
Give 20 minutes to those who have given all

But there doesn't seem to be too many members of the community in attendance. Perhaps a hundred or so. That's a hundred out of a population of 2,000.

There's always things to do on a day off. There's fishing, scuba diving and snorkeling, cookouts and such. But planning 20 minutes or so out of the day to remember and honor the men and women who have died in the past, and those who are dying right now in Iraq, should be included.

Our island should show how we feel with hundreds of Kwaj residents saying thank you and we will not forget our fallen heroes this year.

After Sept. 11, many American flags were put out. There aren't too many in evidence these days. Let's show our colors this Memorial Day. If you own a flag, put it out. If you don't, Macy's West has them.

There have been 793 Americans killed in Iraq so far. That's 793 reasons to make this Memorial Day ceremony the most well-attended ever.

Police chief comments on summer activity

School will be out in just a few days and vacation time is here. Many residents will be leaving the island to visit family and friends and enjoy the summer. On the other hand, there are those who have been away for several months in college and will be returning to Kwaj to visit family here.

We want everyone to have an enjoyable and safe time this summer, and even here, we have some rules that we must obey. Rules established by the command are for everyone's protection and welfare.

Some students who are returning may have been going to school in an area where the legal drinking age for alcohol is less than 21 years old. So this is just a reminder that USAKA Regulation 210-21 Control of Alcoholic Beverages, establishes the legal drinking age as 21 and reads as follows: "The minimum legal age for an individual to be permitted to sell, purchase, possess or consume

alcohol beverages at USAKA is 21 years of age, with the exception of religious ceremonies which involve the possession and consumption of alcohol."

KPD is being proactive and is looking at trends and what has happen in the past so we can take preventive measures to head off trouble areas. Things that seem to occur this time of year are an increase in patio hopping and other activities to obtain alcohol and tobacco products that are left unattended. To go along with this and could possibly be related is a spike in juvenile mischief and misbehavior.

We are asking island residents to be responsible when involved in activities where alcohol is present and to ensure that only authorized or legal aged persons are consuming alcohol. When events are over, don't leave alcohol unattended or accessible to patio hoppers or any other place where people who should not have it can readily acquire it.

The support of the community in this effort would be very helpful and greatly appreciated.

Kwajalympics set for June 11

On June 11 Kwajalein and Roi-Namur workers are invited to set aside their labors and participate in the 2004 Kwajalympics.

"Come out and play for four hours or stay at work," said Mark Owens, co-chair of the Kwajalympics.

Owens said the games are open to everyone working on Kwaj and Roi-Namur, and their spouses. All military person-

nel, contract employees, RMI employees and spouses are eligible to sign up and participate in the games.

productivity and efficiency."

Mark Paier, co-chair of the Kwajalympics, said "You can not be a spectator. You have to participate in one sporting event."

Paier and Owens both said once an individual participates in an event, they can then watch the rest of the events without participating, but they can not go home.

This is a team-building plan, using sports, they said.

"It is my goal to promote uncanny

cooperation between all groups," Richardson said. "I don't want to lose some of the great things that each company and customer brings to the table. I want to meld the best attributes into a cohesive unit and sports is one way to do that."

Team building skills and communication are the emphasis at the events so participants are urged to read or listen to all instructions.

The Kwajalympics will run from 12:30-4:30 p.m. with most of the contests to be held in the field near the Richardson Theater.

The games will start with a team relay. Details about the relay will be released at a later date.

Other events will include an egg toss, kickball, bowling, three-legged race, swimming, wiffleball golf, paper airplane

toss and a cannonball splash contest. Each event is modified in some way to allow everyone to compete.

"A lot of these are real quick," Owens said.

Kickball, for example, will run about a half-hour at the longest.

Sign-up sheets are currently available with department managers, according to Owens. Spouses of employees who want to participate, can also sign up with their spouse's manager. The sign-up sheets must be turned in to Paier or Owens by the close of business on June 4.

A closing ceremony is scheduled at the Yokwe Yuk Club immediately after the games.

The overall top three teams will each receive an award and the top six places in each event will receive a certificate.

It will be a "fun day, team building, increased communication between departments and sun," Owens said.

According to Owens KRS Food Services will also sell food and drinks at the Kwajalympics.

KRS reaches million-hour safety milestone

KRS employees worked more than one million hours without an injury involving time away from work as of May 21. For the approximate 2,300 employees of KRS, that translates to nearly three months of continuous safe operations.

This milestone is particularly notable because employees here face all types of hazards, from the ordinary to the extraordinary.

“Some of our high-risk jobs include tower climbing and maintenance, high-voltage electrical, marine functions and everything from operation of the some of the largest and most powerful radars in the world to climbing palm trees to remove coconuts,” explained John Feldman, KRS Safety manager.

KRS president, Ike Richardson, attributed the million-hour achievement to efforts by KRS to put safety at the forefront and to the entire KRS team for their diligence and focus on safety.

“The importance of this milestone is a testament that if you focus efforts on specific challenges they are achievable,” Richardson said.

According to Richardson, KRS now has an Executive Safety Council that reviews every incident with the responsible supervisor or manager, as well as an Employee Safety Committee whose input goes directly to himself and the Executive Committee.

Also, the safety personnel slots have been filled, and more attention is being put out in the field to oversee work.

“These changes have all started to pay dividends now,” Richardson said.

Lost work time injuries are by far the most serious, according to the Occupational Safety and Health

Administration. Other on-the-job injuries are considered either first aid or recordable. Recordables are those that require medical attention and treatment such as a prescription.

will be to be just as aggressive as we attack the recordable injuries,” Richardson said.

