

COL Stipe addresses teen issues


Recently, I met with our teens to discuss issues that were on their minds. It was a very interesting discussion and I would like to take this opportunity to provide answers to some of the issues that were raised during the meeting.

The first issue was clarification of the island curfew. Anyone under 18 is not permitted in public places between the hours of midnight and 5:30 a.m. unless accompanied by a parent or custodial guardian 21 or older. The purpose of this policy is to provide general protection and welfare of children in the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Reagan Test Site community. Parents must know where their children are and what they are doing, and are responsible for arranging for their care and supervision.

The second issue was a music room for the teens. The youth expressed a desire to have a place to practice amplified music outside their parents' quarters. Lauren Peters, our school/student representative on the Quality of Life Integrated Product Team, broached the subject last week and was successful in getting a resolution passed to place up to \$5,000 of Indian Incentive Funding toward this endeavor, with primary expenses being a community-use drum kit and sound proofing materials. Community Activities is currently looking for a suitable location on island that could be dedicated to this activity.

The third issue was whether there could be on-line video and live Xbox games on the local television. I'm sorry to say that due to bandwidth constraints, this is not possible.

The fourth issue concerned the reasoning behind teens not being allowed to rent vehicles until they are 21, even though they can obtain their driver's license at 16. The USAKA regulation concerning motor transportation vehicle operation and control states a person must be at least 16 and have completed a formal driver's education training course. The



minimum age without formal training is 18. And, the person must have a job status or membership in a private organization that requires the use of government vehicles or equipment.

Not allowing those under 21 to rent vehicles is a policy decision, and here are some reasons for the policy.

We are challenged with an extremely limited vehicle fleet, and our parts' supply system does not support legacy (old) vehicles. Since nearly all of our vehicles

are operated well past their life expectancy, they are more vulnerable to wear and tear. To keep the vehicle fleet ready for operational use, we limit, to the maximum extent possible, external use by private individuals. Many project organizations have already had to reduce their vehicle use.

Unfortunately, it is statistically true that young drivers have a much higher incidence of vehicle accidents and incidents. A simple example is that most automobile rental companies will not rent to persons under 25, or if they do so, it is only under restricted conditions. Use of the USAKA/RTS vehicle fleet by young people for other than work purposes seems a logical way to reduce a significant risk to the vehicles. There is also some reduction in risk of bodily harm associated with this policy, though that risk is significantly lowered by the reduced speeds of vehicle operation on Kwajalein.

Under certain circumstances young people are allowed to drive for work-related purposes. This group of drivers is under supervision and the risk of accidents or damage is reduced.

I want to thank all of the young adults who participated in the Teen Town Hall. It was extremely beneficial for me to hear your concerns and points of view. Where Steve Howell, Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School principal, was able to address those issues directly related to school functions, I have not re-addressed them here. I think it is important that we continue this dialogue, and I look forward to meeting with you again.

ATI schedule revised until August

The Air Transport International flights that deliver most of Kwajalein's mail and much of the cargo have changed their schedule through the end of August.

According to Maj. Jud McCrary, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll logistics officer, the new schedule has a positive effect on mail and cargo.

The new schedule was set so

that the DC-9 combination cargo and passenger planes which were flown into Kwajalein could undergo maintenance.

"The DC-8 cargo can hold 18 pallets of cargo versus 10 on the DC-9 combination. We now actually have more cargo capability than we did before," McCrary said. He added that a U.S. Air Force C-17 is expected in

once a month, further expanding the capability to move cargo and mail.

Until recently the ATI flights were on Tuesday and Thursday. The new schedule has them arriving on

Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Even though the flight schedule has changed, the post office hours will remain the same, according to Karla Long, post mistress.

"We will continue to have the mail available to the public within the 24-hour guideline, unless the plane is delayed," she said.

She said that summer months are the heaviest delivery times for the post office because many people take their annual leave and mail back packages. She said that customers should be aware that any packages mailed back from vacation may not necessarily be kept in a temperature-controlled environment due to lack of space. "It is best to have someone responsible for picking up their mail while gone," she added.

