"in" for me being a journalist. Lately though, I'd been questioning if this is really what I want to do for the rest of my life.



# A day in the life at AFN-Kwaj follows no script

Above the bowling alley, Jason Bischoff looks out his window over-seeing the standing water on Brandon and Dally Fields and declares for all of Kwajalein to hear that the island will see rain for the rest of the night.

"I'm just going to put it out there," the disc jockey says into the microphone with a gleam in his eye, after setting down a forecast from RTS Weather predicting scattered showers.

It's just another day at the office for Bischoff, one of four regular DJs at AFN Kwajalein. Bischoff hosts the afternoon show from 2-5 p.m. on weekdays.

The afternoon show came alive again in the last couple weeks and marks just one of the many programming changes that followed the addition of new television channels. In short, with the addition of channels, the station no longer required late-night taping, and after moving personnel around, restarted the live, local afternoon radio show, created a Sunday radio program and will start producing local television public service commercials.

For Bischoff, who hosted the afternoon show during his last tour, the recent return to the microphone gives him a chance to comment on everything from "American Idol" to Quentin Tarantino and spin a variety of CDs – all over the airwaves.

Born an Army brat, Bischoff lived at Fort Hood, Texas; Schofield Barracks, Hawaii; and finally, Fort Polk, La.; before the family settled in Parma, Ohio, the place he calls home. Attending high school in Parma, Bischoff studied vocational radio and TV production at Normandy High School, "under the tutelage of Jim Koch," he said.

Talking to Bischoff, one never knows where he'll go with a conversation.

He "knows" who will win "American Idol," and why, but made this reporter promise not to share his

prediction. And don't expect an argument over who has the most talent. It's a question of the voter make-up. He's not a big fan of other reality programming, and as far as other programs go, "all my favorite shows are starting to stink."

From television, he'll just as easily slide into pop-culture and movies.

"Quentin Tarrantino is the director of my generation," Bischoff says citing the dark topics and rough language. "After 'Pulp Fiction,' every movie wanted to be like 'Pulp Fiction.' Of course, Tarrantino is just ripping off Martin Scorsese."

Oh yeah, and that leads us to the theory that musician Eric Clapton is like the 'Star Trek' of music, because he could produce anything and fans will buy it, which brings us back to the music on the air Friday afternoon, which ranges from Melissa Manchester's "Midnight Blue," to the latest from new rock band, Jet.

"I enjoy such a wide spectrum of music. When I say 'It's all rock-n-roll to me,' I mean it," Bischoff said.

And between songs, his banter has now touched on his fellow DJs.

"The morning show asks 'What's Don Knots up to?' and on the afternoon show, we tell you 'This is what Don Knots is up to,'" Bischoff said. "We're the show with the answers.

They may not all be right, but we have the answers."

Twelve hours later, Rich Feagler and Jamie "Rock-n" Rowe wake the island with their mix of music and banter.

"It's not the same 13 songs played every hour because market research shows these are the popular

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songs," Feagler says. "The Army has given us all these CDs, and we don't want them to go to waste. It's a variety from the entire rock-n-roll era. Stations back in the states are being watered-down ... We're kind of a throw-back."

Feagler has hosted the morning show since the late '90s. A graduate

of Ohio University, Feagler enlisted in the Air Force and served as a broadcaster, doing everything from DJ work to television production. He later shot news and commercials for television stations in Ohio before coming to Kwajalein, originally as a master control operator.

Talking with him doesn't change whether he's on or off the air. One still gets the same correlations from the present to past music and television pop-culture.

On the air Saturday, one learns that singer George Michael has sold the most music in Britain over the past 20 years, beating out Paul McCartney, the Beatles and Elton John. Feagler asks Rowe who played with George Michael in the group Wham, to which Rowe responds with Andrew Ridgely. That correct answer earns Rowe his second "Kwaj bike bell," a computer-generated sound-effect Feagler plays with the touch of a mouse next to the sound board.

