

It seems that it takes years for something to go full circle, but when it does it is all the sweeter.


I am thanking every power that is, was and ever will be.

### The Kwajalein Hourglass

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

# Air Nauru to link Marshall Islands to Australia

An airline out of the world's smallest independent republic, called Air Nauru, will begin service from Majuro to Australia on July 12.

According to Jerry Kramer, Pacific International Inc. chief executive officer, Air Nauru is offering a new South Pacific route to Honiara, Australia and Fiji, "on a modern, certified aircraft at prices never before available to residents of the Marshall Islands."

Air Nauru's introductory fares are as low as \$495 round trip Majuro to Brisbane. This special runs until Sept. 3, and travel must be completed by that date. Regular fares to the same destination range from \$790 to \$1075, with child and infant fares available.

Passengers can expect comforts such as meals and refreshments served throughout the flights, as well as first class and coach seats, but there is no TV on the 10-year-old Boeing 737-400.

Air Nauru flights are scheduled to stop in Majuro on Mondays and Fridays. The Friday departure from Majuro is around lunchtime, with an arrival in Brisbane that evening, offering the makings of a weekend getaway, according to Air Nauru's literature.

Yvonne Duarte, Continental Airlines site manager, said that residents can book their flight from Kwajalein to Majuro either through Continental Travel or Air Marshall Islands. For the Continental

round-trip flight, expect to pay \$338 for full fare or \$210 for a three-day advance, nonrefundable ticket. The Aloha round-trip flight is \$300 full fare or \$190 for a three-day advance, nonrefundable seat. The cost for a round-trip Air Marshall Islands flight is \$250.

The new Air Nauru service has been under negotiation for several months, according to Kramer, and because existing routes brought them within 1 hour and 15 minutes of Majuro, their research indicates that this should be a financially feasible route.

"The equator might as well have been a wall in regards to travel between the South and North Pacific to residents and visitors through the Marshall Islands until now," Kramer said. "This new Air Nauru service opens a new world of opportunities to travelers in our area and is destined to have a positive economic effect for our community."

Air Nauru has been in business 34 years and is owned by the government of Nauru, an island totaling 8 square miles south of the Marshalls, known for its export of phosphate.

The airline is registered in Australia and holds an Australian Air Operating Certificate issued by the Civil Aviation and Safety Authority of Australia, according to Kramer. Maintenance is managed and carried out by Qantas Airlines.

## Reds executive offers tickets to Guard troops

WASHINGTON — When the Cincinnati Reds' chief executive officer returned earlier this week to Forward Operating Base Eagle in Tuzla, Bosnia-Herzegovina, following a foot patrol through a local town, he presented the Indiana National Guard troops there with an unusual gift: the promise of tickets to a Reds game when they return home.

"It seemed like the right thing to do," John Allen said. "Hopefully they can come and bring their families and see a game on me."

# Visiting islands, diving wrecks requires forms

Want to visit Bigej or dive the Eugen?

Requirements for visiting the outer islands in Kwajalein Atoll recently changed.

Hiram Malolo, Republic of the Marshall Islands representative to U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll, stated that people who want to visit Bigej, or any of the outer islands in the atoll, first must fill out a request form and return it to the Republic of the Marshall Islands office. Malolo will then contact the landowner to obtain permission.

"The landowners want to be informed," Malolo said.

This new requirement recently took affect.

Before one simply filled out a visitation form with the names those people who wanted to visit the outer islands and which island they wanted to visit. Malolo would sign the form, giving permission to visit the specified island. Now, the landowners must be notified, and they must give their permission before anyone can visit non-leased islands.

Malolo said it takes two to three days to acquire all the required signatures and permission for the

visit.

If one requests a visit to islands or atolls outside Kwajalein Atoll,

paper work and obtain permissions before visiting the outer islands.

"It is a legal requirement," Coffey said.

He added the landowner has the final decision on whether to grant the visit or not, and since the landowners do plan events on their home-islands, there may be times when they deny the visit.

Another area Coffey addressed was diving on the different wrecks in the Marshall Islands.

"[Divers are] supposed to get an RMI dive permit," Coffey said.

One of the more popular places to dive is the *Prinz Eugen* near Carlson. According to Coffey, permission to visit Carlson and an RMI Dive Permit must be obtained.

The dive permits can be obtained from the Kwajalein Atoll Local Government city manager's Office on Ebeye for an annual fee of \$50.

