There are terrible things happening on Kwaj that people just don't know about or turn a blind eye to.


Well, I for one will not stand for it anymore and I intend to expose it.

Chuuk trips sport historical diving opportunities

Part two of a four-part series on nearby getaways for Kwaj residents.

The State of Chuuk, with 822 square miles of enclosed lagoon and 15 large islands, might be the ticket to a diver's paradise.

It is all recreational diving, said Pat Zurick.

Zurick stayed at the Blue Lagoon Resort and used the Blue Lagoon Dive Shop. The food was good and the lagoon was only a short walk away, he added.

The wrecks are similar to what is here in the Kwajalein Atoll, but they have not been stripped of the artifacts.

"It reminds you people were living on those ships when they were sunk," Zurick said.

Truk Lagoon has more than 50 wrecks and downed planes which have become home to many coral species and marine life. This diver's paradise is an underwater museum of the Japanese WWII fleet.

Wrecks in the lagoon are at various depths so snorkelers can enjoy the under water sights as well as hard-core divers.

The capital, Weno, stands as the main visitor's center with many hotels, restaurants and stores and home to over 16,000 residents.

From Weno one can see Sapou, Fefan and Dublon, islands within the lagoon also holding a variety of sight-seeing adventures such as the Japanese lighthouse, WWII runways, gun emplacements, caves and more.

At only seven degrees north of the equator, the tropical climate dictates casual summer wear. Shorts and T-shirts are acceptable at the resorts and on dive boats, but local custom calls for women to wear skirts or wraps to cover their thighs. Hats, sunglasses and sunscreen are also recommended.

Getting there

Continental Airlines flies to Chuuk three times a week on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. The four-hour, 40-minute flight stops briefly in Kosrae and Pohnpei.

The return flights are on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. With a three-day advance purchase, a ticket runs only \$565 round trip, according to travel specialist Sylvia

Notarianni. But, she added, prices are subject to change. Reservations can be made at Continental Travel Agency, 51013.

Sights

Weno

Tonata Caves are natural caves on Weno where the Japanese installed their guns during WWII.

Nefo Cave holds guns used by the Japanese to guard the entry to the north pass. It is only a short distance from the Governor's home.

Sapuk Lighthouse — This light house was built by the Japanese in the 1930s and gives a strategic view of the north pass.

Mount Tonaachaw — The mountain is the tallest in Weno and is the legendary home of the god Souwoniras and his son.

There is a shallow pool at the base of the mountain which is used for swimming and bathing. Many petroglyphs are etched in the mountain walls above the Wichon Falls.

Eten

The WWII Japanese Officer's Quarters are on Eten. This structure received considerable damage from bombings during WWII Pacific Battle.

Sapou

This was once an ancient city, but now is overgrown by vegetation which conceals much of what is left of the original city.

Fefan

On Fefan visitors can not only watch the Chuukese lovestick being carved but also purchase one as a souvenir.

Truk Lagoon diving sights

Some of the wrecks are deep like the *San Francisco Maru*, Zurick said. But most are at a 100 feet or less, he added.

Land-based diving operations allow divers two to three dives a day and four to five dives a day are done on live-aboards, Zurick said.

The live aboards sail around the Truk lagoon and stop for dives above the sunken ships, he added.

It is against the law to salvage or collect souvenirs from the wrecks in the lagoon, and divers also must obtain a permit before diving, but for those who want to see some of the WWII ships and planes, the experience will speak for its self.

Zurick said Chuuk police strictly enforce the law.

Shinkoku Maru — The Shinkoku Maru was an oil tanker which rests upright. In the galley many dishes, utensils and a stove still remain.

Heian Maru — This was a 510-foot submarine. In the galley much of the dishware still remains.

Nippo Maru — This was a cargo ship with very little damage. The ship was 353-feet and holds some

Island events mark battle's anniversary

Returning to the place where Lt. Col. Aquilla Jimmie Dyess died on Roi-Namur during World War II, his family has found something lacking in his hometown of Augusta, Ga.

"People here haven't forgotten," said Connor Dyess Smith, Dyess's daughter.

In his hometown, Jimmie Dyess Parkway runs as the major thoroughfare leading up to Fort Gordon, yet few know who he was, according to Smith's husband, Air Force Maj. Gen. (ret.) Perry Smith.

"They think he was a golfer or crooked politician," Mrs. Smith said.

"But the majority of folks who commute up to and land at Dyess Airfield on Roi-Namur, know who he was," her husband added.

Dyess died during Operation Flintlock leading an attack on a Japanese bunker holding out on Roi-Namur, Feb. 1, 1944. He was the highest ranking officer killed during the battle, and for his actions that day, he received the

Medal of Honor posthumously.

As part of the 60th anniversary of the operation, the Smiths, along with son, McCoy, traveled to Kwajalein joining a group to pay tribute to Dyess and service members of Operation Flintlock.

"I really wanted to see the site, physically," McCoy said. "Knowing about it, growing up, I now have a better understanding what everyone had to go through, how hard it was."

Among the visiting group were veterans James Reaves, who fought as a diver on Roi-Namur and later, Kwajalein, and Archie Pitts, who as a Seabee, rebuilt Roi-Namur after its liberation.

Arriving Saturday, the guests toured Kwajalein's battlefield sites and attended a 1940s-styled dinner and dance that evening. Sunday, they toured Roi-Namur's

battlefield sites and joined the American Legion Post 44 for pupus and a performance by local band, SASS.

Monday, the guests, joined by community residents, gathered at the Island Memorial Chapel to dedicate a monument to those who fought in Operation Flintlock.

"Good military tactics and strategy were necessary to succeed in such an operation," said Col. Jerry Brown, USAKA commander. "But would have been mere words on paper without the men on the ground, in the air and at sea, whose courage and determination brought the great successes of World War II."

