## Humanitarian mission goes to Enewetak

Laughter and children in pink T-shirts gradually filled the pews of the white-washed church with neat blue trim and tri-color stained glass. On the covered front porch, a doctor listened for congestion in a baby's lungs while the first rains in four months dampened the surprisingly lush landscape.

A late Christmas arrived at Enewetak Atoll on Tuesday along with a 1900D plane from Kwajalein. Filled with 11 passengers, 900 pounds of Samaritan's Purse shoeboxes, Bible stories in Marshallese and medical supplies, the tiny aircraft landed on the runway originally built to handle B-29 bombers.

After the Kwaj contingent was welcomed with flower *wuts*, leis and fresh

## Hammering away — CILHI optimistic, changing strategy

The last card hasn't been played yet.

The mass grave that holds the nine Makin Marines still eludes the team from the U.S. Army Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii, despite some promising features that appeared during the excavation in the last week or so. But all four features — roughly oval-shaped dark patches — turned out to be shell craters, according to Dr. Greg Fox, CILHI archaeologist.

While team members are currently excavating the southern section of the site, located across the street from the Japanese Cemetery, they will soon turn north again based on a hunch and a hope.

Fox said it's possible that at least one of the maps, including a 1944 pre-invasion map, that are being used to plot the excavation could be in error. A Japanese gun emplacement may not be plotted at its actual location, he explained, meaning the team could be as much as 160 feet off the

## Impact of proposed 2003 federal budget on USAKA unclear

President George W. Bush announced this week his plans to beef up homeland security and other Department of Defense initiatives. The president offered a proposed military budget of \$379 billion in the next fiscal year, an increase of \$48 billion over the current fiscal year — reportedly the biggest jump in defense spending in two decades.

What those numbers will mean to the USAKA budget in fiscal year 2003 is unclear at this time.

Brian Burnham, USAKA Resource Management program analyst and team leader, said next year's USAKA budget will not be finalized for several more months. He noted that the fund that primarily supports the installation — Research, Development, Test and Evaluation — is actually decreasing by about \$200 million, from \$7.1 billion to \$6.9 billion.

"Current projections are for USAKA to receive about \$16 million less in FY03 due to projected [Kwajalein Modernization and Remoting] savings," Burnham said.

The total proposed Army budget for next

# Federal budget doesn't address real needs — more islands


You know, \$2 trillion just doesn't go as far as it used to.

The president's federal budget for the next fiscal year is already out, and a quick perusal of a 700-plus page tome of the government's Analytical Perspectives (subtitled, "Man, We've Got a Lot of Money to Spend") on the 2003 fiscal year makes fascinating reading. If you're already dead.

But that's why I'm here: To make sure you don't die from boredom. So here's a few items that our readers should know about.

(You may be wondering why the government is already working on a budget that doesn't begin until Oct. 1. Well, historically speaking, the debates in Congress surrounding the budget can be intense and time-consuming. In fact, few people know this, but we're actually operating on the budget from 1984 that was just approved three weeks ago. That's one reason we have to do more with less — those 1984 dollars don't go quite as far today.)

Of course the big news is the \$379 billion proposal for defense spending (see related front-page story). That will be a tremendous boost for our military. And, to pause for a moment of seriousness, those folks certainly need the pay raises, better housing and equipment to do their jobs — along with a few really cool missiles, laser guns and some of those 007 utility watches with the explosive paste dispensers for



blowing open cell doors.

Locally, we're not sure whether any of this money will trickle our way. Always the optimist, I've already bought my nut-cracker from Macy's West for when they start serving lobster claws at Café Pacific on Wednesday nights.

Of course, with that much money, we could really hire a whole other army to fight our battles. What about the Russians? Considering many of their military members haven't been paid wages for six months, we could probably get a few battalions and several squadrons for a just a few billion dollars. It's a win-win situation for both sides, as long as we don't send them to Afghanistan.

Then there's the rest of the budget. Now, I'm no budget analyst, but I own a checkbook, so I think that qualifies me to question a few of these expenditures.

