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# 'Friends' farewell leads to journey through past TV

I was never a huge "Friends" fan. I like the show all right. It's had some funny stuff, but I just never got hooked.

In the last week, however, we've heard how we're now "saying good-bye to our best friends," as the promo states.

What, Danny, his book bag and his mom are going away?

"Friends" dominated the news last week, sitting atop the headlines along with serious war coverage and presidential campaign news. I saw one piece that suggested the finale marked the end of television sitcoms, as networks focus more on reality programming.

More than 51 million people, including Danny's mom, reportedly watched the final episode, which, according to MSN, ranks fourth among series finales behind "M\*A\*S\*H" at 105 million viewers in 1983, "Cheers" at 80.4 million in 1993 and "Seinfeld" at 76.2 million in 1998.

I think Kwajalein Atoll's 1,000 captive viewers, time-delayed to Saturday, added .0001 of a percent to the total. Don't forget us Nielsen!

Discussing this with AFN's Rich Feagler and the *Hourglass*' Dan Adler and Jan Waddell, the departure of "Friends" led us to a conversational journey through our



own TV recollections. In fact, TV memories, or the shared experience of seeing something happen on an electronic screen, have become a part of our lives.

I remember where I was when I saw the U.S. hockey team beat the Russians in 1980 at Lake Placid, N.Y., and I remember where I was when I saw the Challenger tragedy, and of course, the terrorist attacks of September 11.

But where do regular weekly sitcoms fit into this equation?

"Friends" has certainly survived and thrived over 10 years, a remarkable feat in television history. Few shows have demonstrated the same staying power and much of that has to do with the cast itself.

The six actors on "Friends" have not only remained on the show, they've negotiated salaries and sought nominations for awards as a group, never letting one character or another get bigger than the show.

When Fonzie jumped the shark, "Happy Days," sank.

When Suzanne Somers left "Three's Company," the show went down hill, despite the efforts of the talented John Ritter

and Joyce DeWitt.

When Gary Coleman reached puberty, "Diff'rent Strokes" tanked.

The first and last shows spawned spin-offs — "Happy Days" begetting the evil that was "Joanie Loves Chachi" and "Mork and Mindy," while "Diff'rent Strokes" turned out "The Facts of Life" and "Hello Larry."

In an unusual twist, the aforementioned "Cheers" spun off into the equally successful "Frasier." In a sense, that's 20 years of "Cheers."

You might say television sitcoms reflect and mark the passing of time. Some are funny for the moment, others stand the test of time.

"I Love Lucy" is funny slap-stick, but today's generations might wonder why a wife would care what her "Big Babaloo" thinks. Tell him to pound sand, already. In context, it's hilarious and tells a lot about life in the '50s.

Like that classic, "Friends" won't hold up 20 years from now when people are soooooo over the cool expressions, but it will sure explain a lot about Gen-Xers to other generations.

On the other hand, check out an episode of "M\*A\*S\*H" and, naturally the uniforms have changed since the Korean War, but the satire hasn't, making it our consensus pick for best show ever.

# Retail offers phone cards

New MCI telephone calling cards with portions of the profits returned to the Recreation Fund arrive in stores on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur today.

There are five different types of calling cards available; a 125 Minute Pass, 240 Minute Pass, 500 Minute Pass, and two types of International Flat Rate calling cards.



The cards will be offered at a significantly discounted price from the manufacturers suggested retail price, according to Paul Divinski, retail manager, merchandising and provisioning.

Another feature of these cards is they are live cards and the minutes can be reloaded by calling MCI and using a credit card to reload the cards. They are not necessarily throw-away calling cards, he added.

As a bonus Divinski said the cards are discounted and a convenience for residents and TDY personnel.

"The profit on this, like all other profits on retail items, goes toward the [recreation] fund," Divinski said.

Currently there are 600 Minute Pass cards and 100 International Flat Rate cards available at Ten/Ten, Macy's, Macy's West, Surfway and Gimbel's at the cashiers or store managers.

"[Since these] are live cards they have to be kept secured," Divinski said.

Attending the luncheon were 10 military personnel, their spouses, one reservist and his spouse and several invited guests.

After the luncheon, Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School student, Amber Banducci, sang "Wind Beneath My Wings," and Col. Jerry Brown gave a short speech.

"Spouses are the Soldiers without uniforms," Brown said. "You are forever prepared. Your job as our spouses require you to be strong and flexible. Together you make neighborhoods and communities."

