# Driver's education is motoring to a school near you

Drivers Education training for Kwajalein students could roll onto island next semester.

The School Advisory Council discussed the issue, among others during their monthly meeting, Wednesday.

According to Karen Amman, Kwajalein Schools superintendent, talks are currently underway with a driving school in Honolulu. Students will need 30 hours of classroom instruction and six hours of behind the wheel instruction. Students completing the course will receive a certificate of completion.

Amman said that the classes should start after Christmas, but they are still in the talking stages.

The council approved two other issues including the Home School Policy and the Special Education program.

The Home School Policy requires parents who choose to home school their children to file a statement with the school system releasing Kwajalein School System from liability for the student's education. Parents must also work with an approved program for home schooling; submit annual reports on the student's progress and provide testing results for the progress of the student.

On the Special Education Program, Amman said several requirements need to be changed within the program to meet with new

contract standards. A draft will be presented to the SAC during the October meeting.

- Maj. Jud McCrary opened the meeting with an introduction of the council members.

- Amman, introduced new teachers and new youth services staff. She gave a report on enrollment in the elementary school, saying to date there are 230 students enrolled in kindergarten through sixth grade.

- The council and audience discussed the size of the elementary school classrooms and enrollment ratios.

Currently the kindergarten class has 40 students with three teachers; first grade has a 19 to two ratio; second grade has 37 to three; third grade has 41 to two; fourth grade has 24 to two; fifth grade has 35 to two and sixth grade has 34 to two.

- Progress reports for the elementary school are Sept. 22-26.

- Amman informed the council that the elementary school picture day is Wednesday. The pictures will be taken outdoors with digital cameras, which will help in minimizing picture retakes.

- Steve Howell, Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School principal, reported progress report for the high school students would be sent out by Sept. 26. He also announced that high school pictures are on Thursday. These also would be outdoor digital pictures.

- Community Education reported there are currently 19 classes and the fall registration begins Oct. 7,

with classes starting Oct. 21.

- Adult Education reported 11 Kwajalein residents were tested and certified as emergency medical technicians recently.

- Ann McCoy, Child and Youth Services coordinator, reported on the first dance this year, held at the Youth Center. She reported there were 66 youth and six chaperones in attendance.

In addition, the Youth Center needs volunteer staffing for future services and programs, she said.

She said 80 youth had registered for the community basketball teams.

- Shelly Corbett reported for the elementary school PTO stating the school store would be changing to Fridays after school.

- Michelle Corder, student representative, gave a report on the trip to France by some Kwajalein students.

- There was discussion on the North Central Accreditation committee which will be evaluating the schools on Kwajalein. The NCA will be speaking with students and teachers on their visit to Kwajalein. They will assess the school system, goals and progress. The NCA will also assess the future needs of the students.

- Bob Amman, school counselor, announced the Kwajalein students ranked higher than the National average in both grade level and ACT and SAT test scores.

- The next School Advisory Council meeting is set for Oct. 15.

# KPD examines dog bite incident, takes corrective actions

Along the dirt and gravel road in front of the new Kwajalein Police Department dog kennel, Victor Clark, on a regular night-time walk on Sept. 7, was bitten by one of a police dogs out exercising with her handler, Sgt. Crystal Greer, and another dog.

Clark's and Greer's description of how the incident occurred differs, but KPD is taking the incident seriously.

"They are at the airport intermingling with people and we have never had a dog bite incident there," said Chief of Police Kevin Dykema, adding that a letter of apology was sent to Clark. "It is important to say that we are not trying to make excuses. It is an incident that happened. It was unfortunate, and we're taking steps to preclude it from happening again."

KPD has requested that the area be declared a restricted area by the provost marshal; new warning signs, in addition to the warning signs already attached to the kennel, are propped up at the end of the gravel and sand road; sawhorse barriers are in place at either end of the road and a request has been sent to USAKA for a fenced-in exercise area, said Lt. Moses Moreno, KPD chief investigator and K-9 Unit supervisor.

The kennels are located not far from the Barge Slip Ramp. Leaving the police station, a visitor turns right on the second dirt road after passing the Kwajalein Public Gardens. The road curves around and passes a fenced building to the left and then a small open area with shrubbery followed by the long concrete kennel surround by metal fencing and a warning sign on the East and South sides. A trailer used as an office is at the far end of the kennel. The dogs, sensing visitors, start barking.

