

Jim reinvented the *Hourglass* when



Bali, Aussie holiday travel packages take off

In researching affordable travel to Australia, at the request of Joe Marshall, deputy program manager for Community Services, Continental Travel initially considered chartering an airplane over the holidays the best solution. But once the facts were gathered, it turned out chartering is no bargain.

"You pay for all the empty seats on the plane's way here and back, as well as all the seats that didn't fill up for the trip with a charter," Yvonne Duarte, Continental Airlines site manager said.

The alternative, says Duarte, makes getting off "the rock" easy and affordable. Airfare to and from Kwajalein is being offered to destinations such as Australia, Bali, Manila, Hong Kong and Palau through Continental Travel's travel packages.

"Many people don't know that reasonable packages are available," said Duarte, who explained that the packages began selling last year when Kwajalein was added as a point of origin. Approximately 80 packages have been sold to date.

Travel to Australia over the holidays, as originally announced, is now available through the Cairns Holiday Escape package for as low as \$915 per person, which includes roundtrip airfare, three nights hotel stay, roundtrip airport and hotel transfers and breakfast.

"The intent of the holiday trip is to get a group of people together to get off the rock and do something different," Duarte said.

Without the package, costs are estimated at \$1,300 per person for airfare plus \$112 to \$300 per

night for the same hotels offered in the package.

The Cairns Holiday Escape package offers three hotels to choose from, and residents can opt to include an outer barrier reef cruise and a skyrail, train and kuranda experience. Packages are good for a total of 21 days, so there is no obligation to stay only three nights. Additional nights may be added for \$55.

The holiday Australia trip connects in Guam with departures on Dec. 23 or 31. Return dates are Dec. 30 or Jan. 7 for a direct flight from Australia to Kwajalein. Other return dates require a layover in Guam.

Duarte advises people to take advantage of the travel packages while they are here in the Marshall Islands, and says that residents can even apply their Continental One-Pass miles to the trip. If December is not convenient, she suggests going for spring break or summer vacation.

"Put your money to good use to learn and experience something new. Keep in mind that these packages are inclusive and economical," Duarte said. "There's something for everyone's price range."

According to travel specialist, Nancy Opiniano, Bali is also a great destination and is very family oriented. Opiniano recently returned from a business trip there where she visited 12 of 13 hotels included in the Continental packages.

At one point during her morning swim, Opiniano says she thought, "Oh my God, I'm in a movie. With the smell of incense burning and the sound of wind chimes, it's so beautiful and amazing."

Bali Experience packages range

from \$831 to \$1,131 per person and include roundtrip airfare, three nights hotel stay at a choice of 13 hotels, airport transfers and late checkout. Three different packages are available, and all include at least one adventure. There are 18 adventures to choose from including a massage treatment, 18 holes of golf, diving, a dinner cruise, cooking school and tours of the monkey forrest and temples.

"Hotels in Bali offer everything from the Ritz Carlton to something comparable to Honolulu's Maile Sky Court," Opiniano said, adding that there is only about \$300 difference between the best and the "cutest" hotels.

Opiniano recommends the trip for singles as well as families.

"Bali is absolutely amazing and it's safe," Opiniano said. "The service is out of this world and people are such courteous hosts. They are truly ambassadors of their country."

Making the reservations for a travel package through Continental Travel is easy. A deposit of approximately \$100 per person is required to book the trip, at which time the reservations are secured.

Then, according to Duarte, the Continental office in Guam handles all of the package details. A day or two before departure, ticketing occurs and everything including coupons and hotel vouchers can be picked up at the Continental Travel office.

On Monday, Continental Travel will host a Holiday Package Open House at their offices from 10 to 12 a.m. Residents are invited to stop by and learn about the package offerings and options, ask questions and receive handouts.

SMDC commanding general pays atoll a visit

Lt. Gen. Larry Dodgen shakes his head and smiles on hearing one of the longest-running island rumors, that someday soon the range might shut down.

The commanding general for the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command said the only questions in Washington concerning the USAKA revolve around “who pays what, not should we be here. We’re too strategically located and too important for our country.”

Dodgen visited USAKA/RTS and Ebeye last week in a whirlwind tour, his first since taking over of the major command in December.

He arrived Wednesday and left Friday.

“My first impression was that I was hoping there was going to be land beneath that airplane,” he said. “Next it was the picturesque beauty ... When you spend some time here, though, you realize it’s the people that are interesting here. They come from different places on the Earth.”

His visit focused on familiarization with the range and facilities, things up to now he’s only read about.

He said USAKA/RTS’ mission and future is only growing, largely due to the space surveillance role.

“It’s a very strategically located place,” Dodgen said. “Our ability to look into space is a very valuable national asset as more and more nations are venturing into space.

“Commercialization of space makes us more vulnerable,” he added.

Asked about the range’s role during the war on terror, the lieutenant general commented on new ground-based combat systems that rely on space-based assets. He said that makes the space mission even more important.

