

Bugle timing considered unreliable

The exchange over the bugle calls and respect for our flag has made for fascinating reading over the last several weeks, and reminds us of what a varied and interesting group we Americans are.

But I find the bugle calls don't take place every day and when they do, they are not reliable. On more than one occasion, I have gone out from the chapel at several minutes before five in the evening to be present for the lowering of the flag

and I have watched the police wait, look at watches and at some point decide to lower the flag without the bugle. Sometimes then the bugle has played at five or eight minutes after the hour; sometimes not at all. I have gone out at 6:57 in the morning to find the flags already in place – and at seven, the bugle calls were played. Several times in the evening the Marshallese flag has been lowered, but the American flag remains flying for several minutes after the

bugle call has finished.

I find the moment to respect the flag and think about what it means an important part of the day, and I am glad to devote a few minutes to it. But I am disappointed when (after all the fuss) the bugle call is not played or the protocol for raising and lowering the flag is not observed.



Rumsfeld asks congress for funding

Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld asked Congress Monday to approve the fiscal 2005 supplemental funding request quickly.

The \$81.9-billion request will fund the military through Sept. 30. The money will cover the cost of operations in Iraq and Afghanistan, training Iraqi and Afghan troops, addressing the transformation of the Army and making good on repair and replacement of equipment strained by the increased tempo of operations.

Both Rumsfeld and Joint Chiefs Chairman Air Force Gen. Richard B. Myers stressed the need for continued transformation of the military during testimony before the Senate Defense Appropriations Subcommittee.

Rumsfeld praised the sacrifices servicemembers and their families are making. He told the committee that it

is "becoming increasingly clear that the sacrifices they are making are making a difference in bringing about a world that is freer and more peaceful, and that rejects terrorism."

The

secretary said the past year has seen historic elections in Afghanistan and Iraq, and that extremists in both countries are under mounting pressure.

Three years into the war on terrorism has made two things very clear, the secretary said. First is that the struggle will not be won by military strength alone. He said all aspects of U.S. government power must be focused on the enemy. This includes long-range policies and programs aimed at alleviating the conditions that force young people to embrace extremism.

The second reality is that the U.S. cannot win this struggle alone. "No one nation can," Rumsfeld said. "It will take cooperation among a great many countries to stop weapons proliferation, for example. It takes nations working together to locate and dismantle extremist cells and stop future attacks."

The secretary told the senators that 60 nations "are now engaged in unprecedented effort to address proliferation of dangerous weapons."

But even with the progress in the war on terror, the Defense Department must move ahead with transformation. Even before the attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, the Bush administration was moving to change the defense establishment, Rumsfeld said. "September 11th added urgency and impetus to make the military more agile, more expeditionary and more lethal."

The entire national security apparatus is making significant changes. The military is moving forces rapidly across the globe. It is functioning as a truly joint force. But it is also fighting a war. Rumsfeld said the military is still "adjusting to a world where the threat is not from a single superpower, but rather from various regimes and extremist cells that could work together to proliferate lethal capabilities."


But while progress has been made, the U.S. military is still largely equipped to confront conventional forces, he said.

Myers told the senators that there are three major processes this year that will help inform decisions in the years ahead. The first is the Quadrennial Defense Review, due in September. "It will provide a comprehensive strategic plan for reforming the armed forces," Myers said. "Second, the base realignment and closure process provides an excellent opportunity to further transform our warfighting capability and eliminate excess capacity."

Third, the department's global basing strategy transforms the U.S. Cold War footprint into one "that's focused on combining the capabilities of U.S.-based rotational forces ... with strategically placed overseas-based forces," Myers noted.

Whatever the United States does will have a profound effect on friends and allies in the years ahead, Rumsfeld said. NATO allies are already following the U.S. lead in transformation and the capabilities of allies will be crucial to the country in the future, Myers said.

Myers and Rumsfeld agreed the fiscal 2006 defense budget request keeps faith with servicemembers serving around the world. And they deserve no less, said the chairman. "We are now in the fourth year of sustained combat operations, and all our Soldiers, sailors, airmen, Marines, Coast Guardsmen and DoD civilians continue to perform superbly under extremely challenging conditions."

Empowering employees to identify risky behavior key to work safety

Just the word “safety” is enough to evoke a response from people. Some perk up because they recognize it as a top priority of most companies, agencies and communities and because they share the concern for safety. Some go deaf at the sound of the word, considering the topic dry, merely conceptual and beaten into the ground.

In which category do you fall?

Until faced first-hand with an unsafe condition or an injury resulting from it, safety may not hit home. The moment it does, safety makes a dash to the forefront and becomes of the utmost importance.

