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## Mic Shop responds to shipping concerns

**CONSUMER ALERT:**

The Micronesian Handicraft Shop, or as it is more commonly called The MIC SHOP, Operating Committee addresses a problem which has come to their attention.

The Mic Shop's Operating Committee issues a caution to travelers who purchase handicrafts on other islands: BUYER BEWARE! There have been occasions when merchants and/or artists have told consumers that a special "made to order," "pre-paid for" item will be completed per the purchaser's specifications and sent with the next Mic Shop shipment.

To our knowledge, this has not been the case in any instance. We have not ever made an agreement with any vendor to receive pre-paid, special order items for residents.

When a customer has contacted the Mic Shop personnel requesting their special order item, the sad lesson learned was that we did not receive

their order with our shipment. No item(s) have ever been included in shipments received with any indication of "special order," pre-purchased, nor specific directions for delivery. This leaves the customer without their specially ordered item(s) and most probably no recourse to recover their money.

We, the Mic Shop Operating Committee, are not saying that the intent was to swindle or defraud the paying customer. But, regardless of the intent the loss is the same. So, when traveling and purchasing handicraft items, the age-old adage still holds true: BUYER BEWARE! And, use standard practice common sense: "take with you what you pay for!"

We also suggest if you plan to purchase handicraft item(s), and you are fairly sure you will not have room for them in your luggage, go prepared to ship them home. Carry with you:

- A broken-down, sturdy carton
- Bubble wrap, or popcorn packing material
- Packaging tape
- Labels or permanent marking pen as these items may be difficult to locate or obtain. Then package and mail your handicrafts yourself.

It is our sincere wish that you will have wonderful filled, safe traveling in the Marshall Islands and in Micronesia.

# 'Iron Chef' battle royale comes to Kwaj kitchen

Celeste Gainey claimed the title of of the first Kwaj Iron Chef Monday in an event that should feed into future kitchen battles.

Gainey, with assistant Erik Garrett, beat Josh Brazeal and Kristen Palé in the day-long battle royale.

The two cooks picked up a letter at 8 a.m., with their secret ingredient for the challenge — coconut. Both then had two hours before the stores opened to decide on at least three dishes they would cook for the competition, all using coconut.

At 10 a.m. the stores opened and the contestants shopped for the ingredients they would need to prepare some award-winning cuisine.

The judges, Annie Consul-Tompkins, Carl Overman, J. Martinez, Clarrisa Washington and Lisa Tracy, gathered at the high school multi-purpose room kitchen and waited for the arrival of Gainey and Brazeal.

Both Gainey and Brazeal arrived at "Kitchen Stadium" around 11:15 and prepared their respective kitchens for the battle.

Overman flipped a coin for who would serve their dishes first and the honor fell to Brazeal.

At 11:30 a.m. the cooking began. Both cooks had decided on shrimp, rice and chicken to match with the theme ingredient, but that is where the similarities stopped.

Brazeal had his assistant, Palé, start a cake while Gainey had Garrett coring apples.

Both cooks worked up a sweat within the first few minutes, scurrying around the kitchens trying to find the different items they would need.

After 30 minutes of cooking, Gainey said, "So far so good. A little more pressure than I thought it would be. But it is fun."

"It's real," Brazeal said excitedly.

"I chose the three simplest dishes I could cook in 1½ hours," Brazeal said later.

Gainey said she chose dishes she would like to try.

When Overman announced "30 minutes left," both cooks kicked it in to high gear.

Brazeal started to make his chicken dish, but said he did not have time to perfect the dish.

"I am not stressing right now, because everything is going pretty well," Brazeal said.

Gainey said, "I am doing pretty good."

At the end of 1½ hours, Martinez sounded a gong and the cooking ceased.

Both cooks were given a few minutes to plate their dishes and present them to the judges.

Brazeal served three dishes, coconut prawns, coconut fried rice and coconut cream cake.

Gainey presented four dishes, coconut-peanut butter chicken with rice, coconut shrimp, apple and coconut chowder and coconut-chocolate fondue.

The five judges made their decision on quality, presentation and flavor.

The judges first tasted Brazeal's dishes and then Gainey served her dishes to the judges.

