I don't care how many painkillers, epidurals, breathing exercises or any of that other birth stuff men could have, I'm here to tell you our attitude would be no, no and hell no.


Men just want to pass out the cigars and wonder how they're going to pay for that little squalling bundle of joy to go to college some day.

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# Slain officers to be honored Monday

## Hourglass reports

Monday is National Peace Officers' Memorial Day. Peace Officers Memorial Day is in honor of the federal, state and municipal officers who have been killed or disabled in the line of duty and in recognition of the service given by the men and women who, night and day, stand guard in our midst to protect us through enforcement of our laws.

Kwajalein Police Department Chief Dennis Johnson said that 150 police officers have lost their lives in the line of duty during the past year. "This is a day of sharing. These are our brothers and sisters in a fraternity

of selfless service. They have families and friends who must also not be forgotten."

Johnson added that 53 percent of the officer deaths are a direct result of subject confrontation, and 44 percent involve vehicles. "We have officers here that have been face-to-face with these types of realities; Kwajalein offers a unique small-town environment with real-world threats that don't come with your typical small town. So the ability to provide a safe and friendly community policing program and at the same time be prepared to defend national security are the parameters our officers are challenged with. A day in remembrance is nice," Johnson said.

# Toughest job

## *Mothers juggle work, home, family*

"My mother had a great deal of trouble with me, but I think she enjoyed it," U.S. humorist Mark Twain said.

Mother's Day is Sunday. This holiday has been celebrated in the United States on the second Sunday of the month since 1914.

"For our family, May is a month of celebration, with two birthdays and Mother's Day," Kathy Ann Funk said. "This helps us to enjoy being together as a family even as we look to the end of a school year and the beginning of the summer schedule. So, Mother's Day is just one of our celebrations."

Funk is one of the many women on Kwajalein who balance life as a professional with life as a parent. She is the Transmitter Engineering Manager for AL-TAIR and the mother to two daughters.

"I have 2 beautiful daughters. Kelly is 20, which was traumatic for her because she is 'so old.' She is finishing up her sophomore year at Colorado State University with business and political science majors. Katie turned 18 on Wednesday. She is a graduating senior from Kwajalein High School. She plans on becoming an engineer, and will study at Florida Institute of Technology."

Katie is following in her mother's engineering footsteps, so in some ways her mother has been a mentor for her while her mother admits to aspiring to examples set by men. "I have no women mentors. I have been in a male-dominated environment from my college days on," Funk said. She was part of the first class at the U.S. Army Academy at West Point that included women, and then served in the Army. "Therefore, most of my role models have been male. I have observed how some of these good leaders balance strong career goals with service to their communities and families, and I have tried to be a role model like this for other women, and especially my own daughters."

Loretta Childers is another working mother on Kwajalein. She is the administrative assistant to the superintendent of schools. "The woman in my life who has been my mentor is my own mother," Childers said. "Through her example, I have learned a lot about being hospitable, gracious and giving. I fall far short, and my husband teases me all the time about being the spitting image of my father! My mother has always encouraged me, and has rarely criticized me, and to this day treats me like a princess."

Childers is the mother of three. Her eldest, Barry, 18, is graduating with Katie Funk. She also has a daughter, Shelley, 16, and another son, Danny who is 12.

"My children make every Mother's Day special, for

I relax on the couch, and they bring me everything, including food to eat. I don't have to lift a finger.

When they were a lot younger, I have happy memories of the little cards and gifts they would make at school, and then would surprise me. I still have many of those cards and gifts, for they were made with a lot of love," Childers said.

Funk and Childers agree that love is a mother's best gift to her children.

"To me, the most important thing a mother can do is love her children and teach them to become independent citizens who give back to society," Childers said.

Maggie Halliday's two boys are on their own now. Kyle is 27 and DJ is 24. For 30 years she was a registered nurse in labor and delivery, and a part-time childbirth instructor but she said, "Being a mom is tops in my life." She works two days a week at medical reception. Halliday said her fondest Mother's Day memories are of Sunday brunch with both her mother and mother-in-law and extended families. She added that her mother-in-law is her mentor. "She loves and respects each of her four boys for who they are and doesn't try to make them someone they're not."

"It is most important to love your kids whether you are proud of their behavior and accomplishments or not," Funk said. "I think many of us struggle with how hard we should work, how much time we should spend with friends, how independent or how pleasing we should be, and kids have the same struggles as they go through various stages of their life. The privilege comes when your kids want to know your opinion about things that really matter. I don't think kids really ask for advice unless they know you love them."

Halliday mirrored Funk's thoughts when she said her most important responsibility as a mother was, "Loving and respecting your kids and helping them be all they can be. Raising kids requires a lot of flexibility and communication between parents is most important."

