I was recently asked if I had any noteworthy anecdotes or interesting stories from my 20 years in the Air Force. This simple question made me reflect back on many memorable experiences, some of which were more appropriate for print than others are. After a little reflection, one particular situation repeatedly came to the forefront of my mind; although it is not amusing, I found it to be the most meaningful.

It actually occurred a few days after I retired from Active Duty during a visit to my mothers' home. But, before I begin you must understand that 20 years earlier my mother was very against my joining the military due to her pacifist beliefs; my enlistment was a source of embarrassment and shame. It took many years for her to accept my decision, however she never really fully approved of my choice. During the aforementioned visit, my mother introduced me to a small group of her friends, stating I just retired after serving twenty years. As I watched her introduce, I saw pride sparkling in her eyes, and it was even more evident in her voice. I was amazed at how her belated approval warmed my heart.

Then as I stood there basking in my mother's approval, each person to whom I was introduced, shook my hand and genuinely thanked me for dedicating my life to "our" country. I was awe struck; that was the only time my service has been recognized in such a manner.

Access changes reduce violations

Arrest rates down since new policies put in place

In light of recent access changes, evidence of impacts on the community is emerging in the form of fewer arrests and an overhaul in bar atmosphere in light of sagging sales.

October saw noticeable decrease in access violations, trespass violations and alcohol related violations for the month of October, according to Dennis Johnson, Kwajalein Police Department chief.

"Any decrease in the quantity of incidents allows for KPD to increase our quality of safeguarding the community," Johnson said.

"The command did a great job of informing the community of the changes this assisted KPD in the transitions during the implementing of the new policies, which were implemented not only to meet regulatory needs, but for the best interest of the community.

Access changes have also had a notable effect on the island's two watering holes.

Since the access changes took effect, sales have dropped in the neighborhood of 50 percent at the Ocean View Bar and 20 percent at the Yuk Bar, according to Robert Champion, retail bar operations manager.

"In my opinion, with the perspective of being the clubs' manager, I do not agree with the changes because sales and profits have dropped," said Champion.

Now catering to a different clientele, Champion said that special events have been added to the offerings at both facilities. A weekly barbeque at the Ocean View is working to draw more customers, as is opening the Yuk Club on Thursdays and reviving Happy Hour with free pupus on Thursdays and Fridays during that time.

"We're hoping to attract the early crowd back to the club," Champion said. "We also have D.J. Blue Lou playing on Fridays and Sundays. He has an awesome collection of CDs."

Champion added that more is in the works for the clubs and is pending approval. "It should be really exciting," he said.

While the overall effects of the recent access changes will take a while to fully evaluate, Maj. David Coffey, Host Nation chief, said, "I am happy that my office is no longer delivering termination notices to long-time RMI employees."

Coffey added, "My hope is that our two communities will be able to interact more now that the constant friction between KPD and alcohol consumers has for the most part been removed."

It didn't take long for the Host Nation office to feel the impact of the access changes, according to Coffey.

"I had people in my office within two days of the changes relating to me how pleasant the DSC was now that there were no long lines or in-

toxicated passengers," Coffey said.

The change is most notable at the Dock Security Checkpoint, added Coffey, but also in the bars and in numerous offices around the island that had to deal with the alcohol abuse problems in the past such as the Provost Marshal Office, KPD, Host Nation Office, Legal and Human Resources.

"All of these offices now have significantly more time to devote to making things better as opposed to dealing with the aftermath of alcohol abuse," Coffey said.

Negatives identified regarding the recent changes have been mitigated or worked around, according to Coffey.

"I know there is a perception by some that there were some negatives to these changes, but my opinion is that the positives have exceeded expectations and vastly outweigh the negatives," Coffey said.

Coffey said he knows that some of the changes are an inconvenience but asked for the understanding of everyone affected.

"I think that most Marshallese will tell you that they had no choice but to accept the changes and they see that as unfair," Coffey said. "If you ask them if they like the changes, most would probably still say 'no'. If you ask them if they are glad the lines at the DSC are smaller, that fewer employees are losing their jobs, that more wages are getting home to their families on Ebeye, then the answer would most certainly be 'yes.'"

Coffey said that his office worked very closely with the elected and traditional leaders on Ebeye for many years to try and come up a less drastic solution. He said, "but until we do, these changes certainly seem to be effective."

Water, water everywhere

Marine bio expert shares insight, knowledge with H.S. students

Kevin Foster, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service marine ecologist, met Sunday with Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School marine biology students at Emon Beach for a lecture and snorkeling excursion. Foster is on Kwajalein to survey species around this and other islands.

"We're living in a time of mass extinction," Foster said. "There is a steady downward decline throughout the world." Foster's goal is to educate and persuade others about marine biology and conservation to impart values to arrest this decline.

According to Eric Nelson, high school science teacher, the field experience gave students access to another marine expert with his own special insights and knowledge. Nelson hoped that the students gained new ideas, observations and perspectives on how to explore the ocean world.

The excursion turned out to be a catalyst for a public service project Nelson's students can perform involving clearing an area of calcareous red algae, which is out-competing the coral due to a nutrient influx near Emon Beach.

"When the red algae cover the area, new corals cannot settle and grow there," Nelson said. "The class will go out

and manually clear an area, record the mass of material removed, and for the rest of the year note what organisms now colonize the area using a digital camera and other measuring techniques."

If coral colonizes, all is back to normal. If algae colonize, Nelson said the class will investigate where the nutrients are coming from and make proposals to the KRS Environmental Safety and Health department.

ALCOR sees 10,000 hours of action in 35 years

Supporting all missile-related missions and some space identification tasks since 1969 is the ARPA Lincoln C-Band Observables Radar – otherwise known as ALCOR. The radar is situated on Roi-Namur at the MMW/ALCOR complex next to TRADEX and is operated by "a team of people dedicated to national security," according to Benjamin Davenport, MMW/ALCOR antenna leader. Their teamwork paid off last month when the antenna reached 10,000 hours of "drives-on" work, which means time spent tracking and looking out into space. Davenport believes this feat was accomplished because of the dedication of an outstanding team. "The ALCOR team truly has a never-give-up work ethic," he said. "If no one hears about ALCOR we know our work was done right." According to Davenport, most antennas in remote locations do not normally see as much action and are often replaced or upgraded to newer sensors. "The fact that ALCOR has been working hard since






Likiep added to Christmas Drops

(Editor's note: This is the last in the drop series.)

What started last year as a personal crusade for three couples has blossomed into one of the newer Christmas traditions; the Likiep Christmas drop.