The dogs used to be housed in back of the police station, but with five dogs that kennel was too small and the barking each time a person went by was disruptive, Dykema said.


"We moved them there so they would be away from people and they would be able to get their rest, because when they see people, they bark," he said. "A thing to remember about these animals is they become territorial."

On Sept. 7, Clark said he didn't see any dogs outside when he passed the kennel going up to the BSR. Reaching the BSR on his regular walking route, he turned around and came back the same way on the gravel road.

As he was passing in front of the kennel in the dark, about 7:40 p.m., he recognized an officer he knew as Crystal off in a grassy area east of the kennel.

"I saw at least one dog," he said, explaining that he walked up to the opposite end of the dog kennel from where the trailer was and staying on the side of the road away from the kennel.

"The dogs came at me," he said "They weren't chasing me from behind; they were coming straight at me. So I stopped. They were growling and showing their teeth. I knew I was in trouble ... And why they

weren't called off of me, I don't know."

There were two unleashed dogs and the black dog brushed up against his leg, he said.

"I thought the dog was going to take some meat out of my leg, but then the next dog jumped up ... the handler's dog jumped up and bit me," he said.

Trying to protect himself with his hands, he turned away and the dogs suddenly retreated, he said.

"I don't know how they had that amount of time to get on me and then immediately be called off after I had been bitten. They disappeared. I don't understand that," he said. "I stood perfectly still and didn't do anything to antagonize the dogs."

Greer said she didn't see anyone on the road before she let the dogs out. So she was standing east of the kennel with her back to both the kennel and the road, watching the dogs "take a break" over by the fence and shrubbery, Greer said. Her K-9 partner, Reini, was not all the way to the fence.

"She started running," Greer said. "As she was coming, I noticed she wasn't really running directly at me, but wanted to go past me. That is when I turned around and I saw [Clark]. Of course she is still in a full gallop, so I started calling out her

name.”

Greer said she moved towards the east end of the kennel and noticed that Clark stop moving.

Reini went up to Clark, and then heard Greer calling.

“So she went around him. She stuck her nose up and was kind of smelling at him and came right back to me,” Greer said, adding that the other dog, Ramses, who is a darker colored dog than Reini, was still near the fence. “He was ignoring [Clark].”

“I was just about to grab her when [Clark] started walking again which I didn’t notice because I was focusing on her,” Greer said.

Ramses came up barking at Clark then and he “tried to move past that dog while that dog was barking at him,” she said.

“I should have told [Clark] to stop moving all together, but before I could do that Reini bolted from me ... and went over to him,” she said. “It didn’t even look like she made contact at first because she just nipped up at him.”

Clark stopped moving and both dogs came right back to Greer who said she called both of them as they went towards Clark.

Greer took Clark to the hospital as soon as she put the dogs in the kennel and he was released after being given some antibiotics for the puncture wound.

“I would have told [Clark] to stop moving,” Greer said in hindsight. “Movement is considered as a threat and [Clark] closing the gap between us was perceived as a threat. She was being protective.”

Admitting he is still angry since he suffered puncture wounds, bruises and abrasions, Clark questioned why the two dogs were out with only one handler.

“This incident tells me the handler had no control of the dog,” he said, explaining that both the Army regulation and Kwajalein Animal Control regulation requires

dogs to be on leashes. “It is totally against the regulation written here, everything that happened shows that these people were being negligent.”

Dykema said, “A lot of people have been saying why would we let our dogs off the leash since there is a leash requirement? Our answer to that is pretty simple. These are working dogs. We require flexibility to work them off-leash because dogs can get places off-leash where we can’t get to ... the barge areas, where they have little crannies where the dog can get to that we can’t.

“So it is important ... for one, so they can get accustomed to it, the obedience part and they learn voice commands off-leash,” he added.

Another consideration is keeping the dog in shape, Greer said.

The dogs, unlike pets, are required to stay within five pounds of a specific weight to be able to do the jobs required of them under the temperature conditions in the tropics.

The Military

Working Dog Program Army regulation does require that the dogs be trained off-leash and also be exercised.

Pointing out that the dogs and their handlers regularly demonstrate how police dogs worked for school children, Moses emphasized how safe the dogs are while leashed.

“We’re around people all the time — the Post Office, the barges, ships, the BQs, the airport,” he said.

As to when the dogs are unleashed for exercise far away from residential or downtown areas, Dykema asked that residents stay away from the kennel area.

