Environmental awareness has changed over years

Let's think back to Earth Day 1984. After riding to Arrow Springs Elementary School in a school bus that belched black exhaust, we children in a conservative Oklahoma suburb gathered in the cafeteria before school.

Someone mentioned Earth Day and the general reaction probably included the quote, "must be some silly California thing."

We didn't think about it the rest of the day.

The height of our environmental thinking consisted of crushing and collecting aluminum cans from my family, my grandparents and my aunt and uncle in an effort to raise a few bucks to buy the next cool Star Wars or G.I. Joe toy.

Flash forward 10 years. I'm covering the police beat, and the local sheriff's office has just instituted a "new" program of hiring an experienced detective to police environmental mishaps and misdeeds in the rural Texas county.

The detective is a Texas-sized man, with bushy mustache, arms the size of my leg and a .357 wheel gun the size



of my head. He looks like Wyatt Earp, but talks about things like waste water run-off and PCBs.

We're riding in the detective's pick-up truck to a man's ranch, where the sergeant explains to me that people haven't exactly embraced environmental reform, and in fact, environmental officers are among the fastest growing group of cops killed in the line of duty. Apparently, people don't like being told how to manage their land in these parts of Texas.

As we pull up in a long gravel driveway — he's going to show me an illegal dump — we stop at a ranch house, and he points to the glove box.

"You know how to use a pistol?" he asks.

"A little," I said, opening the flip-down door, and seeing the shiny .38-caliber Saturday Night Special.

"Wait here in the truck," he says. "If anything happens, use that if you have to and drive away from here. Don't worry about me."

Fortunately, he knocks on the house door, talks to a man through a screen and returns in a few minutes.

We checked out the dump as promised, with no other serious adventures.

A week later, I get a call and a ranch address from a friend. From the ranch lawn, we can see onto a local, influential businessman's property where men dressed in space suits are digging. I have just received my first mobile phone, and determined to use it, I call the businessman.

"Why are men dressed in space suits digging up your property?" I ask.

"I don't know what you're talking

about," he says.

"Well, I'm standing about 100 yards away from these guys and ..."

"You're not on my property are you?"

"No sir, I have permission to be here. What's going on?"

Silence follows and man near the dig site shifts and kicks the ground around his pick-up.

"Call my lawyer," he says.

Seems the Environmental Protection Agency paid him a visit and found some illegal dumping. I guess he was embarrassed.

Flash forward another 10 years to Earth Day 2004.

Folks on a tiny rock, 7,000 miles from that illegal dump site, plant trees and hold learning sessions for children and adults, alike. It's understood that dumping waste and chemicals in our water or soil is bad.

Today, in that Texas region, the local council of governments has obtained 62 grants totaling \$503,953.50 for local city and county governments since 1995 to deal with solid waste alone.

And that Oklahoma community today boasts 12 recycling centers. Each "accepts a variety of recyclables including: newsprint, magazines, cardboard, glass, aluminum, used oil, used antifreeze, lead acid batteries, household batteries, plastic, and more," according to their Web site.

Politics and speeches aside, mainstream America has changed its views on the environment over the years.

And the same holds true for Kwajalein. Check out the story on page 16, where we learn all the ways our residents "reduce, reuse and recycle."

But there's always room for improvement.

We might bump up that aluminum can and metal recycling from 20-some percent to the national average of 50 percent.

It's as simple as a tossing that can in a separate waste basket set beside the trash can.

We won't get any Star Wars or G.I. Joe toys for it, but we might take up less landfill space and leave a little more space on the rock for the next generation of Kwajalein residents.

And who knows, in 10 years, some guy might write about the Kwaj community a decade before, and say they were forward thinking.

Search begins as superintendent steps down

The want-ad might read, "Tropical island seeks school superintendent. Must be familiar with North Central Association accreditation and able to work with Army and overseas contractor community."

Discussion over how to fill the position currently held by Karen Ammann topped Wednesday night's School Advisory Council meeting.

Ammann announced to teachers earlier in the week she would PCS after this school year.

