

# Yard care requirements released

*Residents must comply with regulations by May 2*



## Hourglass reports

The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Directorate of Public Works has released yard care requirements for residents of the community. These requirements

apply to all residential areas including family housing, unaccompanied personnel housing, trailers and bachelor quarters. Segregate discarded items and place curbside for pick-up by building and grounds.

## Residents must comply with the following requirements by May 2.

- Remove and/or thin out excess potted plants and shrubs.
- No yards filled with plants.
- Plants used for yard borders must be 2 feet apart edge to edge.
- Plants must not block egress from windows or doors and must be 42 inches away from the structure.
- Plants at BQs must be a minimum of 12 feet from the structure.
- Remove tarps and awnings in disrepair.
- Discard wooden pallets from yards.
- Concrete blocks shall not be used for landscaping. Concrete cylinders are acceptable. (Do not remove rocks from shore line for landscaping because they are there for shoreline protection).
- Replace broken pots and planters.
- Repair broken fences, gates or walls.
- Fix landscape curbing and borders that are in poor condition, including wooden trim, concrete cylinders, etc.
- Relocate shelving and storage containers from front or side of structure to the rear of the structure and inside the fence if the yard is fenced.
- Relocate sheds to rear of structure inside the fence if yards are fenced. Obtain permits for sheds from the housing office.
- Do not store excess items on the front porch, walkway or in the yard.
- Obtain permits for structures such as fences, decks, windscreens, and storage sheds IAW SPI 2600, through the housing office.
- Store construction materials neatly while in progress.
- Work must be completed and all construction material removed within 90 days of permit issuance.
- Paint decks and fences in compliance with SPI 2600.
- Obtain a permit or remove exterior antennas through the Facilities Operations Office.
- Remove newly planted coconut trees.
- Do not store or hang articles from rafters in front of the structure (bikes are acceptable).
- Store small watercraft (rafts, kayaks etc.) in rear of structure and inside the fence if yard has a fence. Larger watercraft must be stored at the small boat marina.
- Remove pet doors.
- Do not use vacant quarters for additional personal storage.
- Remove excess and broken bikes and/or parts or store out of sight.
- Remove broken items from yards and patios.
- Remove bathtubs stored in yards or used as planters.


## Small Arms Range hones firearm skills, increases readiness

Residents may have seen a notice on the roller or in *The Hourglass* for the small arms range being in operation every once in a while.

The purpose of the range is to provide a means to ensure Soldiers and police officers meet the minimum standards in accordance with Army regulation and/or contractual requirements in order to carry a weapon for military or law enforcement purposes, according to Maj. Johnny Davis, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll provost marshal.

The Kwajalein Police Department is the primary user of the facility, however, certain other people can use it, too. Anyone with a need to qualify with small arms on USAKA can use it. "This means KPD officers, USAKA Soldiers, any transient military with a requirement, and other organizations such as the Boy Scouts—who may use it for BB-gun target shooting and only with adult supervision. The range is restricted for individual use in target shooting, archery and any other device designed to propel a projectile that may injure or kill," Davis said.

While the range is in use boaters are not permitted to enter the area. Notices of operation times and dates can be found in *The Hourglass* and on the Roller. KPD uses the range once or twice a month. Davis said they try to schedule use on Tuesdays and Wednesdays when the marina is closed.

When at the range KPD officers fire M9 pistols and M16 rifles for initial and annual qualifications, and the Special Reaction Team qualifies with the M9 pistol and M16 rifle quarterly, but shoot the pistol every month to ingrain and maintain muscle memory firing. SRT policemen accomplish this by incorporating stress firing, reloading drills; shoot/don't shoot scenarios, speed drills and accuracy drills, Davis said. Soon the SRT will include the MP5-N sub-machinegun, and Remington Model 700P Police Sniper Rifle, he added.

Using the range is not all fun and games. Shooters are graded and must score appropriately. "KPD uses the Army's standard marksmanship target scoring by number of hits from various positions and distances to determine if an officer meets the minimum qualification requirements. Number of hits out of 50 rounds for pistol determines how proficient police and/or Soldiers are," Davis said.

