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School calendars top agenda at November public School Advisory Council meeting

A change to this year's school calendar was approved Wednesday night at the School Advisory Council public meeting in the elementary school music room.

Under the revised 2005-2006 calendar, April 28 and 29, originally slated for professional development, will become full school days. Instead, teachers will devote half days to professional development on Dec. 3, Jan. 14, Feb. 18 and March 4.

Students will experience shortened classes on the half days, which, at the high school, equates to 25-minute classes instead of 47-minute classes.

"I can assure you the time will be used wisely," Steve Howell, high school principal and acting SAC chairperson, said.

As is the case with all SAC recommendations, the calendar revision is headed to COL Beverly Stipe, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Reagan Test Site commander, for final approval.

Next year's school calendar

A committee of from six to seven teachers was formed to propose to the superintendent potential school calendars for next year.

In a memo from Dan Frazier, Kwajalein Schools superintendent, provided to the SAC in his absence, he said, "The final decision regarding adoption of a school calendar lies with the SAC. As superinten-

dent, I hold the responsibility to make recommendations to the SAC for calendar adoption."

Frazier asked the committee to discuss options with others in their buildings and provide suggestions on three calendar options that would be workable and favorable for both teachers and parents, while at the same time "providing optimum learning benefits for our students."

The committee has been tasked with providing the calendar options to Frazier by Nov. 31 using criteria outlined by him. Within that time-frame, the public is asked to contact its SAC representative to provide input on next year's school calendar.

The SAC will vote on the calendar or calendars proposed by Frazier and make its recommendation to Stipe.

The Kwajalein Range Services calendar for next year, being finalized with USAKA according to John Pickler, KRS president, will be provided to the SAC in order to ensure minimal conflicts with the school calendar.

Line of Authority policy will be renamed

The SAC entertained a first reading of a proposal to change the name of Policy 2000.07 from 'Line of Authority' to 'Appeal Process.'

The policy states, "Certificated school employees have all the rights, privileges and obligations of all logistics contractor employees and are subject to the same restrictions that apply to all employees on Kwajalein.

Problems or concerns should first be discussed with the appropriate teacher. If satisfaction is not obtained it is proper to take the matter to the principal(s). If satisfaction is not obtained, it is proper to take the matter to the superintendent, then to the chairperson of the School Advisory Council if the issue is of an educational/technical nature or to the logistics manager responsible for the schools if the problem deals with company policy issues. A written format will be provided parents so they can formalize their concerns and requested actions. This form will be shared with the teacher the parent has expressed concern about."

Frazier, who initiated the change, wrote that the only issue problematic is the policy's title.

"It suggests that the chairperson of the SAC is next in line of authority following the superintendent. Of course, the SAC chair holds no real authority separate from the SAC," Frazier stated. "However, the SAC chair can function as a liaison with the USAKA commander, as some things are more appropriately addressed through this channel than before a public SAC meeting. Definitely, there may be issues where someone may need to appeal educational issues privately beyond the authority of the superintendent. Therefore, this issue addresses more the appeal process than the authorities of the school. In conclusion, I suggest a more appropriate title for this policy may be 'Line of Appeal' or 'Appeal Process.'"

A second reading of this policy is slated for the December SAC public meeting.

School improvement plan in works

The school has completed nine of the 14 steps recommended by E. Bruce Jones, School Improvement/Accreditation specialist. The North Central Association is slated to visit Kwajalein again March 1-3.

There are no cars, malls or cell phones and there is limited space and activities. As a result of these things, the social life of teenagers on Kwajalein is different than

that of teenagers in the states; it comes with its own special perks and difficulties.


The open and friendly environment on Kwajalein makes it relatively easy for newcomers to fit right in and make friends. Teenagers on the island are always ready for a new face and are usually quick to welcome people.

According to senior Mauren Moulton, who returned for her second tour on Kwajalein two and a half years ago, the teens made her quickly feel right at home, "When I came out of the airport my first day here peo-

ple were there to meet me and they were very welcoming and friendly." The physically small size of Kwajalein is also conducive to making connections with other people. "Yeah, it's pretty easy to make friends, you see everyone everywhere," says junior Jeremy Beckler.

Although the tight bonds that form from spending so much time with other youth create cliques, people are generally inclusive. Mingling between groups of friends is common and people come together easily at parties and school functions.

Kwajalein's small area and population may make making friends easier, but a lot of teenagers agree it makes dating much more complicated.

It's not easy to find a girlfriend or boyfriend simply because there is a lack of options. The fact that many of Kwajalein's teenagers have known each other their whole lives also causes difficulties.