Ammann came to the island in 1993 as the elementary school principal and took over as both principal and superintendent in 1995, she said.

Ammann's earlier announcement generated a series of questions Wednesday for Joe Marshall, deputy program manager for Community Services, from both council members and parents in the audience.

Marshall said he has formed a team, including himself, Ammann, KRS Human Resources Manager Bob Bills and two others from KRS, to review candidates obtained by the HR department.

The council and audience discussed executive search agencies and headhunters. Ammann said she has shared with Marshall the most common sources for school superintendents, such as specific education associations.

Boeing SAC representative Sherry Butcher said in her experience with superintendent searches in the states, the community has had input in as much as sharing desired skills, characteristics and strengths.

"They've been allowed to speak on the kind of human who could be successful," Butcher said.

Butcher expressed concern that many stateside schools have already offered new superintendents contracts, and Ed Hillman, representing the Jr./Sr. High School Parent-Teacher-Student Organization, asked if Marshall shared that concern.

Marshall said that did not concern him.

Marshall added he's currently looking for someone to replace Am-

mann in both the elementary school principal and superintendent roles, but when asked if he would split those positions, he said he couldn't say without looking at a pool of candidates.

He also said he intends to hire someone who would hold the job for more than one year.

"My goal is to hire a superintendent who will stay for a long period of time," Marshall said, adding again without looking at a pool of candidates, he couldn't say whether he would offer the new superintendent a one- or multiple-year contract.

"I'm listening, but I can't commit to anything right now," Marshall said. "We have a contractual obligation to find a superintendent, and we'll do that."

In other staffing news, the high school has hired a full complement for the next school year and the elementary school still has two teacher vacancies, though one contract has

been offered. New hires are communicating, mostly via e-mail, with those they will replace, Ammann said, asking questions on everything from curriculum to housing and island living.

Setting Goals

Meanwhile, the North Central Association, whose team visited the school earlier this spring, released its report to the school.

Ammann said it contained, "nothing they didn't tell us."

The teacher steering committee's Barbara Bicanich attended the group's annual meetings in Chicago, and along with new committee members Eric Nelson, Gina Bennett and Sonya Sava, is coordinating a process to identify two new goals.

"[The goals] must be chosen based on test data," Ammann said, pointing to the standardized tests given at Kwajalein schools.

Also, identifying and meeting the

goals must involve all staff and some parents. At present, the committee is considering a single goal for the high school and another goal for the elementary school, to meet their different needs, but that could change as staff go through the process and possibly identify a singular theme, she said.

Class of 2017

On May 2, 25 Ebeye students will vie for five spots in the annual Kindergarten selection process. Teacher Deb Mawhar, who leads the selection effort, described the process for the council and audience.

"We want kids who will be successful in our schools," she said. "It's a rigorous academic environment."

Kwajalein schools have included up to five Ebeye students in each grade level since 1987. Charles Paul, who graduated in 2000, was the first student to go through all 13 grades, and now works with the RMI government in Majuro.

"He's a real success story," Ammann said.

To join the future class of 2017, kids and parents will attend a half-day session at the elementary school. There, parents will interview with Ammann while the kids will go through six different centers, each focusing on specific social and learning skills such as sharing and listening and knowledge of shapes, colors, numbers, books and language.

Mawhar said incoming students didn't have to know English, "but we're looking for kids with aptitude." She added an English speaker within the home would help. In the early years, a parent could read to his or her child at home, and in later years, help with the demanding workload.

"They need strong support to succeed in our schools," Mawhar said.

Two teachers will work each center, one leading the lesson, while the other observes and records results, Mawhar said.

All 16 teachers involved volunteer their time that day and in numerous hours preceding the event, Ammann said.

Said Ammann, "It's a great thing they do."

Sixty years later, a member of that squadron returned. Kenneth Niles was a member of the 4th MAWD squadron the "Ready Teddys," nick-named for a picture painted on the side of the planes of a teddy bear running to the flight-line dragging a

school at Texas A&M in College Station, Texas.