Long advised customers to complete a Form 3801 in order to have someone pick up their mail in their absence. "If there is no 3801 on file, mail will not be given out," she said.

"Please remember to fill out a vacation slip when you leave island, this causes problems with accumulated mail and is an inspect-able item for us," Long said of customers who want to have the post office hold their mail.

With the added cargo space, it is possible that mail will be delivered more quickly than before.

"It is the responsibility of the box holder to check their mail on a daily basis, whether it is a mail plane day or not. We always have magazines and on-island mailings that are distributed. The postal staff will do our best to accommodate the changing plane schedule as needed. Watch the roller throughout the summer for any unexpected changes in package pick-up window hours," Long said.

PALACES of KWAJALEIN

Historic Richardson Theater was best place for Kwaj entertainment in 40s, 50s


Ask any resident of Kwajalein during the 1944-54 era what the best resource of entertainment was on the island and most likely the answer would be the “nightly movies and live shows at the Rich.” Of course he or she would be referring to the Richardson Theater, that grand old lady of countless movies and live stage productions over the past 60 plus years.

Built in late 1944 as a Special Services Project by the US Army, the Rich was named after Lt. Gen. Robert C. Richardson, 1944 Army commander, Pacific Operations, Hawaii. In early 1944, several so-called movie theaters had been put together on Kwajalein, Ebeye and Roi Namur. By mid 1944, there were no less than seven outdoor movie houses on Kwajalein

alone. Some of these motion picture theaters were nothing more than some bed sheets strung between two trees, or a couple of tents.

The most elaborate outdoor movie palace in mid 1944 was built by the Navy Seabees, on the south side of 9th Street across from present-day Ragan Field. At first the Navy had it all with real seats made from two-by-twelves over saw horses, a full-size white painted screen, big sound speakers and a small snack bar concession with all the latest stale hard candy from home. There was a problem keeping track of the seats since Kwajalein had a shortage of building material at the time, and the wooden seats would often disappear. Marine guards put on duty 24 hours a day to guard the theater finally corrected the problem.

The Navy movie shows were generally standing room only, unless you were an officer and could sit in the special reserved center section. The Navy captain’s staff had the best seats that included a raised central island box seats fully covered with canvas in the even of rain. The movies never started without the

captain and his staff in attendance unless the picture was a rerun from the night before.

After an arrangement had been made with the United Services Organizations in mid 1944, there was a constant inter-service argument to see where the USO live productions might be shown. Another theater called the Raymond Clapper Theater was a favorite permanent movie house. There was another all-night theater in the area now between Coral Sands Beach and the old TTR-5 Building. This theater was very popular with transient passengers waiting for an airplane at the Army Transportation Command Building across Lagoon Road. The Seabee-built theater on Ebeye was perhaps the best facility at the time, but then the attendance was limited to Ebeye residents unless you could get a ride on a small boat from Kwajalein to Ebeye, walk the reef or swim!

None of the so called theaters were considered adequate for full-scale theatrical productions on Kwajalein and the idea for the Richardson was born. Space was the immediate problem since almost every inch of Kwajalein in 1944 was being utilized to support the war effort. Military support groups and their buildings were back to back. Several possible sites were considered, but the island commander insisted the new theater be central to the island operations. Land was finally made available

behind the already built line of quonset huts along present day 9th Street.

The first Richardson was somewhat crude, but the new theater did have the first stage-like structure needed for the USO shows along with real stage lights. Even though seating initially was somewhat crude using split coconut logs, the Army Air Corps solved the problem by "finding" a load of two-by-twelve lumber that was spread across used bomb crate containers. The Rich became the place to go.

When the first audio speaker system was completed, the big shows such as Bob Hope/Jerry Colona, Joey Brown, Jack Benny, Danny Kaye and many other performers came to Kwajalein. By mid 1945, there was a new stage show almost every other week and the

Rich really hit its stride with top name Hollywood and Broadway performers visiting Kwajalein.

