BRAC commission hears how Army realignment will build future force

The planned closures of many Army Reserve and National Guard centers and several military installations and the return of units from overseas were among the primary concerns expressed when Army officials testified before the Base Realignment and Closure Commission May 18.

Under the Army's current recommendations, the 2005 BRAC would close 15 installations, seven leased sites, 176 Army Reserve installations and 211 Army National Guard facilities. It will also create seven training "centers of excellence," seven joint technical and research facilities and four joint material and logistics facilities. Giving primary information for the Army were Secretary of the Army Francis Harvey, Army Chief of Staff Gen. Peter Schoomaker and Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Army for Infrastructure Development Craig College.

"The recommendations of BRAC 2005 will holistically transform the current infrastructure into a streamlined portfolio of installations with an 11-percent increase in military value which, thereby, enables the operational Army to better meet the challenges of the 21st-century security environment," Harvey told the commission.

Rebase troops

Former Secretary of Veterans Affairs Anthony Principi, who chairs the commission, started the questioning by asking Schoomaker about the return of troops from overseas.

"With regard to rebasing the 70,000 overseas troops, they don't add up to 70,000 in the numbers we have," Principi said. Schoomaker said the Army's portion of the 70,000 troops to be rebased is only 47,000, of which 22,000 are in units that will stand down and be reassigned in the new modular force structure. He said the remainder is made up of larger units that will return from overseas and be distributed to large installations such as

Fort Bliss, Texas; Fort Lewis, Wash. and Fort Shafter, Hawaii.

College told the commission these major moves will take place over a period of years. Principi also asked if the movement of large units to Fort Bliss might overload the area's communities, or lead to water-supply problems in the area's dry climate.

"All of this is informed by the national military defense strategy, which adds 10 brigades to the Army force structure and 34 brigades to the National Guard and Reserve," Schoomaker said. He said Fort Bliss offered the right mix of maneuver space, unrestricted airspace, free radio spectrum for the use of Unmanned Aerial Vehicles and access to sister services. Commissioner Sue Ellen Turner asked if the closure of Red River Army Depot, Texas, called for in the BRAC plan is a good idea in the wake of media reports of difficulty fielding items such as up-armored Humvees. Harvey said the Army has an excess production capacity, and it will be enhanced by creating "centers of excellence" in specific fields.

"In the past 50 years, the highest number of direct labor hours we've ever used is 25 million. By closing Red River and creating centers of excellence, we can surge to 50 million direct labor hours," he said.

Transforming

Commissioner Samuel Skinner asked about the closure of National Guard and Reserve centers, and their consolidation into joint centers. "I guess it's like 'Field of Dreams.' You're saying that if you build these world-class facilities, you hope the Guard will come," Skinner said. Schoomaker said the Army is continuing to work toward a "one-Army" concept.

"The Guard and Reserve are increasingly important to that one-Army concept," he said. "What we're doing is taking overstructure out of the Guard and Reserve and making them into whole units. You said it pretty well. We are committed to building 125 facilities with the hopes that 211 state facilities will align into them."

Specially sworn in to testify, Lt. Gen. Roger Schultz, director of the Army National Guard, told the commission the states have cooperated with the Army's analysis of which sites will be closed under the current plan. "These realignments started from field submissions," Schultz said. "They have been line-time detail reviewed by the state leaderships."

Harvey said that the new joint centers will be constructed in the same areas as the old bases slated for closure. "We plan them for the same demographic area, within a 50-mile radius of where they were before," he said.

"There are two points about this," Schoomaker said. "The first is the obvious opportunity to improve training and retention. The second, as we look at this movement we would expect to see divestiture of the old sites, and direct our funding into these 125 centers."

Combining bases

Commissioner James Hill said he was pleased to see DoD "get it right" by combining Pope Air Force Base and Fort Bragg N.C., in the current BRAC proposal. He asked why similar steps aren't planned for McChord Air Force Base and Fort Lewis, Wash.

"The big difference is the Air Force's intended use of Pope. They'll be leaving only a small element there," College said. "So it makes sense to have a single entity under Army control. McChord will retain a large Air Force presence."

He said the current study is to determine how the bases might share suppliers and support services. Hill also returned to the subject of increasing the troop numbers at Fort Bliss, asking if there were environmental issues to address. Schoomaker said the environmental issues there are minimal, and the base will be well served by being close to additional training pace at White Sands and Kirtland Air Force Base, N.M., and Yuma Proving Grounds, Ariz. Hill also asked why the Army had

COPING WITH FAMILY STRESS

Don't bring work pressures to your home life

It seems predictable that if you live in a big city with noticeable crime, bumper-to-bumper traffic, noise, smog and the other factors associated with a metropolis that stress would be common place.