Tracy said she loved the variety of all the dishes and was amazed it was all done in just 90 minutes.

Overman tallied the score sheets and, with a score of 31.50 to 28.64, presented Gainey with the title of the First Kwaj Chef.

Gainey said she would like to be known as Kwaj Iron Chef American.

"I had fun," Brazeal said.

Brazeal said this is the first of three competitions to name three Kwaj Iron Chefs. Then contestants from Roi-Namur and Kwajalein can challenge one of the Kwaj Iron Chefs to a cooking battle.

According to Overman, they hope to add celebrity judges in future battles.

Brazeal stated he would challenge Gainey again in a rematch.

He added they will try and have the next completion for the second Kwaj Iron Chef in about two weeks to a month depending who the next contestants are.

# Successful shot sets stage for GMD's schedule

The last of his briefings done, Maj. Gen. John Holly stepped out on Holmberg Fairways to take in a few holes before catching his plane home Wednesday.

The program director for the Ground-Based Midcourse Defense Joint Program Office seemed to walk with an extra spring in his step after a successful booster launch and test Tuesday.

"These kinds of missions are a lot easier to return home on," he said. "And we'll be back in March to conduct another mission."

Tuesday's mission marked the first flight of a new booster designed by Orbital Sciences Corp. The booster carries the exo-atmospheric kill vehicle into the sky where it detaches, seeks out an incoming warhead and collides with it, destroying the target.

In Tuesday's test, officials wanted to see that the booster would fly within mission parameters. The booster flew a successful mission in the states in August. Tuesday's test, however, simulated an intercept using a mock EKV and based on projections of where a target would have been.

"The booster performed better than we could have hoped for," Holly said. "We do hundreds and hundreds of simulations and runs from an analytical standpoint prior to any mission. And in all of our predictions and what we expected, both in terms of performance and timelines, it was exactly on."

Calling the test "a very important milestone in the program," Holly added the mission tested the latest interceptor communications system and other new program system changes, or "first-time risks."

The test sets the table for another flight test in March in which the booster, carrying a kill vehicle, will perform "a fly-by" on a target, launched for the first time from Kodiak, Alaska.

The launch from Kodiak will signal the full implementation of a Pacific test bed, a two-year project, in which now Vandenberg has both target and interceptor launch capability, Kodiak has target capability and Kwajalein retains interceptor capability along with its sensor

suite.

"That allows us to expand how we execute tests," Holly said. "We're able to more realistically test in different environments in different geometries the performance across the board so that's a big step forward."

More tests and more realistic tests would answer the program's critics in Washington D.C., but the system must be built first, Holly added.

"Many of our critics say we're not conducting operational or realistic flight tests," he said. "We are progressively conducting those, but we haven't built the system yet. So I can't test something we haven't built ... We have tremendous people working on the program across the board both in government and industry and they're delivering the goods."

"The testing this year includes a significant number of events, but it's a significant investment every time we do a test, both in terms of time and resources, hardware to conduct the mission and the costs incurred executing the mission itself," he added.

A follow-on intercept test is currently scheduled for May, with another set for July.

This fall, GMD officials plan to begin fielding an operational interceptor.

"This is an important capability," Holly said. "We do not have a capability to defend our country from long-range ballistic missiles. By the end of this year, we will. It will be a start point from which we will improve."

"We will continue to do a great deal of testing at the same time the system is on alert," he continued. "We will go through a series of upgrades at a minimum of annually, and potentially more frequently than that."

Improvements will come in both numbers of interceptors as well as technological advances and new equipment, such as the sea-based X-band radar, as they become available, he said.

For now, however, the general heads home happy with the results and looking to the future.

"Everything worked well. This was the smoothest mission from the execution standpoint, we've had," Holly said.

He added, "The analysis was great. The performance was great. And the range support was fantastic. But we still have a great deal of work ahead of us."

**Editor's Note:** Tomorrow marks the 60th anniversary of Operation Flintlock, the mission in which U.S. forces liberated Kwajalein Atoll from Japanese occupation during World War II.

Island residents and guests will mark the anniversary with a series of events including a 1940s-styled dinner-dance Saturday night and a community-wide dedication Monday of the Operation Flintlock monument at the flag pole. The ceremony will begin at 8:30 a.m.