Like the Navy Theater down the street, the Richardson employed an officer's reserved section in the center and close to the stage. This situation led to a major controversy when Hope and Colona came on island. Hope let the military brass know he would not put on a show unless the common military members were allowed to occupy the entire front section next to the stage. The shows always included a host of Hollywood girls including Frances Langford, Marilyn Maxwell, Betty Hutton, Carol Landis and many, many more. The girls would often invite the military members up on the stage to dance or take part in the skits.

Of course Hope loved to pan the officers and the military members loved him for it.

On April 16, 1945 the Rich was the scene of a memorial to the late President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Almost every military member on Kwajalein stood in the early morning sun in full uniform to pay respects to their lost commander in chief. The ceremony was most impressive.

Probably the biggest stage production occurred during September 1945 when the musical show *This is the Army* played to more than 3,000 men and women at each of two nightly performances. For an outdoor theater designed to accommodate about 800 servicemembers at a time, this presented a real problem. Special bleacher-type seating was quickly built along with a wide wing area of seats at about 30 de-

grees to the stage. Each performance was restricted to specific groups of military personnel on Kwajalein, Ebeye, and the many Navy ships in the harbor. The plan was to allow attendance by written passes only for only one of the performances. The whole entry was to be supervised by military security. The plan was to ensure that every servicemember on Island got to see the show, but only once. The whole idea failed as military personnel began to assemble at the Rich in the late afternoon for the first evening's show. By the time the performance got underway, the audience reached back to the first base line of the baseball field! Many of those Kwajers only heard the music

that night because they couldn't see the stage.

After the war, the Rich continued to play to an occasional USO or military road show. By 1956, when the island population was down to less than 1,200 men, women and children, the Rich played nightly movies. The big stage shows had come and gone. While the other theaters folded or were swallowed up by new structures, the Rich hung on showing nightly movies only. Smaller theaters began to open like the indoor movie room at the new Navy Officers Club built in 1952. Now known as the Yokwe Yuk Club, the movies were finally moved outside into the present open-sided theater in 1956. People could have a few cocktails, eat dinner and see a movie all in one area. The Yuk Theater became an instant success.

The resurgence of the military mission for Kwajalein in the 1960s breathed new life into the old Rich. The Navy enlarged the front face of the building, added more benches, a new snack bar and even painted the old white screen. When the Army took command of the island in 1964, another face-lifting project was done to increase the size of the screen to accommodate the new CinemaScope and other wide-angle film and projectors. Better speakers were installed and on a good night you could hear the sound track of the movie clear down to Echo Pier!

Movies at the Rich in the 1960s were sometimes a real challenge. The first big problem was finding a seat, particularly if the movies were new or it happened to be on a Friday or Saturday night. Most everyone on the island went to the movies on the weekends. So besides the normal dog fights, breakage in the film, occasional loss of one of the reels, the cat calling and the roar of aircraft taking off, there was always the threat of nightly rains! One visiting correspondent noted in his newspaper column about "observing the vast field of mushrooms on Kwajalein sitting in the rain!" He was referring to the hundreds of umbrellas and yellow poncho rain gear worn by the Kwajers as they sat in the rain watching the movies at the Rich. In the heyday of 1960s there were always double features on Saturday and Sunday nights. The second movie was

considered X-rated and for adults only. Getting the kids to leave after the first movies was always a chore for the Security Police. Then there was the problem of the mass exodus of bicycles leaving the Rich in the dark. Someone always got knocked over, fell off their bike or worse yet got a citation because they didn't display a flash light.

