MISSION POSSIBLE: Logistics of keeping island running with large TDY population offers challenges

If you think you're seeing more new faces than usual on island lately, you're right. The upcoming IFT-8 mission has reportedly brought more than 300 TDY personnel to Kwajalein, with more on the way.

How does this small installation handle the influx of so many temporary people? Logistically it's a challenge, and it takes many people to make everything run smoothly.

A TDY visit begins with the visitors' arrival at Entry-Exit, which has been very busy lately, according to KPD Lt. Melinda Heikkinen, officer in charge of Entry-Exit.

After Sept. 11, a lot of security changes have occurred, as residents are aware, she said, including the 100-percent bag check for all incoming and departing passengers. Add to that the extra people who have been arriving in the past weeks, and the security job grows.

"There is a dramatic increase around mission time," Heikkinen said. "There's a 60 percent to 70 percent increase in workload."

Youth receives five-year bar for 'touching' incident

Police: Rumors of assault unfounded

The USAKA command handed down a five-year administrative bar against a juvenile for what authorities are calling "inappropriate" touching against a female juvenile and other misconduct that occurred about three weeks ago.

"There was no sexual assault," said Maj. Mark Harmon, USAKA provost marshal, trying to shut down the rumor mill that's been working overtime of late. Authorities say there have been rumors of a sexual assault on the island, but they're just that — rumors.

"Nobody has reported a sexual assault to Kwajalein Police Department in the recent past," said Police Chief Kevin Dykema. The last sexual assault case investigated by police happened about a year ago, he said.

In the case involving the juvenile, the trouble began around 10 p.m. one evening when he entered an unlocked residence without permission and removed a bottle of liquor, according to authorities. He then took the bottle to a place called "the tunnel" — a hallway around the elementary school that is secluded from both Ocean and Lagoon roads — and proceeded to drink, and at some point was joined by other juveniles, authorities said.

CILHI uses World War II-era bomb craters to confirm data

The scars of a 58-year-old battle are helping the Central Identification Laboratory team from Hawaii prepare for perhaps its last offensive to find the Makin Raiders.

Comparing the location of now eight unearthed bomb craters — dark, oval-shaped bruises in the ground scattered throughout the excavation site — with a photo of the area taken about 20 days after the Feb. 1, 1944 invasion of Kwajalein Atoll has allowed the team to pinpoint features with maps they've been using during the excavation.

"We think we finally got things well located," said Dr. Greg Fox, CILHI archaeologist.

If that's the case, that means the building where the nine Makin Raiders were held before their execution was indeed located just in front of the RTS Photo Lab, as Fox has speculated for some time. That puts the location of the burial somewhere due north to northwest between the photo lab and the lagoon.

"The road looks like a very good place," said Fox, gesturing to the remnants of the road leading to the barge slip ramp. Over the weekend, the intersection at the photo lab was removed, forcing traffic to be routed around the

The Kwaj connection and the lost riddle of the ages

Some days I'm convinced that Kwajalein is at the epicenter of some sort of time-space vortex, a coral-encrusted black hole where past and future link together like one of those paper chains you made in elementary school for the Christmas tree.

The latest proof involves a couple of local residents who found that the Kwaj connection can stretch farther than a few hundred feet from the ocean to the lagoon.

Our friend Gwyne Copeland held her own high school reunion last weekend during the visit by the California Girls. It turns out the group's drummer, Barbara Goodman, not only went to the same California high school as Gwyne, but the two knew each other fairly well. Gwyne was especially good friends with Barbara's brother, and had been to the family's house on numerous occasions.

The matchmaker in this case was AFN's Rich Feagler, who while DJing a show with the band Saturday morning, fielded a call from Gwyne, who, ever the journalist, began asking questions. Soon, the two realized who the other was.

In another case of Kwaj-style serendipity, Kwaj kid Suzanne Mayo was attending a dorm party while away at the University of Southern California, where she is now a junior. One of the students she met



turned out to be her pen pal while she was taking Spanish class as a junior at Kwajalein high school, according to her father Robert Mayo.

And we all know these are not isolated cases. Everyone seems to have similar stories.

For example, Louis Zamperini, the 1936 Olympian and World War II POW who spent 42 days in captivity at Kwaj, may never have come back to visit in the last two years if it had not been for Kwajalein resident Doris Raymond. The link: Raymond's sister attends the same church in Torrance, Calif., as Zamperini. Well, one thing led to another ... and you know the rest of the story. Look for Zamperini's life story at a theater near you in the future ...

Are these all simply coincidences, mere happenstance in a universe of nearly seven billion people and nearly as many fast-food chains? Or are we dealing with something far more mysterious, an unknown intelligence pulling the strings, a la the man behind the curtain in the "Wizard of Oz"? Is this something on the scale of the Pyramids, Stonehenge and visits by aliens?

Don't take these hypotheses too lightly. Phone calls and e-mails to Art Bell, America's leading expert of really weird stuff, were not immediately returned, leading us to wonder what the cover-up really is about. Don't forget, this is the same atoll where some believe Amelia Earhart crash-landed. That's got to account for

something, right?