“We’ve had a long-term work order in for a fenced exercise area,” he said. “Once that is procured there will be no danger, because we won’t let our dogs off the leash except in that exercise area.”

# Officials meet to clear up television reception issues

Officials are now working the bugs out of the addition of new television channels earlier this week.

Crews installed new ultra-high frequency transmitters Sunday and Monday, upping the program channels to four — 9, 14 17, and 35 — with the promise of more to come in the beginning of the year. That doesn't count the informational channels such as the Roller, flight information and weather radar channels.

For many residents, most of whom live south of Surfway, the addition has been well-received.

But many residents north of the Surfway have been receiving static transmissions, if at all, said Craig McCarraher, AFN chief engineer.

The problem, McCarraher said, is that the UHF signal does not cut through obstructions such as the palm trees, cinder block with rebar and/or aluminum studded walls. Thus, the transmission might be well-received on Ebeye, but closer in, obstructions inhibit the reception.

"No one has ever broadcast UHF out here before," McCarraher said.

Up on Roi-Namur, another problem has delayed the premier of the new channel system. Equipment needed to feed the broadcasts along an existing fiber-optic cable running from Kwajalein to Roi-Namur is expected to arrive at the end of the month, and after installation, should result in the additional channels. Since Roi-Namur is cabled, Roi residents won't see the airborne transmission problems facing Kwajers.

As officials work to fix the problem, AFN Kwajalein has returned to its past programming for channels 9 and 13, meaning 9 continues to air

the Direct-to-Sailor entertainment feed, delayed 21 hours to coincide with local time. Channel 13, rather than convert to 24/7 Roller informational channel under the new plan, continues to show combined news and sports programming from both AFN News and AFN Sports feeds.

Among the most popular shows, college and professional football will air on channel 13 this weekend and onwards until both the transmission problem on Kwajalein and the fiber optic equipment issue for Roi-Namur have been resolved, Feagler said.

"People are still getting everything they were getting last week on VHF, and some people who get the UHF are getting more channels," Feagler said, adding they hoped to fix the problem as quickly as possible and return programming to a new normal set-up.

That will mean the DTS delayed programming on 9, with the undelayed signal transmitted on channel 35. AFN News will air on channel 14 and AFN Sports on channel 17. In January, after U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command has transferred its headquarters to a new facility at Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Ala., AFN will begin to receive three more AFN channels including a family channel, Spectrum entertainment and a movie channel.

In the meantime, officials met this week to determine the best course of action for fixing the transmission or reception problem.

McCarraher has spent the week taking a rooftop-style UHF/VHF antenna around the island and testing television sets at various points. With the external antenna, programming came in "crystal clear," McCarraher said.

"The signal is out there," he said.

"The ultimate objective is to provide outdoor antenna kits and an installation process to the community residents," said Lloyd Jordan, deputy manager for Community Services.

Before meeting that objective, however, officials must first hammer out some issues.

Under the tentative plan, the antennas and all the necessary equipment will be assembled into installation kits and sold at Macy's West, if all goes well, for around \$30. Much of that is already underway as Retail personnel anticipated a need for hundreds of indoor antennas and some outdoor antennas.

Paul Divinski, Retail Merchandising manager, said he would adjust those orders depending the outcome of upcoming meetings.

And rather than ask hundreds of do-it-yourselfers to climb atop their homes to install antennas and begin boring holes in walls to run coaxial cable — a prospect that raises safety as well as supply and housing issues — officials hope to create a way for professional crews to perform the installation.

"We want something uniform to all quarters, a set solution that's as inexpensive as possible," said Maj. Joe Southerland, the USAKA representative to a Thursday meeting.

For Bachelor Quarters residents, the situation is slightly different. Officials expect to install new UHF and VHF compatible antennas on each structure, as well as make sure each floor has the necessary compatible amplifier. Checks on the interior coaxial cabling will follow to see that the reception is properly fed to individual rooms.

Officials will meet again today to discuss the plan further.

## Aeromet: August was a dark and stormy month

Perhaps the most memorable weather moment of this past month was the window-rattling thunderstorm that woke up the island during the early morning hours of the 28th. In fact, we reported two separate thunderstorms that morning, one at about 1:30, and the now infamous one from 3:34 – 4:30. The weather station reported four such

storms during the month of August. Our average for the month is one thunderstorm, so this was, indeed, a stormy August.