In that environment it shouldn't surprise many that family issues arise when parents bring issues from work into the home and it results in family stress.

And even though Kwajalein isn't a metropolis and traffic jams are typically of the two-wheeled variety families might still face pressures and stresses.

"Granted, there is an adjustment period when families first arrive on Kwajalein and for most newcomer families, the adjustment is painless and quick," said Marion Ruffing, the counselor at the Kwajalein Hospital and an Employment Assistance Program professional.

She said that the remoteness on Kwajalein can be difficult for some families.


"Most newcomer families are

aware of the lifestyle on Kwajalein before they arrive. The stress and adjustment becomes more difficult and longer when there is a family member that doesn't want to relocate. Sometimes it is the spouse, sometimes it's the teenager or younger child that wants to stay put in their "hometown" where they feel comfortable. The unknown of moving to a new location can be stressful, and this applies to any location," Ruffing added.

Families move to Kwajalein for many different reasons according to Ruffing. She added that some come for the change of lifestyle, some to save money, some come to "start over," some for a work promotion; some come for the excitement of living on a remote, well-known atoll in the middle of the Pacific.

"I find the family system lifestyle doesn't change much. If the system is dysfunctional in the states, it will be dysfunctional on Kwajalein. If the system is one of strength, support and comfort, it will be the same here," Ruffing said.

Indicators of family stress are

the same on Kwajalein as anyplace else. How do you know if your family is under stress?

- Is it difficult for you sometimes at night to be present and calm when your mate or your kids want to talk with you (because you've got work stress and unfinished business racing through your mind)?

- Do you ever find yourself becoming impatient or saying "Get to the point already" right at the moment when your loved ones need you to be an excellent, patient listener?

- Do you sometimes get into an argument with your mate or your kids because they accuse you of not caring or not listening, when in fact you're just exhausted from the pressures of your job?

"You are not alone," says Leonard Felder, PhD., author of *Wake Up or Break Up: 8 Crucial Steps to Strengthening Your Relationship* (Rodale, 2005). Felder has been counseling couples for more than 20 years and he has found, "Those first few minutes when you walk in the door and get bombarded by screaming kids, an exhausted partner, or a series of domestic problems are a 'make-or-break moment' for most relationships. If you can find quick, effective ways to shift from the pressures of the work day so you can be fully present with your loved ones, your home life will be a lot less argumentative and a lot more loving."

Felder recommends three steps to help with family stress.

The centering time out

Five or 10 minutes before you walk into your home, give yourself a much-needed time out. Close your eyes and find a moment of serenity. Then take a few moments to breathe, pray, meditate or talk silently to yourself about the fact that the people you are about to meet in a few minutes (your mate and/or your kids) are more important than any client, customer, supplier, boss or work colleague you've dealt with all day. Even if your work-focused brain wants to take your loved ones for granted, this is the moment when you can once again realize they are the most important people in your life right now.

The promise

Felder suggests making a daily promise to your-

self that "instead of being an impatient, grumpy or bossy creep when I walk in the door, tonight I'm going to be the caring, interested and relaxed partner or parent these loved ones deserve. Tonight instead of tuning out my loved ones or having a short fuse, I'm going to be fully present." You might even ask in a silent prayer or meditation for support and strength to make your promise come true during the next few hours with your loved ones.

Taking turns

Finally, when you sit down to talk with your spouse or partner, set some guidelines that will allow the two of you to have a good check-in conversation. For example, Felder recommends, "Instead of having one person go into a 60-minute monologue where the other person is struggling not to tune out or interrupt, it's much more effective to say ahead of time that you're a bit tired tonight and you do have 10 or 15 minutes of good listening left in you. That proactive statement clues your partner in that if the two of you take turns (10-15 minutes for each partner to check in about his or her day), both of you will have a chance to be heard and understood each night no matter how stressful your days have been. This guideline of "10 minutes for each person so we both get a turn" is a remarkable way to restore balance and closeness in your relationship.

Based on what he's seen in hundreds of counseling cases, Felder recommends, "If you don't take proactive steps to deal with the day's stressfulness, your tiredness and grumpiness will start to cause your loved ones to feel distant from you. Unless you take immediate action to break the pattern of nightly impatience and tuning out, they will begin to withdraw from you emotionally."