He then joined the VMO155 Marine Observation Squadron stationed in El Centro, Calif., and shipped out to Pearl Harbor where he trained for two weeks with F4U corsairs at the EWA Marine Corp Air Station in Oahu.

Niles' next station was Midway Island.

According to Niles, the squadron arrived at Midway after it was secured. Their mission was to fly submarine hunting combat patrols.

A young 2nd Lt. John Glenn Jr. was one of the test pilots in Niles' squadron.

Glenn flew corsairs after engine changes and repairs had been done to the planes along with bombing missions. In one case, Glenn was testing a new type of

engine, a water injection engine.

"Lt. Glenn took off," Niles said. "He wrung that plane inside out and put in a [400 knot] dive."

The cloth flaps on the plane were in tatters when Glenn landed, he said.

"It was amazing he was able to bring that plane in. He did everything you could ask out of a test pilot.

"Who knew [Glenn] would be one of the astronauts who circled the globe three times," Niles said. "He was quite a guy."

The squadron was stationed at Midway for about four months before transferring to the Marshall Islands.

They left Midway, on the *USS Makassar Strait*, a converted flattop aircraft carrier, bound for Majuro. At Majuro, they

were again reassigned to the Marine Air Group 31 Squadron, headquartered at Roi-Namur.

Their main mission was to drop bombs on several of the Marshall and Marianas Islands and provide logistics support.

"It was the ground-pounders [Marine ground units], who took the beatings," Niles said.

"They are the ones who did the hard work. They did the heroic work. All we did was back them up and give them support."

"It's really real now"

After two months on Roi, the squadron and planes were loaded on the *USAT Hawaiian Shipper* bound for Kwajalein.

Niles remembers the trip from Roi to Kwajalein taking three days.

For eight months the only thing they had eaten was K-Rations and C-Rations.

"We threw our C-Rations over the side of the barge and chummed for fish," Niles said.

"This was the first fresh meat we had in over eight months."

During the six months on Kwajalein, Niles recalled, "I saw the chapel being built."

He also remembered a show at the Richardson Theater he attended, and proudly showed off a picture he took of Bob Hope and Jerry Colona on the stage.

"Lt. Glenn took off. He wrung that plane inside and out and put in a [400 knot] dive."

When Niles and his wife arrived on Kwajalein last week, they took a short tour around the island.

"I was unable to recognize anything but the Chapel and the Richardson," Niles said. Niles said the Chapel and Richardson haven't changed since he was here.

He said living on Kwaj was difficult but, "if you like camping out in tents, it was great."

Niles said that fresh water was hard to come by, but the Navy brought in fresh water and the Marines kept it in "Listerine" bags. He said they hung their "Listerine" bags outside in the sun instead of the shade and the water was always hot.

Niles said for entertainment they would play cards and listen to the radio.


While on Kwaj the troops would hear Tokyo Rose threatening them over the radio.

"Tokyo Rose would say you people on Kwajalein are going to get it tonight," Niles said. "She was just running a bluff."

Niles and his wife also toured Roi-namur during their brief visit. "Things [on Roi-Namur] have changed over 60 years," Niles said.

"This is a beautiful island. I was astounded. I couldn't imagine it could be what it is now."


Dot said for years she had listened to stories Niles told her and their grandson and as she stepped off the plane at Roi she said, "It's really real now."

Flying club made sky the limit for would-be pilots

Returning to Kwajalein, as a civilian in 1965 was an eye opening event. I immediately tried to remember and compare my military tour of Kwajalein in 1945-46 with the present 1965 Kwajalein. Wow! What a difference.

As the airplane carrying me and my family entered the Bucholz Field approach pattern in 1965, the first shock was to see the area between the runway and the eastern ocean shoreline that had been a large ammunition dump and aircraft parking area in 1946 was now replaced by a golf course!

For the next few weeks as I toured the island several times a day, I tried to reconcile the old Kwajalein with the new Kwajalein. It was a dramatic experience.

One day, I noted a small single engine airplane in an area between the main runway and Lagoon Road near the first helicopter hangar. I stopped to take a closer look at the bright and shiny Cessna 150 airplane.

