers just need to report that they have a concern, she said.

"The reporter will [now] call directly to the point of contact," said Karen Ammann, school superintendent, adding they also needed a 24-hour line.

Under previous policy, teachers passed concerns to their supervisor, who then reported them to the medical department, she said.

The entire community is responsible for reporting concerns when they arise, she said.

"When they report child abuse, the

information is always kept confidential," Tiffany said.

The 24-hour number is the regular daytime and after-hours number answered by medical staff (receptionists and nurses), said Chief Medical Officer Dr. Eric Lindborg.

A caller will usually be given the number of the individual(s) taking on the responsibility for abuse investigation, Lindborg said, explaining this is generally the counselor/psychologist, but sometimes it may be the CMO or duty physician depending on who is available.

"The hospital number is thus simply a liaison number," he said. "Individuals will not be required to give any personal ID or details when calling this number."

Once a report is received, protocol involves evaluating the child and interviewing the alleged perpetrator to determine if there is any validity to the report, he said.

"If problems are confirmed, a treat-

Fairlamb: U.S. has not agreed to RMI tax hike

The U.S. government is concerned about a proposal by the RMI to increase a 5 percent income tax on contract civilian employees at USAKA, according to a U.S. official involved in a series of negotiations between the two countries.

"We have not agreed to a tax increase," said Dr. John Fairlamb, Foreign Affairs specialist. Fairlamb is the SMDC representative to the U.S. State Department team, led by Al Short, in charge of the Compact of Free Association negotiations with the RMI, as well as the Federated States of Micronesia. The State Department is also engaged with the RMI in discussions about extending the Military Use and Operating Rights Agreement for USAKA.

The proposed tax increase is actually a part of an eight-point plan put forth by the RMI government to the U.S. in regard to the MUORA. The MUORA describes funding levels and other provisions for the use of the Kwajalein Defense Sites by the U.S. The RMI is seeking to increase funding and extend the agreement until at least 2023 and perhaps much longer. That would coincide with the expiration of the direct economic assistance provided by the U.S. to the Marshall Islands under a proposed amendment to Title II of the Compact.

Earlier this month both sides initiated ad referendum amended Compact economic provisions under Title II, which would provide funding for the Marshalls at new levels for 20 more years beginning Oct. 1, 2003. Negotiators also made amendments to the bilateral defense and security relationship under Title III and the survivability and termination provisions un-

Editorial doesn't go deep enough on Roi dive accident

I am a resident of Roi-Namur and a very active member of the dive community here. As such, I feel I am friends with all the parties involved, or at least on friendly terms with all of the parties. Being what I consider neutral, I feel a responsibility to rebut the recent editorial stating that Virgil was held up to ridicule.

I have had numerous conversations with Virgil and the dive officers on Roi and never once have I heard a single word of ridicule from anyone. If I heard any ridicule, it is for the lack of journalistic integrity in printing a poorly researched editorial. From the article I could deduce that the editor only interviewed one person (Virgil) and has spent little or no time on Roi-Namur.

The conversations I had with the officers revealed a genuine concern to prevent further cases of DCS and a feeling of responsibility both to Virgil and the entire dive community to seek the truth in order to orchestrate a safer environment. Granted, it is a very emotional issue as diving is very important to our living standard.

Throughout the investigation I witnessed the officers going to pains to show respect to everyone concerned. There were serious questions from the officers as to why Virgil would not allow them to view his dive computer. Possibly, they approached it in a way that put Virgil on the defensive;



but, nonetheless, they have both a right and a responsibility to investigate a matter of this gravity.

I cannot believe that any diver would fail to get medical attention if they felt their health was at risk. I did have a concern that divers might be a bit slower to seek help if they viewed their symptoms as minor and if they perceived that to raise questions would result in an inquisition. I raised this issue to the dive club officers, and they assured me they would do no such thing.

I hope that in the future the editor will take time to look into the matter more closely before spouting his own ridicule of the community on Roi-Namur.



Last hurrah

Leonid Meteor Shower could be last for about 96 years

The Leonid Meteor Shower, which put on a spectacular show last year for Kwajalein residents, may have one more year to give, according to some astronomers' predictions. Unfortunately, though, this year's shower will not favor Kwaj.

First, the shower will occur on the night of the full moon, whose shining brightness will greatly reduce the number of meteors that can be seen. Second, the two predicted peaks of meteor activity occur at about 4 p.m. and 10 p.m. on Nov 19. Each peak is expected to last about two hours, centered on the times given above.

These peak times do not favor Kwaj residents, since the Leonid *radiant*, the point in the constellation Leo from which the meteors seem to radiate, will not rise until

about 1 a.m. on Nov. 20, after the second peak is predicted to be finished. Also, in general, more meteors are seen after midnight, when the Earth is facing into its orbit and "sweeps up" more meteors into the atmosphere.

