Top athletes battle for RustMan honors

T.C. Cardillo turned on the speed in the final leg of Monday's RustMan triathlon to take first place. Cardillo was down by 6 minutes before starting the 10-kilometer run.

Cardillo's time of 2:17:44 topped second place and last year's champion, Nick Perry, by more than two minutes.

"The biggest surprise this year was Thomas Cardillo's beating Nick Perry and Robert Guidi, the

consensus favorites. We all know that Thomas is very capable, but he did not seem interested [in the competition], or to be training much," said Bob Sholar, RustMan race director.

"Hell, after the swim I was happy to still be alive and with only a few sea critters happily swimming in my lungs so I had bigger worries than six minutes. The inverse of fish out of water comes to mind," Cardillo said describing the task of overcoming the leaders.

The RustMan is a 1-kilometer swim, 42-kilometer bike race and 10-kilometer run.

"I'm heavily biased, but I think RustMan is far more than an endurance competition, it's one of the best annual acts of community on Kwajalein Island," Sholar added.

Sharon Greenbaum took the women's category with a time of 2:22:16, she was third overall.

According to Sholar, this year's field of competitors is smaller than during peak participation years. This year there were 24 individuals and 10 teams. In 1998, a peak year, there were 32 individuals and 24 teams, putting 56 contestants on each course segment.

Categories for athletes included,

male or female open, for men or women 19-39; male or female youth, for males or females 18 and under; male or female master, for men or women 40 and older.

The youngest contestant this year was Chris Berling, 16. He completed the triathlon in 2:35:44, 15 minutes off of his time from last year.

The oldest contestant was 55-year old Dennis Lampiasi, who is on temporary duty on Kwajalein.

Athletes who didn't want to compete in all three categories formed teams, splitting the events. The "Off The Record" team of Brian Brewster, Charles Greenbaum and Mark Daugherty with a combined time of 2:06:

06 won the team category, with Daugherty's blistering: 40:29 10-kilometer run breaking the

record for a team run. Twenty-four athletes "ate the whole enchilada by themselves," according to Sholar.

Three couples competed in the three-event RustMan: Brent and Krystal Peterson, Bill and DeAnn Brower and Rick and Kathy Ann Funk.

Sholar said that Krystal's 2:25:18, sec-



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USAKA flexes response muscles in mass

Heart-stopping words...airplane crash, injuries, death... were uttered at 9:20 a.m. Saturday on Kwajalein. Words of comfort...response, aid, rescue...followed closely behind at 9:25 a.m.

In a scenario used to test the island's emergency response capabilities, an airplane en route from Honolulu to Guam crashed on the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll installation. At 9:30 a.m. of the reported 151 passengers and nine crew members, 42 were accounted for, 10 listed in critical condition, 21 injured, 11 confirmed dead and 118 unaccounted for.

The incident prompted activation of the Emergency Operations Center by Maj. Craig Holton, USAKA/RTS Operations officer.

"The EOC is the focal point of all on-island emergency response efforts of this magnitude," explained Holton, "and all the information from the field is passed to the EOC where the decisions are made and orders issued."

Holton said that during a mass-casualty exercise such as the one that took place Saturday, the fire department and hospital are the key players. Their quick and effective response is what pleased Holton most about the exercise.

He added that the Kwajalein Police Department has a supporting role and in some cases, such as a water rescue, participate in rescue efforts as well as secure the accident scene and other critical areas.

Numerous not-so-obvious departments also play a role, as do many more behind the scenes. For instance, Holton said that in this accident scenario, there was a large amount of jet fuel on the ground.

"We dispatched a hazardous material unit. The Water department also was notified to seal up the lens wells so they would not get contaminated with fuel run off. Automotive supplied additional vehicles and drivers to move the victims. The list goes on and on," he said.

Adding realism to this year's exercise were approximately 30 volunteer victims, who donned makeup to reflect their prescribed injuries.

"This year I was very lucky in that I was able to enlist the help of a great group of folks who volunteered to be exercise makeup artists," Holton said. "These folks took time out of their day to attend a class taught by the hospital nurses and then came out early this morning and did an outstanding job making our victims look gruesome. This extra effort paid off by giving our medical personnel a more realistic looking victim to work on."

When asked how it feels to be tested, Jerry Leverett, assistant Fire chief and Incident commander, said that

exercises such as Saturday's are "the only way to do it," adding that in the emergency services arena, these types of training sessions are encouraged.

"It is the only way to know if your plan works. If it does, great. If not, now you know where to go next if any adjustments are needed," he said.

This exercise tested the department's capabilities while splitting forces. Because the scenario called for part of the aircraft wreckage to be in the water, fire and emergency services supported the police boat with rescue swimmers.

Leverett said that searching for possible survivors in the open water took away from the ground rescue efforts. He explained that adjustments were made and "we carried on with the mission at task."

Operational organization and teamwork shone throughout, said Leverett, and "every obstacle was addressed with solid reasoning as it was presented to them."

