

Your mama wore combat boots, loved it

It was an adventure but my parents couldn't understand why I wanted to leave the haven of the Great Smoky Mountains in Tennessee to join something called the Women's Army Corps. In 1973 young ladies "just don't do such things." I gave them the best reason I had.

"Because I can."

It was an opportunity for new places and experiences for women.

I wanted physical therapy training but didn't want to wait for an opening in the school, so I agreed to Radio Traffic Analyst school, whatever that was.

But, I wouldn't compromise on my ponytail. If I had to cut my locks, forget it. My recruiter assured me the ponytail could stay, so I signed on the dotted line.

He gave me a lot of good advice before putting me on the plane to South Carolina.

"Basic training is all self-discipline," he said. "Just do what you're told, no matter how stupid it seems. Don't call your drill sergeants sir or ma'am. They hate that. Salute anything with shiny rank and black braid on the uniform."

He even warned me about the guys in the Army.

"These guys are trained to dismantle and reassemble a weapon in 20 seconds," he said. "Unfortunately, they want to meet, date, fall in love and marry a girl in the same amount of time."

As far as I know, my recruiter forgot to tell me only two things. I didn't know you're not supposed to have fun in basic training. I had the time of my life. I was in the first bat-

talion of women to train at Fort Jackson, and we were trailblazers for a lot of changes.

None of those prissy blue and white uniforms the women down at Ft. McClellan were wearing for us. We wore fatigues...accessorized by a lovely pair of combat boots.

My boots never looked better than anyone else's, but my drill sergeant thought they did, and I didn't argue with him.

Of the 42 women in my company, only two of us were from the South. Drill Sergeant Jones called me Private Gomer.

Every morning during inspection, he said, "Lookin' good there Private Gomer. You gonna be a drill sergeant when you grow up?"

"Yes drill sergeant," I lied.

He dogged my friend, Shelly, though. She was a California girl, future military police. She spent hours every night working on her boots. Every morning she caught the same grief.

"Private Green," Jones barked down at her, "you been polishing that fine pair of Army boots with a candy bar again?"

"Yes drill sergeant," she lied.

Apparently her recruiter had given her the same advice I got from mine...the drill sergeant is always right.

Mind games and self-discipline is what basic training is all about. Keep your mouth shut and don't look at the ground when you march. Hurry up and wait. Eyes right. Double time. Salute. Together we could make it.

But you don't make it out of basic training until you pass Captain's inspection. My recruiter forgot to tell me that. He also forgot to tell me you never pass Captain's inspection the first time.

Air Force testing equipment on Kwaj

(Editor's note: The mission of the wing and its aircraft in this article often brings the crew into harms way. Because of this no names will be used.)

At the south end of Kwajalein Island, at a place known as the 'hot spot,' a couple of big, gray birds have nested. In a war zone they are predators, they don't drop bombs but what's beneath their benign appearance can turn the tide of a battle, or keep the first shots from being fired.

They are EC-130Js from the Air Force Special Operations Command's 193rd Special Operations Wing, Middleton, Pa. This wing is manned by the Pennsylvania Air National Guard. The aircraft and several dozen airmen are on Kwajalein testing the relatively new Hercules model.

They conduct information operations, psychological operations and civil affairs broadcasts in AM, FM, HF, TV and military communications bands. A typical mission consists of a single-ship orbit offset from the desired target audience -- either military or civilian personnel.

One crew member said, "We try to influence the en-

emies will to fight." He used the example that they might broadcast that America has food and medicine and recommend that enemy combatants throw down their weapons.

The Air National Guard unit is on Kwajalein testing the updated equipment on board the big-bellied aircraft and ensuring that it works in sync with the J model of the almost 50-year-old aircraft.

"We're doing what needs to be done," a crew member said of the seven test flights that are each seven hours.

Kwajalein was chosen for the test due to its remote location. According to a crew member, the equipment used on their Hercs is so powerful that it disrupts frequencies in populated areas.

Commando Solo, the name of the specially fitted aircraft, have one-of-a-kind weapon systems, simultaneous deployments/capabilities, can launch on short notice, are air-refuelable and have secure satellite video as well as worldwide color television.

This unit has performed operations in Vietnam, Grenada, Panama, the Persian Gulf in Desert Storm and Shield; Haiti, Bosnia Herzegovina, Kuwait, Yugoslavia, Afghanistan and Iraq. During Operation

Iraqi Freedom the 193rd has flown from three different locations on four aircraft, with up to 100 personnel per location, they have dispersed psychological operations material and real-time relay as well as jammed tactical frequencies.