Military Spouses Appreciation day is held every year on the Friday before Mother's Day. It is designed to honor the spouses and what they deal with on a day-to-day basis.

# KPD trains for

Lined up like Roman legionnaires with plexiglass shields, polycarbonate batons and 12-gauge shotguns loaded with rubber bullets, Kwajalein police marched toward continual improvement last week during non-lethal civil-unrest training.

“Though the possibility [of civil unrest] is unlikely here, any time something happens you want to act with the least amount of force necessary,” said Joe Barnes, a consultant who traveled to Kwajalein for the three-day training. “There are non-lethal things we can apply. We want to

make sure everyone goes home without serious injury.”

The training came as part of a quarterly series of training programs KPD officers go through. Last quarter’s training, for example, focused on anti-terrorism activities, and ironically, shortly afterwards, police at the airport found box-cutters in a passenger’s carry-on bags.

“It was useful training, and our officers responded accordingly,” said Cpl. Shannon Burdine, training sergeant.

Last week’s training highlighted non-lethal, team-based approaches to civil disturbances that might threaten people, a mission or property. Police Chief Dennis Johnson said the training could apply primarily to mission security, but also any other public unrest situations that could happen.

Though currently short-handed, the department rotated all police in three groups over three days.

“It demonstrates the professionalism of this de-

partment,” Johnson said.

Friday’s group of trainees met with Barnes for four hours of class-work in the morning and gathered at the pistol range in the afternoon for hands-on training.

“At all costs, we want to try and deescalate the situation,” Burdine said.

It’s a difficult balance between force, sensitivity to the public and perception, officials said.

Often, to prevent conflict, police must project force and the ability to, if necessary, disperse a crowd and apprehend suspects without seriously injuring or killing someone.

To do so, they rehearsed individualized tactics in the use of shields and three-foot-long batons. They practiced ways to defend themselves in ways that might hurt an attacker for the short-term to end a melee, but not seriously injure someone long-term.

In addition, they practiced formations in which shield-bearing officers took the front, much like an ancient legion.

“You’re not responsible for just yourself, but everyone behind you,” Barnes told the shield carriers while demonstrating techniques for deflecting projectiles.

One technique involves firing rubber bullets into a crowd, which again, can be perceived as an offensive tactic. But Barnes says that can, when done properly, diffuse an otherwise volatile situation. Essentially, the rubber bullets – they look like 12-gauge-sized round-tipped bombs with fins – can be fired accurately within 150 feet to maintain a dis-

tance between the police and crowd. Some rubber bullets are tipped with OC gas, similar to pepper spray, which on-impact expel the nauseating gas onto the subject. By maintaining distance, however, the police formation lowers the potential for a hand-to-hand melee, which all training aside, offers a greater possibility for more people, police and civilians, to get hurt.

The trainer, Barnes, hails from Anniston, Ala., where he works as a youth pastor for a church. But he also performs consulting work based on his military experience in police training. Material for the KPD course came from Barnes' familiarity with the Inter-service Non-lethal Individual Weapons Instructor Course at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., which is a two-week course, based on lessons learned from civil unrest in Haiti, Bosnia and Kosovo, to name a few.

The course is given to all military police from all branches, but also to some others in combat arms. Variations are given to civilian police departments in the states.

Barnes said that the training is military-styled, but police-oriented.

"If you're not ordered and regimented, you're just another mob facing off against a mob," Barnes said.

Johnson said his department will next take the training and develop standardized practices. Also, every month, he hopes to get small groups together to train on what they learned

last week, as well as other topics, and once or twice a year, gather the whole department together for group training.

"They're thirsty for training," Johnson said.

# Charlie Daniels Band plays for troops in Europe

WIESBADEN, Germany — Charlie Daniels fiddled his way into the hearts of Soldiers, civilians and family members at Wiesbaden Army Airfield May 6 during a free concert to show support for U.S. troops.

“I was planning on just coming out here to check on our troops,” said Maj. Gen. Gus Hargett Jr., Tennessee’s adjutant general who helped coordinate the event with U.S. Army Europe. “Charlie got wind of it and asked if he could come along,” said the adjutant general who has more than 200 Tennessee National Guardsmen deployed to Kosovo and Germany.

Hargett said he called his friend and fellow Tennessee native, Gen. B.B. Bell, U.S. Army Europe commander, who then made it happen.

Six months later, Hargett and the band, along with local media from Tennessee, began their trip, starting in Ramstein with a visit to Landstuhl Regional Medical Center May 4.