Seriously, though, it's simply amazing the number of folks who have heard of this little atoll, roughly separated by 2,500 miles of ocean from Hawaii and Australia in both directions. (Heck, I had to find the Marshall Islands on a map after I accepted the job.)

A Web search on MSN using the keyword "Kwajalein" returns nearly 18,000 matches, not a spectacular number, but quite a diverse listing. There are the official sites, like the one for the Reagan Test Site, and different organizations such as the scuba and yacht clubs have their own Web addresses as well. That doesn't include all of the residents, former and present, with their own Web pages. Even the Roi Rats have a site (www.roi-rat.com).

Maybe the easiest answer (at least one with some empirical basis) is that, in general, it takes a certain type of person to move half a world away from MTV (unless you live on Roi), McDonald's and Mom.

Maybe we're not the rough stuff of Antarctic explorer Ernest Shackleton or that Ernest "KnowwhatImean" guy from those TV commercials, but it's not a timorous soul who uproots himself, and possibly a family, and moves to what amounts to be another world. Such a person, at the very least, has the seeds of adventure in his soul, and, after a few months here, grains of sands in his carpet.

But such a person, though nomadic, is usually not an isolationist, but an approachable, amiable human being not afraid to reach out to others. The Kwaj connection exists because Kwaj folks are usually willing to connect — whether to other people or good causes — and they're better for it.

Know what I mean, Vern?

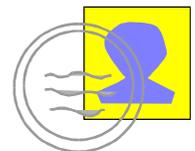

No assaults reported, say police ...

Much later in the evening, about 2:30 a.m., the juvenile returned to the same residence for more alcohol. But when he couldn't find any, he went into the bedroom of a juvenile girl, who was asleep, and did "inappropriate touching," Harmon said. The girl woke up, threw him out of the house, and then an argument ensued outside involving several juveniles, Harmon added.

The girl's parents were home at the time of the second entry but were not aware of the incident, and the authorities were not called to the scene that evening, Harmon said. However, the next morning, the girl, after talking to a friend, did contact the police, bringing with her several juveniles who had witnessed the late-night argument.

The girl identified the juvenile, who was questioned by police in front of his parents, Harmon said. The boy admitted to all the charges made against him, Harmon added, and after going through the adjudication process, he was removed from the island Saturday.

No criminal charges were filed against the barred individual.

Harmon said his office received several calls after the incident concerning rumors about sexual assaults on the island. He said anyone with information concerning a sexual assault or any criminal act needs to contact the police immediately.

"Kwajalein Police Department will aggressively pursue that charge," he said, adding that if the charges are valid, criminal investigators from Honolulu will be brought here to work the case.

Authorities emphasized Kwajalein remains extremely safe. Dykema noted that the ratio of officers to the population is extraordinarily high compared to stateside standards — 85 to 2,500 versus 1 to 1,000.

Despite the statistics, Dykema added, "Being safe is always a good idea no matter where you are."

area by way of a back road that jogs slightly south of Lagoon Road before it heads west and connects to the intersection that leads to the landfill and GBR-P.

The size of the two-month-old excavation has grown, moving well beyond the confines of an open field across from the Japanese Cemetery. The team had its best luck on the north end of the site, finding a gun emplacement and some scattered remains — as yet unidentified. But eventually they discovered the maps they had been using were misplotted. They struggled to find enough features from six decades ago to match up with today's landscape.

While Fox was able to use two gun emplacements,



including the T-shaped bunker surrounded by a white picket fence at the end of the runway, to reconfigure the maps, the bomb craters provide fairly conclusive points of reference, he said.

"They matched the [replotted] map pretty closely," he said.


Except for a small corner at the far northwest end of the excavation site where team members were digging by hand Wednesday morning, the team is turning its full attention to the mostly untapped area across from the photo lab where the nine Marines were likely buried.

"Once we get this done, there's no other place to go," Fox said.



Range operation

From the Command Safety Office

A range operation is scheduled for Saturday, March 16. Caution times are 12:01 p.m. through 8:30 p.m.

In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within Kwajalein Atoll, defined by the area bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbermohr Island on the west reef, and bounded on the south by a line drawn north of Bigej Island on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E, and then to a point north of the high-tide mark on Nimni

Island on the west reef.

Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor. An additional caution area extending from Kwajalein Atoll north into the broad ocean area is defined on the map at top right.

In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, Kwajalein Police Department island clearance procedures will continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all air and sea craft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect

until mission completion.

In conjunction with this operation, a Kwajalein met rocket launch is scheduled as soon as possible after the launch from Meck Island on Saturday, March 16. For caution areas, see maps above at bottom right and bottom left.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following days:

- 12:01 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Sunday, March 17.
- 12:01 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Monday, March 18.

Travel orders have been coming in since she began her job there Feb. 1, and they each have to be processed in a procedure she describes as simple but time-consuming.