Additionally, he said, “An ICBM or missile is the ultimate act of terrorism whether it’s from another nation or a group of people.”

Besides space, the range will con-

tinue testing for the Ground-based Mid-course Defense Segment. GMD will achieve initial operational capability this year, but the range will continue testing and updating the system using the Pacific Test Bed, which allows the range to work in conjunction with other ranges in the region so that missiles are not all fired from Vandenberg Air Force Base in California to Kwajalein, but rather some are shot from Alaska and fired towards the U.S.

“If you’re going to build a global system, you’re going to see geometries flip-flop,” Dodgen said.

“Beyond the test bed there are other things in ballistic missile defense theater that you’re going to see flourish here,” he added, noting the open testing space at Kwajalein allows for a variety of trajectory options, giving testers “added realism.”

The mission work, combined with USAKA/RTS’ international partnership with the Republic of the Marshall Islands makes the atoll command “worth many more times the investment,” he said.

On that investment, Dodgen couldn’t promise significantly more money, but added he hoped to work with the local command and through the Army to give the USAKA/RTS commander, Col. Jerry

Brown, latitude to set priorities and use what budget they have most effectively. Privatization, or allowing private contractors to build facilities on lease-to-buy agreements stands as one example, he said.

“I get the sense that not everyone [on Kwaj and Roi] is living in the lap of luxury the people in CONUS might believe,” he said.

Another group Dodgen considered, are the Marshallese. The lieutenant general visited Ebeye Thursday meeting with local leaders.

“I saw good cooperation between us and Ebeye and I told [Brown] to continue that and make things a little better,” he said. “We have to consider them our partners, and whatever living conditions and concerns they have, we have to consider.

“We’re in another country and we’re representing America here. They have their customs and our people ought to understand that and embrace our host nation’s customs,” Dodgen added. “These folks have put a lot of their future in America’s hands.”

The lieutenant general left on Friday with impressions he’ll carry to the Pentagon, mostly, he said, “You have great people doing great work out here, dedicated to what they do.”

Sometimes a name says it all, sometimes not

In Spanish the term “No va” means “no go or it won’t work.” When the General Motors people introduced their new Chevrolet line into Mexico several years ago the vehicles just didn’t sell. Why? The reason was the misinterpretation by the local residents about the product name, Nova. They figured the Nova just wouldn’t go. GM quickly changed the name to another popular model selling in the U.S. and the renamed Nova vehicles sold very well in Mexico for several years. This is a good illustration of how an indigenous language can be misused or at least misunderstood. This leads me into a story about a similar situation that occurred on Kwajalein.

One thing I have found about the Marshallese people, after knowing and counting them as my friends for over 40 years, is their ability to enjoy a good laugh either at themselves or often times, the Americans. The story about Chicken Every Sunday in my book “Kwajalein Remembered” is a good illustration of Marshallese humor. Another story I had a small part in also illustrates how badly the Americans sometimes unknowingly put their worst foot forward with the Marshallese. This particular incident had a happy ending and everything including the Kwaj residents got a good laugh but, I think the folks from Ebeye had the biggest guffaw over the whole matter. Anyway this is what happened.

Along about late 1967 the population was bursting at the seams with almost 5,000 residents living on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur. The new trailers had just been installed on the north-fill, later to be called Silver City, and the population density in this area made Emon Beach one of the more attractive recreation areas on the island. The Army Island Commander established a program to upgrade the existing Emon Beach pavilions. A new concrete lifeguard tower along with three new picnic shelters were built. Someone suggested the installation of a permanent food service area at Emon since a lunch wagon-type business out of the PDR was doing a booming business on the weekends and

during noon hour lunch periods at the newly occupied Kwajalein High School across the street from Emon Beach. It was decided to build a new snack bar where hot takeout foods would be sold.

Nearing the completion of the new snack bar construction, it was realized there was no appropriate name for the new facility. Somehow the word “Snack Bar” just didn’t seem appropriate for the South Sea Island setting at Emon Beach. Someone suggested placing palm fronds over the roof to make the new facility look like something right out of a Dorothy Lamour movie. Some of the high school kids asked why loud speakers playing Hawaiian music couldn’t be placed on the structure. Everybody seemed to have their own great idea about what the new snack bar should represent.

The Island commander, finally tired of all the crazy suggestions about the new attraction at Emon Beach, called his staff together one morning and told them to suggest a name for the new eating facility. According to Col. (ret.) Del Walker, the deputy of logistics at the time, someone suggested “let’s have a name the snack bar contest.” Over the next few days over 100 name suggestions were received. The winning idea came from Major Floyd Johnson who was the Kwajalein Missile Range adjutant at the time. Maj. Floyd reasoned that since the new facility was at Emon Beach why not use the name Nome, which was Emon spelled backwards. Someone added the “s”

to make Nome sound better. Great! KMR had a new name befitting the brand new Snack Bar.