“The spirit and patriotism of these kids, some of whom have arms or legs blown off, are just amazing,” Daniels said. I expected to find low morale; instead I found out that these kids want to go back down-range.”

Daniels talked about one Soldier in the hospital who lost his leg in Iraq. “He told his commander to get him a leg and ‘send me back to fight.’”

After visiting the wards in Landstuhl, the entourage headed for the Balkans, where Daniels and his band performed a free concert for Soldiers there and visited Tennessee National Guardsmen.

“This is my way to serve [our country]. I can’t serve myself, but I can certainly support those who do,” said Daniels during a private lunch at the Wiesbaden Dining Facility the next day.

More than 60 of the Tennessee National Guard Soldiers were bused in from Mannheim, Stuttgart, Kaiserslautern and Heidelberg to meet with Daniels, get autographs and

talk about “home.”

“We don’t get to see someone like this that often, especially someone from our home. It’s a real honor to meet with Mr. Daniels and the general,” said Spc. Nick Oswalt of Chattanooga, Tenn.

“People don’t understand what the Guard does. They think we’re different because we’re in the National Guard. But we deployed to 38 countries last year. We’re not different, we just choose not to be on active duty all the time,” Hargett said.

“And now I’m here, and if there’s anything I can do to make things better for these guys, I’ll do it.”

Later in the day, the guardsmen were back at Wiesbaden, displaying the Tennessee state flag among almost 1,000 other people at Hangar 1036 waiting to hear good ‘ol country music. The concert was aired live on the American Forces Network, AFN radio. The 75-minute concert concluded with Daniels’ fiddling to his well-known song, “The Devil Went Down to Georgia.”

## Pentagon memorial fund seeks donations

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon Memorial Fund campaign was officially launched April 22.

Almost \$30 million is being solicited, according to a news release from the Washington, D.C., public relations firm handling fund-raising for the memorial on a pro bono basis.

About \$17.5 million of collected funds will be used to build the memorial, according to the release. Another \$10 million in donations, the release continued, will be earmarked for memorial maintenance.

Some \$2 million already has been collected, including a \$1 million donation from the Anheuser-Busch Foundation, the first major corporate donor to the Pentagon Memorial Fund.

The Pentagon Memorial Fund Web site at [www.pentagonmemorial.net](http://www.pentagonmemorial.net) enables donations through a secure online system, the release noted.

The Pentagon Memorial will be built in a park-like setting and will consist of 184 individual units — the number of people killed in the Sept. 11, 2001, attack on the Pentagon.



# AFN-Kwajalein to receive Olympics, Movies, Family

AFN-Kwajalein viewers will see the Olympics and two more channels beginning in August, according to Chief Engineer Craig McCarraher.

The Olympics will begin to air Aug. 21, and will show on a number of channels, not just the sports channels, to allow for the number of events, as well as other sporting events to be televised, he said.

But the Olympics will serve as a warm-up for AFN, in a way, as starting Sept. 3, the network will begin broadcasting two new channels, AFN-Movies and AFN-Family, and revise AFN-Spectrum.

The Olympics will broadcast on the signals set for Movies and Family from Aug. 21-Sept. 3.

McCarraher said channel numbers will shift after Sept. 3 and

the combined news-sports programming on channel 13, taken from the news channel on 14 and sports programming on 17, will be replaced with new programming. The new channel numbers are, as of yet, undetermined, he added.

AFN Spectrum, Family and Movies will offer viewers more variety. AFN-Spectrum will transfer much of its movies and family programming to the respective dedicated channels and air some Lifetime Network shows and more documentaries from the Discovery Network and The Learning Channel and "flashback" television.

AFN-Family will set aside blocks for age groups, such as the early morning hours to 3 p.m. for young children, the after-school hours for tweens and general family programming for prime time.

Movies similar to those on Spec-

trum will air, with classic and newer releases, but not necessarily first-run movies, McCarraher said.

Unfortunately, the programming, if received today, would air about 14 hours off, as it will be transmitted to the Atlantic time-zone, because the island receives programming via satellite from U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Headquarters in Huntsville, Ala. That means AFN-Family's pre-school programming would start at 7 p.m., and late-night movies would start at 1 p.m., local time.

McCarraher said he is researching delay equipment to delay the signals to coincide with Kwajalein's time zone.

AFN-Kwajalein will continue to receive Atlantic, Direct-to-Sailor, News and Sports, channels, in addition to Spectrum, Family and Movie channels.