"If you've lived here all your life, most of the girls are like sisters," Beckler said. Also, because of the closeness of teens there is always a risk of friendships being ruined when dating.

It's not unusual for the person a student is dating to have already dated some or his or her friends. As a result of the tricky dating situation, on the island casual dating is more prevalent. Serious relationships do develop though, especially among the older teens.

According to many teens on the island, there is no shortage of fun activities to do with friends on Kwajalein. The good weather coupled with the lack of cars, and for that matter places to drive to, make outdoor activities dominate many teenagers' free time. Boating, wake boarding, fishing, trips to Bigej, swimming and sports all top the list of enjoyable things to do. Hanging out at the Teen Center and going to dances is popular among the younger teens.

Finding places to go on dates, on the other hand, can be more difficult. Privacy is limited in such a small community and the few options for dates can wear out quickly. However, with a little imagination, entertaining things to do with a girlfriend or boyfriend can be found. As senior Will O'Connell put it, "You have to have a creative mind. You

could take someone to the tip of the island to watch the sunset for example." Group dates or taking a significant other out to activities with friends is popular also. Many teenagers do the same things with their dates as they do with their friends.

The social life for teenagers on Kwajalein is one of contradictions. It is active but relaxed, satisfying but frustrating. The social life of teenagers is also quite different than that of their counterparts in the states. For some, this is a good thing; they appreciate the intimacy and the freedom that comes with living here. For others, who miss the variety of people and entertainment found outside Kwajalein, it can be annoying and boring.


Either way, Kwajalein's teenagers by and large make the best of the island and the unique experiences it brings.

KRS-supported employee savings plan now with The Vanguard Group

Kwajalein Range Services employees can now access their new 401(k) plans with The Vanguard Group.

According to Dana Lum, KRS Human Resources supervisor, a freeze was put on all accounts from Oct. 3 to Monday to allow for the transition of plan assets and individual employees' accounts from Securian to Vanguard.

Lum explained that technically all KRS employees who are eligible to participate, even those not currently enrolled, already have accounts with Vanguard. "What they need to do is register to access that account," she said. "Employees who

already had accounts with Vanguard and have access will not have to reregister as they should see their 401(k) information when they view their other accounts."

There are three ways to access an account.

- **Online.** Register at www.vanguard.com, click on Go to Personal Investors link then click on Sign up for access to check account balances, conduct transactions, research funds, use financial planning tools and more. When you register for immediate Online account access you will be asked for your social security number, birth date, zip code, plan number (095606) and a valid e-mail address.

- **By telephone.** Call

Vanguard's 24-hour automated VOICE Network at (800) 523-1188 to make transactions, get detailed fund information and more. Employees will receive a personal identification number shortly. The PIN will be needed to use VOICE.

- **With personal assistance.** Call the same toll-free number Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 9 p.m., Eastern time, for answers to questions or help with transactions.

According to Bob Bills, Human Resources manager, Vanguard offers an array of benefits including a diversified lineup of investment options to meet specific needs. They offer a 24-hour Online and toll-free telephone account ac-

cess, for information any time.

The account is updated daily, so performance can be checked whenever the employee wants. Lifelong investment education and planning programs are available to help employees meet all their financial goals.

Program recognizes U.S. Army veterans

The commendations are mailed within 4-6 weeks.

Red Eye, Terror rides the night skies in this thriller from horror auteur Wes Craven. Lisa Reisert (Rachel McAdams) is a young woman with more than her share of anxieties about flying. However, when circumstances demand she go to Miami, she gathers her nerves and books a seat on a late-night flight. Sitting next to her is a handsome and charming man named Jackson (Cillian Murphy), whom she already met in the airport, but once their jet is safely in the air, Lisa discovers he's not the pleasant traveling companion she imagined. Jackson is part of a terrorist cell plotting to kill the head of Homeland Security, and he's decided to draft Lisa into helping him.

Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, Director Tim Burton brings his unique vision and sensibility to Roald Dahl's classic children's story in this lavish screen interpretation. Willy Wonka (Johnny Depp) is the secretive and wildly imaginative man behind the world's most celebrated candy company, and while the Wonka factory is famously closed to visitors, the reclusive candy man decides to give five lucky children a chance to see the inside of his operation by placing "golden tickets" in five randomly selected chocolate bars. Charlie Bucket (Freddie Highmore), whose poor but loving family lives literally in the shadow of the Wonka factory, is lucky enough to obtain one of the tickets, and Charlie, escorted by his Grandpa Joe (David Kelly), is in for the ride of a lifetime as he tours the strange and remarkable world of Wonka.

