

# Army acronyms can be tough to translate

Do you know what 'CG' stands for? Sure—it's commanding general. Except when it means center of gravity, or communications gateway, or consolidated guidance.

How about PMCS? Easy—Preventive Maintenance Checks and Services. Just not when it means 'Project Managers Control System.'

Another example: A sergeant first class sitting on a Soldier of the month board a couple years ago was going to ask me questions about Army programs.

"What does ASAP mean?" she queried.

"Sergeant, ASAP means 'as soon as possible,'" I said without hesitation.

Behind me, I knew my supervisor was hiding his face in his hands. In terms of Army programs, ASAP means "Army Substance Abuse Program."

As an Army journalist, a lot of my time is devoted not just to writing, but also translating what I like to call 'Armyese' into plain english. It's not always an easy task.

Acronyms are such an integral element of Armyese that many of us have started to use them as if they were normal verbs and nouns. Someone might say "I'm going to take the GOV over to UAMBL to see the TACOPS drill," and no one would bat an eye.

Of course, acronyms have been around for much longer than the Army—some good early examples can

be found in Italy, where the Romans chiseled SPQR into many of their monuments (Senatus Populusque Romanus). But the Army sure does have a certain fondness for them.

It's not just acronyms that require translation. Dates written '16MAR2006' would make most civilians' eyes cross, since most Americans are used to 'March 16, 2006.' Ranks must be retyped—LTC becomes Lt. Col. in the Associated Press Stylebook and SFC becomes Sgt. 1st Class.

Then there's the lexicon—the actual vocabulary of the Army language. Some folks in the Army are fond of saying 'at a high rate of speed.' That's a lot of words just to say 'quickly.'

One that's always gotten under my skin is 'to include.' Why the sudden use of the infinitive tense here? Can't we just say 'including?'

There's 'police up' and 'square away,' which just mean 'to neaten.' Things that are good are 'outstanding' or 'hooah.'

'Ensure' is another popular Army word. It's used correctly most of the time, but it sounds an awful lot like 'insure,' which has a totally different meaning. Why not eliminate any possible confusion and just say, "make sure?"

'Attrition' means 'a reduction in numbers usually as a result of resignation, retirement, or death.' Basically, attrition rate is how quickly numbers are declining. It functions as a noun. That is, until it gets 'verbed'—I recently heard an officer use the word

'attrit,' as in, "We're going to attrit the enemy down to a combat-ineffective level."

The translation to regular english, of course, is 'reduce,' as in, 'reduce the enemy to a combat-ineffective level.'

It's easy to get lost reading some of the upper-level planning-speak. Here's a sentence from the FCS (Future Combat System) Web site:

"The adjusted program schedule will use an iterative development, integration and verification process to demonstrate readiness to move into Low-rate Initial Production and provide FCS SO capabilities to the Current Force."

Surely, that's a statement that's full of meaning. But the average reader (and writer, in my own case) needs some help to fully understand exactly what that sentence is actually saying.

All the armed services have their own languages and vocabularies and have since their institutions. It's a safe bet that they'll continue to do so indefinitely.

As long as they do, those souls whose job it is to tell the Army story will continue to have to translate phrases such as "we took the QRT out on an FTX at 0100 to ensure everyone was good to go on their NVGs" into plain english: "We took the quick response team out on a field training exercise at 1 a.m. to make sure everyone was qualified to use their night-vision goggles."

The March Kwajalein School Advisory Council public meeting was short and sweet according to Dan Frazier, schools superintendent.

He said the meeting lasted approximately 30 minutes.

In that time, three items were voted on and approved. They were the School Policy 4000.02 Age Limits; Policy 4000.09 Searches and the foreign language/music curriculum.

The Age Limits policy was approved to read children must be 5 years old on or before September 1 to be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten. Proof of date of birth must be presented at the time of initial registration for kindergarten.

The Searches Policy was changed to read reasonable

# Tax preparation volunteers trained, ready to file

Yep, it is that time of year again, tax time.

An instructor for the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program, Bill Thomas of Hawaii, was on island last week teaching a course to four volunteers.

The volunteers will offer free tax help to island residents. After taking the course from Thomas and passing a written test, the volunteers were certified through the IRS.

Some changes will be made from last year. Thomas said all taxes will be done on computer however, as of now they will not be e-filed. "They will be printed out and you have to mail them in," he said.