Gary Belson of Yulee, Fla. trained the SRT in police close quarter defense tactics on April 5-7.

The team trained at the range in advanced firearm action drill and techniques of engaging multiple targets.

# Protecting workplace computer data

## *Behavior standards defend against cyber attacks, misuse*

"You are the first line of defense in the prevention of cyberspace attacks and system abuse/misuse," said Diana LaVigne, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Information Assurance manager.

"I strongly feel people are one of the most important aspects of IA," said LaVigne. "All the money and technology in the world won't help if the user doesn't understand the need for IA in their workplace. Everyone is an IA 'asset' and leaders establish the IA environment. People follow an example, good or bad, and a strong leader helps to ensure good IA practices are the norm."

According to LaVigne, a lot of people aren't familiar with the world of computer security and IA, even though computers are now part of everyday life. The question most often asked is "what is information assurance?"

LaVigne said, "IA provides a baseline for basic knowledge and understanding of requirements for protecting technology and information assets and spells out what users shall and shall not do on the various components of a system or network, including the type of traffic allowed on or accessed via the network."

According to LaVigne, the security-related decisions you make, or fail to make, largely determine how secure or insecure the network is (including the data/information stored on the network); how much functionality the network offers and how easy the network is to use is the answer to the second most asked question of "why have IA?"

LaVigne also recommends several standards of behavior to help prevent cyberspace attacks and system abuse or misuse. She said "users should always activate the password protected screen-saver or logoff when walking away from their system/workstation. Additionally, network privileges could be revoked if users should send chain letters or unsolicited religious, political, sexual or other inappropriate correspondence. Everyone should use basic 'good practices' such as respect the copyright on all software/materials, be careful what you download (including photos) and protect your equipment by keeping food, drink and electrical appliances away from your system/workstation and media." LaVigne added that users should follow proper shutdown procedures to power down and restart the system at the end of each day.

Government provided hardware and software is for conducting official, authorized government business. LaVigne identified some examples of authorized uses of government computers and software:

- Brief communications made by Department of Defense employees while they are traveling on government business to notify supervisor, co-workers or family members of official transportation or schedule

changes.

- Personal communications from the DoD employee's usual work place that are most reasonably made while at the work place (such as checking in with spouse or minor children; scheduling doctor appointments or brief internet searches)

She specified personal communication is only permitted when an agency designee determines the communication doesn't adversely affect the performance of duties; is of reasonable duration/frequency and whenever possible made during the employee's personal time, such as before/after duty hours or lunch periods. Additional categories which may be permissible include: If use serves a legitimate public interest; educates the DoD employee; improves the morale of employees stationed for extended periods away from home; enhances professional skills or job searching in response to federal government downsizing.

"Do not put federal government communications systems to uses that would reflect adversely on DoD or the DoD component, such as chain letters; unofficial advertising, soliciting or selling except on authorized bulletin boards established for such use; violations of statute or regulation; inappropriately handled classified information and other uses that are incompatible with public service," advised LaVigne. This is part of the agreement everyone subscribes to when using a government system or network.

Some things are never authorized and include, but are no limited to:

Pornography; chat rooms (other than DoD sanctioned chat rooms); ICQ/Yahoo/Instant Messenger, Real Player/Real Audio/Games over the Internet; activities for personal or financial gain such as chain letters, commercial solicitation, personal Web sites; storing or processing copyrighted material; storing, processing, displaying, sending, or otherwise transmitting offensive or obscene language or material such as 'hate literature', pornography and other sexually explicit materials; use of automatic push/pull Internet applications such as PointCast, ICQ, Stock/Sports Tickers; permitting any unauthorized individual access to a government-operated system; sharing, giving or loaning your user identification/password.

Using the Internet for other than authorized purposes will result in notification to the appropriate authorities and could result in possible administrative or disciplinary action according to LaVigne.

"Passwords are another basic of IA, and sometimes it seems we have too many. While easy for you to remember, you shouldn't use personal information, names, places or things that can be closely identified with you, as a password," said LaVigne. "Passwords should be at least 10 characters in length and must include at least two each of the following types: Numerical, special character, upper-case letter and lower-case letter. Never share with or tell anyone your password, including the Help Desk."


