My boss recently completed a 360-degree review, which means he, his boss and some of his reports all assessed his performance.

It's a popular business practice now, and I'm not here to debate the merits of traditional versus non-traditional means of employee reviews, but I like the concept of looking at the complete person.

Out here, we think we know people. We see them at the grocery store, at the PDR and the beach park. We encounter them through work or friends of friends, and whether or not we actually talk to them, we derive an impression. It's human nature, magnified by the close proximity of this community.

Some of those impressions are probably dead-on, and others, not so much. But people have a funny way of doing the unexpected.

This week alone, we saw kids produce works of art at the schools and perform music at the spring ball. We saw some kids and adults perform in the Rustman at an athletic level most of us just shake our heads at.

Of course, we have the winners pictured



on pages 6-7 in today's issue, and they are great stories. But I also watched the folks who just wanted to do something physical for themselves, maybe for their health or just to push their level of commitment and discipline.

In covering things like that, I'm often struck by those people's accomplishments. I then have to rethink my impression of them. And that carries beyond the art shows, band performances or Rustman.

Parents, teachers invited to join organization

The Parent Teacher Student Organization will hold elections for president and vice president during the May meeting to be held 7 p.m., Wednesday, at the high school library.

There are three ways to nominate people for the offices; either through self-nomination, call in a nomination or nominate someone in person, during the meeting. The vote for officers is a voice vote held during the meeting.

“If you don’t come [to the meeting], you can’t vote,” said member Quentin Parker. The PTSO, formed last year, is an organization to facilitate communication between parents and teachers of Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School and encourage community involvement in school programs and activities to improve the educational experience.

This past year, the PTSO has assembled bikes for all Ebeye guest students to use while attending school. PTSO also sponsored a cookout at the Turkey Bowl and provided treats for the teachers, for about a week, at the start of school and have supported spirit organizations.

There are no dues or sign-up

required, according to Parker. All parents, students and teachers of the KJSHS are automatically members of the PTSO and eligible to nominate individuals or vote on the nominees.

The new officers will hold office for one year. They will take office at

the end of May and hold the office for one year. Meetings are once a month throughout the academic year, September-May.

The president also sits on the School Advisory Counsel and attends the SAC monthly public and closed meetings.

“[PTSO] has suffered from the lack of hands-on people,” Parker said.

She added the organization is looking for more participants to become involved this next year.

“It is a forum,” Parker said. “You can bring up things that concern you. You can bring up anything,

whether it is popular or not.”

Not only can subjects which concern the high school be discussed, the PTSO is also involved with different projects that benefit the students and school.

The activities are “driven by the acts of participants,” Parker said. If people want the organization to do things “they need to participate ... Meeting attendance is not required to do different projects or tasks.

“Anyone is welcome to bring a project or concern to the PTSO for discussion or action,” Parker said.

She added concerns can be raised anonymously through PTSO, P.O. Box 1027.

The concerns will be addressed either at the meetings or with school officials.

“We do not censor,” Parker said.



Ancient Arts

Saturday was filled with tradition, rhythmic-chants and drum beats meant for only high chiefs, but graciously shared with an entire community.

But *Iroij* Michael Kabua gave his permission for the *Jobwa* Stick Dance performance on Emon beach and brought his outrigger canoe to Emon and to give rides to the adventurous in what became a Marshallese cultural event Saturday night to raise money to send the dancers abroad to share their art.

The event raised around \$1,150 in t-shirts, canoe rides and handicraft sales and all the proceeds and donations helped the *Jobwa* Stick Dancers travel to Los Angeles to perform and then to Pacific Arts Festival in Palau.

The dance is an old and honored tradition performed only for high chiefs and kings.


Public showing of the dance is rare and has only been shown on Kwajalein three times in the past 20 years, according to Eric Lindborg.

Kabua explained it is part of a war dance and performed only on special occasions, and usually in private. The dancers train for the *Jobwa* at the direction of the high chief and pass the tradition down to younger dancers.

He added there are 20 dancers, 18 who dance and two who walk back and forth to keep the line straight and step-in if a dancer is unable to continue.