Childers thinks moms and dads roles in parenting differ. "Parenting skills for fathers and mothers are not the same, for men and women tend to think differently. Most of the time, it's the mother who does the warm hugs and kisses, while the father wrestles and tickles. Both are ways of showing love. I always made sure my children were clean and fed. I do agree that mothers are there to focus on the day-to-day issues, but mothers also teach skills for the future (cleaning house, doing laundry, cooking, etc.)"

"I do think that some women and men tend to react differently to a particular issue, and that having both men and women as leaders helps make a stronger organization. When I was little, I was a bit sad that I was female, because I always wanted to go to work.

With the changes that have occurred in our country, I have been especially glad to be a female leader," Funk said.

She said that parents need to be aware of their children's development and how fluid it can be. "As I think back on our experience raising kids, I remember how many times I thought everything was great, and then something new happened for us to consider, and usually not good. But these are each part of character development, and often the basis for very good personal qualities within the correct bounds," Funk said. Funk advised parents-to-be to stay involved in their children's lives. "The early development years are fun and tiring, but these years really do fly by. Pre-teen and teenage years bring new challenges, and it can be hard to stay involved. We tried to plan vacations and other events that our kids would choose to do over their other commitments and friendships. If someone is planning on starting a family, they should know that being a parent never really ends. It is a lifetime commitment to someone that will stretch your emotional joys and sorrows, but is probably the most rich you can be."

Childers agreed and she shared advice she re-

ceived: "Enjoy your children at every stage of life they go through, for they will never repeat it. Don't look ahead, wishing they were already there, or look back, wishing they were at a different stage."

She added her own recommendation, "Talk everything out with your husband, and make sure you both understand your expectations involving children. Once the children come, be united in dealing with the different issues that will come up throughout their lives. Support each other, for children will try to 'divide and conquer'—after all, once the children leave, all you have left is each other."


Parenting is not done in a vacuum. "I am most proud of my two daughters," Funk said. "I may have had an impact on their early years, but there are many other people in the community that have mentored, guided and influenced them, especially as they grew older. We as a community really do influence what young people value. I am very glad to be a part of this community, where so many give and care."

"Having a family is the hardest job you'll ever have, but it is also the most rewarding. Have fun and enjoy because time goes by much too quickly," Halliday said.





# Triggerfish aggressively defend nests

Pat Zurich is an experienced diver. He has more than 1,500 dives in Kwajalein-area waters and that's not counting all of the other places in the world where he's spent time underwater. When someone with that much experience says something like, "Titan Triggers make me more nervous than sharks do," it seems like advice worth listening to.

"You see triggerfish a lot, and just about everywhere you dive here, both in the lagoon and on the reefs," Zurich said. And during nesting season they aggressively defend their home turf. Nesting season is now for the Titan according to Eric Nelson, diver and Kwajalein High School marine biology teacher.

In the last few weeks several divers have been telling stories of aggressive triggerfish. Kim Morris took home the prize for best dive story at Wednesday's Kwajalein Scuba Club meeting when she related a scary encounter with a triggerfish. She was diving with Zurich when the fish took offense to her proximity and went for her regulator.

"The problem is if you don't see them coming at you. Their attack is extremely fast," Zurich said.

"I have noted at least 11 different species. All have the potential to be aggressive. On the lagoon side we have about four that are troublesome," Nelson said. "By far, the most bothersome is the Titan Triggerfish. It is the largest. It lives both lagoon and ocean side, and the males like sandy bottoms to build their nests (they look like bowls in the sand). Most of the attacks are from them, but especially near Emon I see either the Wedge Trigger (Huma-huma-nuku-nuku-apu-a'a) sometimes being aggressive, as well as the White-barred trigger that some are calling the Picasso."

Titan is big for a trigger. A typical adult Titan Triggerfish grows to a maximum length of approximately 2.5 feet. "I've never seen them bigger than out here," Nelson said of his Titan spotting. The biggest I've seen was near Bigej pass." He added that the Wedge and White-barred Triggerfish are smaller than the Titan, "The other two are about the same size, let's say less than a foot," Nelson said.

And from the trivia department, Nelson said, "The family name is Balistoides...easy to remember because ballista is Latin for the large spear throwing devices of the roman empire, and trigger fish look like big spear/arrowheads."

"My experience around Kwajalein waters with Titans has been that they like to build their nests in sand or coral rubble in low areas on the reef and/or channels into the reef," Zurich said. He added that when they are out swimming along the reef they aren't a problem. "I always keep my eye on them. But, when you see one looking down into the sand in a low area on the reef, look out."

Zurich uses evasive maneuvers and distraction when he encounters an aggressive triggerfish. "I turn on my back and paddle off the reef, or away from the nest, while keeping my fins raised up to thwart an attack. My experience has been that the first charge will be a

direct shot right at their target, and if your fins are up front, they will first attack the fins. And, that once you move out of their territory, they will break off the attack," he said.

