Drug and alcohol abuse exists on Kwajalein

Living on Kwajalein may seem like a safe and secure environment, but dangers such as drug and alcohol abuse are present here the same as in CONUS.

Many people don't recognize the signs or fail to acknowledge a problem.

"It doesn't get better without help," said Marion Ruffing, Employee Assistance Program counselor. "We need to be aware. The community needs to be aware."

Ruffing has a Master of Science in Counseling Psychology and is currently working on her Doctorate in Psychology, with a specialty in addictions. She is also a Certified Employee Assistance Professional offering workplace on-site programs.

The Department of Transportation and Homeland Security approve her professional background to offer treatment and rehabilitation as a substance abuse professional.

She has over 30 years experience working in the area of treatment and recovery.

Ruffing provides Kwajalein Atoll residents recovery for drug and alcohol issues along with other counseling issues.

"EAP is free to employees and family members," Ruffing said.

She added it can help with the needs of the employees and their families, if an employee or employee's family-member needs help.

Ruffing said, "That employee will receive help."

She added that an employee can come to her for assistance, but if they refuse to see their problem, it could become a Human Resource Office problem.



She said there is a Fitness for Duty policy on Kwajalein and if a supervisor or physician does a Fitness for Duty assessment then HRO has to get involved, but if the employee comes to Ruffing voluntarily, then she will have the opportunity to have the individual sign a "last chance agreement"

to look for are physical, but many are emotional.

Ruffing said, "[Addicts and alcohol abusers] operate in a state of denial. The job is the last thing to go."

She said there are many signs attributed to drug and alcohol abuse.

"Any change in hygiene or physical appearance," Ruffing said.

She added attendance at work also starts to drop.

There is also a "change in mood and behavior," Ruffing said. "Their judgment may be impaired" Another area of Ruffing's concern is the young people on island.

"I have seen issues on island with teenage drinking and abuse of drugs," Ruffing said.

"Parents need to be diligent. Talk to your child." She

stressed the need to look for "any change in behavior which can't be explained."

School grades fall and friends they hang out with also change as they become less interested in ordinary social activities.

Ruffing said young people have a choice and they can choose not to allow drugs and alcohol to become part of their everyday life.

If a parent has a concern about the child, they can contact a physician and request the child be drug screened. If the screen is positive, then treatment and recovery can be offered. Here again, Ruffing stressed it is confidential.

She said the EAP program could make a big change in the lives of employees and their families.

Having an on-site EAP program is very beneficial to the employee.

Ruffing said. "This one program could change a person's life forever"

and work with them to help them in their recovery.

"Nobody has been fired because they came to the EAP," Ruffing said. "The program is confidential." Part of the agreement Ruffing signs with the employee is addiction treatment/counseling and random drug screening.

"The employee knows where they stand all the time," Ruffing said.

She said during the random drug screening the employee has 90-minutes to report and since we have random screening for safety sensitive positions, this does not identify the employee as a drug addict or in counseling.

Due to the recent influx of drug problems, the concern has been raised about increased drug use.

In August, managers and supervisors will begin classes which will aid them in identifying drug and alcohol abuse in the work place.

Ruffing said some of the warning signs outlined in the classes

Artifacts should be saved for

Recently, a member of the Kwajalein Community attempted to sell a historic artifact recovered from a Japanese wreck in the Kwajalein Lagoon on EBay. Members of the community contacted this individual, explained to him that selling this artifact was against the Republic of the Marshall Islands law and contravened the United States Army Kwajalein Atoll Environmental Standards. Graciously, the individual withdrew the artifact from sale as soon as he was informed. This situation highlights the types of threats to the natural and cultural resources of the Marshall Islands.

The Marshall Islands have an abundance of spectacular natural and cultural resources. The RMI is home to about 860 species of reef fishes, 362 hard and soft corals, 40 sponges, 1,655 mollusks, 728 crustaceans, and 128 species of echinoderms [starfish and sea urchin families]. There are also five species of turtles, 27 marine mammals, 106 species of birds. Many people in the community have visited the Marshallese Cultural Center and have seen for themselves the breadth and depth of Marshallese culture, whose history and pre-history extends back into time some 2,000 years. The tangible remains of the courage and bravery of what has been called the “Greatest Generation” are visible throughout the atoll in the form of buildings, wrecks and archaeological sites dating from World War II. All of these things comprise great national treasures.

The natural and cultural resources of Kwajalein Atoll are a big “fringe benefit” everyone living on this island enjoys. However, with this benefit comes the responsibility to make sure that our recreation does not damage them. It is important that we remember that these resources are delicate and we need to make certain that

we use them in a responsible and sustainable manner so future generations can also enjoy them.