With the several newly arrived families on Kwajalein, an old construction warehouse was relocated to a site in the family housing area in 1965. The new facility was to be an indoor movie theater called the Ivy after Gen. Ivy B. Drury. This 4,000 square foot tin roofed indoor theater was to be used seven days a week until 1984. The movies were shown in a safe dry area, but

when the heavy rains hit the metal roof the movie sound was obliterated! I suppose one could say the Rich really hit the skids about the beginning of the 1970 years and the introduction of television on Kwajalein. Crowds that normally went to the Rich each evening now went to the Yokwe Yuk, Tradewinds or Crossroads Clubs to watch the latest TV tapes in from the mainland. As more and more TV sets were brought on island, the audience attendance dropped off at the Richardson. There were still special shows, a band concert or

maybe an occasional live theater production, but the Rich was gasping for breath. With the new TV station operating for a time on Ebeye Kwajalein began to become hooked on the 'boob tube.' By the 1980s and the introduction of the new Armed Forces Radio and Television station nightly attendance at the Rich was often down to less than 100 people.

Today the Rich is limited to showing movies only on the weekends. During a recent visit to the island I noted several of the old timers sitting at the Rich in the dark during the middle of the week. When I asked what was the reason for just sitting in the darkened theater one of the men said, "Well, it just seems right to have a cold beer at the Rich before turning in for the night." The Richardson still lives on with the ghosts of performers, audiences, and movies over the past 61 years.

USAKA commander visits Majuro

COL Beverly Stipe and her Host Nation staff paid a courtesy call to the Republic of the Marshall Islands national government in Majuro recently.

Stipe and Greta Morris, U.S. Ambassador to the RMI, met with John Silk, RMI minister for Resources and Development, and Bobby Muller, RMI chief secretary. Stipe stated the purpose of her trip was to meet with the Government of the Republic of the Marshall Islands representatives and the U.S. Ambassador on a variety of mutually important subjects.

Her list included the three-party fiber optic cable plans, changes in the Host Nation office, and the importance of the Community Relations Committee meetings. Stipe also wanted to visit with certain local businesses to thank them for their participation in the Kwajalein trade fair last month. Stipe is interested in facilitating Marshallese

businesses and wanted to determine the feasibility of encouraging retail operations on Kwajalein.

While in Majuro, Stipe and her staff visited Laura Farms, Robert Reimer's Pacific Pure Water Plant and the Marshall Islands Fishing Venture fish plant.

When asked if the goals of the trip were accomplished, Stipe said, "We had a very good open discussion concerning the fiber project, and RMI Chief Secretary Bobby Muller, agreed to coordinate future RMI participation in the CRC meetings to ensure we get the appropriate representation from all RMI entities. We are all in agreement that the CRC schedule should be issue-driven and not calendar-driven." She said that the fish plant was a promising venture, but the farm has a long way to go before USAKA would be able to accept fresh produce that meets the U.S. Army inspection criteria.

This trip was also an opportunity for USAKA Host Nation Chief Maj. David Coffey, to say farewell and

to introduce his replacement, Maj. Jeff Klein. Klein said that he would continue forward with many of the initiatives Coffey started.

Morris said that Klein has experience in Civic Action Teams and Humanitarian Assistance Programs. She hopes with his expertise, more projects may come to the RMI. Klein said that his expertise was mainly in Title 10 projects, Humanitarian Assistance Programs and Civic Action projects that provide training for military units that benefit the Host Nation. Muller confirmed the emphasis is not necessarily on bricks and mortar, but humanitarian assistance, particularly focused on rural areas. All agreed that Klein's experience would provide beneficial insight to future endeavors.

Stipe was pleased with the outcome of the visit. Stipe said that she looks forward to working on future enterprises with the GRMI and will preserve the already close relations with the U.S. Embassy in Majuro.

Island moviegoers at Richardson Theater witnessed Voyager's travel to space in 1977

Launched in 1977 by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, the Voyager One and Two spacecraft were sent to study Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune during an alignment of the planets that occurs once every 175 years.

Voyager Two was launched first from Cape Canaveral, Florida, on Aug. 20, 1977 and Voyager One was launched on a faster, shorter trajectory on Sept. 5, 1977, according to the NASA Web site.

In late May, the Voyager One space probe reached beyond the orbit of Pluto, headed for the outer reaches of the solar system. According to an ABC News Online article, it is almost 14 billion kilometers from the sun and has traveled further through the solar system than any other space probe.