Kwajalein Range Services isn't waiting until that moment. The company is implementing a concept called people-based safety, a way of looking at safety that focuses on what people do. To date, 37 have been trained in the behavior-based approach.

“The PBS approach is very 180 from the older safety approach to issues,” Amber Morse, Safety Specialist III and facilitator for the Kwajalein Automotive behavior observation team.

There are seven teams across the company representing Roi Radar, Roi Logistics, Automotive, Logistics Employee Management Safety Council, Marine, Information Technology and the Kwajalein Fire Department. Planned groups are: Community Employee Management Safety Council, Public Works, Roi Numer and Meck Fire Departments.

“Out here we often get so caught up in the inanimate

objects like facilities, equipment, tools, etc. These are often the low hanging fruit that auditors will catch because the items are in plain view. But, PBS really focuses on people and not things and that really changes how someone will look at compliance when out in the field,” she said.

Morse explained that the new approach creates a peer-to-peer style of identifying and correcting problems versus a top-down, bottom-up approach, which is often more traditional. She said it has helped her to focus more on the people and not the objects.

“Our company's ultimate objective is to prevent injury first – then, costly equipment or facility damage,” she said.

People-based safety is brand new. “It was KRS' first attempt at establishing the philosophy that Zero Accidents is possible,” according to Norm Black, Environmental Safety and Health manager.

Challenges in implementing any new program are abundant, but on Kwajalein, circumstances unique to the island make it even more difficult.

“I think it will continue to take time to change culture but mostly I think the employees that are involved are doing a great job and really set a great example,” Morse said. “It is always a challenge on Kwaj to really instill a cultural change due to high turnover rates.”

She explained that in the Automotive group, six employees were trained initially. Of those six, one asked to be removed from training for personal reasons, one had a permanent change of station move and one transferred to another department.

“So, within six months just within the Automotive Team, we've had a 50-percent loss. That's a hard thing to overcome when trying to facilitate a massive cultural shift in how we essentially conduct our business in terms of safety and health,” she said.

Alex Britain is an industrial hygienist and safety engineer, as well as the technical champion for the IT department's behavioral observation team. He took the four four-hour people-based safety classes over the past five weeks and gave the administrator class to one person last week.

“I was asked to as part of my safety professional responsibilities,” he said. “I would have gotten involved anyway, because I've worked elsewhere where similar programs have been implemented and it was cool to be a part of the change... the positive outcome.”

Britain said that though there was a general feeling of low expectations for success, by several of the team members when his class began, the trainer dealt effectively with that by staying positive

and pointing out how “non-threatening” this program should be.

“It appears to be hard for many good people to “tow the safety line” with our buildings crumbling around us,” he said. “How we approach this is the key and a positive attitude is important despite the major infrastructure challenges we have.”

When asked the biggest difference between the people-based way of thinking and the existing way of thinking, Britain said that individuals didn't want to watch and comment on other personnel at work because it “wasn't their job” or “it is none of my business.”

“This BOT [behavior observation team] process, when fully accepted and implemented, will give empowerment to people to own their own safety and their fellow workers,” he said.

“We have always had ‘Stop work authority’ ... every one of us. PBS gives the employees, who are the experts in their own line of work, to stand back and ask ‘what could we do in order to per-

The repair prevented a major safety problem and loss of operational capability according to Robert Struppeck, Kwajalein Radars manager. Nominations for a presidential award may be made by anyone, typically supervisors, and can be done by e-mailing Deborah Black, executive assistant to the president of KRS. The nomination should include detailed information on the person's or team's accomplishments.

Once a month, the committee meets to decide on recipients of the award.



form this task more safely.' Because 90 percent all accidents are the result of at-risk behaviors (whether that is the injured employee who did not follow a rule, the supervisor who failed to supervise, the trainer who failed to train, the maintenance person who failed to maintain a piece of equipment, etc.) the corrective actions identified are generally the simple fixes such as better gloves, easier tools to use, better work layout or more effective training," according to Black.

With continued top and middle management support, Britain said more people will become familiar with the process and "this very simple process will get fully integrated into our workplace," making people less defensive when suggestions are made to do a task in a safer manner, he said.

Black, a people-based safety champion who has taught approximately 30 KRS observers, identified the need to implement the program on site based on resulting lower injury rates

he witnessed on other international projects.

Because behavior is objective, observable and measurable, using people-based safety, observers help to identify at-risk behaviors. Feedback from observations by labor leaders and co-workers is then compiled and recorded. From there, recommendations are made based on the trends and concerns identified.

The resulting shifts in thinking are from fault-finding to fact-finding, and a management-driven to an employee-driven program.

"PBS turns safety from a management driven safety program to an employee-driven safety program...It helps employees establish peer-to-peer discussion on safety issues," he said.

Black said that he believes that this way of practicing safety will change the safety culture by "positively reinforcing the safe way to do a job."