The 193rd's mission is as important in peace time as it is during times of conflict. The specialized equipment and training can be used to augment and replace commercial radio and television in disaster situations.

A member of the organization for nearly 20 years said, "For example, during a hurricane disaster we could go up and tell the people where it was safe to go, where they could find help."

The initial production model of this aircraft was the C-130A, with four three-bladed Allison T56-A-9 turboprops. A total of 219 were ordered. The first production C-130A flew on April 7, 1955 and deliveries began the following December.

The latest C-130 to be produced, the C-130J entered the inventory in February 1999. With the noticeable difference of a six-bladed composite propeller coupled to a Rolls-Royce AE2100D3 turboprop engine, the C-130J brings substantial performance improvements over all previous models, and has allowed the introduction of the C-130J-30, a stretch version with a 15-foot fuselage extension.

KRS strives to create positive legacy in RMI

In an effort to create a positive legacy in the Marshall Islands, Kwajalein Range Services has implemented and will continue to foster a program called sustainable development.

The United Nations' Brundtland Commission defined sustainable development as "the process of change in which the uses of resource, the direction of investment, and the orientation of technological development and institutional change are made consistent with future as well as present needs." Environment, employment, and education are three facets to sustainable development on Kwajalein.

"The philosophy is that we are visitors," said Jim Rugg, Environmental manager. "We want to be good stewards and emphasize protection of the environment and be proactive in educating the community."

According to Norm Black, Environmental Safety and Health manager, although ES&H often champions environmental and cultural efforts, it is a core value and policy that sustainable development be a factor in decision making company-wide.

Examples of those efforts include recycling on both Kwajalein and Ebeye, composting, using oil from the Regan Test Site as incinerator fuel, collecting rainwater for potable water, water quality analysis in the lagoon, education via E-Talk, preservation of artifacts and documentation of wildlife.

Recycling programs enable schools to take advantage of money KRS is paid for recycled aluminum cans. According to Rugg, four months ago a program was started on Ebeye as a resource for schools and to teach kids the direct benefits of recycling – that space is precious.

"The more we recycle, the less we bring into the island," said Black. "Conservation is 'wise use'. We're hoping that's what our stewardship is causing to happen here."

Composting is also a key effort in preserving the island's environment.

"For every spot of green grass you can thank some cardboard, paper product or food waste," Black said.

Some compost also gets sent to Ebeye, according to Rugg.

Used oil from operations at RTS is used as fuel for the Kwajalein and Roi-Namur incinerators, as well as ground-up tires to assist in the burning process of the non-hazardous, non-recyclable waste. Ground glass is used in the sludge drying beds to facilitate drying of the material and at the drinking water plant to re-charge the water filters.

Eighty percent of the island's raw water is from rain water collected near the runway and subsurface water that is tapped into and treated. KRS also analyzes the quality of direct discharge water and popular swimming locales on Ebeye for anything that could cause health problems.

Both English and Marshallese versions of E-Talk are distributed each month to promote environmental awareness via pamphlets and flyers. Issues such as giant clam harvesting are addressed using this communication tool.

Culturally, KRS worked with the command to re-

furbish Building 905 to house artifacts, preservation, establish a cultural artifact cataloging system, and prepare documents pertaining to the history of the island.

USAKA also provides funds for the operation and management of the Marshallese Cultural Center.

Rugg explained that with every new project there is a National Environmental Policy Act determination and the requirements are explained in writing to mini-

mize impacts to the environment. A full-time archeologist is now on the KRS staff and dig areas are monitored so that archeological finds are not missed.

According to Black, some wildlife inventories are now being conducted by the Fish and Wildlife Service.

In addition, a project just commenced in which boaters document marine mammal sightings, which are then entered into a database.

"We're living in a museum," Black said, adding that everyone must see themselves as stewards here. Black advises everyone to leave the sea shells alone explaining, "They're part of the giant ecosystem." Post World War II artifacts must also be left in place, but Black said it's important to report them to Leslie Mead, archeologist, for study and because they are property of the U.S. taxpayers.

Sustainable development is driven by global trends as caused by disappearing resources. For that reason, Black said that their goal is not only to meet, but exceed the environmental standards in the contract.

According to Black, sustainable development means working hard “to ensure that we leave no lasting footprint of our presence here.”

“When the U.S. government is long gone, I hope this place is better off due to our efforts today,” Black said.

Employment and education also play a vital role in sustainable development and counter trends such as increasing economic disparity and escalation of the world’s population.

Romeo Alfred, RMI Training Office training specialist, is at the heart of efforts to train and retain the Marshallese workforce. He administers the Marshallese Training and Employment Plan.