For example, speaking of our former Cold War antagonists, take the \$20 million for the Russian Leadership Development trust fund that's squeezed into the international aid category. Is it really a good idea to be training another country's leaders, particularly ones that still have nuclear missiles aimed at our cities? If we want to give money to our enemies, why not fund local ACME factories where they manufacture all of those dysfunctional devices used to catch roadrunners.

Another interesting line item is the United Mine Workers Prescription Drug program. This seems very discriminatory against the United Gold Mine Workers

•Tropical Island Acquisition Fund. I love living on Kwaj, but I know I won't be here forever. Yet, I would like more consistent access to tropical islands with palm trees, beaches and great diving that's not located near Waikiki. I propose a 10-year program to buy French Polynesia.

•Beach Bum Assistance Program. Of course, once moving to said tropical paradise, I will need access to funds to enjoy said tropical lifestyle. That being said, we should begin several pilot Beach Bum Assistance Programs (BBAP) in selected states like Hawaii, California and Florida. If successful, I would like to see this program expanded internationally, to help fellow beach bums from the shores of Australia to the suntan lotion-drenched resorts of the Caribbean. 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




## Cable lives, schools still smart and credit cards beware

## Town Hall Redux: Everything you always wanted to know about Kwaj, Roi — and were not afraid to ask about

*(Editor's Note: The following information is based on questions received at last month's town hall meetings on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur. For further information, contact the Commander's Hotline at 53400.)*

Q: Are hard-skinned fruits, packaged yogurt, etc., included in the restrictions on take-out?

The take-out service at the cafés has been reevaluated and is being continued, as is, on a trial basis. Hard-skinned fruits and packaged yogurt are not currently restricted.

Q: Can Roi's Outrigger (snack bar) stay open until 1:00 p.m.? Everything closes at 12:30, leaving no alternatives for commuters after that time.

On a trial basis, the Outrigger is now open until 1 p.m.

Q: The Three Palms Snack Bar on Kwajalein was closed all day Christmas and New Years Day.

Residents returning from Hawaii on scheduled flights had no place to eat.

Sodexo USA will consider this situation and an alternative schedule for future holiday seasons.

Q: Closing the snack bar at the Dock Security Checkpoint was not a good decision. It had the best chicken on the island.

The customer's opinion is appreciated; however, the snack bar was closed for cost-effective reasons.

Q: Marshallese residents on Roi who are badged workers can't shop at Macy's and Macy's West.

Retail facilities are now allowed to recognize "RMI Roi Resident" badge holders as authorized patrons.

Q: There were two flight cancellations Dec. 26, while more than 10 individuals (workers not hard-seated) were waiting for the flights.

That was a valid problem, which was identified and fixed.

Q: Roi residents can't take advantage of entertainment on Kwajalein, the Yuk Club specialty nights, and other events on Kwaj due to lack of aircraft support.

Requests for additional transportation will be considered when a central point of contact on Roi can guarantee a nearly full aircraft. USAKA Transportation will look at the current schedule.

Q: What's the status of the theaters?

Improvements to the sound system at the Yuk Theater are nearly complete. The Richardson and Tradewinds theater improvements will follow, based on the success and findings of the Yuk conversion. RSE Residential Services will determine completion date.

Q: Sometimes the DoD shows and entertainment, such as the Redskins cheerleaders, only go to Kwajalein and not Roi-Namur.

Some shows are restricted in length of stay, and cannot be

shipped to Roi. Schedules are provided to Roi, and Roi residents are always welcome to attend the events on Kwaj. (RSE Residential Services/Community Activities ensure schedules are provided to Roi). If transportation is required and not scheduled, or not sufficient, special arrangements can be requested for "nearly full" aircraft support, as written above.

Q: On holiday weekends, the Roi Post Office is closed Sunday through Wednesday. Can't it be opened on Wednesday on these weekends?

We now have a part-time postal employee on Roi who is willing and authorized to open Wednesday for mail and package pickup and drop off.

Q: There is no hot water at Café Pacific restrooms.

The hot water works, but patrons need to allow about 15 seconds for the water to heat up.

mark.

"It's based on hypothesis of error that's unconfirmed as yet," Fox said of the decision to work farther north. "When you have a big X on the ground, [160 feet is] a big difference."