Guest Maj. Gen. (ret.) Perry Smith will discuss his book, "A Hero Among Heroes," Tuesday at 6:30 p.m. in the Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room.

The book chronicles the life of Marine Lt. Col. Aquilla "Jimmie" Dyess, a Medal of Honor recipient for actions on Namur and the highest ranking officer killed in Operation Flintlock.

In the following, we look at the events of those six days on Kwajalein 60 years ago, when the now peaceful test site was a battlefield.

During January and February 1944, the U.S. used overwhelming air and ground attacks on Kwajalein, Roi and Namur.


The first stages of the attacks were to bomb and strafe Japanese strongholds on the islands. Then the U.S. sent in ground troops to overtake and secure the outer islands, using them to set up howitzers and continue the shelling of the three main islands.

U.S. troops then made multiple amphibious landings in two separate actions on Kwajalein, Roi and Namur.

**Jan. 30, 1944**

**Kwajalein**

Kwajalein Island, code name Porcelain, was battered by two days of naval bombardment and intensive air attacks.

The battleships *Massachusetts*, *Indiana* and *Washington* hammered Kwajalein with 1,000 rounds of 16-inch shells while B-25s from the Gilbert Islands dropped 23 tons of bombs.

## Roi and Namur

Roi and Namur islands were considered the center of Japan's air power in the Marshall Islands. The Northern attack force made their assault on Roi and Namur as planes from the *Essex*, *Intrepid* and *Cabot* attacked at dawn, drop-

ping 2,000-pound bombs on runways, hangars, fuel dumps and gun positions on Roi and Namur along with the B-25s which also pelted Roi and Namur with 15 tons of bombs.

**Jan. 31, 1944**

**Outer Kwajalein Atoll Islands**

U.S. troops landed rubber rafts on the two islands on each side of Gea Pass, Ninni Island [Cecil] and Gea

Gea Island [Carter], at around 4:10 a.m.

By 10 a.m., Gea Island was secured by the U.S. troops, and, at 2:30 p.m., Ninni Island was declared secured.

Chance Island came next and only took 45 minutes for troops to secure.

Losses included 120 Japanese dead. U.S. troops suffered 14 wounded.

Enubuj Island was assaulted at 9:30 a.m. by two waves of troops.

They landed in amphibious landing craft and overtook the island with little resistance.

Once secured, the troops set up 105mm and 155mm howitzers and began shelling Kwajalein.

In preparation of the next day's invasion of Kwajalein, Roi and Namur, the battleships *Pennsylvania* and *Mississippi* began heavy shelling of Kwajalein, Enubuj, Ennylabegan, Ebeye and South Gugeegue.

## Roi and Namur

The 25th Regimental Combat Team of the 4th Marine Division secured five islands near Roi and Namur islands.

During the assault 18 Americans died, eight were missing and 40 were wounded.

**Feb. 1, 1944**

## Kwajalein

In preparation for the U.S. landing, 7,000 shells were launched at Kwajalein.

Artillery fire from Enubuj pelted Kwajalein with 29,000

rounds of 105mm and 155 mm Howitzer shells and heavy bombers from Tarawa bombed the beach-landing area to clear the way for the amphibious vehicles.

The first wave of U.S. troops landed at Red Beach 1 at 9:30 a.m., and one minute later, troops landed on

Red Beach 2.

Troops from the 32nd and 184th RCT division were joined by the 767th Tank Battalion, and it took only minutes for 1,200 men and equipment to advance 100-yards onto Kwajalein's beaches.

By 6 p.m. the U.S. troops had driven the Japanese back about 1,600 yards from the beach.

U.S. casualties at the end of the first day of fighting on Kwajalein were 17 dead, 46 wounded with Japanese casualties estimated at 500 and 11 captured.

## Roi and Namur

The assault on Roi and Namur came on the lagoon side of the islands by the 23rd and 24th RCT.

They struck Red Beach 1 and 2 on Roi and Green Beach 1 and 2 on Namur at 11 a.m.

Battleships shelled Roi and Namur non-stop for several hours in preparation of their landing.