There are also two women who chant and a drummer.

Several Ebeye women arrived early Saturday and started making *leis*, *wuts* and woven mats, dinner baskets and hangings in preparation for the celebration.



THE JOBWA STICK DANCE LEGEND

As told by *Iroij* Michael Kabua

The *Jobwa* Stick Dance is only for the chiefs and can only be performed with the permission of the high chief.

The dance is for when high chiefs build and launch their canoes or build their house.

The sticks used in the dance are iron wood, the same as Marshallese spears.

Legend of the *Jowba* Stick Dance

Jobwa Stick Dance started in Ujae Atoll and it is a very old story.

A man went to sleep and slept for a very long time. He had no food or water.

As he slept, he started to dream, and a group of *nonieap*, which are spirits you can't see but can hear, came to the man and showed him the *Jobwa* Stick Dance.

The man woke, and when the people asked why he had slept so long, he told them about his dream and taught them the dance the *nonieaps* had shown him.

When the men were performing the dance, a *Dri ikjiet*, which is a good spirit that lives under the ground, came up from a well.

He was a very handsome man.

The women, whose job it was to beat the drums for the *Jobwa* and chant, stopped paying attention to their drums and chants and started to pay attention to the *Dri ikjiet*.

When the women started to pay attention to the *Dri ikjiet*, their drumming and chanting became very bad, or *dubwebie*, which means their beat was wrong.

The *Iroij* became very angry that the women were paying attention to the *Dri ikjiet* and not to their drumming and chanting.

The *Dri ikjiet* was also paying a lot of attention to the women, which also made the *Iroij* angry.

The *Iroij* wanted to get rid of the *Dri ikjiet*, so he spoke with the *Jobwa* dancers and told them at the end of the dance, instead of holding their sticks to the sky to hold their sticks to the ground.

When the *Dri ikjiet* was dancing with the *Jobwa* stick dancers, he held his stick to the sky when all the other men held their sticks to the ground.

This gave the *Iroij* a reason to kill the *Dri ikjiet*.

Passed Down

The women started in the early afternoon preparing teriyaki beef sticks, rice balls, jelly-filled desserts and fresh drinking coconuts.

Kabua's outrigger canoe, along with his race-winning *ruwits*, rested on the beach and he made sure all was ready for the evening's ceremony.

"As I recalled the [*Jobwa* Stick Dance] history is over several hundred years. The play is never performed without the permission of the king and the royal families," said Helmer Emos. "The uniqueness of the play is beyond comparable, and it has never been changed for the last 40 years of my observation."

The events started around 5 p.m. with outrigger rides, traditional Marshallese food served in a handwoven palm frond basket, fresh drinking coconuts and handmade woven items that were purchased from the makers.

"The outrigger was fascinating," said resident Teresa Young. "We couldn't believe how fast it was."

To sail the outrigger in different directions, the crew manually picks up the sail from one end and runs it across the boat to the other end and sets it in place, Kabua explained. There is nothing mechanical on the outrigger, and the crew does it all. He also said that his outrigger was a small one. Some are 50 to 100 feet in length and even have homes built on them for long ocean travel.

He chuckled and said when you ride on the outrigger, "you are going to get wet."

The people who rode it were soaked when they returned to the shore, but their smiles told of the fun they had.

"The outrigger ride was amazing," said resident Cris Lindborg. "You could really feel the surge of power as the winds filled the sail. It was exhilarating to watch the crew change the sail from one side of the boat to the other. This was the first time in my 25 years on island that Kwajalein has been graced with an opportunity to experience traditional sailing. You really gain respect for the skill and bravery of the Marshallese who ventured out in the open ocean in such vessels."

At dusk, Kabua's crew brought the outrigger to shore, since they were part of the *Jobwa* Stick Dance.

Eric Lindborg took the stage and gave the brief story about the dance legend before the dance began with the blowing of a trumpet shell.

A man blowing another trumpet shell answered and the rhythmic sound of the sticks were heard, as the dancers emerged onto the concrete stage. Dressed in ancient, traditional Marshallese attire, the chanters and drummers took their place on stage.

