# Holiday Bazaar

## Local crafters, artisans to share wares at bazaar

Poetry readings, Broadway tunes and new vendors give this year's Holiday Bazaar a unique twist.

Thirty-eight vendors will fill the Corlett Recreation Center Gym Nov. 8, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Cub Scout Pack #135 will sell Christmas wreaths in CRC Room 1 and the Micronesia Handicraft Shop will set up shop in Room 2. Table space for the event has been sold out since late September. A tent outside the CRC will accommodate overflow, according to

Pattie Ferguson, Kwajalein Art Guild president.

The Holiday Bazaar is one of two craft fairs hosted each year by the KAG to support the arts and to

raise money for the local artists. The other is held in the spring.

"I love to give the opportunity for crafters to shine," Ferguson said.

Ferguson credits the work of Beverly Vencill, bazaar coordinator, for pulling this year's Holiday Bazaar together.

"There's something for everybody – and in everyone's price range," Ferguson said. "And there's lots for men." She added that at last year's event, she even set up a dollar table especially for high school students.

"No one with a job could buy from that table – it was just for students to get gifts for their family," Ferguson said.

But even those with gifts in mind end up buying for themselves, she added, after viewing all that is offered.

This year, bazaar shoppers can expect to see woodwork, outer-island Marshallese handicrafts, both beaded and silver jewelry, photography, handcrafted pottery, gel candles, and T-shirts, and scores of other items for sale.

Kwajalein's yacht, scuba, and ham radio clubs will be represented and Girl Scout Troop #2 will offer gift wrapping services.

In addition to the merchandise, refreshments will include shaved ice and baked goods.

Ferguson recommends that shoppers dress light because the crowds cause the temperature in the CRC to rise. She also suggests that people get there early and bring their burleys to hold items "they hadn't planned on buying."


## Costume kiddies haunt island



# Hard work by Roi residents makes Enniburr Christmas party possible

*Editor's note: Each year, groups across Kwajalein gather donations and raise funds for outer-island Christmas drops. Preparations for this year's drops are underway.*

On an island near Roi-Namur called Enniburr, known to many as Third Island, approximately 310 children under the age of 12 receive the gift of Christmas joy each year thanks to the Enniburr Children's Christmas Fund.

According to Joe Coleman, ECCF president, "The ECCF is a year-round effort organizing various fundraisers such as bingo, Coconut Race, Labor Day Street Party, karaoke, golf long drive contests and Frisbee golf, not to mention our biggest fundraiser of the year, the Chili Cook-Off."

Though the organization has no set goal, Coleman said a total of \$15,000 has been raised over the course of the year. Work spent raising money culminates in an annual celebration.

"At this Christmas celebration, we sponsor games and prizes, feed the children and their families, and provide each child with a gift bag containing toys, clothing, school supplies and personal hygiene items," Coleman

said. They also get their picture taken with Santa.

"At the end of the day, the children thank us with song and dance," he said. "The joyous smiles are unforgettable."

The Command supports this drop with transport to Roi-Namur from Kwajalein and Enniburr, according to Maj. David Coffey, Host Nation chief. The Roi-Namur community raises the money and does the rest themselves.

"This drop is the largest annual drop in terms of the number of kids participating," Coffey said. "It is also the only one where the kids come to a USAKA-leased island as opposed to the drop participants going to the Marshallese community."

The ECCF is a non-profit organization consisting of four committee members. Though Coleman explained that the entire Roi-Namur community helps with the organization's fundraising events.