It all appears to flow effortlessly, like two guys hanging out over coffee, donuts and a giant CD collection, which is not to say Feagler doesn't prepare for the morning show. The three-hour show can take hours of prep work from lining up a mix of music to downloading the clips of strange and humorous news from the AFN wire service and Internet.

"We always look for a local tie," he said.

"We just try to avoid train wrecks," Feagler added, remarking on the most memorable when he played a Connie Francis song followed by Stevie Ray Vaughn.

"If we've had a good time and sent the information out, that's our number one priority," Feagler said.

Rowe hosts his own show on Sundays now from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., a new addition to the AFN-Kwajalein line-up.

"Let's just let it flow," he said of the format. "I really like hearing from listeners."

Rowe added he features an artist every week from noon to 1 p.m.

"Roy Orbison or the Eagles?" he asks Feagler and this reporter.

The Eagles win.

"It's real scientific right now," Rowe said through his evident

Southern drawl that gets only worse on the air.

"I try to play off Rich," he explains.

Rowe hails from Aurora, N.C., population 575. He moved to Kwajalein from Morehead, N.C., but has worked 15 years in radio and television production from master control to newsroom operations to radio in a variety of formats and in various parts of the south.

A successful show occurs, "If somebody got something out of it, even if it's a small laugh."

Dropping by the Saturday morn-

man said.

The new channels, new equipment and converting Diezman to full-time television production made the new commercials possible.

Diezman worked more than 10 years in Akron, Ohio, five of those years as operations director and producing commercials and live and taped studio shows.

He came to Kwajalein in 2000.

"It's good to be back in the production game," he said.

"It's always nice to break out, change it up, so you can be more creative," Muhich said.

ing show, video production manager and "Window on the Atoll" personality Sarah Muhich mentions the station will begin airing commercials.

"We'll still get MCPON Scott, but we'll insert our own commercials, too," Muhich said.

Following her to the editing room, one finds a trio of computer stations. Two are new.

At one station, Aaron Diezman, special projects producer, explains that by the end of the month, the commercials will start with a series on bicycle safety.

"Safety is a good one to lead off with, because it's important," Diez-

Muhich worked at a television station in Michigan before coming to Kwajalein in 1999, and producing more than 200 "Windows on the Atoll" segments.

The announcements will come on a case-by-case basis, from "announcements that need more in-depth treatment than a roller announcement," Muhich said.

The subject matter will need a visual element, too, Diezman said.

Feagler invited the community to call in with their thoughts.

"It's a chance for departments to have fun, and get the word out," he said.

## May honors service members

WASHINGTON — Both chambers of the U.S. Congress have adopted a resolution calling for Americans to recognize and honor U.S. service members during May's National Military Appreciation Month.

Virginia Rep. Tom Davis, along with 16 cosponsors, introduced Concurrent Resolution No. 328 in the House in November. The Senate agreed to it without amendment and by unanimous consent April 26.

The Senate first passed a resolution in 1999 designating National Military Appreciation Month.

Traditionally, May has focused on the military in many ways. For example, Public Service Recognition Week, celebrated the first full Monday through Sunday in May since 1985, recognizes the roles of public servants, including the military, at local, state, regional and federal levels. As a part of PSRW, communities across America showcase military equipment

and service members from U.S. installations.

The largest PSRW event takes place on Washington's National Mall, where more than 100 federal agencies, including the military services, put their activities, people and equipment on public display. This year's mall event is May 6-9.

Armed Forces Day, created in 1949, is an annual event held on the third Saturday in May, with activities at U.S. military bases around the world. This year's celebration occurs May 15.

The month culminates with Memorial Day, a federal holiday on the last Monday in May. The day, dating from the Civil War era, traditionally has marked recognition of those who have died in service to the nation. Each year on Memorial Day, the White House Commission on Remembrance promotes one minute of silence at 3 p.m. local time to honor the military's fallen comrades and to pay tribute to the sacrifices by the nation's service members and veterans.

## Stars and Stripes offers free online newspaper service

WASHINGTON — One can now go online to read or download an exact replica of the paper at no charge.