Other sections of the police department help as they can, although their tasking has increased too, she said. And a group of TDY Marines also helps augment the security team.

Speaking of the regular Entry-Exit team of five, Heikkinen said, "I'm super proud of my guys."

Bed and breakfast

Once they're here, where do all these visitors stay?

"With the commander's help, we've provided more assets this time than we ever have in the past," Susan Kleback, superintendent of Housing Services, said, adding, "I've found it to be a great challenge."

Kleback said her department was allowed to use vacant trailers and hard housing in addition to the regular transient facilities. Fourteen trailers will be used, for a total of 30 beds, and 21 400-series houses will provide an additional 42 beds, Kleback said.

To residents in duplexes, she said, "If you have a vacant house next door, it probably won't be that way soon."

The houses and trailers are outfitted with basic furniture and the amenities of transient housing such as coffee, shampoo and daily maid service, Kleback said. Also seven temporary custodians have been brought on board to help with the extra workload.

As for handling what Kleback said is the largest group of TDY customers at one time she's seen, she said, "I'm really proud of the Housing team. They've done a great job making this happen."

To help feed all the visitors, Gilligan's is open seven days a week through March 24, said Jewels Marhold, Sodexho marketing manager. The bar will serve food seven nights a week from 4:30 p.m. until 10 p.m., she said. An extra appetizer special has been added to the regular bar menu.

Over at the Three Palms, the grab-and-go menu has some added selections, and the food is available to take out from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Marhold said also new plastic packaging for the take-out food makes it easier to carry.

To welcome the TDY folks, Sodexho has put together a package of information with descriptions of the food facilities, and hours and managers, flyers for Gilligan's and the

Yuk Club, and two coupons.

"We want [the TDY people] to know that we're listening to them and trying to improve based on customer comments and the surveys. We want to make it even better," she said.

Basic supplies

To provide all this extra food takes extra provisions.

To make sure the needed stock is on hand, Supply starts bumping up staples and specific items ordered by retail and food services, said

Annette Thibodeau, manager of Provisions and Acquisition Support. She said that they meet with Sodexho and Retail and get an estimate of how many extra people will be here and then order accordingly.

The effects of the extra people trickle down to water supply as well. More water is used on Kwaj, Roi and Meck.

"With the lack of rainfall, we need to make sure we have [water for] fire reserve on Carlos and Meck," said Stan Jazwinski, Liquid Plants superintendent.

The biggest difference in water usage is felt on Meck, said Al McGinnis, Water Operations supervisor. He explained that Meck uses fresh water only, without the nonpotable or saltwater systems used at Kwaj and Roi.

McGinnis said that in the last few weeks, water usage was about 3,500 gallons a day at Meck. In the past week, with the increase in personnel, as well as in other activities that use water, usage has risen to about 8,000 gallons a day, he said.

McGinnis explained that they assess consumption and maintain 250,000 gallons for fire protection reserve and then barge water up as needed.

Tuesday 125,000 gallons of water was barged to Meck, and tomorrow they will send up another 125,000 gallons.

Dialing up

Echoes are heard at communications as well. Last week, more than 40 phones were installed in the houses to be occupied by visitors, said Jim Schilling, supervisor of Mission Support at Communications. Also 20 new phone lines were added at Kwajalein Mission

Control Center.

"It was a big week for us," he said.

Although phone usage will be heavy in the next few weeks, Schilling said they are monitoring long-distance usage and counting the number of calls, so they can make changes to make optimum use of the lines.

Staying busy

"When we have a lot of TDY people, all our facilities gear up, said Steve Snider, superintendent of Entertainment Services. More people may use the gym or adult pool, for example.

Most of the TDY people work long hours and have limited free time, he said, but they may need snorkel gear, or access to the gear locker, help locating someone with a boat license or use of community center rooms.

"We'll always try to help in any way possible," Snider said.

When the mission is over, plans are to have a special commercial flight take people off island, since a big group will leave at the same time, said Vicki Santucci, lead traffic agent. The plane will hold about 120 people, she said.

Almost everyone on island contributes extra effort to the missions in some way or another, whether visible or not.

Monuments to Marines, soldiers in place

The struggles of those who fought and died here, memories fading with the decades, will not be forgotten now.

Two monuments — one commemorating Operation: Flintlock, the battle to take Kwajalein Atoll, and the other in memory of the nine Makin Marines executed here in 1942 — were assembled this week in front of the Kwaj Lodge.

An official dedication ceremony is tentatively scheduled in May, when a group of Marine

Raiders are scheduled to attend to honor their fallen comrades. The Kwaj Lodge site is only temporary until CILHI determines the location of the Marine burial site, according to LuAnne Fantasia, USAKA Public Affairs.

Both of the monuments are made of concrete, topped with a plaque of bronze, and were designed in Huntsville by SMDC. The Operation: Flintlock memorial is shaped like a broken column, while the Makin Raider piece resembles a mortar. Both were designed by Darin Haaversen, RSE Special Project manager.
