

Playing a dangerous, losing game

For those who might think that what's going on in Lebanon with Hezbollah is a recent thing and involves only the Israelis, here's a little history lesson.

In 1982, French, American and Italian troops made up a peacekeeping force to get the Palestinian Liberation Organization out of Lebanon, try to stop a civil war, and keep a buffer between the Israelis and Islamic terrorists.

Hezbollah had been newly formed in Lebanon under the auspices of Iran and lost no time in attacking the French.

They fired rockets (obtained from Iran) on French troops, hijacked an Air France jet in Tehran and blew up a French barracks and killed 58 French soldiers (along with the 241 U.S. Marines who were killed in another barracks bombing) and attempted to murder French diplomats in their embassy in Lebanon.

French intelligence knew that Hezbollah was funded by and followed orders from Iran. At that time, Saddam Hussein's Iraq was at war with Iran and the French were supporting Iraq. So Iran, through Hezbollah, was determined to strike at France.

After the murder attempt on their diplomats, the French ineptly tried (and failed) to blow up the Iranian embassy in Beirut.

They also made several bombing strikes on Hezbollah training camps and succeeded in killing dozens of Hezbollah members and several others who were identified as Iranian 'advisers.'

In revenge, Hezbollah then bombed the French embassy in Kuwait and later, the main Marseilles train station in France itself.

In 1984, the French left Lebanon. The U.S. Marines had withdrawn in 1983 following the barracks bombing.

But Hezbollah and Iran weren't done with France yet. Even after the French Army left Lebanon, Hezbollah kidnapped 16 French citizens there. They were held captive for three years and one was murdered as 'revenge' for the French support of Iraq.

Between 1985 and 1986, Hezbollah (directed by Iran) conducted a terror campaign in France that killed dozens and injured hundreds of people. France caved in and began refusing to label Hezbollah as a terrorist organization and changed its foreign policy so as not to anger Iran.

The withdrawal of American and French troops from Lebanon emboldened Iran and other terrorist-sponsoring Muslim nations. Western countries should have hung tough against them 20 years ago, but look what 20 years of appeasement

has wrought. And yet, the world still doesn't want to really confront them.

What gets to me about all this is how France, of all countries, isn't ready to march shoulder to

shoulder with Israel to rid the world of the cancer of Hezbollah and other terrorist organizations that are directly linked to Iran, and as I said before, settle some scores.

How can they let Hezbollah and Iran, who have caused their country so much grief and suffering, just go on doing business as usual? How can they want Israel to withdraw when Israel is doing the world's business of at least weakening Hezbollah, if not destroying them. And now comes word from the Israelis that they believe Iranian soldiers are crossing the Syrian border and joining Hezbollah


How can Germany, Italy, Spain, Russia and other western nations, who have all been touched by deadly terrorism, not be willing to join in the fight against this very common enemy? Why are the Israelis fighting this battle alone?

But now, even the United States is calling for Israel to stop the fighting. The western world is ready to run and stick its head in the sand just like it did 20 years ago.

How can they not see that an Israeli defeat would be a defeat for all of us and would be looked upon as a victory not only for Hezbollah but also Iran and Syria, just as the withdrawal of America and France was seen as a victory, and would make them heroes to all the radical Islamic world? That can't be allowed to happen. They are masters of the public relations war as it is. They must be because a lot of people don't see the fight between Israel and Hezbollah as part of a war against terror. I find that unbelievable.

I'm not a smart man, so I guess I shouldn't be surprised that I can't figure out why the rational world doesn't unite against these people. But I think I'm intelligent enough to know that at this point in time, there has never been a graver danger to humanity than right now. I don't know how anyone could be blind enough not to see that.

Iran is at the center of the storm and has to be confronted by the rational countries of the world. This could be the opportunity to correct past sins of omission. It's fight them

PEOPLE'S VISION

Opening ceremony of Nitijela held Monday

Twice a year the Republic of the Marshall Islands holds a ceremony to open its parliament, or Nitijela.

The second session ceremony was held on Monday.

RMI President Kessai H. Note said "the Marshall Islands is still on course," in a national address delivered during the opening.

The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll was represented by Maj. Jeff Klein, Host Nations officer and his wife Janice; Capt. Eric Everts, ICBM test director for the Reagan Test Site, Noda Lojkar, RMI ombudsman, and his wife Hemikko and Roberta Jones, USAKA protocol officer.

"The opening of the Nitijela is the equivalent of the opening of our Congress. As a prominent member of the Marshall Island's community, USAKA is demonstrating its respect for the democratic institutions of the RMI as well as showing our respect and appreciation for our host country," Klein said.