Meteor showers are produced when the Earth passes through trails of dust ejected by a comet as it cuts across Earth's orbit on its way around the Sun. For the Leonids, the comet is Temple-Tuttle, which last passed close to Earth in 1998.

This year, the first peak occurs when the Earth passes through the ribbon ejected during the 1767 close approach of Temple-Tuttle, while the second peak is from the 1866 pass. After 2002, these same astronomers predict that we will not have another Leonid storm until 2098.

Residents who want to give it one last shot should locate themselves away from street and houselights, and, if possible, try to block the direct light of the full moon from shining in their eyes by getting into a shadow area. Get outside early to give your eyes a chance to adapt to the darkness. Reclining beach chairs work best for reduc-

ing neck strain.

The meteors for the 10:30 p.m. peak should appear to streak out of the east, but will be visible in any part of the sky. The full moon and early peak time will definitely diminish the view, but this is probably the last chance to see a substantial Leonid shower for everyone alive today.

ment plan is drawn up and the case is reviewed (without identification of the family/individuals) by a multi-department ad hoc case review committee in accordance with [USAKA/RTS guidelines]," he said.

"Of course, if there is criminal activity, the security contractor may also be involved in the investigation," he said.

"Under Army regulation, there has to be a mechanism for people on island to report child abuse, and there needed to be one source on island that everybody went through," Tiffany said.

This presents fewer chances for conflict and fewer people who need training, she said. "It makes sense."

Child abuse can be physical, emotional or sexual abuse or neglect, Tiffany said, adding that in the past she has gotten calls, but not many.

"In any community, there tend to be concerns about how children are being treated," she said.

The CDC staff has already been informed of the new procedure, Tiffany

said, and they are all trained yearly in how to recognize and report suspected child abuse.

Ammann said she will put the information in the school newsletter as well.

The surprise visit last week was part of the Army's regular procedure in evaluating Army child care centers.

Army child care centers do their own self-evaluation, "plus they send a surprise team in to the child care center to inspect it," Tiffany said.

The Pacific Evaluation Team from Hawaii included a specialist from the safety office, a community health nurse and two specialists in child care and youth programs.

"They go through all the records, look at the facility, evaluate the program and look at training issues. They also talk to parents," she said. They compare the school's self-evaluation with theirs to see how well the center evaluates itself, she added.

"Most importantly, they commended both the CDC and the School Age Services programs, she said, "and they found

some things we need to work on, which is good."

They especially commended the staff of both CDC and SAS for "providing a child-directed curriculum that relates to both the community and culture the children live in and an enriching environment," she said. They also recognized the parent advisory boards of both CDC and SAS for their strong support, and the Kwaj Kids program for their community service efforts. Recognizing it takes community support to run a successful program, they commended other community agencies for supporting the center's program, Tiffany said.

Areas that needed work were a few playground structures that no longer conformed to new child protection requirements and have now been put off limits until they can be fixed and the CDC kitchen, which they recommend be a separate facility.

"To me this is a positive thing to have the Pacific Evaluation Team come in with a fresh eye to look at your program," Tiffany said.

would receive new furniture in the housing units.

The housing furniture had been expected during the summer, but the vendor shipped the BQ furniture first, according to Galloway.

Furniture Warehouse personnel are now in the process of delivering the second round of family housing furniture. Three containers with 15 sets of furniture — about 14 pieces per set — arrived on the last PM&O barge. Galloway said she expects another four to five such shipments over the next 30 weeks before the delivery is complete.

Priority for who gets furniture first is based on those who requested a full set of furniture, she said. Some residents, she explained, have personal furniture, such as rosewood, that they want to use instead of the new furniture. Once all of the full sets have gone out, the remainder of the houses will be stocked, Galloway said.

"There should be plenty for everybody who were winners for the drawing," she said, asking for residents' patience as the

items are processed. "We're just trying to take our time to make sure everybody gets what they asked for."

Housing worked with the vendor to customize a few of the new pieces especially for Kwaj homes, according to Galloway. For example, the desks were designed with a pullout drawer for a computer keyboard, she said. In other cases, tables and desks were re-sized to better accommodate the living spaces in the typical Kwaj home.

While the project is underway, all normal Furniture Warehouse business will be on hold, Galloway said, anticipating that all the pieces should be delivered around the Thanksgiving holiday. The warehouse will still respond to emergency calls, she said.

The excessed furniture is going to the DCCB, where it will be auctioned, Galloway said. Some items, like rattan furniture that's still in good shape, will be saved for the trailers, she added.