I remember thinking, "Now what would the Army be doing with an airplane like this little puddle jumper?" I was a licensed private pilot, and I had owned a couple of Cessna airplanes back on the mainland, but here I was on this oversized hunk of coral out in the middle of the Pacific Ocean looking at an almost new similar aircraft.

I wondered, "How could this little airplane possibly be used for the mission on Kwajalein?"

It didn't take long for me to find out.

In early 1959, the U.S. Navy began to phase out their Kwajalein operations staff. Several civilian contractor personnel, some with families, began to arrive for work on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur. One of the immediate problems was the need for people to find something to do during their leisure hours. Almost overnight, Kwajalein became the land of recreation clubs of all kinds.

Initially for Kwajalein and Roi-Namur residents, there was little to do in the way of recreation after a hard day at work, but soon there developed a big interest in sail and power boating, deep-sea fishing, use of an excellent nine-hole golf course and driving range, a great number of

athletic activities, including some of the best swimming and scuba areas in the world. There was even a new bowling alley, four motion picture houses, an active theater group and myriad of clubs to fit just about any need for the new island residents. A group of Bell Lab employees felt there was still something missing. The idea for a flying club was born.

A draft proposal for a flying club was put together for the Naval Commander's review and approval in 1961. After an extended time period in which some 18 members of the new flying club, initially called the "Kwajalein Aero Club," worked to finish an outline and the necessary paperwork for a club charter. The Navy Command approved the first flying club on Kwajalein in January 1963.

Initially, there was much work to be done like buying an airplane and shipping the disassembled craft to Kwajalein. A parking ramp for the airplane had to be built. Gasoline in 55-gallon drums for a small airplane had to be procured and shipped. A small work area and store room for airplane parts and tools had to be built. All of this initial work and costs

for the first airplane was borne by the members of the new club. It was a struggle.

The first Sanderson Private Pilot ground school was held at night in the Community Center in early 1963. The class boasted 42 participants, both men and women, and two high school seniors. Twelve people passed the first written test in May 1963, also, by the time the first airplane, tightly packed in several wooden crates, arrived on Kwajalein.

Luckily two of the club members also worked for the Kwajalein Aviation Department and were FAA certified aircraft and engine mechanics.

By mid-1963, the Cessna 150 was fully assembled and flight-tested. Over 80 hours of flight time was logged during the first month. The enthusiasm about the new flying club began to accelerate, but many new problems also presented themselves.

While the club membership included two certified flight instructors, it was sometimes difficult to arrange for a dual-flight because the instructors were busy with their regular job on island, and the one Cessna air-

plane flight schedule was sometimes booked for weeks in advance.

The membership of the club increased rapidly, and another airplane was badly needed. There was also the problem of a rapid turnover of members as people left or arrived on Kwajalein. Money to pay for aircraft parts, gasoline and maybe a second airplane was a continuing need.

Another problem surfaced regarding the registration of the new airplane with FAA. This was caused by the misunderstanding on the original registration application about the number of owners of the airplane and a requirement for registering the airplane in a foreign country.

For the better part of a year, and working through an attorney in San Diego, Calif., and the Aircraft Owners and Pilot's Association in Washington D.C., the new Cessna airplane was finally registered as an American aircraft operating on Kwajalein, but this situation now caused another problem.

The biggest setback occurred when it was found that no new private pilot licenses could be issued because there was no way to meet the requirements of Part 61.85 of the FAA Regulations regards cross country flight training and check-out.

Part 61.85 stipulated that a student pilot must take a cross country flight landing at three airports. In order to receive a private pilot's license, one leg of the flight had to be at least 100 miles in length. How could this be done out in the middle of the Pacific Ocean?

The club's operation manager and senior flight instructor, Bob Blair, started a letter-writing campaign to petition the FAA for a wavier to Part 61.85 that would somehow allow student pilots on Kwajalein to receive a private pilot's license.

After a long wait, the FAA advised they would study the problem. What Blair didn't know was at the time a similar situation had occurred at the American Air Force base at Tachikawa, Okinawa.

