

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Community saddened by local death

Danny Lajouj, 33, an employee of Chugach Development Corp., a teaming-partner of Kwajalein Range Services, died Friday in an explosion at the Marine Department Dry Dock.

According to Maj. Johnny Davis, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll provost marshal, "a comprehensive investigation which will include members from the U.S. Army's Criminal Investigations Division, Hawaii, will be done."

He added that the investigation will be concluded as quickly as possible and "all avenues will be reviewed."

Lajouj was a Marshallese employee who began working as a laborer in the Marine Department almost 10 years ago, when Raytheon was the USAKA primary contractor. "He successively became a deck hand and then a painter, which was his position when the accident occurred,"

John Pickler, KRS president said. "Janet Burki [KRS deputy manager for logistics] and I met with members of his family shortly after the accident and again later to express our condolences," Pickler said.

Pickler added that Lajouj was working as a painter in the port ballast tank of the LCU *Manassas* when an explosion of unknown origin occurred. One other painter was working just outside the vessel with Lajouj at the time of the explosion, and he was not injured.

Davis described Kwajalein Police Department's responsibilities at the scene of the accident, "Our first response is to provide security for the fire department and clearing the area, being cognizant of a possible secondary blast and to maintain a thoroughfare for any other emergency personal and/or equipment needed on the scene, also keep any unnecessary parties out, for their own safety and the integrity of the scene so an investigation can be completed then, turned over to the

safety investigators," he said.

He added that the priority at the scene is the safety of the emergency responders and any possible victims in whatever type of incident they are called upon. "Obtaining correct information will be achieved as these folks are allowed to concentrate their efforts; we owe this to any victims," Davis said.

After the KPD finished its initial site investigation, members of KRS Environment, Health & Safety began their investigation in the area. "The purpose of the ES&H investigation is to find out what happened and correct it, so nothing like this can happen again," according to Jeff Halliday, acting public affairs officer for KRS.

The accident is under investigation.

According to Davis, prior to this accident, the last accident-related death on Kwajalein was in 2003 when a bicyclist ramped into a tree and died as a result of his injuries to the head.

Army begins Common Access Card logon for government computers

The Army began implementing Common Access Card Cryptographic Logon last month and will soon require a common access card and personal identification number, or PIN, to log onto the Army's unclassified network.

By March, about 10,000 Army users, including most Pentagon staffers, are expected to be logging onto their computer network by scanning their card.

By summer, implementation should be Armywide, G6 officials said.

"Protecting identity is critical as the Army moves forward to deliver a joint net-centric, information enterprise," said Lt. Gen. Steven W. Boutelle, chief information officer/G6.

"One of the greatest vulnerabilities of our networks is posed by weak user names and passwords," Boutelle said. "Spyware or keystroke tracking software can steal your username and password, and even your PIN. It cannot steal your CAC. The Army's goal is to eliminate the use of username and password."

Before the CAC logon is implemented across the Army,

workshops will be offered, G6 officials said.

CAC logon allows users to be authenticated with something they know -- their PIN, and something they have -- a CAC, officials said. CAC is a type of smart card with electronic information about an owner and digital public key infrastructure, or PKI certificates that insure identity.

Part of the CIO/G6 mission is to protect and defend the Army systems, networks and information, officials said. Key to that mission is reducing vulnerability of the unclassified network through security measures such as CCL, they said.

CCL also meets the directives on identity protection published by the Army vice chief of staff in 2005 and the president's 2004 Homeland Security Presidential Directive 12.

Recently, the Department of Defense's Joint Task Force Global Network Operations started accelerating PKI implementation throughout the DoD.

In the near future, the Army's intranet Army Knowledge Online also will require CAC logon, officials said. They said the Army is currently testing and vetting the capability to use CAC logon outside Army networks.

Youths' agility, strategy challenged Kwajalein's Amazing Race

There were 37 excited ninth through 12th graders packed into the home of John and Karen Pickler on Sunday in anticipation of Kwajalein's first-ever Amazing Race.

Some of the participants painted their faces and colored their hair to show team spirit and each of the eight teams were given tie-dyed team shirts before they lined up outside to receive their first clue and begin the event. The race participants showed their enthusiasm with

cheers for their teams and for the race sponsors.

The Picklers, who lead the Senior High Youth Fellowship on island, came up with the concept for The Amazing Race several months ago while brainstorming fun activities to shake up the weekly youth fellowship meetings. The idea came from the popular television show *The Amazing Race* in which teams race around the world and take part in challenges along the way.

It took about two months and 40 volunteers to put together the race that would take the kids all around the island and test them with physical

and mental challenges throughout. Organizing the race was a challenge in itself but with the support of so many community members and organizations including the Emergency Operations Center, Community Activities and the Running Club, it was pulled off without a hitch.

The participants were given a clue at the completion of each challenge to direct them to their next location and experience.

There were 14 challenges in all that took the teams from Emon Beach all the way to the Shark Pit. Some of the challenges required physical prowess such as diving for rings at the family pool, relay racing through the terminal, and kayaking to North Point. Others, such as solving a number puzzles at The Weather Station and playing word games at the Public Gardens, required the racers to use their mental abilities.

“The ball balancing relay was the hardest,” ex-

The competitors surprised everyone involved by finishing a full hour before expected.