The coral reefs surrounding these islands, called the “rainforests of the sea,” represent one of the most magnificent, diverse, and extraordinary animal habitats on the planet. Coral reefs worldwide are in danger due to both natural and man-made causes. Population growth and development has altered the coral reef environment. Over fishing, land-based sources of pollution

and coastal development can all have a detrimental effect on delicate reefs. Closer to home, inappropriate anchoring of B-boats and souvenir hunting can cause enormous long-term damage to reefs.

Some countries, such as Cayman Islands, Bonaire, Turks and Caicos and Australia have developed protected marine parks/sanctuaries, which charge, sometimes substantial, fees to enjoy the wonders of the reef. Other countries have developed well-articulated regulations governing reef use and access. Divers know that removing live coral, shells, fish and invertebrates from the reef environment is illegal in many countries and undermines biodiversity.

Cultural resources such as wrecks, historic buildings and archaeological sites are delicate too. One of the ways that his-

tory comes alive is to be able to visit a wreck or a building, see the everyday objects left behind by the former occupants and experience a sense of connection to the past. This sense of historic connection is undermined or broken if every object has been removed and what was once a fascinating place to visit and experience history has become a hulk sitting on the floor of the lagoon.

Anyone who breaks off a piece of coral or takes an artifact from a submerged wreck to take home as a souvenir of their time in the Marshall Islands, is failing to take into account the important effect that this ac-

future generations to enjoy

tion will have over time. It will take many years for that coral growth to be replaced. Many, if not most, corals grow at a rate of less than half-an-inch a year. Artifacts once removed from their original context have little value beyond that of souvenirs and once taken will not be there for the next individual to enjoy.

We need to think long-term about natural and cultural resources. If the beauty, both underwater and out of the water, of Kwajalein is to remain for the future enjoyment of everyone, residents and visitors to Kwajalein must act responsibly now.

There are three things to keep in mind while enjoying the resources of Kwajalein. First, each and every one of us is a steward of the resources on this island. We do not own these resources, we are temporary custodians and it is our responsibility to ensure these wonders are there for those who come after us. Second, artifacts removed from their original location are of limited value from a historical context. Third, look, don't touch, especially unexploded ordnance.

USAKA Command policy follows local laws, customs, and traditions. As such, Kwajalein residents need to be aware that historical and cultural artifacts belong to the RMI and any taking, export, or disturbance of these resources is against RMI law and the USAKA Environ-

mental Standards.

Marshall Islands regulations define an artifact as any item found on, at, or in archaeological sites, any object of traditional material culture greater than 40 years old, or any historic item over 40-years old. Collections of cultural artifacts may be maintained by residents of the Marshall Islands so long as the taking of the artifact in no way damaged or compromised an archaeological site or historic property. No artifact, collection, or component part of a collection can be removed, exported, mailed, or shipped from the Marshall Islands, without an appropriately obtained permit from the RMI Historic Preservation Office in Majuro. Under RMI law, diving on submerged cultural resources requires a permit, which can be obtained at the Kwajalein Local Government Offices on Ebeye.

Sea eels can appear to be sea snakes

The waters of the Pacific Ocean hold many answered and unanswered mysteries about what lies beneath.

One of the more recent concerns on Kwajalein is sea eel or sea snake sightings.

Several determining factors make up the difference. "Snake eels are commonly mistaken for sea snakes," said Scott Johnson. "Like snakes, these eels are elongated and tubular, very snake-like. Like all eels, they do have dorsal fins, but on snake eels these are rather indistinct and not easily noticed."

Johnson added, "I have seen specimens of this snake eel while diving at night in the ski boat area. It is not a rare species here, but is rather shy."

According to Johnson, who holds a Masters in Zoology from the University of Hawaii, considerable marine biology has been done in the Marshall Islands. After college, he spent several years doing research at a marine biology lab on Enewetak Atoll, about 350 miles northwest of Kwaj.

"This lab was established in the 1950s during nuclear testing in the Marshalls and was known by several names during its tenure: the Eniwetok Marine Biological Laboratory, the Mid Pacific Marine Lab, and by the end of its life, the Mid Pacific Research Laboratory," Johnson said. "While I worked at the lab and before that time, lab personnel conducted research, particularly at Enewetak, but via expedition throughout the northern Marshalls. As far as the Pacific Islands go, the Marshalls are among the best studied."

Enewetak's spelling was changed sometime after 1970 from Eniwetok to more closely match the Marshallese pronunciation, Johnson said.

The lab was closed in 1983.