On the other hand, Felder has found, "These three preventive steps can make a huge difference in the quality of your home life. Just by doing these three positive steps you will once again become the kind of mate and co-parent that will cause your partner and your kids to say, "Wow, it's so good to have you back again!"

Because of shortage on Ebeye, workers purchase rice from USAKA

In response to a request from C-badge holders, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll began sales of rice Tuesday to alleviate the neighboring island's shortage. Sales were held at the Dock Security Checkpoint to coincide with the workers' departure from Kwajalein after the normal duty day, according to Gerry Wolf, Community Activities chief.

On Tuesday, 20-pound bags were sold and as of Friday afternoon, 5-pound bags were still being sold by Kwajalein Range Services.

"All activities involved in the request, approval, transport and sale of the rice were very quick to react and meet the needs of our Marshallese neighbors," Wolf said. "These included both USAKA and KRS activities in Logistics/Supply, Community Activities/Services and

Host Nation, to name a few."

Sales of rice do not affect its availability to Kwajalein residents.

"The amounts provided for sale to support the emergency request were determined based on maintaining adequate stock for the Kwajalein community," Wolf said.

The staple food is a daily part of the Marshallese diet, eaten in the afternoon and evening, and for some even in the morning, according to Noda Lojkar, ombudsman.

"I am trying to find out why this [shortage] is occurring again since rice is used every day," Lojkar said. "One of the businesses on Ebeye claims that within the past month, two RMI [Republic of the Marshall Islands] field trip ships stopped on Ebeye and food items for the outer island were loaded, rice being most of it."

Lojkar said that he is looking into whether the same thing happened


at the other stores. The last rice shortage occurred in November because of an ordering miscalculation on the part of an Ebeye business as well as delays in shipment.

Lojkar said that the workers are happy with the continued support from the command on matters such as this, though added that only C-Badge workers were permitted to buy rice, one bag per worker.

"Some people on Ebeye asked why we were selling just to workers and not [to] all," Lojkar said. With limited stocks of rice available, he explained that it would not be fair for the workers not to get the first crack, considering the fact that there is not enough to sell to everyone on Ebeye.

"Some were not happy, the ones without C-Badge workers in the house," he explained. "The barge will be here on the 28th [of] May, so I think this will keep them happy."

Range operation scheduled for Wednesday

A range operation is scheduled for Wednesday. Caution times are 7:01 p.m. through 3:01 a.m., Thursday. In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within the Kwajalein Atoll.

The caution area is bounded on the north by Boked Island on the East Reef and Yabbernohr Island on the West Reef. On the south, the area is bounded by a line drawn north of Bigej Island on the East Reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the West Reef.

Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the Mid-Atoll Corridor. All Mid-Atoll Corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands. Additional areas specified outside the mid-atoll are designated as caution areas. See the maps below.


In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the Mid-Atoll Corridor by the window opening time, Kwajalein Police Department island clearance procedures will begin at approximately 7:30 a.m. on Sunday and continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all air and seacraft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following days:



In Good Company, Middle-aged man finds a callow twentysomething usurping his professional life and worming his way into his family in this alternately funny and poignant comedy drama. Dan Foreman (Dennis Quaid) is a man in his mid-forties who has spent 20 years as the head of advertising sales for *Sports America*, a leading athletics magazine. Dan is happily married to Ann and has a college-age daughter, Alex (Scarlett Johansson), whom he dotes on, but Dan's comfortable life is given a major shake-up when a large multimedia firm buys the magazine. Seen as a bit long in the tooth to be truly competitive, Dan is demoted to second in command of advertising, and his position is handed over to Carter Duryea (Topher Grace), a 26-year-old who talks a good game about sales but has no practical experience in the field. Dan's wounded ego makes working with the arrogant Carter an uphill battle, but when he learns that Ann is expecting another baby, Dan is in no position to quit. Before long, Dan becomes aware of Carter's intense insecurities about his new job as the younger man reaches out to him for guidance, but this doesn't make Dan any less angry when Carter begins a romance with Alex after his marriage to Kimberley (Selma Blair) crashes and burns.