Visits to Carlos must also be cleared through Malolo, even though part of the island is leased by USAKA. There is a Marshallese community on Carlos.

Coffey said there is renewed interest in ancestral land and at times whole family-clans visits their island to fish, collect coconuts and maintain the island.

"Don't hesitate," Coffey said. "Don't assume there is no requirement. Get your permission first, even if you don't plan to go on the island. The landowners do utilize their lands."

He added if the police find you have visited an outer island with out the proper paper work then a citation can be issued.

such as Namu or Lib, for example, then the senator and the mayor of that specific atoll and island needs to give permission for the visit.

"[The Marshall Islands] is a sovereign state," said Maj. David Coffey, USAKA Host Nation chief. "All the land is privately owned."

Coffey added, "You need to plan ahead," to complete all the required

# Private company births new hospital plan

The island could see a new hospital soon, thanks to private builders.

"A private company is looking to build a new two-story hospital on island. Col. [Jerry] Brown [USAKA commander] is working this issue hard for us," Ike Richardson, KRS president, told residents at the Kwajalein forum on June 10.

This construction is separate from that announced under the privatization initiative, because the hospital falls under a different category, Richardson said. Timing will coincide with the other new construction, expected to begin in the March timeframe, and the building will be funded on a lease-to-buy basis.

Richardson also announced that with family dining at the Yokwe Yuk Club out of commission, the Pacific Dining Room would open for families in July as an alternative place to eat. The days and times for dining will be made available, but have yet to be determined.

Family dining at the Yuk was discontinued because of logistics involved in cooking the food at the Snack Bar or PDR and transporting it at the correct temperature back to the Yuk. This practice occurred following closing of Yuk's kitchen because of structural issues.

According to Richardson, "Structural engineers are looking at the Yuk but it does not look that it will pass inspection because of safety concerns. Opening the PDR will serve to augment what's currently available to families."

Health insurance carrier selection, the new compensation plan,

and employee bonuses were among the topics discussed at the Kwajalein forum, as they were at the Roi forum.

"I'm not promising a bonus, but we are really well positioned to get employee bonuses in FY 04 if we continue to do as well as we did in the last six months," Richardson said. But, managers cannot have the old "use or lose" mentality with the budget, explained Richardson, because a percentage of what is saved will go to the employee bonus pool.

"If you need something, buy it, but don't just buy to buy," Richardson said.

In other matters:

- KRS met a safety milestone of over 1.2 million hours June 9, setting a new record on Kwajalein. The previous record was 960 hours without a lost workday incident. Richardson stressed the need to work on reducing recordable injuries as well.

- New airplanes are not coming, per the USAKA commander's decision, Richardson said. Air conditioning will be installed in the two existing Metroliners, and one new air-conditioned Metroliner will be on its way shortly. According to Richardson, the D-6 will go away.

- North Point trailers closest to oceanside will be brought down according to plans, and eight dome homes will be built in that space. Half of the homes will be two bedroom and half three bedroom units. There are possible reuse capabilities for the trailers, according to Richardson.

- Badges will be changing to restrict access to those without contracts. Also, the 480 visitor program

is changing in that visitors will not be permitted to buy liquor and cigarettes under future restrictions.

- Chugach is looking at reprogramming its payroll system to include the deduction information currently available to employees on KRS paychecks.

- A point-of-sale system is one of the highest-funded priorities, Richardson said, and should be funded before next fiscal year, if at all possible.

- The new animal control policy will be in place in the next few weeks. There are no weight limits on pets, but quotas for the number of pets allowed on island remain. On a related note, Richardson reminded dog owners to please clean up after your animals.

- As the old cold storage building is taken to the ground, people disregarding the tape around that area may be given tickets.

- Tickets may also be handed out for unkempt yards. After receiving a certain number of tickets, notice will come directly from Richardson asking that the recipient clean up their yard. Unresponsive recipients will receive a bar from the island.

- KRS managers are handing out safety bucks to the entire community for safe acts. This program is funded by KRS and enables the recipient to such things as free ice cream at the Snack Bar.

- Feedback on the vacation trailers available on Roi was given by a forum attendee who said they appreciated their availability and cleanliness.

"We do listen to your comments," Richardson responded, adding, "There is nothing that we cannot accomplish if we operate as a team."

## *Coalition protects Babylon archaeological site*

WASHINGTON — The coalition in Iraq has taken steps to protect an ancient Babylon archaeological site.