"In all of the scientific literature, the only confirmed reports of sea snakes anywhere in the Marshalls consist of the species *Pelamis platurus*, otherwise known as the yellow bellied sea snake," Johnson said. "This is a pelagic species. That is, it lives in the open ocean rather than around reefs and islands. Because it is open-ocean, it is possible for a specimen to wash up here. I know of at least two, one that washed in on Kwaj quite a number of years ago and one that washed in on Third Island near Roi two or three or maybe four years ago. I preserved the latter one and it is in a bottle on display at the Roi air terminal."

According to Johnson, the *Pelamis platurus* is easily recognized by a yellow underside. It has no stripes and

because it lives in the open ocean, it would either quickly die or swim away if washed up on the reef.

"Over the years I have occasionally received reports from people who thought they spotted sea snakes," Johnson said. "Almost invariably these were described as black and white or yellow banded. There is a common sea snake species from well west of here named *Laticauda colubrina*--I have seen them in the Solomon Islands--that indeed fits this description. To my knowledge it has never been positively reported from as far east as the Marshalls or even the Carolines."

Johnson added, "Its habitat seems more restricted to the larger continental-type islands such as the Solomons, Philippines, New Guinea, etc. There is, however, a kind of snake eel that also fits this banded description. Snake eels are so called because they resemble snakes much more than do standard eels. One of our snake eels, *Myrichthys colubrinus*, is elongated and slender with small dorsal and ventral fins and is typically banded black and white, sometimes yellow, or even gray."

Johnson said, "I see this occasionally, particularly night diving in sandy areas off the lagoon side of Kwaj. A

few years back, one person actually caught one out on the reef off the end of Kwaj and called me to come look at it. It was definitely the snake eel, *Myrichthys colubrinus*, not a sea snake."

Johnson added, "So to my knowledge there is no evidence that any reef dwelling sea snakes live anywhere in the Marshall Islands, aside from a few unconfirmed sightings that were most likely snake eels rather than sea snakes. While it is possible for pelagic sea snakes to pass through, it would seem to be uncommon."



Army focus on faster equipment delivery to troops

Editor's note: This is a series on the 17 Army focus areas. This one focuses on "Resource Processes."

WASHINGTON - Every Thursday senior leaders on the Army staff spend an hour validating equipment requirements from commanders to ensure needed capabilities get in the hands of deploying troops. Additional body armor, more up-armored Humvees and battlefield robots are examples of requests that have been heard and approved by members of the Army Strategic Planning Board.

Getting the right equipment to combatant commanders in a timely manner is only one aspect of the Army's focus area "Resource Processes." "It's a series of actions that match dollars to desired capabilities," said LTC Bobby Clafin, an action officer with the Deputy Chief of Staff for Programs, G8. Nested in improving the Army's "Resource Processes" is supporting combatant commanders, getting re-deploying troops ready for future missions and working with other services to ensure money isn't wasted by developing redundant capabilities, G8 officials said. The Army Strategic Planning Board was first formed after 9-11 with a primary focus on supporting the Global War on Terrorism. And even though it works as a gatekeeper, it ironically has proven to compress

equipment-fielding schedules from years to months and even weeks, officials said. Unit commanders from company to theater-level submit operational needs statements to their major commands, and if the MACOMs can't fulfill the requests, they are forwarded to Headquarters Department the Army for resolution, said COL Mark Averill, chief of ASPB. "When commanders see a required piece of gear that they need for mission success they can basically write and ask for it," Averill said. Before requests reach the ASPB's Thursday meeting, Averill hosts a Tuesday meeting where a council of

tions of Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom to "lean forward" and predict what units we'll need on the ground, Komichak said. Among the board members are representatives from the Rapid Equipping Force. They look for off-the-shelf technologies that they can get in the hands of Soldiers as rapidly as possible. An example of a REF product is the "Well-Cam," which is being used in Afghanistan. The Well-Cam is a camera attached to an Ethernet cable that enables Soldiers to safely search wells for weapons caches. By reprioritizing resources and restructuring other programs, the

colonels first reviews the requests. "It's not layers of bureaucracy," said LTC Michael Komichak, a member of the ASPB. "Instead of walking requests in each of the staff sections and trying to get on the G3's calendar, we provide a forum where multiple decisions directly impacting Soldiers on the ground can be made within 60 to 90 minutes." The planning board isn't just driven by requests from commanders, Komichak said. Board members also think forward, he said. They use lessons learned from previous rota-

In addition to investing in new equipment, major items that have been used in Iraq and Afghanistan are being repaired through the "setting the force" program. Through the reset program, all returning units will achieve a sufficient level of combat readiness to be able to conduct future missions, officials said. "The entire resource process has been evolving from independent processes to a synchronized concert that includes the Office of the Secretary of Defense and the sister services," Clafin said.

Army has reinvested \$36 billion towards Army Transformation, said G-8 officials. Technologies and capabilities are being developed that can be applied to the current force, officials said.
