As anyone who's familiar with *The Hourglass* knows, every Saturday we publish the names of American service-members who have been killed in Iraq.


When I read those names and the circumstances of their deaths, I'm usually struck by three things. How very young they were and how, in almost every case, the cause of death was a roadside bomb, and the place it happened was Anbar Province.

I don't find it surprising that the alleged 'massacre' of 24 Iraqi civilians by U.S. Marines took place in the town of Haditha, which is in Anbar Province. Haditha is known as an insurgent stronghold where a lot of those bombs are probably made.

And if you take young men and women, teach them to kill, give them some of the most lethal weapons on earth and then put them in a situation where they see

their friends and comrades horribly maimed and killed day in and day out by an enemy they can't fight back against, why are we 'shocked' as some of our news reporters and politicians say they are, that something bad may have occurred?

Some of our Marines and Soldiers are on their second and third rotation to Iraq. For three years now, our troops have been subjected to an unseen enemy that kills them

U.S. military responds to quake victims

The U.S. military is sending about 100 troops to Indonesia to contribute to international humanitarian relief efforts in the wake of a devastating 6.2 magnitude earthquake that struck May 27 near the ancient city of Yogyakarta.

The deployment is part of a larger U.S. government response to a request from the government of Indonesia for humanitarian assistance, according to U.S. Pacific Command officials. The troops will come from the III Marine Expeditionary Force in Okinawa, Japan; U.S. Pacific Air Forces units in Guam; and the hospital ship *USNS Mercy*, which is

operating in the Philippines as part of a five-month medical deployment to Southeast Asia and Western Pacific countries, officials said.

The U.S. troops will bring surgical, shock trauma, laboratory, dental, X-ray, and preventive medicine expertise to the earthquake-ravaged area.

“Doctors, nurses, medical technicians, and supplies are rapidly deploying to Indonesia to support the humanitarian efforts near Yogyakarta. The goal is to reduce further loss of life and help alleviate human suffering,” said Air Force Brig. Gen. Dana Atkins, U.S. Pacific Command director of operations. “We offer our sincere condolences to the people of

Indonesia affected by this tragedy and will do our best to ease their suffering with available medical assets. The U.S. has strong regional ties to Indonesia, and we are a longstanding friend of the Indonesian people.”

The deployment of personnel from *USNS Mercy* will not affect the ship’s ability to continue the mission in the Philippines, officials said. The U.S. military and all organizations aboard the *Mercy* remain committed to providing humanitarian and civic assistance as previously planned, officials said.

The earthquake death toll has risen to more than 5,000 people, with about 6,500 seriously injured and 100,000 homeless.

Department of Defense grant funds Majuro Diabetes Wellness Center

U.S. Ambassador Greta Morris, RMI Minister of Health Alvin Jacklick, and the founder of Canvasback Missions, Jamie Spence, each spoke to a large audience of medical professionals and members of the general public at the May 11th opening of the Diabetes Wellness Center in Majuro, Republic of the Marshall Islands.

The new center is a joint project of the RMI Ministry of Health, Loma Linda University and Canvasback Missions. It is funded substantially by a grant of approximately \$800,000 from the U.S. Department of Defense.

“The goal of the wellness program is to reduce the high rate of diabetes by implementing lifestyle changes through education and exercise. It will also involve conducting research into the causes of RMI’s very high rate of diabetes, estimated to be around 30 percent,” Morris said.

She added, “According to preliminary research, inadequate nutrition and lack of exercise among residents of the Marshall Islands are major contributors in diabetic illness. Type II diabetes is a serious problem in the Marshall Islands and elsewhere, as well. Diabetes is an illness that has taken too many lives and has taken the joy out of the

lives of others. This does not have to be. Although individuals cannot always prevent diabetes, through proper care of our bodies—specifically proper diet and exercise—the vast majority of people can control the disease and continue to live active, productive and happy lives.” The grant titled *Diabetes and Wellness Outcomes Research* for the Republic of the Marshall Islands is administered by the U.S. Army Medical Research and Materiel Command and the Telemedicine and Advanced Medical Technology Research Center, according to Maj. Jeff Klein, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Host Nations officer. Canvasback Missions, Inc. proposed the grant in close coordination with RMI Ministry of Health and Loma Linda University.