Coalition Provisional Authority administrator Ambassador L. Paul Bremer III and Army Lt. Gen. Ricardo S. Sanchez, commander of Multinational Force Iraq, announced the initiative today in a joint statement.

"Recently, the coalition dispatched a team of archaeologists and Iraqi cultural antiquities experts to the city of Babylon to assess the current condition of the archaeological site located at Camp Alpha, a coalition base originally established to protect and defend the

ancient city of Babylon during military operations in 2003," the statement said.

Based on the experts' findings, coalition officials have directed all contractors working in or around the Babylon site to halt any activities that are or may be likely to cause archaeological damage, the statement continued.

Bremer and Sanchez also directed an official investigation into the construction and expansion of Camp Alpha to ensure that the coalition is respecting the surrounding archaeological site and ordered that planning begin for the relocation of all coalition troops in the immediate area of Babylon.

# Take precautions against sun

Sun is a daily part of life on Kwajalein, and it is also necessary form of vitamin D, but prolonged exposure or unprotected exposure to the sun can result in health issues.

Unprotected exposure to ultraviolet ray can cause skin and eye damage, and even cancer.

But the most common result is sunburn, which can be serious.

"When we do see people, the sunburn is usually blistered and painful and can be listed as first or second degree burns," said Valerie Janikowski, Outpatient nurse manager.

And while anyone can get sunburned, Dr. Eric Lindborg, chief medical officer, said most often, "We see [sunburns] with the newcomers," because some people who come here use the same precautions they used in the states. But many of those precautions are not enough for Kwajalein where extra protection is needed near the equator, where the sun is strongest.

Lindborg and Janikowski recommend sunscreen, a long sleeve shirt and a wide brim hat to protect the skin.

Lindborg said one should seek medical attention if a sunburn has significant blistering.

Mid-day sun, between 11 a.m.-3 p.m., is the most damaging due to the higher ultraviolet radiation. UV radiation can also penetrate clear water up to one meter. So even when in the water, there is a danger of burning, the same as on cloudy



days.

One should apply sun screen of 15 SPF or higher 30 minutes before going out in the sun. That way it can be absorbed. Reapply often, especially when swimming, exercising or sweating. Remember to put sunscreen on ears, back, shoulders and the backs of knees and legs and under the straps of bathing suits in case the straps move.

With children, apply sun screen every two to three hours and reapply after swimming. A waterproof sun screen will last for a shorter period of time if the child is swimming. Reapply the sunscreen when they come out of the water.

Also, check prescription medication to see if exposure to the sun will cause adverse reactions.

Another risk of sun exposure is photo aging, Lindborg said. This is when the skin wrinkles, thickens, gets scaly and has an increased chance of cancer.

If there is a new spot on the skin which changes in texture or color, Lindborg suggests having a doctor check the spot out.

Also, people over 50 should have a general exam and have their doctor check their skin.

Heat exhaustion is also a concern for people exposed to high temperatures with the elderly at a higher risk.

Heat exhaustion usually occurs with physical exertion.

According to Lindborg, heat exhaustion is not seen much here on Kwajalein, but when it is, it is usually in athletes who have pushed themselves too hard and have had inadequate fluid intake.

"Train carefully and cautiously," Lindborg said.

Signs and symptoms to look for can be cramps, light-headedness and poor mental focus.

He added if any of these symptoms occur then the person should stop exercising, spray themselves with water and drink lots of water.



# Citizens honor Reagan outside cathedral

WASHINGTON — As public figures arrived in black limousines and SUVs to attend today's funeral service for President Ronald Reagan, ordinary people waited outside Washington National Cathedral to pay their final respects to the former chief executive.

As the start of the service neared, the sullen morning sky released a misty drizzle as umbrellas popped open among the hundreds of people who braved the weather for the arrival of the funeral motorcade.

"It's really an honor to be here," Jennifer Bresnahan, 19, declared as she peered out from under a dripping umbrella. The Georgetown University student noted she's an "Army brat" whose family currently is stationed overseas. She shared the umbrella with her Georgetown classmates Layne Bolin and Joel Devallon.

President Bush had declared Saturday a national day of mourning for Reagan, who died June 5 in California. Air Force One brought the former president to Washington June 9, where he was taken to the U.S. Capitol to lay in state till Saturday's funeral. News reports quoted officials saying that more than 100,000 people had viewed Reagan's casket in the U.S. Capitol Rotunda.

After the funeral service, the former president was flown back to California for burial at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library.