"They are definitely aggressive in the spring. And, the area on the West Reef, between SAR Pass and DCCB, has been the area where I have encountered the most numbers of aggressive triggers. My experience has been that they will defend their nest for approximately 20 feet or so in all directions from their nest, and this includes above it. One time I tried to ascend up and over the nest and was attacked and had a trigger bouncing off the bottom of my fins," Zurich said.

Nelson advised divers to watch out for triggerfish bites, "We have ciguatera in the local coral, and triggers eat corals. A trigger bite could have ciguatera toxin in it, so you might want to check with the hospital for appropriate monitoring and cleaning measures."

# New building opens new opportunities

## *Child Development Center gets more workspace*

Kwajalein Range Services Child Development Center expanded its workspace Thursday when they moved into a newly renovated house.

Building 213-A was a single-family dwelling occupied by a Boeing-sponsored family.

"Acquiring the new building has opened up a lot of opportunities for the CDC/SAS [School Age Services] programs and CYS [Child and Youth Services] as a whole. This is now a place to hold CYS staff functions," Aimee Pang, the new CDS/SAS director said.

She said the kitchen facility was the main reason for getting the house. "The kitchen space, with the added three-compartment sink and a commercial refrigerator and freezer,

has allowed us to follow TB MED 530 procedure in preparing snacks for the children in a safe manner. The space has also been made into a staff lounge; a space for staff and parent board meetings; a teacher work room with access to computers for lesson planning and parent-teacher conferences," Pang said.

The home-cum-business facility provides space for offices for the training and curriculum specialist as well as the director or the CDC/SAS program.

The extra support space comes in handy, especially since CDC now accepts children starting as young as two. "The CDC has expanded their service of care as of last year; we have lowered the age of enrollment from 2 ½ years to 2 years of age," Pang said.

Approximately 100 children are enrolled in the CDC and SAS pro-

grams; Pang said "We provide care for kindergartners who need before and after school care, along with full-day care when the elementary school is out."

Pang admitted that use of the new facility wouldn't have been possible without the help of many people. "There were a lot of people involved with making the house ready for move in; Colonel Stipe, USAKA, KRS management, Engineering and Planning, the FOM department, IT, and Communications department all had a hand in converting the house to an office," she said.

"The efforts put in to acquire the house have been put forth by many people and are the result of hard work done by Trina Tiffany, former CDC/SAS director. We want to thank her for her years of service. We wish her well as she moves on bigger and better things," Pang concluded.

**Grandma's Boy**, Alex (Allen Covert) is a 35-year-old video-game fanatic who gave up a career in accounting to take a job testing games for Brainasium, the company behind the wildly popular game "Eternal Death Slayer." While Alex took a big pay cut to land his dream job, he's happy with his work and is making ends meet — until he discovers that his roommate hasn't paid the rent for the last six months, using the money to finance repeated visits to a local massage parlor. After running out of friends who will let him sleep on their couch, Alex swallows his pride and moves in with his grandma Lily.

**When a Stranger Calls**, A teenage girl becomes a demented serial killer's prey in this big-budget remake of the 1979 thriller that became a TV late-show favorite. *When a Stranger Calls* takes its title and basic premise from the original, which — for its first 15 minutes or so — featured Carol Kane as a frazzled babysitter plagued by creepy, invasive phone calls. This time around, the doe-eyed Camilla Belle plays Jill Johnson, a high-schooler dealing with the usual set of crises: an unfaithful boyfriend, a bitchy best friend, and an over-the-limit cell phone bill. In order to pay for the latter, her father (Clark Gregg) has committed her to a babysitting gig with a wealthy family. At the isolated, palatial house, Jill settles in for a night of no-stress kid-watching. But it isn't long before someone starts anonymously calling the house with creepy, increasingly specific messages. Jill doesn't rule out anyone, but it becomes clear that whomever it is, he or she is watching her, and may be closer than she even suspects.

**Cheaper By the Dozen 2**, The jumbo-sized Baker family are back in this sequel to the 2003 box-office hit *Cheaper by the Dozen*. College football coach Tom Baker (Steve Martin) and his wife, author Kate Baker (Bonnie Hunt), have decided this time they took their sizable brood of 12 children on a summer vacation, and so they pack up the cars and take the kids to Lake Winnetka for some camping.

# Global War on Terror Honoring fallen heroes

The following 28 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism.

**Lance Cpl. Robert L. Moscillo**, 21, of Salem, N.H., died May 1 while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province, Iraq. He was assigned to the 1st Combat Engineer Battalion, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

**Sgt. Joseph E. Proctor**, 38, of Indianapolis, Ind., died May 3 in Tammam, Iraq when a suicide, vehicle-borne, improvised explosive device detonated near his observation post during dismounted combat patrol operations. Proctor was assigned to the Army National Guard's 638th Battalion (Aviation), Shelbyville, Ind.