Oversight for use of human subjects is provided by the RMI Internal Review Committee, the Loma Linda Medical University Internal Review Board and the USAMRMC Office of Research Protections.

The grant is for \$1,000,000 of which USAMRMC deducts \$177,000 for administrative costs leaving a balance of \$823,000.

The total cost of the center and its mainland support is more than \$1,200,000. The balance of approximately \$377,000 must be raised by Canvasback Missions, Inc.

“I am very pleased that the U.S. Department of Defense has provided this grant to Canvasback Missions to make this Center possible. This is a wonderful example of how the U.S. Government is working with faith-based organizations to achieve something very good for the people,” Morris said.

“I am convinced that this Diabetes Wellness Center will help the people of Majuro do that, by providing them with education on proper diet, exercise and lifestyle and actually providing them with a place where they can practice what they learn. This Diabetes Wellness Center will help contribute to two of the most important goals of the amended compact: promoting better health and improving education in the Marshall Islands. “The center demonstrates that, through better education about health, people can start living healthier, happier and more productive lives. It won’t just help the Marshallese people avoid and control diabetes; a healthier lifestyle will promote better health across the board,” the Ambassador said.

The center is located in a wing of the old hospital and includes a classroom, laboratory, offices, a kitchen/dining area and an aerobic exercise room.

Maintenance seminar conducted for 100 employees

Joel Levitt, a maintenance professional, spoke at the seminar, which was the first of its kind held on Kwajalein. His presentation addressed many maintenance issues that impact asset management challenges for one of the most corrosive environments in the world.

This seminar was part of an ongoing effort to communicate and implement the best methods available to manage RTS range assets for the entire atoll bringing it further in line with world class maintenance standards.

Since 1980 Levitt has been the president of Springfield Resources in Philadelphia; an organization of maintenance consultants in a wide variety of industries including pharmaceuticals, oil, airports, hospitals, high-tech manufacturing, school systems, and government organizations. He has worked both in highly regulated and unregulated, commercial and government, union and nonunion environments.

Levitt is a leading maintenance trainer throughout the United States, Canada, Europe and Asia. He has trained

Eight Below, Eight brave sled dogs search for the master who is looking for a way to rescue them in this adventure drama. An American geologist (Bruce Greenwood) flies to Antarctica to participate in a project at the United States Research Base, where he teams up with arctic guide Jerry Shepard (Paul Walker) and his best friend, Cooper (Jason Biggs). The scientist soon discovers that Shepard also has eight other valuable friends — a pack of sled dogs he's worked with for years, who have rescued him from a number of tight spots.

Firewall, A businessman becomes the last line of defense for his family and his business in this thriller. Jack Stanfield (Harrison Ford) is an upper-echelon technology executive at Landrock Pacific Bank, a leading financial institution based in Seattle. Stanfield oversees security for Landrock, and has made sure that their online banking services are the best-protected in the world, and that the bank's data is safe from hackers and other intruders. However, Stanfield finds out the hard way that his system does indeed have a flaw when he's visited by Bill Cox (Paul Bettany), a cold and calculating man who has spent months learning everything there is know about Stanfield and his family.

Global War on Terror Honoring fallen heroes

The following 11 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism.

Pfc. Caleb A. Lufkin, 24, of Knoxville, Ill., died on May 25, at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Washington, D.C., of injuries sustained on May 4, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his RG-31 Mine Protected Vehicle during combat operations in Baghdad, Iraq. Lufkin was assigned to the 5th Engineer Battalion, Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

Two Soldiers died May 25 in Baghdad when an improvised explosive device detonated near their HMMWV during combat operations. Both soldiers were assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 6th Infantry, 2nd Brigade, 1st Armored Division, Baumholder, Germany. Killed were: **Capt. Douglas A. Diczenco**, 30, of Plymouth, N.H. and **Spc. Robert E. Blair**, 22, of Ocala, Fla.