"We're still on course with the peoples' vision," Note said before a packed chamber and live national broadcast. The president was referring to Vision 2018, a plan established in 2000 when the president's administration came into office.

"Education, health, prosperity, peace, protection of our lands, protection of our customary values, respecting others, democracy, freedom and trusting in God are foundations of Vision 2018," Note said.

He added that the Marshall Islands is a member to the Millennium Development Goals and the Pacific Vision. "The Vision 2018, the Pacific Vision and the United Nations Millennium Development Goals en-

sure that the international community, the Pacific family and the people of the Marshall Islands live under the human fundamental rights of freedom, democracy and the rule of law."

Note said that the government continues to place education and health as the top priorities, pointing out that the budget for this year will reflect the continuing efforts to renew and build new buildings for both sectors. This year, the efforts to build new schools in the outer islands, Majuro and Ebeye will continue, and new medical dispensaries will be built in the outer islands this year according to the president. The president also said that the second phase to expand the Lerioj Atma Medical Center on Majuro will start soon with \$5 million funding made available in the FY 2007 global budget.

Note highlighted the need to move forward with the constitutional referendum. "A recent survey by EPPSO shows that the Marshallese people want to hold a constitutional convention and the right to directly elect their president," Note said. He said the survey revealed that between 77 and 95 percent of the islands were in favor to hold a convention.

The president said that the government will continue to talk with the Congress and administration in regards to the changed circumstances petition, and said that the government will support the lawsuits filed by Bikini and Eniwetok.

Bugle calls honor American flag, our military traditions

The following information is offered to explain the traditions and courtesies affiliated with the bugle calls played daily on Kwajalein.

- **REVEILLE:** Is traditionally played at dawn on military installations to coincide with the raising of the national colors. In deference to the community, *Reveille* will be played at 7 a.m. Formal courtesies are rendered for *Reveille*. For the community, this means stop what you are doing (dismount your bicycle or vehicle) if you are within range of the music, face the music or the flag and stand silently until the music is finished (about 30 seconds.)

- **CALL TO MESS:** Is played to signal mealtime. *Call To Mess* will be played at noon, and does not require formal courtesies. *Call To Mess* lasts about 20 seconds.

- **RETREAT:** Is played at 5 p.m. to signal the end of the official duty day. The community will notice military members facing the music or flag while at position of parade rest (hands behind their backs.) The Kwajalein community should render formal courtesies as described in *Reveille*. *Retreat* plays for approximately 30 seconds.

- **TO THE COLORS:** On the first note of *To The Colors*, the community will notice military members assuming the position and rendering a hand salute. *To The Colors* will be played immediately following *Retreat* as the flag is lowered. *To The Colors* should be regarded with the same civilian courtesies as the

national anthem, and lasts about 90 seconds.

- **TATTOO:** Signifies that it is time for loud talking and other disturbances to be discontinued. This will be played at 9 p.m. and will take approximately two minutes. No formal courtesies are required.

- **TAPS:** *Taps* is the last bugle call of the day. On most military installations *Taps* is played at 11 p.m., however, on Kwajalein it is played immediately following *Tattoo*.

When *Reveille*, *Retreat*, and *To The Colors* are played the community can actively participate by removing their hats and standing silently.

New dentist perfect fit for Kwajalein

Step into Dr. Monte Junker's office and you can not help but notice the huge world map pinned to the wall next to his desk and the bumper sticker-on-steroids above it cataloging Junker's hobbies.

The bumper sticker simply says, "I love boating, camping, fishing, golfing, hiking and skiing," and would fill the entire bumper of a very large vehicle. Stop right here and you would have all the information you would need to get to know the new dentist on Kwajalein.

Junker arrived on Kwajalein in July with his young daughters, Danielle, 8, and Chelsea, 7, and their cat, Kuching. The word Kuching is Indonesian for cat. Junker's wife, Dr. Barbara Junker, also a dentist, will work in the Kwajalein dental clinic as the dental office lead and part-time dentist when she arrives later this month. Back in Seattle, Barbara is in the process of selling their dental practice of nine years, but plans to move to Kwajalein.

The Junker's move to Kwajalein has been two years in planning. "I had a consultant for my dental clinic that had done some consulting for the this dental clinic, she came to me and told me about this place and said, 'This is you.' She knew my background," said Junker, "and I said I can't do it, I have a house and kids. But two years ago we said, 'Why not, let's do it.'"

Junker started his career as an elementary school teacher for three years and then taught science at the middle school level another four years. Bored and burnt

out on teaching, Junker decided to give dentistry a try.

