

The other boats had looked toward Mellu pass on the west side of Sand Island because the surface wave action was being blown in that direction. Page was not in Mellu pass being blown out to sea; she was approximately 2 miles west of the pass being pushed further into the lagoon by the incoming tide.

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Death prompts safety review

Employees need to be aware of dangerous situations

On Feb. 24, a tragic accident occurred in the Kwajalein Range Services Marine Department resulting in the death of a Chugach Development Corp. employee, Danny Lajouj. This is an update on actions by KRS and Chugach to safeguard against future accidents.

Members of the Kwajalein Fire Department, police department and U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Provost Marshall's Office responded immediately to the accident. "Our first responders acted promptly, professionally and appropriately when they got the call," said KRS President John Pickler. "They were on the scene literally 1 minute after being notified of the accident."

Immediately after the accident, KRS suspended all work in the area where the accident occurred and stopped all work on its projects involving burning, welding and confined space entry pending a thorough review by KRS Environmental, Safety and Health and

fire department personnel. Work activities are now being resumed after review of specific task requirements and work hazards. This process includes documentation of work control processes and procedures, training, certification of workers and supervisors and oversight to ensure work is performed in a safe manner.

Members of ES&H also visited work sites on Kwajalein, Roi-Namur and Meck to be sure that operations are safely executed. "Our immediate focus was on activities that can lead to serious injury if not performed safely, such as working at heights, welding, confined space operations, scaffolding, lockout of powered systems, ladders, rigging, excavations and the like," KRS ES&H Manager Dick Nugent said.

KRS is embarking on a longer-term program to analyze safety processes all around the atoll. A team of experienced leaders will perform a careful review of hazardous activity training and job safety analysis. "We are determined to improve," said Nugent.

"We face daily risks in our on-

and off-duty activities, and we must constantly reinforce our focus on safety as our top priority," Nugent continued. "Talking about safety is not enough; we need to live and breathe safety at every level of the company. Many KRS employees operate around high voltage sources, climb on the radars, trim palm trees, operate vehicles, work with sharp instruments and power tools, fly aircraft and work around explosives – you name it. Because of this, we need to be aware of safety all the time."

The Island Memorial Chapel has established a fund for the family of Danny Lajouj. On March 28, representatives of USAKA, KRS, CDC and the Host Nations office presented a \$4,000 memorial gift to the Lajouj family.

"Danny Lajouj was a very good man, an extremely loyal employee, and a loving husband, son and father," Pickler said. "His loss will be felt by his family and our entire combined communities on Kwajalein and Ebeye. We thank the many members of our community for their generosity and support in this difficult time."

We'll be back

SpaceX views launch as victory

"Look for us in 6 months; we will be back," said Steve Fuchs, a SpaceX site technician, while looking at some debris from Falcon 1 that was about to be detonated by Explosive Ordnance Disposal.

"It was impressive to watch it take off," Fuchs said of the maiden launch March 25. "There was 30 seconds of flawless flight."

Fuchs described the attempt as "a victory, not a loss at all."

March 26 a team of approximately 40 people collected the

debris from the rocket on and around Omelek.

"We collected a large portion of the rocket remains. It was definitely a lot more than anyone would have guessed we would find," Fuchs said. According to Travis McDiffett, unexploded ordnance technician, pyrotechnic cutters, explosive bolts and a triethylaluminum were recovered and in need of disposal.

An emergency disposal operation was performed March 27. A team of two UXO technicians, a U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll safety representative and

April is National Alcohol Awareness Month

April is National Alcohol Awareness Month, with Thursday being National Alcohol Screening Day.

Alcoholism, also known as 'alcohol dependence,' is a disease that includes four symptoms:

- Craving: A strong need or compulsion to drink.
- Loss of control: The inability to limit one's drinking on any given occasion.
- Physical dependence: Withdrawal symptoms, such as nausea, sweating, shakiness and anxiety, occur when alcohol use is stopped after a period of heavy drinking.
- Tolerance: The need to drink greater amounts of alcohol in order to get high.

People who are not alcoholic sometimes do not understand why an alcoholic can't just use a little willpower to stop drinking. However, alcoholism has little to do with willpower. Alcoholics are in the grip of a powerful craving, or uncontrollable need, for alcohol that overrides their ability to stop drinking. This need can be as strong as the need for food or water.

Although some people are able to recover from alcoholism without help, the majority of alcoholics

need assistance. With treatment and support, many individuals are able to stop drinking and rebuild their lives.

Many people wonder why some individuals can use alcohol without problems but others cannot. One important reason has to do with genetics. Scientists have found that having an alcoholic family member makes it more likely that if you choose to drink you too may develop alcoholism.

Genes, however, are not the whole story. In fact, scientists now believe that certain factors in a person's environment influence whether a person with a genetic risk for alcoholism ever develops the disease. A person's risk for developing alcoholism can increase based on the person's environment, including where and how he or she lives; family, friends, and culture; peer pressure and even how easy it is to get alcohol.



Forty-four percent of the adult U.S. population (18 and older) are current drinkers who have consumed at least 12 drinks in the preceding year. Although most people who drink do so safely, the minority who consume alcohol heavily produce an impact that ripples outward to encompass their families, friends and communities. The following statistics give a glimpse of the magnitude of problem drinking:

- Approximately 14 million Americans—7.4 percent of the population—meet the diagnostic criteria for alcohol abuse or alcoholism.
- More than one-half of American adults have a close family member who has or has had alcoholism.
- Approximately one in four children younger than 18 in the United States is exposed to alcohol abuse or alcohol dependence in the family.

National Alcohol Screening Day will be held on Thursday. In recognition of this national outreach, Screening for Mental Health is offering members of the public the opportunity to take a confidential and free screening for alcohol problems online. 
