Public forum debates all-day kindergarten

Discussion at the Nov. 17 School Advisory Council public meeting centered on the effects of offering kindergarten classes that span a full day, each day on Kwajalein.

Feedback received by council members prior to the meeting favored all-day, every-day [week days] kindergarten for the educational benefits, according to Ed Hillman, Parent Teacher Student Organization representative.

At the meeting, an attendee voiced concerns that the move would adversely affect family values and quality time with her children. She said that after three hours of kindergarten, her child was "done."

Opinions were split among teachers.

"There is not unanimous agreement, but a preference among teachers of early grades for all-day kindergarten," Dan Frazier, school

superintendent, said.

Cassandra Rubly, teacher representative, stated that the majority of teachers felt a compromise was the best option, adding that some children are developmentally and academically ready, but some may not be emotionally ready.

A compromise may mean offering all-day, every-day kindergarten as well as retaining the current half-day kindergarten. Splitting the time during the week or offering options on end times are other compromises on the table, according to Rubly.

While cost of all-day kindergarten may be an obstacle, curriculum for the venture is a minor hurdle.

One option discussed by the board to help defray costs is to combine classes in higher grades, such as fourth, fifth, or sixth, in order to make available a teacher for all-day kindergarten, according to Frazier. The board also discussed the fact that asking parents to pay would directly affect what parents think

about the move.

When questioned about curriculum, Frazier said that new curriculum would be required for all-day kindergarten, but that curriculum material is easily obtained and will be made available to the public.

The process for reaching a decision on the subject was addressed by Maj. Jud McCrary, council chairman.

The council will first ask KRS for a cost breakdown of different options. Then, the information will come back to the board and be presented at a meeting to obtain the public's input, according to McCrary. The next step will be to present a proposal to the commander.

McCrary stated that all-day, every-day kindergarten is not a "done deal" and that the interest of the children is the advisory council's foremost concern.

"The board has no agenda on this," McCrary said. "We want to listen to what the population wants."



In other school business



- Another topic of interest was the Iowa Test of Basic Skills reports sent home with students last week. Frazier explained that the report compared schools, not students. Criteria were unclear for excluding students for whom English is a second language. Frazier said that the information was drawn from reports from the past seven years. Measures of student success include SAT scores, which typically are 100 points above the national average for Kwajalein students. Also, high school graduates' grades from their freshman year in college are reported back to the island, and surveys are conducted of those same students to determine, among other things, what classes were most beneficial to them. Results of those surveys have been included in the North Central Association Accreditation profile report for approximately the past five years.
- Curriculum committee reports will be presented at the December School Advisory Council public meeting by the co-chairs, according to Steve Howell, junior-senior high school representative.
- The North Central Association Visiting Team Site Report was included in a handout and discussed. The report offered suggestions including a move toward standards-based instruction, which is the norm for continental United States schools. Also suggested was an emphasis on data-driven decisions based on student achievement.
- Policies were approved for special education/special needs and interrogations of students by outside agencies.
- Susan Davis has been hired as first-grade teacher and Angela Ramsey will serve as speech pathologist while Lynn Beckler is on leave.
- School Advisory Council changes include the departure of Ann McCoy, Child and Youth Services, and Anthony Graham, Adult Education. Graham's position will be filled by Diane Swanby.
- According to Frazier's report, the school has created a report card on student achievement at Kwajalein schools, which will be distributed to parents to improve school-to-home communication. Dates to remember include: return to school from Thanksgiving break on Tuesday, elementary Parent Teacher Organization and high school PTO meetings Wednesday and primary concert Thursday.
- Hillman reported that participation is lacking in the PTO organization. The future of the organization will be discussed at the Wednesday meeting.
- Cheri Malloy, PTO representative, reported that the organization has filled several committee chairs but is still in need of a Science Fair chair. Mistletoe Market is slated for Dec. 14 and 15. The next PTO meeting will be held Wednesday.
- Howell reported that the high school play will take place March 19, 20 and 21. Also, Christmas tree sales are expected to be Dec. 16, pending arrival of the barge. The next School Advisory Council public meeting is scheduled for Dec. 8 at 7 p.m. in the elementary school music room.

Christmas tree safety

Proper care can avoid a holiday tragedy

During the holiday season there are many office Christmas parties and other private get-togethers. The decorations you select for yourself and family are often reminders of the festive natural of this holiday season. Along with that, here are some Christmas tree safety tips from the Fire Prevention Office to ensure that you and your family have a safe and happy holiday season.

- When you get your Christmas tree home, saw off the bottom end of the trunk with a straight fresh cut at least ½ inch above the end prior to placing the tree in a stand to allow the tree to absorb water. Check the water level every day and ensure that it is kept above the cut. This will keep the tree fresh and green, and will reduce the risk of fire.

- Choose a sturdy tree stand designed not to tip over.

- If purchasing an artificial tree, be sure it is flame retardant.

- Use the proper type of light for your tree. Some lights are designed only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both. All lights should be Underwriter's Laboratory approved. Check the string of lights for signs of wear and tear. Any string of lights with worn, frayed, or broken cords or loose bulb connections should not be used.

- Never use lit candles to decorate a tree. Also, keep other open flame devices away from tree limbs and decorations.