The dancers took their position, and the methodic drumming and chanting started.

Banging iron wood sticks and weaving back and forth through other dancers the performance lasted almost 30 minutes.

"I thought they were amazing," resident Rick Young said. "I can see why it would be a dangerous dance for

the dancers. I could see a lot of the old Marshallese influence."

Cris Lindborg added, "I thought the festival was fantastic, everyone seemed to have enjoyed it. The performance was better than in the past because we could sit right next to the dancers, rather than watching the dancing up on the Richardson stage as before."

Teresa Young said, "We felt fortunate to be able to witness this event. The dancers were incredible.

What an opportunity to be a part of. It seemed like we were reliving a part of history. We had a great time."

Kabua shared the dance one more time, this time on Ebeye, before the dancers headed for California Wednesday on the Aloha flight.

"One of the truly amazing experiences I will take from being on Kwajalein," said Rick Young.

Racing

Crossing the finish line at 2:15:45, Nick Perry claimed his first Rustman title and second record Monday.

"This is a great day, a great event," Perry said, catching his breath shortly after the 25th running of the Kwajalein triathlon.

Perry finished first among individual finishers and first in the men's masters, or over-40 division. He set a new record for that age group, beating the old time of 2:19:32, set by current Kwajalein Running Club President Bob Sholar in 1998. Perry also holds the record for the fastest non-winner, when he turned in a 2:14:09 performance last year.

This year, however, winds seemed to slow times down, not that Perry made note of it.

"When you're feeling good, you don't notice the conditions," he said.

Perennial competitors Sharon Greenbaum and Brian

found their ways back to the leader board, as well. Greenbaum claimed her sixth women's Rustman title with a time of 2:21:09, surpassing Glee Garlie for the most ever titles.

Greenbaum said.

"I didn't go in expecting to win because there were a lot of strong girls, but I always do the best I can, and I can always be happy with that," Greenbaum said.

Greenbaum, in the female master's, or over-40 division, finished ahead of female open competitors Krystal Kubas and Cassie Rubly, who completed their first Rustman in 2:35:51 and 2:38:52, respectively. Both women came in under 2:40, a feat matched by only 23 other women in the 25-year history of the event.

Greenbaum's closest competition came initially from Laurie Mann, who has trained for the

past year and finished the swim two minutes ahead of the returning champion. But Mann suffered a bicycle

wreck while training a few weeks ago, and completed the bike portion three minutes behind Greenbaum. During the run, Mann fell out of the competition due to back pain.

Mann's eight-year-old son, Lee, however, seeing his mother unable to complete the race, ran the 10 kilometers, barefoot, she said.

"He's so sweet," Mann said. "He's my hero."

Brewster, who topped Perry last year in the individual competition, formed the team "Jen Jumbo" with Josh Adams and won that division. Brewster had the fastest bike run of the day at 1:07:13, just a minute shy of the team bike record set by Paul Belarde in 1993. Working with a team, made a difference, he said.

"I didn't have to save as much on that sixth lap, so I could give it a little more," Brewster said. "And I saw Nick, and I was glad I didn't have to hold him off [in the run]. I don't think I could have."

Adams joined Jen Jumbo after runner Mark Daugherty dropped out due to an injury from training. Adams

then turned in the fastest run of the day, at 44:23, only three minutes longer than the record 41:26 set by Derek Brower last year.

"I was terrified of going out too fast for all the excitement," Adams said. "Half-way through the second lap, I had the biggest endorphin rush."

While Brewster's team entered as favorites, the race for second in the team competition came down to a sprint to the finish line as Kathy-Ann Funk of Goats & Mules edged out Jane Cassel, of Team with No Name, by 1 second, for a final time of 2:30:07.

Jen Jumbo's Adams said he has run half-marathons in the states and trained a couple of months to prepare for the Rustman and Kwajalein's hot and humid environment, running five miles at a time mostly.