September is usually the most active month for thunderstorms, so don't be surprised at more.

The 10.54 inches of rainfall we received in August was just barely above the normal of 10.42 inches. The rainiest day was the 22nd,

when we received 2.64 inches of rainfall. Interestingly, most of this precipitation occurred between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m., when 2.57 inches of that daily total fell. Additionally, we received .73 inches between the early morning hours of 3:15 and 4:18 on the 30th. Together, these two totals represent nearly a third of the rainfall for the month,

in just six particularly wet hours.

Temperatures were above normal again for the month of August. The average temperature for the month was 83.6 F, coming in at 1.4 F above normal. This makes the seventh month this year that temperatures have averaged above normal, with the lone exception being the month of April. The high and low tempera-

tures for the month were 89 F and 76 F. Compared to a record high for the month of 91 F set in 1969, and the record low of 71 F set in 1971.

Sea-surface temperatures are also continuing an above normal trend begun in February. Data generated by a buoy located approximately 190 miles west-southwest of Kwajalein, indicates that last month's trend back to normal temperatures

has reversed, with water temperatures becoming anomalously high once again. Current sea-surface temperatures are averaging about 86 F, about 1.5 F above normal.

The months of September and October are considered to be the "heart" of the wet season. So, for the next two months expect the weather to be a little wetter, a little warmer, and generally less windy.





# Today is National POW-MIA Recognition Day

WASHINGTON — The remains of nine U.S. Navy crewmembers, missing in action from the Vietnam War, were laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery in June.

That final action brought closure to their status 35 years after their plane's disappearance over Laos.

"If we send men and women into harm's way, we have an obligation to do everything in our power to account for them," Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Prisoner of War/Missing Personnel Affairs Jerry D. Jennings said here Sept. 15. "That means if they're POWs, to rescue and return them; if they've died in combat and are missing, to locate and return their remains with honor -- return them to their family and loved ones."

More than 600 U.S. specialists work every day around the world to locate and identify the more than 88,000 Americans still missing from World War II, the Korean War, the Cold War, the Vietnam War and the 1991 Gulf War. The remains of more than 700 Americans who were missing as a result of the Vietnam War have been identified.

Sept. 19 is National POW/MIA Recognition Day, a time that should be in the forefront of everyone's minds, said Jennings.

"It's the one day of the year when we honor those who fought and died or who are missing, those that may still be POWs, and those we have yet to recover from around the world (from) all wars since World War II," he added.

The work of Jennings' office, however, continues year-round. There

are teams in North Korea, Russia, Vietnam, China, Papua New Guinea and Cambodia.

"Cambodia is extremely cooperative. We have a free hand to look anywhere in that country we want to for remains," said the former Marine who served as an intelligence officer with the CIA in Southeast Asia from 1965 to 1968. "We have

to get leads, we'll continue to follow up."

Jennings also is a commissioner on the U.S.-Russian Joint Commission on POW/MIAs, which seeks to clarify the fates of American and Russian service members from conflicts since World War II. Earlier this month, Jennings passed documents to the Russians that clarified the fates of 202 Soviet servicemen from the Korean War. American researchers working in Russian and American archives had located the information, according to a Department of Defense news release.

Every month, staff from the Defense POW/Missing Personnel Office set up shop in a major U.S. city. Families who have missing loved ones are invited for updates on what "their government is doing to work their cases," said Jennings.

Jennings said the people who work in his office are there because they want to be. "It's a mission of the heart," he added. "It's a mission where there's a lot of emotion involved. Few people could survive working this mission unless they really believed in it."

The 2003 POW/MIA Recognition Day poster reflects on the past as well as the present, noted Jennings at the unveiling of the poster June 26. The somber, black POW/MIA flag — a national symbol — is a firm reminder of those still missing and of their families who have waited decades for answers, Jennings said.

"Freedom" lies in the hearts of the people of the entire nation, Jennings said. "It lies in the ideas so richly American, and it rests on the shoulders of those who we honor on this special day.



people conducting recovery operations in North Korea. We don't take a high profile, but we're there."

Jennings said his office receives thousands of leads. "If someone thinks they've spotted an American in North Korea, Vietnam or Cambodia, we follow up until we can say, 'No, it was not an American,'" he said.

"We believe there is a possibility that POWs have survived in these wars (Korea and Vietnam) and could be held against their will," he added. "As long as we continue