Honoring fallen heroes

The following 18 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism.

Lance Cpl. Jeremy P. Tamburello, 19, of Denver died Nov. 8 from wounds sustained from an improvised explosive device while conducting combat operations just west of Rutbah, Iraq. He was assigned to the 1st Light Armor Reconnaissance Battalion, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Sgt. 1st Class Alwyn C. Cashe, 35, of Oviedo, Fla., died on Nov. 8 at Brooke Army Medical Center, Fort Sam Houston, Texas from wounds suffered Oct. 17 in Samarra, Iraq. Cashe was on patrol in a Bradley Fighting Vehicle when an improvised explosive device detonated near his vehicle. He was assigned to 1st Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division, based in Fort Benning, Ga.

Lance Cpl. Daniel F. Swaim, 19, of Yadkinville, N.C., died Nov. 10 of wounds sustained from an improvised explosive device while conducting combat operations against enemy forces during Operation Steel Curtain in Karabilah, Iraq. He was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 6th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Staff Sgt. Michael C. Parrott, 49, of Timnath, Colo., died in Balad, Iraq on Nov. 10. Parrott was assigned to the Army National Guard's Joint Forces Headquarters, Cheyenne, Wyo.

Sgt. Joshua A. Terando, 27, of Morris, Ill., died Nov. 10 in Al Taqaddum, Iraq. Terando was a Reservist assigned to the Army National Guard's 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 28th Infantry Division, Washington, Pa.

Two Soldiers died in Kirkut, Iraq, on Nov. 11, when their convoy vehicle was involved in a collision. Both soldiers were assigned to the 40th Transportation Company, 44th Corps Support Battalion, 593rd Corps Support Group, Fort Lewis, Wash. Killed were **Cpl. Donald E. Fisher II**, 21, of Avon, Mass. and **Pfc. Antonio Mendezsanchez**, 22, of Rincon, Puerto Rico.

Sgt. Tyrone L. Chisholm, 27, of Savannah, Ga., died Nov. 11 in Tal Afar, Iraq, when multiple improvised explosive devices detonated near his M1A2 Abrams Tank. Chisholm was assigned to the 2nd Squadron, 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment, Fort Carson, Colo.

Lance Cpl. David A. Mendez Ruiz, 20, of Cleveland and **Lance Cpl. Scott A. Zubowski**, 20, of Manchester, Ind., died Nov. 12 from an improvised explosive device while conducting combat opera-

tions against enemy forces in Al Amiriyah, Iraq. Both Marines were assigned to 2nd Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Twentynine Palms, Calif. During Operation Iraqi Freedom, their unit was attached to 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force (Forward).

Staff Sgt. Stephen J. Sutherland, 33, of West Deptford, N.J., died Nov. 12 in Al Qadisiyah, Iraq, when his Stryker military vehicle accidentally rolled over. Sutherland was assigned to the 4th Squadron, 14th Cavalry Regiment, 172nd Stryker Brigade Combat Team, Fort Wainwright, Alaska.

Cpl. John M. Longoria, 21, of Nixon, Texas, died Monday of wounds sustained from small arms fire while conducting combat operations against enemy forces during Operation Steel Curtain in New Ubaydi, Iraq.

Maj. Ramon J. Mendoza Jr., 37, of Columbus, Ohio, and **Lance Cpl. Christopher M. McCrackin**, 20, of Liverpool, Texas, died Monday from an improvised explosive device while conducting combat operations against enemy forces during Operation Steel Curtain in New Ubaydi, Iraq.

Sgt. 1st Class James S. Ochsner, 36, of Waukegan, Ill., died Tuesday in Orgun-E, Afghanistan, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during a supply distribution mission. Ochsner was assigned to the Army's 2nd Battalion, 3rd Special Forces Group, Fort Bragg, N.C.

Lance Cpl. Nickolas D. Schiavoni, 26, of Haverhill, Mass., died Tuesday from a suicide, vehicle-borne, improvised explosive device while conducting combat operations against enemy forces near Al Karmah, Iraq. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune.

2nd Lt. Donald R. McGlothlin, 26, of Lebanon, Va., died Wednesday from small arms fire while conducting combat operations against enemy forces during Operation Steel Curtain in Ubaydi, Iraq. He was assigned to Battalion Landing Team 2nd Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment, 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif. His unit was attached to 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force (Forward).

Pvt. Dylan R. Paytas, 20, of Freedom, Pa., died Wednesday in Baqubah, Iraq, from injuries sustained from multiple gunshot wounds. Paytas was assigned to the 3rd Brigade Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Benning.

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