According to Morse, it is taking time

within the areas to get people-based safety out and rolling.

"It takes a lot of communication to ensure that employees understand, not just the trained ones, what PBS is. What the expectations are. Where we are heading. How we can audit/spot check the programs. I think we still have work to do on this front," she said.

Morse said that reports and graphs via the internet web database are tools needed to monitor progress and identify trends.

"Essentially, we have our observers in the field collecting all of this data. The data is then entered into this online database. But, who is then monitoring the data, watching the graphs, monitoring the reports to see what kinds of trends are developing or improving?" she said. "I would like to see this aspect of the Program being better utilized by department managers and supervisors so they can better gauge where their groups are at."

Appointment of part-time U.S. Magistrate Judge for district of Hawaii at Kawajalein

The Judicial Conference of the United States has authorized the appointment of a part-time United States magistrate judge for the United States District Court for the District of Hawaii at Kwajalein Missile Range.

The duties of the position are demanding and wide-ranging, and include: (1) the conduct of most preliminary proceedings in criminal cases; (2) the trial and disposition of misdemeanor cases; (3) the conduct of various pretrial matters and evidentiary proceedings on delegation from the judges of the district court; and (4) the trial and disposition of civil cases upon consent of the litigants. The basic authority of a United States magistrate judge is specified in 28 U.S.C. Section 636.

To be qualified for appointment an applicant must:

(1) Be, and have been for at least five years, a member in good standing of the bar of the highest court of a state, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Territory of Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, or the Virgin Islands

of the United States, and have been engaged in the active practice of law for a period of at least five years (with some substitutes authorized), or have a degree from a college or university of recognized standing, with a minimum of five years of progressively responsible administrative experience in public service or business;

(2) Be competent to perform all the duties of the office; be of good moral character; be emotionally stable and mature; be committed to equal justice under the law; be in good health; be patient and courteous; and be capable of deliberation and decisiveness;

(3) Be less than 70 years old;

(4) Not be related to a judge of the district court; and

(5) Reside on Kwajalein.

A merit selection panel composed of attorneys and other members of the community will review all applicants and recommend to the judges of the district court in confidence the five persons it considers best qualified. The court will make the appointment following an FBI full-field investigation and an IRS tax check of the

applicant selected by the court for appointment. An affirmative effort will be made to give due consideration to all qualified applicants, including women and members of minority groups. The current annual salary of the position is \$3,753. The term of office is four years. More information on the magistrate judge position may be obtained from the Clerk of the U.S. District Court or the chairperson of the selection panel.

An original and three copies of a resume must be submitted only by applicants personally and must be received no later than May 20, 2005 and should be addressed to:

All resumes will be kept confidential, unless the applicant consents to disclosure, and all applications will be examined only by members of the merit selection panel and the judges of the district court. The panel's deliberations will remain confidential.

Boogeyman, A man learns his past was more truth than imagination in this horror story. Tim (Barry Watson) is a man who is still haunted by traumatic memories of his past, many linked to the death of his father. Desperate to resolve his issues, Tim returns to his old hometown so he can pay a visit to the house where he grew up. But while Tim wants to convince himself the ghostly memories he carries are just a figment of his imagination, circumstances lead him to believe that there may be a kernel of truth to them. *Boogeyman* also features Emily Deschanel, Lucy Lawless, and Skye McCole Bartusiak.

Hide and Seek, A newly single father discovers his daughter is caught up in a web of evil in this thriller. David Callaway (Robert De Niro) has been left to raise his nine-year-old daughter, Emily (Dakota Fanning), on his own after the unexpected death of his wife. David is at first amused to discover that Emily has created an imaginary friend named "Charlie," but it isn't long before "Charlie" develops a sinister and violent side, and as David struggles with his daughter's growing emotional problems, he comes to the frightening realization that "Charlie" isn't just a figment of Emily's imagination. *Hide and Seek* also stars Famke Janssen, Dylan Baker, and Amy Irving.

Blade Trinity, Wesley Snipes returns as legendary vampire hunter Blade in this, the third film inspired by the popular Marvel Comics character. The vampires have concocted a misinformation campaign that paints a picture of Blade as a ruthless murderer and has sent the FBI on the vampire hunter's trail, led by the relentless agent Cumberland (James Remar). At the same time, the vampires have brought their founding father, Dracula, back to his undead state, renaming him Drake (Dominic Purcell) and investing him with special powers that allow him to walk unharmed in daylight.

of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the west reef. Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor. All mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands. Additional areas specified outside the mid-atoll area are designated as caution areas, see maps.

In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, Kwajalein Police Department island clearance procedures will begin at approximately 7:30 a.m. on Sunday and continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all air and sea craft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.