Goals laid out by KRS include identifying positions historically filled by off-island hires that can be filled by Marshallese workers. These goals vary by contract year and begin with the goal of four positions for the current contract year, increasing to as many as seven positions in future years.

Alfred’s job is to target positions that can be filled within the allotted timeframe and to match the person with the task.

“We try our best to predict what the company will need within a given year and suggest target positions,” he said. “There will always be jobs missed, but positions should be based on what is realistically needed to support the base with the local workforce.”

According to Alfred, his department looks at the unemployed as well as within the company for people who have the potential to move up and fill positions with greater responsibility.

Training follows as required and Alfred’s department works closely with supervisors and department managers to ensure the correct position and person have been identified.

“While being trained here on island and obtaining skills, they get pay increments as well,” Alfred said. “We’re assessed against providing necessary skills for people and ensuring promotions and pay increments are consistent with the higher skills they’re getting.”

For year two of the contract, KRS had identified four positions to target in the MTEP. At present, there are eight MTEP training positions filled by the RMI workforce including: locksmith, CDRL coordinator, fire technician, technical librarian, automotive inspector, supply specialist and heavy equipment operators.

Alfred stresses that an important element of the MTEP is building alliances. He sits on the CMI Board of Regents and on the board that controls the RMI Workforce Investment Act Program, which develops policies and serves as a source of additional training funds.

Such additional funds enabled KRS to send a locksmith trainee to Kentucky for further specialized training, according to Alfred. In-house type training currently includes, for example, on-the-job training for a

member of the fire department to prepare him and increase his competency before assessing what higher-level training or certification might be needed.

Training made available to the entire RMI workforce includes work ethics, among others. They are also eligible for tuition assistance here on-island or online in their area of interest.

“The bottom line is to ensure that RMI employees understand the correlation between skills, work practices and moving up within a given organization,” Alfred said. “It’s always a challenge. These employees are moving between two environments. On Ebeye, we do with what we have – without the same safety equipment and practices that are required here on Kwaj. It’s a whole different culture with different work practices and behaviors.”

According to Alfred, the command and KRS are always looking for training opportunities that will benefit both the company and RMI workers. They are also looking into better ways to move people from Job Corps into on-the-job training or cooperative work experiences.

“If we can operate the base with three-quarters RMI workforce, the company and USAKA would jump at the chance,” Alfred said. “Unfortunately, the skill base doesn’t exist. We continually work to increase the skill level to maximize utilization of the local workforce. It’s a smart business concept.”

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



On June 14, 1775 Congress adopted "the American continental army" with the establishment of an army, so there became veterans. Veteran's Day, was established in 1926 and, according to the resolution passed by Congress 'marked the cession of the most destructive, sanguinary, and far reaching war in human annals and the resumption by the people of the United States of peaceful relations with other nations...'

The Richard B. Anderson Memorial Post #44, the American Legion, is a place on Kwajalein that is set up specifically for veterans, maintaining for veterans an avenue for continued service to their community, and nation. Post #44 currently has 80 members.

Ronald "Bull" Hall is the post commander. "I would like the people of Kwajalein to know that the American Legion is not only dedicated to serving its membership, but them as well," he said.

"We can offer assistance in many ways. For example, we can provide various window-display Star Flags to anyone in the community that has a loved one serving in harms way, or has paid the ultimate price of freedom with their lives," he continued. Hall said that the legion donates thousands of dollars to the island's various charitable organizations, provides a facility for various island charitable organizations to conduct

fund raisers and retires and destroys with honor damaged or faded U.S. flags. Members of the legion provide a rifle team for 21-gun salutes at command ceremonies.

Hall said the post was named for Pfc. Richard B. Anderson of the 4th Marine Division who shielded his fellow Soldiers from a grenade blast with his own body on Feb. 1, 1944. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his selfless act.

On May 23, 1985 the Richard B. Anderson Memorial Post #44 was granted a charter from the National Headquarters through Kaneohe, Hawaii.

"Also, I would also like to invite all island veterans, who are not already members, to join the American Legion," Hall said. "I would like to thank those members who have dedicated many hours of their personal time to American Legion Post #44. Lastly, but not least I would like to thank the Women's Auxiliary of American Legion Post #44 for their hard work, and support. Well done."

The legion is located in Bldg. #976, the first building on the left when passing the Fire Station heading towards Range Command. The American Legion hours of operation for active duty personnel, members and guests are Tuesday to Friday 4-8 p.m., Saturday 4-11 p.m. For more information, or to call for access on Sundays, Mondays and after regular hours, call 54440 or 51268.