Galloway said the Furniture Warehouse is also interested in feedback. "Let us know how you like the new furniture."

Osama tape under review

to the Compact still have to go before Congress for final approval.

Fairlamb said there was "significant movement" on the MUORA talks in a round of discussions held on Oct. 30 and 31. He said the U.S. made its position on a tax increase clear to the Marshallese, telling them it could potentially harm the installation's ability to attract qualified and capable personnel as well as put the range at a competitive disadvantage.

"We're well aware of the impact out here," Fairlamb said.

The USAKA command is also strongly opposed to any tax increase, according to Col. Jerry Brown, USAKA commander.

"We should not go down this road," he said. "The tax proposal has second- and third-order consequences that could be detrimental to the Marshallese workforce.

"I believe we can come up with better ways to address the problem while protecting our workforce," Brown added.

While further negotiations on

the Compact are tentatively scheduled for early next year, Fairlamb said he is optimistic a U.S. government response to the RMI MUORA proposal could come within a month. **Compact headed to Congress**

Meanwhile, it appears a year of high-level talks between the two countries is nearly over as many of the key Compact issues under renegotiation have been agreed upon by U.S. and RMI representatives.

Funding levels have been settled. Between fiscal years 2004 and 2016, the RMI will receive \$54.1 million per year in grants, trust fund money and Kwajalein impact funds. After 2016 and until 2023, the payments drop to \$36.8 million because that's when the current MUORA payment cease. Within the base grant is a total of \$6 million earmarked for the Marshallese communities of Kwajalein Atoll, according to Fairlamb.

Independent reports in the Marshallese media place the value at nearly \$1 billion in direct grants and for a trust fund. The FSM package, according to news reports, is worth about \$1.8 billion.

The base grant starts at \$36 million and decreases \$500,000 per year, while the trust fund begins at \$7 million and increases by a similar amount on an annual basis. By the time the fiscal provision expires in 2023, the base grant will be at \$20.3 million and the trust fund will stand at \$16.5 million. The trust fund is intended to help the RMI stand on its own economically, according to Fairlamb.

While both sides initialed the agreements, the RMI indicated it had several reservations, according to Fairlamb.

"We don't have any reservations on our side," he added.

One sticking point for the RMI is the reduced role of the Federal Emergency Management Agency in the Marshalls. FEMA has agreed to provide up to \$50,000

per year in matching grants for the next 20 years to help the RMI create its own disaster plan, Fairlamb said. However, the agency, which is not designed to operate in foreign, sovereign countries, will no longer directly assist in cases of typhoons or other disasters, he said.

But that doesn't mean the Marshalls will be entirely without help, Fairlamb noted. The U.S. Agency for International Development's Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance will handle any disaster relief efforts, as it does for other foreign nations, he explained.

"We're still going to be providing disaster assistance," he said.

The RMI also expressed reservations on the inflation cap placed on the proposed 20-year funding scheme under the Title II amendment.

"We stand firmly to our position to apply a full inflation adjustment over

the 20-year period for the Title II assistance," said RMI Foreign Minister Gerald Zackios during his opening remarks at the fifth round of negotiations in Majuro on Oct. 31. "As we have worked out the numbers, the base grant declines at a rapid rate that we don't believe our domestic revenues can replace quickly enough, though we are estimating increased domestic revenue generation.

"In addition, we believe our economy is more sensitive to inflation ... more than the U.S. mainland."

Fairlamb said there are still several subsidiary agreements, such as the future of weather service, to complete in the upcoming weeks. The texts will then go to Congress for debate and a vote. Legislators have the power to make any changes they see fit, such as on those reservations expressed by the RMI, Fairlamb explained.

"We don't think they'll change them dramatically," he said.

The amended Compact provisions would go into effect Oct. 1, 2003. Fairlamb said 11 months should be sufficient time for the final discussions to wrap up and for Congress to approve the amendments.

"We've gone as far as we can go as negotiators," he said.

Family housing furniture on the way

Lexy Galloway's new office at the Furniture Warehouse sure is spacious — maybe that's because it's sitting outside under a tree.

Galloway and her crew have moved their operation outside to expedite unloading, tagging and delivering 15 complete sets of new furniture to family housing. The move outdoors saves time in a labor-intensive project that has taken priority over all other work orders.

"We're trying to work smarter, not harder," Galloway said.

The command approved the purchase of \$1 million in new furniture last year. Spring and Spartan BQs on Roi-Namur, with 60 rooms, have already been outfitted, and two more BQs here, the Palm and Reef, with 127 total rooms, are still in the process of receiving the new furniture. In addition, enough furniture was ordered to accommodate 100 families in 400-series housing. A lottery held in May determined who