The U.S. troops met little resistance on Roi. The Japanese had pulled the majority of their troops back to Namur where thick jungle afforded them cover.

Three hours after the U.S. ground assault on Roi, it was secured.

# OPERATION FLINTLOCK

1944 60 YEARS LATER 2004

In little more than 24 hours of fighting, Marines secured the island, and four of them earned the Medal of Honor.

The night before D-Day, Pfc. Richard Sorenson said to his fellow Marines, if a grenade fell in their midst the closest man to it should take the hit.

Sorenson took that hit the next day. Completely surrounded by the Japanese, Sorenson was in a shell hole along with five of his comrades when a grenade landed close to him. True to their conversation the previous evening, Sorenson threw himself on it. The grenade went off, grievously wounding him in the right hip, arm and leg. His five buddies were unharmed.

He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his act of courage.

The following Marines, however, paid the ultimate price.

Pfc. Richard B. Anderson was preparing to throw a grenade at an enemy position when it slipped from his hands and rolled toward the men at the bottom of a shell hole. With no time to retrieve the armed weapon and throw it, he sacrificed himself by throwing his body on the grenade.

Lt. Col. Aquilla J. Dyess led a powerful final attack against enemy forces posting himself between the opposing lines to direct a group of infantry. He was killed by a burst of enemy machine-gun fire. The landing field at Roi-Namur is named in his honor.

1st Lt. John V. Power was severely wounded in the stomach while setting a demolition charge on a Japanese pillbox. Holding the wound with his left hand and firing with his right, he continued to advance toward the opening torn by the explosive charge. He struggled to within a few feet of the opening and emptied his carbine into the pillbox. When he was attempting to reload, the enemy opened fire at him point-blank range.

## Feb. 2, 1944 Kwajalein

Fighting continued on Kwajalein at 7:15 a.m. with the 32nd and 184 RCT, along with the 767th TB, moving forward.

The 32nd RCT advanced with tank support up ocean side, and the 184th RCT pushed forward on lagoon

side.

Carrier-based planes flew around 70 sorties and dropped 40 tons of bombs on Kwajalein. They also riddled the island with 20,800 rounds of .50-caliber bullets.

Military reserves arrived in the lagoon, along with the *Relief*, a hospital ship.

U.S. casualties for the day were 11 killed in action and 241 wounded.

An estimated 1,000-2,000 Japanese soldiers died in the day's assault.

## Feb. 3, 1944 Kwajalein

At 7:15 a.m. the U.S. pushed forward another 1,000 yards.

Japanese mounted the heaviest resistance from the most heavily fortified area on Kwajalein in the Admiralty area, near 9th and Lagoon, today.

Smoke and debris were so thick soldiers found it difficult to see more than 10 yards.

U.S. casualties today numbered 54 killed in action and 255 wounded.

## Ebeye

U.S. troops from the 17th RCT made an assault on Ebeye after an hour-long bombardment. On Big Buster and Little Buster, troops went ashore at 9:30 a.m. and by 4:30 p.m. the U.S. had secured Big Buster and Little Buster.

## Feb. 4, 1944 Kwajalein

Bunker Hill falls as the last stronghold by the Japanese to be overrun by the U.S.

The final phase of occupation took place at 7 a.m. as the 32nd RCT advanced and swept all the way to the north end of the island along ocean side. The 184th RCT made their final push along the lagoon area to the north end.

The troops used satchel charges, grenades and flame throwers to clear out the dugouts, pillboxes and blockhouses of any remaining enemy troops.

## Feb. 5, 1944 Kwajalein Atoll

The Southern invasion force completed the occupation of Kwajalein Atoll from Ennugelligelap to Gellinam.

U.S. casualties for the battle of Kwajalein Atoll were 142 dead, two missing and 845 wounded.

Japanese losses were estimated at 4,938 dead and 206 prisoners.

# First sergeant kicks off PT plan

The Army Master Fitness Trainer on Kwajalein will hold a monthly Army physical fitness training session for all Army personnel and anyone else on island interested in getting fit.

Training will start at the end of February at around 5:30 a.m. on a Saturday and continue once a month, to start. It will last for about an hour, said Master Fitness Trainer 1st Sgt. Dennis Neal.