Heavy equipment was expected to be brought in for digging in the new area before the end of the week. Fox said the team won't waste any time scraping the top of the site as they've done previously, but dig straight down to the sandy layer. Fortunately, the new area, just across the road to the north toward the lagoon, is relatively open except for a dry-docked sailboat.

"We're not going to leave without taking a look," Fox said, adding he hasn't made a decision on whether or not the team will extend its Feb. 14 deadline.

"I'm still optimistic," he said, explaining that he's been on missions in Southeast Asia where the team hadn't turned up even a button and then one day hit its target. "It happens a lot."

Also influencing the decision to stay or not will be a site visit by the CILHI commander, Col. David Pagano, beginning today. Fox said Pagano is making a swing through the various areas where CILHI teams are deployed. Since January, about 100 CILHI personnel have been deployed to Vietnam alone, along with another 40 members at Kwajalein, Papua New Guinea and Panama, according to a CILHI press release.

Team members in Vietnam are working recovery operations in six provinces, and an

investigation team is scheduled to look into up to 29 cases involving unaccounted for servicemen. The object of the Kwajalein search is the remains of nine missing Marine Raiders who were executed by the Imperial Japanese Navy in October 1942 following a raid on Makin Atoll in the former Gilbert Islands. As many as three B-24 crews may also be buried here.

Even if CILHI should pull its team from Kwajalein before the service members are found, the case is not closed, Fox said. It will be turned back over to the department's historians, who will further research the maps and data, and see if the search can be narrowed down. Additional interviews will also be conducted, he said, noting that there have been plenty of witnesses coming forth

since the team arrived.

The latest testimony to the fate of the Makin Marines came last week during a talk given by Ato Langkio, a Marshallese elder who was here before and during World War II. During the talk, sponsored by the Marshallese Cultural Center, Langkio said, "Nine Americans [were] brought here from an airplane. People said they saw them and then they didn't see them."

How quickly a CILHI team could return for a second excavation is impossible to say at this point, Fox said. The recovery of 19 Marines buried on Butaritari from the 1942 raid in the Gilberts took three tries before the grave site was found. One key to the repatriation was testimony from local islanders.

## FY03 defense budget represents 17 percent of federal pie ...

year is about \$91 billion, about \$10 billion more than this year. Most of the increases in the Army budget are going into personnel, operations and maintenance and procurement.

Bush sent his total federal budget proposal of \$2.13 trillion to Congress Tuesday (local time). The proposed defense budget represents nearly 17 percent of the total federal budget, according to an American Forces Press Service article. Military personnel would receive a 4.1 percent pay raise if Congress approves the request. Civilian workers are slated for a 2.6 percent raise, the article stated.

A senior defense official told AFPS the budget would allow the U.S. military to continue the war on terrorism. All told, money for the war is set at \$27.2 billion in fiscal year 2003. A total of \$10 billion is allocated to

help DoD plan for whatever phase of the war on terrorism comes next.

"We don't know what we will be doing in a year, but we know we will be involved in the war," the official told AFPS.

DoD estimates the current cost of the war in Afghanistan at around \$8 billion.

In related budget news, the Missile Defense Agency reports its projected budget for next fiscal year includes \$128 million for a targets and countermeasures project in association with its Ground-based Missile Defense program, one of the high-profile programs tested at Reagan Test Site.

The funding will be used to evaluate integration of new liquid boosters in the test program, an MDA official told *Defense Daily*.

coconut milk by the acting mayor and other government and church officials, Dr. Jill Horner, Kwajalein Hospital staff doctor, along with nurse Henny Levin, took medical supplies purchased by the Protestant Chapel to the island dispensary. The excited volunteers and 250 shoeboxes full of gifts were taken to the United Church of Christ.

Bringing the gospel and presents to Enewetak Atoll's children is a continuation of the Operation Christmas Child distribution performed on Ebeye Jan. 14 for almost 4,000 children, said Kathy Dorr, event co-chairperson. This distribution is on a much smaller scale.

"This is more like what Samaritan's Purse does in other areas — distributing to small villages," she said.

At the church, Enewetak's leading citizens welcomed the visitors while the children sat as patiently and attentively as possible.

Kwajalein Protestant chaplain, the Rev. John

Dorr, with translation by Noda Lojkar, told the children and adults about Samaritan's Purse.