Kwajalein was part of the historical flights of Voyager One and Two, according to Bill Williamson, radar field engineer at Apra Long Range Tracking and Instrumentation Radar.

"It was a beautiful, clear, starry Saturday night on Kwajalein in 1977, before TV came to the island. There

were hundreds of people at the Richardson Theater for the Saturday night double feature," he said.

"All of a sudden the sky above lit up as Voyager One fired its rockets to leave earth orbit to start its travels to the edge of our solar system and beyond," Williamson recalled.

Williamson, who worked at Roi Telemetry during the first of his three tours, said that Telemetry, as well as other Kwajalein sensors recorded this historical event and all the Kwajalein movie goers witnessed it.

"A week later, the event was repeated as Voyager Two followed," he added.

Jim Stepchew, ALTAIR Antenna group leader, was nine years old at the time. He thought the action in the sky was a re-entry.

"I do remember sitting at the Richardson watching a movie and seeing a red glow streak across the sky. We all thought it was just another mission and didn't really pay attention to it," Stepchew said.

According to the NASA Web site, flight controllers believe both spacecraft will continue to operate and send back valuable data until at least the year 2020. On Feb. 17, 1998, Voyager One passed the Pioneer 10 spacecraft to become the most distant human-made object in space.

Global War on Terror

Honoring fallen heroes

The following 14 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism.

Spc. Phillip C. Edmundson, 22, of Wilson, N.C., died June 1 in Ar Ramadi, Iraq, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his Bradley Fighting Vehicle during combat operations. Edmundson was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 9th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division, Fort Carson, Colo.

Pfc. Louis E. Niedermeier, 20, of Largo, Fla., died June 1 in Ar Ramadi, when his unit was conducting combat operations and he came under enemy small arms fire. Niedermeier was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, Fort Carson.

Two Soldiers, **Staff Sgt. Leroy E. Alexander**, 27, of Dale City, Va. and **Capt. Charles D. Robinson**, 29, of Haddon Heights, N. J., died on June 3 at Forward Operating Base Orgun-E in Afghanistan when their convoy vehicle was struck by an improvised explosive device. They were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 7th Special Forces Group, Fort Bragg, N.C.

Marine Cpl. Antonio Mendoza, 21, of Santa Ana, Calif., died June 3 at Brook Army Medical Center, San Antonio, from wounds received as a result of an explosion while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Ar Ramadi, Iraq, on Feb. 22. At the time of his injury, Mendoza was assigned to 5th Battalion, 11th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Spc. Carrie L. French, 19, of Caldwell, Idaho, died June 5 in Kirkuk, Iraq, when an improvised explosive device hit the front of her convoy vehicle and detonated. French was assigned to the Army National Guard's 145th Support Battalion, Boise, Idaho.

Three Soldiers, **Staff Sgt. Justin L. Vasquez**, 26, of Manzanola, Colo., **Spc. Eric J. Poelman**, 21, of Racine,

Wis. and **Pfc. Brian S. Ulbrich**, 23, of Chapmanville, W. Va. died on June 5 in Baghdad, Iraq, when an improvised explosive device detonated near their military vehicle. They were assigned to the 3rd Squadron, 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment, Fort Carson.

Col. Theodore S. Westhusing, 44, of Dallas, died June 5 in Baghdad, from non-combat related injuries. Westhusing was serving with the Multi-national Security Transition Command-Iraq and was assigned to the United States Military Academy, West Point, N.Y.

Spc. Brian M. Romines, 20, of Simpson, Ill., died June 6 in Baghdad, where an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV. Romines was assigned to the Army National Guard's 2nd Battalion, 123rd Field Artillery, Milan, Ill.

Lance Cpl. Jonathan L. Smith, 22, of Eva, Ala., died June 6 from wounds received as a result of an explosion while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Fallujah, Iraq. He was assigned to 2nd Assault Amphibian Battalion, Regimental Combat Team-8, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Lance Cpl. Robert T. Mininger, 21, of Sellersville, Pa., died June 6 from wounds received as a result of an explosion while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Fallujah, Iraq.