**Capt. Brian S. Letendre**, 27, of Woodbridge, Va. died May 3 while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to the Marine Forces Reserve's Inspector and Instructor Staff, 1st Battalion, 25th Marine Regiment, 4th Marine Division, Plainville, Conn.

**Pfc. Christopher M. Eckhardt**, 19, of Phoenix died May 3 in Taji, Iraq from a non-combat related cause. Eckhardt was assigned to the 4th Battalion, 42nd Field Artillery, 1st Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood, Texas. The incident is under investigation.

**Pfc. Benjamin T. Zieske**, 20, of Concord, Calif., died May 3 of injuries sustained in Kirkuk, Iraq when an improvised explosive device detonated during a dismounted combat patrol. Zieske was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 327th Infantry Regiment, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), Fort Campbell, Ky.

**Cpl. Stephen R. Bixler**, 20, of Suffield, Conn. died May 4 while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to the 2nd Reconnaissance Battalion, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

**Sgt. Elisha R. Parker**, 21, of Taberg, N.Y., died May 4, while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to the 1st Combat Engineer Battalion, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton.

Two Soldiers died May 4 in Baghdad, Iraq when an improvised explosive device detonated near their RG-31 Mine Protected Vehicle during combat operations. Killed were: **Staff Sgt. Gavin B. Reinke**, 32, of Pueblo, Colo. and **Spc. Bryan L. Quinton**, 24, of Sand Springs, Okla. Reinke and Quinton were assigned to the 5th Engineer Battalion, 1st Engineer Brigade, Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

**Pft. Alva L. Gaylord**, 25, of Carrollton, Mo., died May 5 of injuries sustained in Qasr Ar Riyy, Iraq, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his RG-31 Mine Protected Vehicle during a combat clearing operation. Gaylord was assigned to the Army National Guard's 110th Engineer Battalion, Kansas City, Mo.

Three soldiers died May 5 in Baghdad when an improvised explosive device detonated near their HMMWV during combat operations. Killed were: **1st Sgt. Carlos N. Saenz**, 46, of Las Vegas, Nev.; **Spc. Teodoro Torres**, 29, of Las Vegas and **Sgt. Nathan J. Vacho**, 29, of Janesville,

Wis. Saenz and Torres were assigned to the Army Reserve's 490th Civil Affairs Battalion, Abilene, Texas. Vacho was assigned to the Army Reserve's 489th Civil Affairs Battalion, Knoxville, Tenn. During Operation Iraqi Freedom, all three were attached to the 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division.

Ten Soldiers died May 5 east of Abad, Afghanistan, in the Kunar province, when their CH-47 Chinook helicopter crashed during combat operations. Killed were: **Lt. Col. Joseph J. Fenty**, 41, of Florida; **Chief Warrant Officer Eric W. Totten**, 34, of Texas; **Chief Warrant Officer Christopher B. Donaldson**, 28, of Illinois; **Staff Sgt. Christopher T. Howick**, 34, of Hamburg, N.Y.; **Sgt. Bryan A. Brewster**, 24, of Fontana, Calif.; **Sgt. John C. Griffith**, 33, of Las Vegas; **Sgt. Jeffery S. Wiekamp**, 23, of Utopia, Texas; **Spc. Justin L. O'Donohoe**, 27, of San Diego; **Spc. David N. Timmons Jr.**, 23, of Lewisville, N.C. and **Pfc. Brian M. Moquin Jr.**, 19, of Worcester, Mass. # Notice of availability for environmental protection

Notice of Availability, USAKA Document of Environmental Protection for Air Emissions from Major Stationary Sources.

The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Environmental Standards require that the operating parameters of USAKA activities, with the potential to affect the public health and environment, must be defined in a Document of Environmental Protection. The standards further provide that regulatory agencies and the public be allowed to review and comment on a draft DEP. Due to significant changes to the document since the first publication,

USAKA is providing the expanded DEP document for public consideration prior to finalization.

The DEP for Air Emissions from Major Stationary Sources, May 2006, describes the emissions of air pollutants from existing major stationary sources with the addition of those on Omelek, and the construction and operation of new stationary sources at USAKA. This DEP establishes operational limitations for major air emission sources to maintain air quality standards.

The public is invited to review and comment on the document. This DEP and the USAKA Environmental Standards are available for review

at the Grace Sherwood Library, the Roi-Namur Library, and the Alele Museum and Library. Questions regarding the DEP can be directed to: Kenneth R. Sims, Environmental Management officer, USAKA (805) 355-8889.