The organization is a nondenominational, evangelical Christian organization, which provides spiritual and physical aid

around the world. Operation Christmas Child is one of the organization's projects to bring the gospel, with shoeboxes full of gifts, to children everywhere, Dorr said.

Families in the United States fill the shoeboxes with different toys and games, but the shoeboxes are not the greatest gift of all, he reminded the children. "Jesus Christ is the greatest gift of all."

The UCC choir sang to the visitors to thank them for the visit and the gifts.

Lined up by gender and age, starting with the tiny Head Start children, pilot Dave Kendrick and co-pilot Don Serra, Joan and Derek Brower, Lojkar and his wife

Hemikko, Sheila Wrenn, Stephan Notarianni and the Dorr's gave each child a colorful brochure of Bible stories and a shoebox — some almost bigger than the child.

The Lojkar's helped open some boxes, and once the children realized that they were allowed to open them, lollipops, small toy cars, dolls with curly hair and even a wool cap appeared. One 10-year-old sat and read the Bible stories undisturbed by the chaos around him.

Out on the church's front porch gaggles of children played with new toys, while Horner and Levin, working with two boxes containing band aids, vitamins, aspirin and other medical supplies, continued their makeshift clinic.

After seeing three patients, two with pneumonia, at the dispensary, Horner said they decided to set up on the church's front porch, where all the children were gathered.

Parents with small children stood crowding around Horner and Levin,





gospel to other islands and atolls.

Working with Aviation Services and private groups and individuals, volunteers will send the gospel and shoeboxes to destinations such as Lib, Namu and Ailinglapalap atolls and Kosrae, he said.

Helicopter crews visit some islands on training missions and there may be room for some boxes and a person to deliver the gospel just like the trip to Enewetak, Kathy Dorr said. Local Kwaj fishermen are going to Lib and will take along some boxes.

"We'll deliver the kits and gospel and they will fish," John Dorr said, adding that members of the Kwaj Yacht Club plan to go to Namu to deliver gifts.

pointing to aching ears and congested lungs.

Ear and skin infections were the most common problems of the more than 50 people they saw, Horner said. Any leftover supplies were left with the medical aide person at the dispensary.

Before everyone left the church, all the children sang two songs, finishing with an intense version of the RMI anthem.

Of the almost 7,400 Samaritan's Purse boxes, 4,000 were distributed on Ebeye, 60 to Carlos and now 250 to Enewetak, John Dorr said. Plans are still in progress to distribute the rest of the boxes and take the

Another large delivery of 1,000 boxes will take place over spring break.

"The Senior High Youth group is going on a field trip on Palm Sunday weekend to Kosrae," John Dorr said.

Since Kosrae is not in the Marshall Islands, the chaplain had to have the distribution approved by Samaritan's Purse, Kathy Dorr said, explaining that the organization doesn't want the boxes just sitting around. The volunteers don't want to sit around either, and will help again if they can.

"What is better than to spread God's word, give gifts and make children happy," Joan Brower said.

**Kwaj volunteers landscape new hospital**

Amy Storey and two other volunteers, one from Wisconsin visiting family, put their green thumbs to work on Ebeye.

The project was to spruce up the new Ebeye Hospital before its grand opening later this month. Storey, Janice Defferding of Wisconsin and Anne Maley pitched in over the weekend to landscape the hospital grounds with more than 200 plants from the Kwajalein Public Gardens and private residential collections.

"A lot of individual plants," Storey said. "It's really nice. The back is the real focal point, where the redwood decking is, is where most of the colorful plants are."

Donated flora included scaveola, crotons,

porter weed, poinsettias, coconut palms, hibiscus and even four lemon trees, according to Storey. She estimated the project is about two-thirds complete, with the hospital construction contractor committed to bringing in palm trees and wood chips.

The grand opening for the new hospital had been scheduled for this week in conjunction with Marshallese Memorial Day and Nuclear Victims Day but was delayed due to scheduling conflicts. The dedication ceremony is now set for the third week of February, according to Stephan Notarianni, Host Nation support officer.

Meanwhile, a three-member team from Tripler Medical Center in Honolulu will be on Ebeye next week to assist hospital staff with system setups, Notarianni said.