In the interim, the club members kept flying and student pilots attended ground school. Someone proposed a name and even a logo for the new club. The official name for the club was changed to the Nike Flying Club

with the Peanuts' Snoopy cartoon character, flying against the Red Baron, being the official logo. The logo was painted on the airplane and on the maintenance building, by Nancy DeVenny and Harry Meverden of Bell Security.

Another Cessna airplane was ordered and the club membership was set not to exceed 60 members, but still the problem of meeting the cross-country requirements of FAA Part 61.85 prevented the issuance of a private license.

Also, at this time, the permanent residents of Roi-Namur decided to have a flying club. A Piper PA-22 was ordered and the new club at Roi-Namur went into operation.

Another lengthy and costly requirement from the Army legal office necessitated the incorporation of the club where all members had to be listed as share holders in the Nike Flying Club Corporation. The incorporation was necessary to hold harmless the government in the event of an accident or loss of life or property while flying the club planes.

In August of 1967, this writer was sent to Washington, D.C. to participate in several conferences regarding the Kwajalein civilian-type contractor operation. Before leaving Kwajalein, Blair asked that I talk to the FAA in Washington, if possible, and learn what action was being taken regarding Part 61.85 as requested in Blair's letters to the FAA.

With help from AOPA in Washington, I was able to set up a meeting with the FAA principles. After showing a series of pictures of the Nike Club and explaining how the Nike Club operated at Kwajalein, the FAA Flights Standards director wrote an exemption that outlined how student pilots at Kwajalein could obtain a private pilot license without making the cross-country flight.

A waiver, called Part 61.111 was written and approved by the FAA director. I hand-carried this wavier back to Kwajalein and became a big hero and an honorary member of the Nike Flying Club.

Over the next five years, I spent many enjoyable hours flying around over the islands in the Kwajalein lagoon.

Snoopy, the Red Baron and I became good friends.





Kwajalein recycling takes on many forms

In some ways, Kwajalein residents look at waste in a unique way, reusing a lot of materials "in some intentional ways, and some unintentional," said Jack Martindale, KRS environmental scientist.

"When someone PCSs and they give something to a neighbor or Bargain Bazaar, they're finding another use for it," Martindale said. "A fence here might be in 10 people's yards over 20 years. That doesn't happen in the states."

Martindale added building and other materials on-island are expensive and consequently, residents find creative ways to reuse them.

In addition, the DCCB turns excess material over to others, where in the states much of that material might also go to a landfill.

For environmentally minded people, reuse is only one of the "three Rs - Reduce Reuse and Recycle," according to Martindale.

To reduce waste on Kwajalein, many departments, such as Automotive, have gone to using sand- or hydro-blasting to remove paint, reducing the use of chemicals, for example.

Also, as offices embrace electronic, rather than multiple paper copies of documents, they can reduce the use of paper. Another tip, Martindale suggested, was to print on both sides of a page or even reduce the im-

age size to print two pages on each side of a piece of paper for proofs or drafts.

When it comes to recycling, much of that waste paper and all cardboard makes its way to the compost heap, and in many cases, returns to the soil.

"Most of our trash is organic," said Phil Malloy, Solid Waste manager.

Malloy said the island runs at 58 percent for its total recycling rate, which is nearly double that of the national average, and that doesn't count the unique reuse of materials.

On the other hand, aluminum can recycling runs in the 20th percentile, just over half the stateside rate of 50 percent, Malloy said.

Kwajalein residents run through an estimated 67,000 cans, or 1 ton of aluminum, in a given month, he said.

Metal should not be put in trash, he added.

"You can recycle metal forever, but you can only throw it away once," he said.

Malloy said. "If it doesn't burn, it doesn't need to be in the trash."

Malloy said residents should put anything that can burn in trash dumpsters, and separate all other trash, most importantly metal objects, in a separate container near the dumpster. Set old, rusted bicycles near the dumpsters for pick-up, too.

While the metal is collected, compacted and sent off-island, trash collectors will add the bicycles to Bicycle Heaven, a spot where residents can pick out spare parts - yet another example of reuse on Kwajalein.