Lance Cpl. Kevin A. Lucas, 20, of Greensboro, N.C., died May 26, while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province, Iraq. He was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 8th Marines, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Spc. J. Adan Garcia, 20, of Irving, Texas, died on May 27, when his convoy encountered small arms fire received while returning from an explosive ordnance mission. Garcia was assigned to the 1st Brigade Special Troops Battalion, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry), Fort Drum, N.Y.

Spc. Jeremy M. Loveless, 25, of Estacada,

Ore., died Monday in Mosul, Iraq when his Stryker came under enemy small arms fire during combat operations. Loveless was assigned to the Army's 2nd Battalion, 1st Infantry Regiment, 172nd Stryker Brigade Combat Team, Fort Wainwright, Alaska.

Capt. James A. Funkhouser, 35, of Katy, Texas, died Monday in Baghdad of injuries sustained when a vehicle-borne improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during reconnaissance patrol operations. Funkhouser was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 12th Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

Two Marines, **Cpl. Richard A. Bennett**, 25, of Girard, Kan. and **Capt. Nathanael J. Doring**, 31, of Apple Valley, Minn. Both Tuesday, following a non-hostile helicopter accident near Al Taqaddum, Iraq, on May 27. Both were assigned to Marine Light/Attack Helicopter Squadron-169, Marine Aircraft Group-39, 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Spc. Bobby R. West, 23, of Beebe, Ark., died Tuesday in Baghdad of injuries sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated during dismounted patrol operations. West was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 22nd Infantry Regiment, 1st Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood.

Cpl. Alexander J. Kolasa, 22, of White Lake, Mich., died Wednesday in Baghdad of non-combat related causes. Kolasa was assigned to the 704th Main Support Battalion, 4th Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood.

more than 9,000 maintenance professionals from 20 countries in more than 475 sessions.

Levitt's maintenance principles were found to be very informative and gave employees a better understanding of how to further utilize maintenance and asset management principles in their own work areas.

Attendees had the opportunity to share their own challenges and solutions to maintenance with other departments. Comments that further endorsed the value of the seminar were that "It made us more aware of costs related to preventive maintenance activities," and that "It emphasized the importance of data, moving us toward a more accurate and educated level of decision making."

The Mission Operations Maintenance Management Department views this seminar as an important step toward further

progress and implementation of Maintenance Management as not only a PWS contract requirement but a better way to conduct standard maintenance policies. Responsibility for millions of dollars of USAKA assets has made this seminar an invaluable opportunity for KRS and other contract employees. It provided awareness of concepts and tools that document percentage of availability by tracking mean time between failures and mean time to repair allowing departments to adjust preventative and corrective maintenance schedules to preclude breakdowns, loss of availability, and keep equipment functioning at optimal capacity.

Levitt suggests in his Handbook of Maintenance Management that "the new paradigm of business is to focus on streamlining, reducing inputs, and making processes more responsive and efficient."

one or two at a time on an almost daily basis.

If the allegations about what those Marines supposedly did turns out to be true, I wouldn't be surprised that it happened. I'm surprised that it hasn't happened more often.

Can any of us imagine what it must be like to go on a foot patrol or ride in a convoy not knowing what's waiting around every corner, in every window, on every rooftop or in every mound of dirt along the road? The pressure, tension and fear must be almost unbearable.

So, if those Marines snapped after seeing another one of their own killed

by yet another bomb they couldn't protect themselves from, it may not be condonable, but it's certainly understandable.

I want to throw a brick through my TV when I see the wailing and wringing of hands by some of the pundits and by some politicians who call those Marines murderers and 'bad apples.' I'd like to point out that as far as I know, nothing's been proven yet.

But, the Marines who were placed in that impossible situation will no doubt be thrown to the wolves to appease the political gods.

The Marines and all the American Armed Forces have a long history of

honorable service and humane treatment of their enemies and especially of women and children. So when something like this takes place, it hurts because Americans have always seen themselves as being better.

War is a horrible thing. People die in war. That's why it should always be the very last resort.

I don't know what really happened in Haditha. I hope it wasn't the slaughter that it's been painted to be.

But in any case, maybe we should ponder if too much is expected of our Marines and Soldiers in Iraq.

We are asking them to be saints in the middle of a place that's hell.