- Make sure the tree is kept at least three feet away from any heat source and try to position it near an outlet so that cords are not running long distances. Do not place the tree where it may block an exit.

- Children are fascinated with Christmas trees. Keep a watchful eye on them when around the tree and do not let them play with the wiring or lights.

- Extension cords must be used with care. Do not use more than three sets of lights per extension cords. Avoid placing extension cords under rugs or in paths of travel.

- After the holidays are over, take your tree down. Dried-out trees are highly flammable and should not be left in the house or placed against the house.

World AIDS Day focus on women, girls

Wednesday is World Aids Day. At the end of 2003, nearly 50 percent of the 38 million people living with HIV are women. This number is up from 41 percent seven years ago. According to the latest studies of UNAIDS, this averages approximately 7,000 new HIV infections in women daily on a global basis. Another startling fact is that almost half of all new infections are accounted to persons 15-24 years old. Seeing these numbers of the largest growing HIV groups, it becomes easy to understand the 2004 worldwide theme of World AIDS Day, Women, Girls, HIV and AIDS.

In an international study by the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS, five million new cases of HIV were acquired in 2003 alone.

This is the largest number of new cases in one year since the beginning of the epidemic in 1981. Twenty-three years and 20 million deaths after the first case of AIDS was diagnosed, there continues to be no cure for this growing epidemic.

What has changed is obvious from the latest statistics—HIV can no longer be thought of as disease affecting gay men and drug users. Earliest studies this year are showing that most HIV infections are related to heterosexual sex.

Many reasons surround the drastic increase of women's infections. Not only are women physically more susceptible to the virus during intercourse, but disadvantages such as social and educational aspects come into play in many parts of the world. The largest push today is to increase gender-specific education. Statistics are clear that teaching abstinence or even safer sex is not working, especially in low social and economic areas of the world, but until a better prevention method can be devised, education will continue to be the key.

One of the prevalent education strategies of HIV prevention/education is teaching the ABC's: **A**bstinence, **B**eing safer (reducing the number of partners and being faithful), and using **C**ondoms consistently. Until a cure can be found, women and men need to know their risks and reduce them.

STDs, HIV in Pacific

"Although HIV prevalence levels remain low, we must not underestimate the size of the challenges confronting the Pacific Islands Region," said Dr. Peter Piot, executive director of the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS in Fiji, on March 22. Continuing he stated, "The stage is set for an expanding and widespread HIV epidemic in the region due to a dramatic increase in sexually transmitted infections and risky sexual behavior among young people aged 15-25."

For the Pacific Region, which includes Australia, Southern Asia and all Pacific Islands,

statistics show a mean of 32,000 cases of HIV.

At this time, RMI Ministry of Health provided no statistics, but health professionals

have confirmed several cases of HIV within the Marshall Islands including two new cases in 2003. Also,

although the presence of STDs in the Marshall Islands, including Kwajalein, continues to be low, in the rest of the region cases have continued to increase.


HIV/AIDS 101

- **What is HIV?** Human Immuno-deficiency Virus. The virus that causes AIDS.

- **What is AIDS?** Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome. The last stage of HIV, when an infected person's immune system is defenseless.

- **How is HIV Spread?** HIV can only be spread by: blood, semen, vaginal secretions, breast milk, cerebrospinal fluid, and amniotic fluid.

Current recommendations are that any persons placing themselves at risk should be tested for HIV every three months. Anyone who would like to be tested on Kwajalein can present themselves to the hospital laboratory during regular business hours and request testing—no physician order is needed. Strict confidentiality for patient testing is maintained at all times.

Vehicles more costly after first of year

Vehicle rental rates will change on Jan. 15.

Capt. Annette Neal, Property Book officer and automotive and equipment specialist U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll and Reagan Test Site, announced that rates for rentable non-tactical vehicles, scooters, pick-up trucks, minivans and step vans, will increase after the New Year. Rental rates for bicycles have not changed.

“We wanted to update the current rates, while at the same time determine a rate that would be appropriate for personnel who are here on TDY [temporary duty] orders. The concept being the same as if I were going TDY stateside and was authorized a rental car in my orders,” she said.

The renter must have a valid USAKA Operator’s License and must be at least 21 to rent a vehicle. If the user is not a permanent resident of Kwajalein but is on temporary duty, then a valid stateside driver’s license can be used.

Vehicles can only be rented after normal duty hours, which include the weekends. A vehicle can be rented up to 12 hours a day on the weekend and two hours during the week days. Renters requiring a vehicle after the normal rental hours may submit a Special Transportation Request Form 1051. “These requests would normally be for special functions [parties, high school graduations, JR/SR proms, etc.],” Neal said. “This however, does not apply to personnel who are here TDY. They would be entitled to a 24-hour rental agreement.” Residents not employed by

the government or contractor will not be issued a USAKA Operator’s License. Special licenses are issued to residents who perform volunteer work such as the Yokwe Yuk Women’s Club and Bargain Bazaar. These licenses are restricted to volunteer work and can not be used to rent vehicles

for personal use. Rentals are restricted to K-Badge holders. For more information or to reserve one of the 20 vehicles available on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur, call 53341.