When asked if he would suggest residents go to a volunteer tax preparer he said, "I've been doing volunteer taxes for 19 years. If you don't understand all the rules you can get yourself in a lot of trouble."

Thomas recommends anyone with any major type of taxes to go to a professional tax preparer.

The tax filing deadline for U.S. citizens living abroad is June 17, payments must be received by April 17 to avoid penalties.

According to [www.irs.gov](http://www.irs.gov) items needed for tax preparation include:

- Photo identification

- Social Security cards for you, your spouse and dependents

- Birth dates for primary, secondary and dependents on the tax return

- Current year's tax package if you received one

- Wage and earning statement(s) Form W-2, W-2G, 1099-R, from all employers

- Interest and dividend statements from banks (Forms 1099)

- A copy of last year's Federal and State returns if available

- Bank routing numbers and account numbers for direct deposit

- Other relevant information about income and expenses

- Total paid for day care

- Day care providers identifying number

- To file taxes electronically on a married filing joint tax return, both spouses must be present to sign the required forms.

- The address for those living abroad or using the 2555/2555 EZ has changed. The new address is on the back of the 1040 instructions.

# Taking care

## March is National Nutrition Month

March is National Nutrition Month, a campaign designed to educate and promote the importance of making informed food choices as well as developing sound eating and physical activity habits. (American Dietetic Association [www.eatright.org](http://www.eatright.org))

Americans consume too many calories and too much saturated fat, trans fats, cholesterol, added sugars and salt, but not enough nutrient-dense foods. This, along with a lack of physical activity, results in an 'energy imbalance,' more calories is consumed than expended and this leads to weight gain.

In the Dietary Guidelines for Americans 2005, the Department of Health and Human Services identified some nutrients many


adults are lacking: calcium, potassium, fiber, magnesium and Vitamins A, C, and E. Children and adolescents are at risk for not enough calcium, potassium, fiber, magnesium and vitamin E.

Nutrient-dense foods are those foods providing substantial amounts of vitamins and minerals (micronutrients) and relatively few calories. Examples of nutrient-dense foods include: dark green vegetables, orange vegetables, legumes, fruits, whole grains and low-fat milk and milk products. For a 2,000-calorie intake diet recommendations encourage people to consume two cups of fruit and 2½ cups of vegetables per day, at least 3 ounce-equivalents of whole-grain products per day and 3 cups per day of fat-free or low-fat milk or equivalent milk products.

In January 2005 the U.S. Departments of Agriculture and Health and Human Services created a 'new' food pyramid called MyPyramid (can be accessed online at <http://mypyramid.gov>) The new food guide emphasizes the need for a more individualized approach

to improving diet and lifestyle

which includes age, gender, activity level and the new 2005 Dietary Guidelines for Americans. The new food guidelines are more flexible and take into account individual and cultural food preferences, vegetarianism, food allergies, cost, and availability.



# SpaceX mission slips to Friday

The SpaceX range operation is now scheduled for Friday.

Caution times are from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within the Kwajalein Atoll. The caution area is bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr Island on the west reef. On the south, the area is bounded by a line drawn north of Bigej on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E, and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the west reef. Bigej, including the in-

ner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor. Omelek, Eniwetak and Gellinam are designated as evacuated islands. All mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands. Additional areas specified outside the mid-atoll are designated as caution areas, see maps.


In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, Kwajalein Police Department island clearance procedures will continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all air and seacraft will be required when

requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following days:

- 8 a.m. - 4 p.m., Saturday
- 8 a.m. - 4 p.m., Sunday
- 8 a.m. - 4 p.m., Monday

**Map 1:** In accordance with U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Regulation 190-14, the mid-atoll corridor is closed to allow ground surveillance of the mid-atoll corridor to be completed. When closed, no surface vessels shall be permitted in this area without prior approval from the USAKA/Reagan Test Site Command Safety Directorate. The area closure is indicated by the 'red flag system.' The range safety officer will release the mid-atoll corridor closure when the area is clear of all hazards.

**Map 2:** Expanded view - mid-atoll corridor lagoon, broad ocean area, airspace caution area. Gellinam, Omelek, Kwadack and Eniwetak Islands will be evacuated for this mission. Meck will only have mission essential personnel on the island in sheltered status.

**Map 3:** Broad ocean areas and airspace areas are closed at L-1 hour mission day until released by the range safety officer. No surface vessels shall be permitted in Kwajalein Mid-Atoll Corridor without prior approval from the command safety directorate.