The Wedding Date, Gal who needs a date for a family function gets the best man money can buy in this romantic comedy. Kat Ellis (Debra Messing) is a woman in her mid-thirties living in New York City and has had more than her share of romantic problems — enough so that she's gotten word that her younger half-sister Amy (Amy Adams) is getting married, and that her mother Bunny (Holland Taylor) and father Victor (Peter Egan) want to fix her up with someone so she won't look alone and miserable for the big day. Adding insult to injury, Kat learns that the best man at the ceremony will be Jeffrey (Jeremy Sheffield), a former boyfriend who cruelly dumped her without warning two years before. Determined not to show up alone, Kat swallows her pride and hires Nick Mercer (Dermot Mulroney), a professional escort, who will pose as her boyfriend for a \$6,000 fee. Kat and Nick fly to England for the wedding, and her family and friends are all struck by how charming, handsome and personable Nick is — and Kat begins wondering if their relationship has to be all business; however, as it turns out, Nick understands Kat far better than she expects.

Global War on Terror

Honoring fallen heroes

The following 17 U.S. servicemembers and civilians have died in the Global War on Terrorism.

Sgt. Antwan L. Walker, 22, of Tampa, Fla., died May 18 in Ar Ramadi, Iraq, when his camp was attacked by enemy forces using indirect fire. Walker was assigned to the Army's 2nd Forward Support Battalion, 2nd Infantry Division, Fort Carson, Colo.

Pfc. Wyatt D. Eisenhauer, 26, of Pinckneyville, Ill., died May 19 in Mahmudiyah, Iraq, on an escort mission in a HMMWV when an improvised explosive device detonated on a bridge. Eisenhauer was assigned to the Army's 2nd Battalion, 70th Armor, 3rd Brigade, 1st Armored Division, Fort Riley, Kan.

Two Soldiers **Spc. Bernard L. Sembly, 25**, of Bossier City, La. and **Sgt. Robin V. Fell, 22**, of Shreveport, La. died May 19 in Baghdad, Iraq, when they were shot while conducting dismounted combat operations. Both were assigned to the Army National Guard's 1st Battalion, 156th Armor Regiment, 256th Brigade Combat Team, Shreveport.

Sgt. Kurt D. Schamberg, 26, of Euclid, Ohio, died May 20, in Baghdad, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV. Schamberg was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 14th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum, N.Y.

Pfc. Steven C. Tucker, 19, of Grapevine, Texas, died May 21, in Kandahar, Afghanistan, of injuries sustained near Shinkay, Afghanistan, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV. Tucker was assigned to the Army's 2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry Regiment, 173rd Airborne Brigade, Vicenza, Italy.

Sgt. Benjamin C. Morton, 24, of Wright, Kan., died May 22, in Mosul, Iraq, when his dismounted patrol encountered enemy small arms fire. Morton was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 24th Infantry Regiment, 1st Brigade, 25th Infantry Division (Stryker Brigade Combat Team), Fort Lewis, Wash.

Sgt. Kenneth J. Schall, 22, of Peoria, Ariz., died May 22, in Yusafiyah, Iraq, when the HMMWV in which he was riding was involved in an accident. Schall was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 70th Armor Regiment, 3rd Brigade, 1st Armored Division, Fort Riley.

Two Soldiers, **1st Lt. Aaron N. Seesan, 25**, of Ohio and **Spc. Tyler L. Creamean, 21**, of Jacksonville, Ark. died on May 22 in Mosul, from injuries sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated near their HMMWV. Both were assigned to the 73rd Engineer Company, Fort Lewis.

Sgt. Charles T. Wilkerson, 30, of Kansas City, Mo., died May 22 in Baghdad, when an unknown

ordnance detonated near his tent. Wilkerson was assigned to the 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment, Fort Carson.

decided to put its decisions regarding leased property inside the BRAC plan. "You could have terminated those leases if you wanted," he said. College said BRAC was the appropriate time to analyze and address the use of leased property.

"If you're going to take on the issue of the high cost of leased space, it should be looked at to determine how that infrastructure would work to support the team. We thought BRAC is the precise tool to look at it in a comprehensive way, rather than taking small steps over time." Hill's final question concerned the move of research and development from Fort Monmouth, N.J., to Aberdeen Proving Ground. Harvey called

the move "a judgment call," but said because Monmouth is relatively close to Maryland that he expects more of the high-tech specialists from Monmouth will make the move than would happen with a larger geographic move. Commissioner Philip Coyle asked about the many differences between this round of BRAC and previous rounds. Schoemaker said the current round of BRAC is allowing the Army to accomplish numerous goals as the force structure changes.

"We have the opportunity to set the force the way we want it to be in the future," he said.