*Stars and Stripes* officials said the electronic version of the newspaper is an effort to reach readers in remote areas, but any service member anywhere in the world, as well as family members, can use the service, which began April 26.

One can read the paper online or download it in the .pdf file format at the [estripes.osd.mil](http://estripes.osd.mil) Web site. The site also offers free access to past newspapers up to seven days.

Publisher Tom Kelsch said that offering the paper online to service members does not mean the printed edition is going away. He said evidence indicates most people still want to hold a newspaper in their hands.



# Plan your travel and travel your plan, sensibly

There are several health factors to consider when traveling to exotic locations as well as back to the states.

Many travel-related injuries and illnesses are preventable with precautionary measures and preparation.

“Plan well, be prepared, be sensible, act responsibly,” said Dr. John Janikowski, Kwajalein Hospital staff.

When traveling to other countries, health professionals advise one to be aware of health and safety factors such as contaminated food and water, insect bites, diseases, accidents, climate and altitude change and terrorism. It is also good to locate medical facilities in areas where travel is planned and find out what level of health care the facilities provide. Also, make sure to carry an adequate supply of any prescription medication for the length of the trip.

“A check-up is not necessary for a trip to Honolulu or the States or even a long weekend in Ponhpei,” Janikowski said. “A pre-trip exam would be important before trips to underdeveloped countries or countries with tropical diseases or suboptimal health standards ... for people with significant medical problems, and before trips to foreign countries for extended periods of time.”

For example, in travel locations that do not have American sanitary standards, it is safer to drink hot coffee and tea made with boiled water. For cold beverages, drink bottled water, soft drinks, beer and wine directly from the can or bottle instead of in a glass, and break the seal yourself.

However, dry beverage cans and bottles should be wiped thoroughly, especially where the mouth may come in contact with the container, before they are opened.



Potentially risky beverages include local water, ice cubes made from local water, drinks served in glasses and milk or milk products.

Also, avoid brushing teeth with contaminated water.

Although most travelers are aware of risks by drinking local water, many forget about disease or illness caused from foods.

Peel it, boil it or throw it away advises the Web site [www.travdoc.com](http://www.travdoc.com).

Fruits and vegetables should be cooked and peeled, and foods that are only warm or at room temperature, such as buffets, should be avoided. Avoid raw or undercooked foods and food or beverages from street vendors.

Locally, tropical reef fish represent a potential risk even if it is cooked. A toxin present in tropical reef fish causes ciguatera. Fish that should be avoided are barracuda, red snapper, grouper, kingfish, amberjack, sea bass, moray eel and sturgeon.

Aside from food- and water-borne illnesses, changes in altitude can become an issue.

Many travelers can experience altitude sickness when ascending rapidly to altitudes higher than 2,500 meters. The most common indicators of altitude sickness are headaches, nausea, dizziness, malaise, insomnia and loss of appetite.

When symptoms appear, don't climb higher until the symptoms have cleared.

Travel to high altitude is not recommended for people with a history of heart disease, lung disease or sickle cell or pregnant women.

Make any trip more enjoyable and safer with a travelers kit for minor ailments.

A traveler's kit can be put together from items purchased at the Kwajalein Hospital or Ten-Ten. The kit should contain sun screen with a minimum SPF of 15, mosquito repellent, water purification tablets, tincture of iodine, dehydration packets, diarrhea treatments, prescription medicine, toilet paper, scissors, aspirin and assorted bandages.

After returning home from any travel, many health issues can arise.

“If a fever is above 100 degrees, or persistent, or unexplained by a simple illness,” Janikowski said, then a traveler should seek medical attention. “After-travel exams are important for anyone with unexplained or persistent symptoms, even of a minor nature, people who have significant medical illnesses, and anyone who has engaged in health risk activities.”

Symptoms may take days, weeks or even months before they develop so if a gastrointestinal illness, rash or fever develops during or after a trip it should be reported.

“If you have any illness requiring medical evaluation, in the post-travel time period, be sure to inform your medical practitioner regarding your recent travel history.”