In his remarks, Perry Smith pointed to Dyess as an example and agreed.

"Dyess exemplified what the soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen

did throughout the Pacific,” Smith said.

“Although this battle is not so well-known, because it happened so fast, it was hugely important,” he said, noting the adjustments on tactics and weapons made by the U.S. military in a short amount of time.

Smith continued to focus on individuals as examples, telling the story of wounded Marine Frank Copra, who was caught behind enemy lines on Roi-Namur and later saved by Dyess.

Smith told the story of Jack Lucas who joined the Marine Corps at the age of 13, shortly after Pearl Harbor. He became a boot camp instructor at 14, but stole away aboard a troop ship to see action. He saw action, throwing himself on a grenade on Iwo Jima and earning the Medal of Honor at 17.

“These were the kinds of soldiers and Marines who fought for our country,” Smith said.

Smith described the group of veterans with the often-used term, “The Greatest Generation.”

That generation, however, is aging, with 1,100 dying daily in America, he added, making it more important than ever to record and recognize their heroism.

“Recognition of our heroes is very important,” Smith said, after his speech. “Young people can look up to a Jimmie Dyess and see his courage or altruism, and think ‘That is something I would like to have.’ Britney Spears, Kobe Bryant — these aren’t good people to be getting excited about.

“There are a lot of soldiers in

Afghanistan and Iraq today who feel very strongly that serving their country, even though it may be dangerous, is very important,” he added.

Dyess felt that way too, eventually costing him his life. After Roi-Namur, the 4th Marine Division fought on Tinian, Saipan and finally, Iwo Jima.

But Roi-Namur was the first action for the unit, and Dyess, like many battalion commanders of the day, felt it important to lead the troops from the front, Smith said. Besides the unit’s fear and inexperience, Dyess had to contend with

communication problems of the day, too. And given his leadership-style, Smith agreed it was no wonder Dyess was leading the troops at the point where he was killed.

“But it still hurts,” Mrs. Smith said.

“If he hadn’t gotten killed on Roi, he would have been killed somewhere else,” Mrs. Smith added.

The 4th Marine Division shipped out to war with 17,000 troops, and listed 18,000 casualties by the end of the war. Those casualties included those killed and wounded from the original 17,000 and replacements.

The majority of losses came after Roi-Namur. Only 195 Marines died on Roi-Namur, and 542 were wounded.

“But that doesn’t help us,” Mrs. Smith said.

Added Smith, “Whenever they talk about light resistance, or fighting, or casualties, to the folks there, it doesn’t seem light.”

Smith will talk about Dyess and heroism, in general, during a presentation at 6:30 p.m. tonight at the Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room. The presentation will include short videos and a discussion on Smith’s book, “A Hero Among Heroes — Jimmie Dyess and the 4th Marine Division.”

of the five-inch guns and Japanese antitank guns.

San Francisco Maru — This is a deep dive, but the wreck holds many mines and two trucks for the experienced diver to wonder at.

Hoki Maru — The aft of this wreck holds trucks and road equipment. In some of the other holds are bombs and sake.

Yamagiri Maru — This Japanese freighter is resting on its port side and was hit many times during air strikes over the lagoon yet the hold still contains some 18-inch artillery shells.

Susuki Destroyer — The Susuki is shallow which allows snorklers to enjoy the wreck also.

Fujikawa Maru — This is also shallow dive. The ship's bow holds a water tank, ammunition, propeller blades and aircraft parts.

Sankisan Maru — This

is another shallow wreck, good for snorklers. The cargo hold contains truck chassis and ammunition.

Currency

The U.S. dollar is the Chuuk currency used, but Visa, MasterCard and Travelers Checks are accepted.

Entry to Chuuk

U.S. citizens do not need a passport to travel to and from Chuuk but proof of U.S. citizenship is required, such as a certified birth certificate and a driver's license with picture ID.

Language

English is widely spoken but learning some phrases in the native language is helpful.

Troops watch Pats claim title

WASHINGTON — U.S. troops serving worldwide tuned in to watch Super Bowl XXXVIII.

Troops in Iraq and Afghanistan watched the game in the wee hours this morning. Troops west of the continental United States celebrated or mourned the game's result over their Feb. 1 dinner. And forces stationed in Guam saw Adam Vinatieri's game-winning field goal after lunch.

The American Forces Radio and Television Service beamed the New England Patriots' 32-29 victory over the Carolina Panthers for the National Football League championship to its outlets around the world.

President Bush saluted American service members fighting the war on terror from the White House during a live, pre-game interview with CBS's Jim Nantz in Houston, where the game was played at Reliant Stadium.

Bush extended his best wishes to the troops, noting he and the nation support them.

Regarding the game, Bush demurred on picking a winner, but he accurately predicted it would "be a very close contest."

The hard-fought contest likely will be remembered as a classic. The game got off to a slow start, remaining scoreless and defense-intensive throughout most of the first half. Yet, the second half was an offensive showcase, with Patriots quarterback Tom Brady and Panthers passer Jake Delhomme completing passes left and right, each eventually amassing more than 300 passing yards. The Patriots' winning field goal came in the closing seconds.

Missile defense budget request equals \$9.2 billion

WASHINGTON — The \$410.7 billion defense budget request for fiscal 2005 fully funds current readiness while maintaining course for transforming the military, DoD officials said here today.

Under the proposal, service members would receive a 3.5 percent across-the-board pay raise. The request also would increase the basic allowance for housing to eliminate all out-of-pocket expenses for service members.

Ballistic missile defense comes in at \$9.2 billion, with an initial operating capability set by the end of 2004. By the end of fiscal 2005, defense officials said, the system should have 20 ground-based interceptors and up to 10 sea-based interceptors.