"In mass casualty exercises, the element of surprise is worked in, to truly test you. Although we were tried by these elements, the crews gelled together as one," he said. "I am very

fortunate to lead such a veteran group of firefighters."

Leverett added that there was great response from the fire prevention office, explaining that much of the labor-intensive tasking was handled by them when firefighters were tied up with other responsibilities.

Dr. Eric Lindborg, Kwajalein Hospital's chief medical officer, served as Red Team leader during the exercise, with responsibility for oversight of prioritizing the medical response.

Lindborg said he was pleased with his area's "excellent teamwork," adding that there was a good review of procedures and staff call-in for the mass-casualty event.

Lindborg also offered kudos to the fire department personnel, who he

said did a great job in triaging and transporting patients.

"More simulated patients than in prior exercises emphasizes the challenges of making spur-of-the-moment decisions regarding what can and cannot be done for a given patient," he said.

By 10:42 a.m., the exercise had come to an end. Overall, Holton said that he thinks

ond place in the women's division, performance was one of the high points of this year's competition. "She was only three minutes behind Sharon Greenbaum. No female has ever come that close to Sharon in seven years. Krystal did a 2:35:51 in her first RustMan last year. That makes this year's improvement over 10 minutes," Sholar said.

Sholar said that training for the annual event varies greatly. "Someone like Thomas Cardillo got away with very little triathlon training and still won, because he stays very fit all the time and plays lots of sports that produce endurance. Several contestants had their training regimens broken by TDY business activity or family emergencies. Most of these relish the event so much that they competed anyway, knowing they almost surely would not be able to match prior best performances," he added.

The winner, Cardillo said, "I surf for the swimming portion (note the gen-

erous portion of flotation in my swim training - that is for good reason), play a variety of sports for the run, and bike like mad between each of these activities. I try to stay pretty active throughout the year."

Cardillo added, "We have a great environment to play in so get out and be active throughout the year."

Chris Johnson, of the "Team With No Name" produced a 1:04:17 bike segment that has the better bikers on Island asking "How did he do that?" according to Sholar.

The RustMan began as an idea tossed around at a back-yard barbecue in either 1979 or 1980, depending on who you ask. It was started as a mini-Ironman and is one-fourth the length of the Hawaiian competition. "And of course, someone suggested the RustMan, because if it wasn't going to be an Ironman and it was on Kwaj," Sholar said.



Appointment of part-time U.S. Magistrate Judge for district of Hawaii at Kawajalein

The Judicial Conference of the United States has authorized the appointment of a part-time United States magistrate judge for the United States District Court for the District of Hawaii at Kwajalein Misile Range.

The duties of the position are demanding and wide-ranging, and include: (1) the conduct of most preliminary proceedings in criminal cases; (2) the trial and disposition of misdemeanor cases; (3) the conduct of various pretrial matters and evidentiary proceedings on delegation from the judges of the district court; and (4) the trial and disposition of civil cases upon consent of the litigants. The basic authority of a United States magistrate judge is specified in 28 U.S.C. Section 636.

To be qualified for appointment an applicant must:

(1) Be, and have been for at least five years, a member in good standing of the bar of the highest court of a state, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Territory of Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, or the Virgin Islands

of the United States, and have been engaged in the active practice of law for a period of at least five years (with some substitutes authorized), or have a degree from a college or university of recognized standing, with a minimum of five years of progressively responsible administrative experience in public service or business;

(2) Be competent to perform all the duties of the office; be of good moral character; be emotionally stable and mature; be committed to equal justice under the law; be in good health; be patient and courteous; and be capable of deliberation and decisiveness;

(3) Be less than 70 years old;

(4) Not be related to a judge of the district court; and

(5) Reside on Kwajalein.

A merit selection panel composed of attorneys and other members of the community will review all applicants and recommend to the judges of the district court in confidence the five persons it considers best qualified. The court will make the appointment following an FBI full-field investigation and an IRS tax check of the

applicant selected by the court for appointment. An affirmative effort will be made to give due consideration to all qualified applicants, including women and members of minority groups. The current annual salary of the position is \$3,753. The term of office is four years. More information on the magistrate judge position may be obtained from the Clerk of the U.S. District Court or the chairperson of the selection panel.

an "A" was scored at Saturday's exercise and response.

"I think the planning team did a good job putting together a training event that effectively met the desired goal and the island emergency response elements provided great service and I, in turn, received some good training," he said.

Holton thanks all who participated in the training, including the volunteers, planners and support personnel.

Lessons learned, according to Holton, include communication, as some emergency response elements need more powerful radio transmitting and receiving capability. Dennis Johnson, KPD chief, echoed the concern about com-

munication and also intends to maintain a list of officers' special capabilities for future use in emergencies.

According to Holton, the exercise also met the goal of determining the "breaking point" at which the number of victims would tax the fire department and the hospital to the point that they would not be able to provide timely rescue services and medical care.

"We now have a better understanding of the types of injuries and the numbers of those injuries that will cause serious problems," he said. "Now, armed with this knowledge, we can begin developing techniques and procedures to mitigate these risks."