According to Neal this will be a structured physical training.

"That is what soldiers are used to," he added.

Island residents are welcome to join the military personnel in the monthly training, but Neal stresses this will be standard Army physical fitness training like what is done on other military installations.

Most military personnel on Kwajalein do some sort of fitness training three to five days a week and are on what Neal calls "maintenance training." He plans on stepping it up a notch.

Neal will start the training off with grass drills and stretching for five to seven minutes.

He will then move to calisten-

ics, such as side-straddle hops, to increase the heart rate and provide a cardio workout.

This will loosen up the body from top to bottom, he said.

Next participants will perform 100 push-ups followed by 100 sit-ups, which will be done in sets, Neal said.

The end of the workout will entail a three-mile run around the island at a nine-minute a mile pace, which Neal hopes to increase in distance and decrease the time it takes to run.

The workout will increase as time goes by, Neal said.

People who show up to work out with the Army personnel should "do what they can do and then build from there," Neal said, adding they may stop at any time.

"I am going to be having fun," Neal said. "They can come and have fun."

Times, dates and locations of the fitness training will be posted in the *Hourglass*.



# DS3 service set for interruption

Kwajalein's DS3 service will go down for maintenance Wednesday and Thursday which will result in some phone line, Internet and other communications outages.

The DS3 connection will go offline "for intrusive testing" to fix error rates in the data flow, said Maj. Joe Southerland, USAKA director of Information Management.

"We're not experiencing huge error rates," Southerland said. "But this is an opportune time between missions to improve the service to our customers who come out here for missions, as well as to our general population."

The DS3 line carries a lot of the communications services to Kwajalein including phone lines, Internet and radio and television.

Actual outages will include two-thirds of the island's phone lines, all but ".mil" e-mail traffic, all VTC capability, all live radio feeds and two of four TV channels.

Currently, DS3 traffic travels from U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Headquarters in Huntsville to Yakult, Wash., from where it travels via satellite to Kwajalein. AFN radio and television signals make an additional trip from the broadcast center in Los Angeles to Huntsville before coming on to the island.

A number of factors such as weather, including rain or snow, in any of the locations, and solar flares can affect the transmissions.

Said Southerland, "We're doing everything we can to make sure the system is optimized."

# Bo knows how to party; will host Super Bowl bash for troops

WASHINGTON — With 200,000 pounds of chicken wings, meatballs and his signature "Bo Burgers" on the menu, and the biggest game in sports on the tube, it's safe to say that former two-sport star Bo Jackson knows more than football and baseball. Bo knows how to throw a Super Bowl party as well.

Jackson, who starred with the NFL's Raiders and with the Royals, White Sox and Angels in major league baseball, left for Kuwait Thursday (Kwaj time) to host what is believed to be the largest Super Bowl party ever to take place in the Middle East.

Super Bowl XXXVIII will feature the New England Patriots against the Carolina Panthers, Feb. 1.

"To be honest, I couldn't think of a better way to spend my Super Bowl weekend," Jackson said by phone while waiting for a plane to London, where he'll stop en route to Kuwait.

During his visit, Jackson said, he plans to "see a lot of troops, talk to a lot of troops, laugh with a lot of troops, and hug a lot of troops" to show his appreciation for their service.

He said Super Bowl parties are planned at several base camps, where he will personally help prepare and serve food to give soldiers some time off and a chance to "lay their weapons down and enjoy themselves." Jackson said that whatever he and his staff

can do to help the soldiers enjoy themselves, "that's what we'll do."

Since early December, the company Jackson co-founded, N'Genuity, has been sending thousands of pounds of food in preparation for the big event. The multi-faceted company specializes in food services and distribution, management and staffing services, and business technology consulting.

Bub Bowen, a spokesperson for N'Genuity, said that by hosting the event, the company's goal was to ensure that service men and women are recognized for the personal sacrifices they're making.

Jackson said he wants the troops to know that people in the United States "care about what they are doing, and care about them as people, as soldiers."

Jackson, the first athlete to play in the all-star games of two major sports, said he wants to wish the troops well and express to them his hope that they will have "a safe journey back home." He said he appreciates what the troops are doing, "what they must do to make the world a better place."