The race began at 1 p.m., the first team arrived at the Community Activities Center Room 6 finish line approximately 3 hours later. Each finishing team was greeted at Bunker Hill by a cheering crowd where they completed their final challenge, wheelbarrow racing up the hill, rolling down the other side, and sprinting to the CAC.

The teams, exhausted from the heat and the challenges as well as riding their bikes several miles to reach all the locations, were surprised with a potluck dinner at the end.

The top three teams were honored during the dinner and the top two teams won gift

certificates. The first place team consisted of two Juniors Jeremy Beckler and Michael Taylor and two Seniors Amber Banducci and Katie Funk. “I think we worked really well together and were all really motivated. We supported each other in the competitions and just had fun,” said Banducci of her team.

The race was considered a success by those involved. Many participants agreed the best part of the race was the end because they could look back on what they had accomplished. Karen Pickler expressed, “My favorite part was watching the kids come into the finish line and seeing that they had a good time and were challenged.”

The racers were challenged but also grateful to the people who made the day possible, which was evident in the final cheers and letters of thanks that concluded the event.

Back from 60s

New life for old equipment

Working in partnership with federal agencies and Indiana University, Defense Reutilization and Marketing Service brings new life to old equipment, helping scientists half a world apart in Indiana and the middle of the Pacific Ocean.

The wake-up call

The United States received a rude wake-up call from the Soviet Union in 1957, with the launch of the 'Sputnik' satellite. As the small device orbited the earth, sending out a beeping signal, U.S. military leaders realized they were in the slow lane of the space race. Millions of dollars poured into missile technology.

By 1961, Clear Air Force Station, Alaska, came online as part of a Ballistic Missile Early Warning System. Three large detection antennas, 400 feet wide by 165 feet high, weighing 2 million pounds, became the station's trademark.

On Dec. 15, 2000, after nearly 40 years of operation, the last of the original radars came off-line.

Old, but still useful

Creative minds found a way to use that 1960's technology to help protect our nation and further scientific research.

In August 2004, a team of 20 people from the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Reagan Test Site, the Naval Surface Warfare Center in Crane, Ind. and Indiana University's Cyclotron Facility arrived in Alaska to harvest the equipment.

The university facility received several pieces of equipment, including a 15,000-pound transformer, according to their project leader Tom Rinckel. "A single klystron tube costs \$250,000 new and we needed four tubes plus spares," Rinckel said. "We appreciate acquiring these recycled items... our project could not be completed without the reuse of these large cost items."

Greetings from 'Edge of Tomorrow'

The Reagan Test Site is a long way from Indiana, a long way from Alaska, a long way from almost anywhere.

Located on Kwajalein Atoll in the Marshall Islands, as the seagull flies it is only a few miles from the international dateline. It is also on the cutting edge of missile-interceptor development, space surveillance and satellite tracking. The site reutilized more than \$4 million in equipment from Alaska.

Working together, DRMS provided equipment for a university research project; supported the Naval Surface Warfare Center and RTS.

Good partnerships lead to good stewardship and service to both the academic and defense department scientific communities.



National Guard athlete nabs Women's Bobsled Silver

Spc. Shauna Rohbock, a member of the Utah Army National Guard, won Silver in the Women's Bobsled competition as the pilot of USA-1 at the XX Winter Olympics Feb. 14.

Rohbock, who is in the National Guard Outstanding Athlete Program, completed the competition at Cesana Pariol in the Italian Alps with a four-run combined time of 3 minutes, 50.69 seconds – .71 seconds behind the Gold medal winner.

"I'm ecstatic and I hope our Four-Man team can pull one out too," Rohbock said.

Ranked third in World Cup points for Bobsled, the administration specialist is a former bobsled brakeman and was an alternate to the U.S. Bobsled team for the 2002 Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City. For this year's Games Valerie Fleming joined her on USA-1 to operate the brakes.

"We got together in 2003," Rohbock said. "She's not just a teammate but a best friend as well."

I have all the confidence in the world of Shauna," added Fleming.

Because she has competed against most of the other women in the bobsled circuit, Rohbock understood she had to be at her best if she was going to win a medal at the Olympics. Before her first run, she watched Germany-1 set a new track record of 57.16 and Canada-1 put up a new push record of 5.16. She answered with a 5.28 push and a run time of 57.37 and closed the night with a two-run total of 1:55.02.

"It's amazing after the first day to be sitting in third place," she said. "I know if I have two more good, consistent runs and get down a little bit on that start, I can be right up there on the medal stand."

Tuesday, the National Guard athlete got her wish. She opened the evening's competition by sliding one of the straightest lines of the event. Her push time for run three was 5.30. She slid solidly into second place with a run time of 57.78.

Germany-1 kept the heat on, though. That team's run time of 57.34 helped them extend their lead to .53 sec-

onds. On her final run, Rohbock's slid solidly into second with a push of 5.31 and a run time of 57.18.

Sixteen sleds from 10 countries started the competition – 15 finished. Sandra Kiriassis and Anja Schneiderheinze of Germany won Gold with a four-run time of 3:49.98. Gerda Weissensteiner and Jennifer Isacco put down a combined time of 3:51.01 to win Bronze for Italy.