Ways in which KRS is building safety into the culture include safety leadership training, audits, safety bucks and on-the-spot awards and quarterly awards. In addition, the past two Presidential

awards were given for individual achievements in safety.

Describing the company’s approach to safety as top-down as well as bottom-up, Feldman believes that it’s about teamwork.

Managers and supervisors need to ensure employees are aware and knowledgeable of hazards and use the proper procedures and equipment to work safely, Feldman said.

“And employees need to know that they have the right to stop work if a situation becomes hazardous and talk with their supervisor or consult with the Safety Office,” Feldman said. “They are empowered.”

Celebration of this milestone is on the horizon and officials are soliciting input on how to reward the KRS team.

Safety is a core capability that touches all aspects of a business, according to Richardson.

Said Richardson, “Safety is a battle that is fought every day.”

Afghan golf course faced additional 'hazards'

KABUL, Afghanistan — With de-mining, a benefit of a U.N. program, and assistance from an effort called "disarmament, demobilization and reintegration," heavy weapons and mines no longer thwart those who wish to indulge in recreation at the Kabul Golf Club, Afghanistan's only operational golf course.

After de-mining the full 18-hole course and removing three abandoned Soviet tanks, a few artillery pieces and a multiple-rocket launching system from the fairways, the in the 1960s-built golf course is now free of ordnance and open for business, providing Afghans a sport that hasn't been made available since before the Soviet occupation.

From the early 1980s Soviet invasion to the fall of the Taliban in 2002, golf in Afghanistan has been non-existent. For Mohammad Afzal Abdul, the club professional, the return of golf to Afghanistan is a sight for sore eyes.

"I have been playing golf since I was 10," the 47-year-old Abdul said. "I was taught the game by American instructors in the old days."

In the 1970s, prior to the assassination of U.S. Ambassador Adolph Dubs, staffs from the various embassies would come and play golf, except for the staff of the Soviet Embassy, Abdul said. Because of his association through golf with Americans, Abdul said several years later the Taliban beat him and burned down his house.

Similar to having a poor lie, placement of the ball, in golf, Abdul disregards the past and focuses on his future and the potential of Afghanistan, he said. "Although golf is not a common game in Afghanistan, lots of kids show curiosity about it," Abdul said. "I explain to them the importance of the game and that piques their interest. Golf is a game for the future of Afghanistan. He said the game "teaches players a sense of tolerance, patience and hard work," noting, lessons like these will bring the country back to the days of democracy, which lasted in Afghanistan from 1965 to 1974.

In March 2004, local golfers convinced Abdul to reopen the course, a sign that proves Afghanistan is making positive changes, Abdul said. Since the course was full of mines and explosive materials, he sought assistance from the government of Afghanistan and requested the area be cleared.

In response, the Afghan Ministry of Defense, Japanese-led DDR program and the U.N.'s Halo Trust de-mining team worked to eliminate hazardous conditions.

"Golf is a safe and friendly social activity," said U.S. Army Col. Bert Key, director of security sector reform in the Office of Military Cooperation – Afghanistan, an organization designed to aid the Afghan government in developing its military defense sector. "People out on the golf course, playing the game and peacefully interacting with one another, are a sign that they are gaining confidence in the stability of their society."

Although the golf club is operational, it is short of equipment, he said, but donations of equipment or materials are helping to improve course operations.

Soldier shares culture

SAN FRANCISCO — When Army Spc. Hong Huynh's father immigrated to the United States after the Vietnam War, he gave her these words of advice: "Always respect the United States, respect the citizens, do your part in our country, and do your best because we have to value our freedom."

This week the California National Guard member was recognized for honoring her father's words. Huynh was one of nine service members who stood center stage at an awards luncheon in San Francisco May 19 honored by the Defense Department and the Federal Asian Pacific American Council for their efforts to bring diversity in the federal workplace.

The service members received meritorious service awards from the council during an Asian-Pacific Heritage Month celebration that was part of a week-long FAPAC training conference.

Huynh, 23, assigned to a California National Guard medical detachment in Mather, near Sacramento, said in receiving the award that she was just doing her job.

"I was just doing my part in the military, in the community and in life," she said. "So I feel like I don't deserve this award — but anyway I feel really honored."

Huynh was recognized for her volunteer work in the Vietnamese community in Mather, where she assists needy families and mentors students at Valley High School, which she attended.

She said education is very important to her, even though her family was reluctant when she signed up for the military while still in high school. She said her father told her that education comes first. But, she replied, "I can do both."





Poppies honor fallen veterans

The Kwajalein branch of the American Legion Auxiliary will offer Memorial Day poppies on Monday, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in front of Ten-Ten.

The red, handcrafted poppies are a tribute to those veterans who died for America's freedoms during the wars of the last 80 years and honor the millions of Americans who have willingly served their country.

Proceeds benefit local programs for veterans and their families. On Kwajalein, programs include scholarships for veterans' children. Funds raised also go to local causes such as Operation Christmas Drop and the Veteran's Club.

The Auxiliary began distributing poppies more than 70 years ago. This program continues to assist hospitalized and disabled veterans in need of rehabilitation and financial assistance.

"I think that this year especially the poppy has a special meaning because we're at war and are losing so many in Iraq and Afghanistan," Auxiliary treasurer, Amy LaCost said. "It has a special meaning for me because I think about my cousin in Iraq every day who left his wife and young children behind."

An estimated 25 million Americans wear the poppy, contributing over \$2 million for rehabilitation and other programs.

"Wear it to show support to those who are fighting to give people a better life and also for those who have died," LaCost said.