The paint crew made two large signs with big, bright red and yellow letters that spelled out Nome’s. The signs were placed on the roof of the snack bar so that one pointed toward the high school and the other pointed toward Emon Beach and the Kwajalein Lagoon. It was soon apparent that something was wrong. The Marshallese working out in the Silver City area were seen whispering and laughing as they rode by the Nomes on their bicycles. As the old Tarlang ferry transited back and forth to Ebeye each day, the Marshallese would run to the island side of the ship’s rail pointing toward Emon Beach while laughing till the tears ran down their faces.

The Marshallese for some reason saw something very funny about the new eatery on Emon Beach.

After having enough of the laughter and the finger pointing, someone asked the Marshallese what was so funny.

“Oh sir, the word Emon means good or fair weather but Nomes refers to human excrement ... It is considered to be a very bad word to use in Marshallese. We could never understand why the Americans would name a place to eat food such a foul name.”

Like General Motors, we changed the name Nomes to the Tradewinds.

The facility closed a couple years ago and become the Kayak Shack in December 2003.

Gen. Myers named No. 1 father

NEW YORK — America's No. 1 military officer recently became America's No. 1 Dad.

During a luncheon June 17, Joint Chiefs Chairman Air Force Gen. Richard B. Myers was honored as the 2004 "National Father of the Year" by the National Father's Day Council.

His wife, Mary Jo, along with daughters, Nicole and Erin, and son, Richard Jr., were on hand to see Myers receive the award.

The council, a non-profit organization established in 1931, recognizes contemporary male leaders each year.

Also receiving Father of the Year honors in other categories were former NBA player and now New York Knicks' general manager Isiah Thomas, NASCAR racing legend Richard Petty, jazz pianist Ellis Marsalis Jr. and National Baseball Hall of Fame manager Tommy Lasorda.

Lasorda called the general a "great American" and "great leader." And pointing to Myers, he said "America can feel pretty safe with our military in the hands of that man over there."

Thomas also offered kind words, thanking Myers for "keeping all of us safe," and "allowing my kids to continue to live freely in a country as great as ours."

During his acceptance speech, Myers said being named Father of the Year is a "great honor," but his concern at the moment was for the future security of America's children.

Referring to the events of Sept. 11, 2001, he asked the audience what they want it to be like when their children "wake up tomorrow?" He said that kind of thinking motivates him daily, "not just for my children and grandchildren, but yours as well."

Paul Rosengard, vice president for the National Father's Day Council's board of directors, said he nominated Myers for this year's honor because many of the "core military values resonate with our board when selecting honorees."

"Honor, integrity, work ethics and commitment to self-improvement, education and family are the cornerstone of a military way of life," he noted.

"General Myers is a great role model for fathers across the nation."





Task force watches president address home post

(Editor's Note: *The war in Iraq has many duty stations. Here's a glimpse into the lives of troops in northern region of Mosul.*)

From a Task Force Olympia Press Release

MOSUL, IRAQ — Soldiers from Task Force Olympia were just settling in for a briefing Friday night at their headquarters in Mosul when a shout proclaimed, “turn on the T.V.” President George W. Bush was addressing Soldiers back home at Fort Lewis, Wash., and with that, the evening meeting was delayed.

More than 50 Soldiers stared at the screen at the front of the battle coordination center, or BCC, listening intently to the President's words, some hoping to recognize a Soldier in the crowd behind the President.

Soldiers from Fort Lewis' I Corps headquarters deployed to Mosul in January to form the command and control headquarters for Task Force Olympia. Last November, the 5,000 soldier-strong 3rd Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division (Stryker Brigade Combat Team), also from Fort Lewis, deployed to Iraq. The Stryker Brigade is in Mosul as the largest unit within Task Force Olympia.

Mid way through his speech, President Bush referenced the commander of Task Force Olympia, Fort Lewis' Brig. Gen. Carter

Ham. Bush said, “Recently in Mosul, the Iraqi Civil Defense Corps successfully repelled attacks on government buildings. The U.S. commander on the ground, Brig. Gen. Carter Ham said the Iraqi forces ‘stood strong.’”

Fort Lewis Soldiers in Mosul and at Fort Lewis erupted in simultaneous cheer.

Soldiers in Mosul and Fort Lewis applauded as well when the President said, “When Americans say we're going to do something, we're going to do it until the job is done.”

The Fort Lewis Soldiers in Mo-

sol visibly sat back and reflected at Bush's comment that “many of you face deployments longer than expected – you miss your families, and they miss you.”

President Bush wrapped up his Fort Lewis address to Soldiers at home and abroad by saying, “You're making your Commander-in-Chief proud.”

With that, a quiet pause filled the battle coordination center in Mosul, the television news feed was clicked off, and the battle major said loudly, “Okay folks, time for our meeting.”