Meanwhile, Perry cited training with Brewster, Mann, Jim Bishop and Greenbaum as keys

to his success. Said Perry, "It's a neat camaraderie, and it makes everyone stronger."



Four generations carry crucifix through service

TIKRIT, Iraq — Priceless. That's how Cpl. Scott W. Fuhs described a simple 18-karat gold crucifix on a silver chain he wears around his neck that dates back more than 85 years.

It has a long, rich military history. Fuhs, 31, of Grand Rapids, Mich., is a fourth-generation Soldier to wear the crucifix in harm's way. His great-grandfather, grandfather and uncle wore it in previous conflicts dating back to World War I.

All three served with the 1st Infantry Division, as Fuhs is currently doing.

"No one has ever seen one like it," he said of the crucifix.

Fuhs arrived in Tikrit at Forward Operating Base Danger nearly three months ago with his Kalamazoo, Mich.-based Army Reserve unit, the 415th Civil Affairs Battalion. It is attached to the 1st ID.

Last century, the crucifix was worn by his relatives who saw combat twice in Europe as well as Southeast Asia. And now, Fuhs is wearing it in Southwest Asia with the Big Red One.

"They figured it is a well-traveled cross and needs to see another continent," Fuhs said.

Had it not been for Fuhs' great-grandmother's concern for her war-bound husband's safety, there never would have been a cherished family heirloom to begin with.

In 1917, before his great-grandfather boarded a ship in New York for France to serve in World War I, great-grandma, Ada M. Mayo, gave her husband, Fredrick J. Mayo, the gold crucifix, according to family lore.

She purchased the keepsake for an unknown price from a jeweler in Michigan.

Her husband was a cavalry and infantry captain in France. He returned home safely, Fuhs said.

When Fuh's grandfather, George E. Wiersma, was drafted to serve during World War II, the Mayo's gave their son-in-law the crucifix. While serving from 1943 to 1946 as an Army signalman, Wiersma traveled to Normandy, Fuhs said. He missed the D-Day invasion by a few days.

Wiersma's son, John, had the crucifix with him when he was shipped to Thailand in 1967 with the Army Corps of Engineers during the Vietnam War.

John Wiersma didn't take it off until last Thanksgiving Day. It was then that he passed the crucifix to his nephew who was being deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

"My grandfather and Uncle John both felt I deserved to have it," Fuhs said. "I felt ... honored, very surprised. I'm among good company."

Born and raised Catholic, he said he gets a "good feeling" from wearing the crucifix. That's why he hopes to continue the tradition by one day passing it down to a relative who is in the military.

"I feel that it needs to stay in the family, in the military," he said.

Fuhs wears the crucifix alongside a pewter medallion engraved with three patron saints of the military — St. George, St. Michael and St. Christopher. Embedded in the center of the medallion is the Virgin Mary. The word "Land" is in red on the top left side, "Air" in white on the top right with the words "Sea" and "USA"

in blue across the bottom.

His mother, Carol, gave it to him before he deployed to Iraq.

Mother and son were shopping at Isdories Religious store in Grand Rapids, Mich., shortly after Veterans Day last year when the pair found the piece of jewelry. Fuhs said his mother wanted to give him something appropriate for a Soldier. So they were looking for patron saints of the military.

Coincidentally, they bumped into a Korean War veteran who was also in the shop. Fuhs said the man pointed out the medallion.

"He said it was one designed specifically for the military so that's the one we chose," Fuhs said.

He is a 1996 graduate of Grand Valley State University in Michigan who majored in history and political science. A former warehouse supervisor, Fuhs joined the Army Reserve in November, 2002.

Military life apparently suits Fuhs, who has considered making it a full-time career. There's one stipulation — he wants to stay in Army civil affairs.

"I love the challenges," he said. "It's a whole different world."

So is Iraq, where there is a lot of uncertainty and danger. But the crucifix provides him with a sense of security, Fuhs said. It protected his relatives in previous conflict and now is protecting him, he said.

"I feel very safe when wearing this cross," he said. "Knowing that this cross has been many places with very special people before me, I intend to pass it down someday."
