





Vehicle paint shop construction underway

The official ground-breaking ceremony for a Vehicle Paint and Prep Shop was held Jan. 19.

The \$10 million contract was awarded Sept. 30 to San Juan Construction, Inc. The excavation for the foundation and utilities will begin Friday and the project completion is anticipated as October 2006.

The project is a partnering between the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll and San Juan.


Les Jones, USA-KA deputy commander, said of the partnering, "I will say that I have every reason to think this partnering workshop for the new Vehicle Paint and Prep Shop is a proactive approach to make this project a successful one. As an investment of time and money,

partnering has proved to improve productivity as well as safety."

He added that San Juan has completed many projects on schedule and within budget on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur, and I have every confidence they will do it again with the Vehicle Paint and Prep Shop and that they will experience good faith and fair dealings from the Corps of Engineers and members of my staff.

According to Louis Askew, resident engineer USACE, the more than 4,300 square foot shop will include a hydro blast room, abrasive blast booth, metallization booth, paint spray booth, undercoating room, administrative space for the operating staff, and supporting facilities

including utilities, fire protection and alarm systems, paving, storm drainage, information systems and site improvements. Project includes air conditioning, dehumidification (25 tons), and mechanical ventilation.



RC track opens with roar

Puddles formed in the dirt valleys of the new remote control car track Sunday, but were quickly swept away with brooms. After more than 100 long hours over the past month gathering materials from the landfill and building the track, not even a rain delay could dampen the spirits of participants of this inaugural event.

The Kwajalein Remote Control Modeling Club's Kwajalein International Super Speedway or 'KISS 2' race got off to a late start because of the weather, but fans were rewarded for their patience with the roaring, smoking action of 14 cars and trucks.

Said Matt Hatfield, club president, "Water is good because it wets the soil and keeps down the dust for better traction."

The track, which is located between the fire department and the Veteran's Hall on Lagoon Road, features five jumps, loose rocks, fine soil

and countless twists and turns.

The day's heats included buggy and monster vehicles and each were required to circle the track 10 times.

"We'll experiment with pit stops in the next race," Hatfield said.

Walking away with bragging rights and a plaque for the monster race were Matt Hatfield in first, Ozzy Velez in second and Robert Greer in third. Buggy results were Casey Martin in first, Bill Jackson in second and John Antill in third.

John Palé won a special made award for the most time spent working on his car as his buggy kept cutting out during the race, and Brandon Owens won a roll cage for best wreck of the day.

Hatfield said the cost of the hobby can vary from \$300 for the basics and upwards of \$600 for those who catch the "RC bug."

The KRCMC welcomes new members and requirements for running at the club's facility include installation of a fail safe unit on nitro vehicles and signing of the club's operating policy. The next club meeting will be held in March.

Some simple steps can prevent a tragedy

Somebody once said, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." Our main goal in the Fire Prevention Office is to ensure, as best we can, that fires do not start in the first place. We have many codes, regulations and standards that govern life safety when it comes to Fire Prevention. A special area of concern to the Fire Prevention Office is unaccompanied bachelor quarters. Many of us live and sleep in these multi-story dormitories. If a fire breaks out in one room, it can affect all of the occupants in the entire building. Strict regulations and codes are in place for the protection and welfare of all occupants living in our dormitories when it comes to fire safety.

U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Housing Management Regulation 210-50, section 13 Fire Prevention and Protection deals with special fire prevention

measures for the bachelor quarters. First, we must understand that our BQ rooms were designed as sleeping and living areas similar to that of regular hotel rooms or university dormitory rooms. None of our BQ rooms have kitchens, therefore certain types of cooking and associated cooking appliances are prohibited. Many of the prohibited appliances produce "grease-laden vapors" that get into the common air conditioning and bathroom duct and exhaust systems. Over time, these grease-laden vapors build up in these ducts and produce serious fire hazards as these ducts are not designed to trap grease-laden vapors in the first place. Additionally, the hot grease given off by these appliances, which is produced under intense heat, greatly contributes to the possibility of accidental fires starting in a dormitory setting.

The consequence of incidents involving unattended cooking is magnified in a dormitory environment due to the number of occupants. The National Fire Protection Association also cites the high possibility of most people being asleep in a dormitory when a fire occurs. This significantly jeopardizes the safety of our dorm residents. Furthermore, our dormitory configuration requires escaping through an interior corridor, which exposes our dorm residents to heat and smoke from a

room fire. By using only approved cooking appliances listed in the regulation, the chances of fire are minimized and the safety of all residents is better safeguarded.


In those situations where BQ residents wish to cook beyond that allowed in the BQs, the Adult Recreation Center is available for their use at no cost.

Another problem commonly found is that some BQ rooms turn into storage areas. The excessive storage of combustible materials, such as papers, magazines, boxes, trash and other items very much increases the fire load of the facility. This, in turn, affects all the BQ occupants. If occupants were to become trapped

during an emergency, these materials will hinder fire-fighting and rescue. Keeping excessive storage down will allow for quick and easy egress from individual rooms for the occupant as well as unobstructed access for responding fire personnel during an emergency. Remove trash, newspapers and recycling materials on a consistent basis. Using good housekeeping practices will limit your combustible storage and will help you maintain your BQ room in a fire-safe condition.

The storage of hazardous materials and highly flammable substances such as nitro fuel for remote control cars, propane tanks and cylinders for outdoor gas grills and large quantities of other hazardous materials is not allowed and could have deadly consequences if involved in a fire. Hazards include explosions from these cylinders, intense heat and toxic gasses that can easily propagate throughout the entire facility. However, household-use items such as cleaning supplies and a couple cans of touch-up paint and lubricants are acceptable. Remember, your BQ room is not a substitute for a garage work bench or flammable storage locker. Please find alternate means to store these types of items for the safety of all BQ residents and our firefighters.

Devices that overload electrical receptacles are also a common hazard. Examples include more than three appliances per outlet, or multiple plug adapters or power strips with more than two cords attached. Multi-outlet surge protectors may not be plugged into an existing power strip (piggybacking), nor shall more than one fused multi-outlet power strip be plugged into a build-





ing wall outlet. Multiple and permanent use of extension cords is also prohibited.

Residents are advised that, upon the activation of the building fire alarm system, all occupants are required to immediately evacuate the building and to remain outside until directed to return by the fire official in command at the scene. Take all fire alarms seriously; it may be the real thing. You don't want to find out when it is too late.

Many of us may not have lived in a dormitory style BQ for some time; and may not be used to the sacrifices and consideration for others that come from living in a dormitory. These fire prevention provisions are universal to any type of dormitory living situation much like those commonly found across the country on universities or other military installations. Our overriding concern is for the safety of all dormitory residents. By following

these fire prevention measures we can minimize fires and provide for a safe living environment for our BQ residents.

For the list of all Fire Prevention regulations covering the BQ, please read USAKA Housing Management regulation 210-50. It can be found in the K-drive under USAKA regulations and memos. If you have any questions concerning Fire Prevention in the BQ, don't hesitate to give us a call at 52137.
