# Iraqis rebuild country despite violence

**BAGHDAD** — The young Iraqi man, face and head covered by a checkered scarf, perched on his haunches in the dark, half-finished hallway of a military barracks and sprinkled handfuls of cement mix into a metal tub of water.

As he gave a thumbs-up sign with his other hand, he said two words: "Work. Good."

Then, flipping his hand over and pointing his thumb at the dirt floor, he said two words more: "Security. Bad."

In a nutshell, that is the story of reconstruction efforts in Iraq.

While some \$18 billion has been allocated to more than 2,600 projects, the continuing violence in the country both overshadows the work and puts Iraqis in a tough situation. If they take a job to help rebuild their country, they risk violence from insurgents.

Two projects near Baghdad are illustrative of the progress. One is an Iraqi special forces barracks being built in a dusty corner of the U.S. military's sprawling Camp Liberty. The other is the Qudas electric power generating station about 20 miles north of Baghdad.

The barracks project employs some 200 Iraqi

laborers and is run by a local contractor. That man, who asked that his name not be used, had worked on several projects for the Marines in Anbar province. Insurgents threatened his family, so he moved them to Jordan.

"When this is all over. Who knows, maybe two years," he says when asked when his family could return.

Until it's pointed out, visitors to the construction site don't notice the relative quiet. At a construction site in the United States, you'd be overwhelmed by generators and power tools. Aside from one bulldozer, the Iraqi work crews here

use no power tools.

"One of the big successes we've had is that there's nobody riding in the bucket [of the bulldozer] anymore," joked Tom Semotuk, an Army Corps of Engineers supervisor on the project and contractor back home in Kansas City.

The six-building project has a budget of \$5 million. Originally, it had a 120-day deadline, but various delays have pushed that to 180 days.

"We've had to overcome a lot of adversity to get the job done," Semotuk said. "The workers have been threatened,

# **Roi-Namur** *perfect for a weekend getaway*

**A** trip to Roi-Namur couldn't be easier. According to Floyd Corder, Roi-Namur operation manager, the first thing that needs to be done when planning a trip is to call and get a flight reservation, there and back. Flights leave periodically through out the day. Flight arrangements can be made by calling 53469. If you're travelling for pleasure you must fly space-available and can't

make reservations.

The next step is to reserve billeting if you are planning on staying for the night. There are 15 rooms available, however, people on official work business get priority, Corder explained. If the housing office is closed the day the trip is planned for, keys can be left at the airport for pick up upon arrival. Cost is \$15 per night. Billeting can be reached at 56004.

Now that getting there and having a place to stay is taken care of what do you do? "We have almost all the same things as Kwaj, just on a smaller scale," said Sgt. Tyrone Scott, Roi-Namur police department. Activities

such as basketball, volleyball, tennis and golf can be found. Roi also has movie theater, a chapel and a hobby shop.

According to Scott among the most popular activities are fishing, diving and snorkeling. The small boat marina has boats that can be rented to Kwaj residents. The boats however, can not be reserved by phone, they are rented on a first-come, first-serve basis, Corder said. Kwaj residents must go through the Roi orientation prior to renting a boat. Transportation such as golf carts can also be rented on a first come first serve basis.

Scott said camping is allowed with out any special permits, however, if campers want to build a fire a burn permit must to obtained from the fire department.


According to Scott, the beaches are said to be one of the things that attract visitors. The beaches are lined with cabanas for resident and visitor use. There is also a larger cabana called the Parrot Head that is used as a beach side bar.

There are also several World War II bunkers, and a underground Japanese hospital and other ruins of the war that can be seen around the island. There is a Battlefield Tour that is given on the weekdays. According to Corder it takes about four hours to complete.

As far as shopping goes Roi has one store to accommodate the needs of the residents and visitors. "Gimbles is our Macy's, Macy's West, Ten-Ten, Tape Escape and Surfway," Scott said.

There are a few large events that bring many people to Roi, the biggest one is the chili cook-off. The cook-off is scheduled for mid-September.

"People come to Roi to get away, things are laid back and simple here," Scott said.

so some have left.

“And any deliveries, they have to be dropped off and completely unloaded outside the gate, then loaded back up on different trucks to be brought inside, and unloaded again.”

Most of the laborers on the project make between \$10 and \$15 per day. They live in a makeshift camp provided by the Iraqi contractor. Sometimes they leave simply because they don’t like the hard work.

When done, the barracks will provide modern facilities for Iraqi troops, who are the cornerstone of the U.S. exit strategy in Iraq. There are some 900 projects in the “security and justice” sector of the Iraq Reconstruction Program.

Semotuk, like many of the Corps employees, volunteered to come here. And he’s staying past his original contract.

“I wanted to make sure this got finished,” he said,

waving a hand toward the construction. “For me, it’s win-win all around.”

The Qudas plant could help solve one of the most pressing problems for Iraqis — providing a constant flow of power. Once repair work is completed, the Qudas plant alone could increase Iraq’s electrical production by more than 10 percent.

“That is a significant contribution. It’s one of the larger gas turbine power plants in Iraq,” Dennis Karns, electricity program manager with the U.S. Project and Contracting Office, said in a written response to questions.

Once operational, he said, the plant could provide power to nearly a half-million homes.

The \$2.1 million project employs some 100 Iraqis, and repairs are 85 percent complete.

doorstep as gleeful as a love struck teen to show off my latest batch of photos. I had caught the "fever" and knew I had to invest in a better camera. I purchased a mid-range 3.3 mega pixel with wide angle lens and digital strobe, far from a luxury model but a significantly better beginner's camera.

After completing dozens of dives and taking hundreds of photos, I went on a dive trip to Rongelap. I shot more than 300 photos in all.

When I returned and downloaded my camera, I was amazed. I looked at the photos I took at the beginning of my adventures in underwater photography and was quite taken aback at the comparison. Only a liberal use of expletives could adequately describe my early photos. What a difference a few mega pixels, a flash, and loads of information from the pros make. Now that I've gotten at least the basics of underwater photography, my next purchase will

be a much better camera setup, probably a professional model with underwater housing. While most of my education in digital underwater photography lies ahead and I continue to guilt a few professionals into mentoring me, I am sincerely thankful that I was introduced to the world of underwater photography in the first place.

Before the war, Iraq was producing 4,400 megawatts of electricity per day. On most days now, it produces 4,700 megawatts. But demand is still outstripping supply, so electricity has become a major gripe for Iraqis, sweltering through the summer.

To compound problems, there is no Iraqi billing system for service, so no incentive for people to limit their usage.

In many areas, utility repairs were used as leverage by Saddam Hussein: To either reward or control certain population groups, some regions would be kept fully

supplied. In some areas, like Ramadi, residents still lament to U.S. soldiers that, under Saddam, at least the power or water would be fixed the next day.

U.S. officials say that whether or not that is true, the reality is that 35 years of neglect and more than two years of conflict left Iraq's infrastructure damaged.

Col. Frank Kosich, deputy commander of the Army Corps of Engineers Gulf Region District, noted the disparity of projects and their impact.

At one end of the spectrum, a well can be dug in a village to

supply a few hundred people with fresh water. They will see the benefits immediately.

However, right down the road is a water treatment plant that nobody knows about, but provides clean water for hundreds of thousands.

"There's the well, which everyone in the village can see. And there's the plant, sitting alone, drawing no curiosity and no visitors, but supplying water to 600,000 people," Kosich said.

"Which would you rather have? You have to do both. You can't do one or the other."