"Teaching middle school can be very frustrating. Teenagers are great for a while, but I needed a job where I could use my science background and work with my hands, as I enjoy doing artwork. Dentistry is a combination of the two, science and art. I must say that I am very happy to be a dentist," said Junker

After graduating from University of Texas Health Science Center San Antonio with his DDS degree, Junker joined his wife in their dental practice, but felt the pull to teach again. For the past six years Junker has been an associate professor at the University of Washington dental school teaching implant treatment, while continuing to practice dentistry.

"The one thing I do that hasn't been done out here is implants," said Junker. Junker is a general dentist with extensive training in the surgical placement and restoration of dental implants. Tucked in a corner of his office is Junker's surgical kit and equipment he

carried with him so that he can provide implant treatment on Kwajalein. "Patients need to understand that this set of procedures will only be available as long as I am working here," said Junker.

Determined to satisfy his love of learning, Junker hopes to assist in a study on Ebeye and Majuro researching the use of Xylitol, run by the University of Washington. Xylitol is an "artificial sweetener that has been shown to possibly reduce cavities," said Junker. "They're doing this study with Marshallese kids trying to have them chew gum or gummy bears with this sugar in it. Hopefully it will reduce some of the cavity problems they are having."

Remember the map in Junker's office? It hints at his childhood and is a tactile expression of his personal motto, "Have passport, will travel," a motto he developed as a young boy. "I'm an oil field brat," said Junker laughing.


"From the time I was 11, to the time I graduated high school, I lived in various countries. My parents took two to three vacations a year for a week at a time and we got to see India, Pakistan, all of Europe and Sri Lanka. I was in Lebanon two weeks before the civil war broke out in 1975," commented Junker. "I got to see a lot of places that a lot of kids never did. I have the travel bug, and I want to give my kids the same opportunity to see more.

"We liked Seattle as a city, but for what we like to do it wasn't the right environment," commented Junker. Both Junkers are certified divers looking forward to exploring the Kwajalein lagoon, snorkeling at Emon beach and sailing. Drawn to the water, Junker already misses the 20-foot Hobie Cat he sold before coming to Kwajalein.

Two weeks after arriving, Junker has joined the Yacht Club, took the tests for his B-Boat license and started his search for a new sailboat to purchase.

"I want to go out, drop anchor and go camping," said Junker. "I love to go camping, and a boat would give us the freedom to go do the islands."

Life on this island would seem to be a perfect fit for someone who grew up traveling the world. "After living in Dubai in the 1970s, this place is sweet," said Junker. Now all Junker needs is an 'I love Kwajalein' bumper sticker for his office wall.

Community generosity feeds guest students

The schools within the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll do not have lunch service. All students, from kindergarten through high school must fend for themselves at the mid-day meal time. This is not much of a challenge for the majority of young people because this



is a small island and home isn't far away. They can jump on their bikes or hot foot it, to their houses and get lunch

with mom or dad or both.

It is not so simple for the students attending Kwajalein schools as a part of the guest student program. Home is a ferry-ride away on Ebeye.

So each school day there are 55 young people who need lunch.

Lunch for the guest students has been provided through private donations for the past four years according to Loretta Childers, administrative assistant to the school superintendent. Childers is also the go-to person for the guest student lunch program.

"It takes \$14,850 to support the program annually," Childers said. That breaks down to \$270 per child.

School lunches vary day-to-day; everything from chicken and rice

to a sandwich and chips, according to Childers. She added that without the donated meals, many of the children would not have lunch.

The meals are prepared through Kwajalein Range Services Dining Services and delivered to the school for distribution.

Elementary school students eat in a room with adult supervision. The junior and senior high school students eat where they choose. Stephen Howell, high school principal, said that there is an open campus policy for junior and senior high school students.

British police arrest 21 terror suspects, search on for an additional 10 suspects

The overnight arrests of 21 suspected terrorists by British authorities is a stark reminder that the United States is still at war with "Islamic fascists" who are intent on destroying freedom-loving people, President Bush said Friday.

The suspects are thought to have been ready to unleash a plot to bomb multiple international flights bound for the United States. Officials said the suspects planned to carry liquid explosives onto about 10 commercial airplanes.

"I want to thank the government of Tony Blair and officials in the United Kingdom for their good work in busting this plot," Bush said while standing on the tarmac at Austin Straubel International Airport, in Green Bay, Wis. "I thank the officials in Washington, D.C., and around our country who gather intelligence and who work to protect the American people."

Bush said cooperation between British and American authorities was solid, and the cooperation among agencies within the U.S. government was excellent. He added that the United States is safer today than it was before the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, because of security improvements made since that attack.

"But obviously we're still not completely safe, because there are people that still plot and people who

want to harm us for what we believe in," the president said.

Bush said travelers are going to be inconvenienced as a result of the steps taken to further tighten airport security, but he urged patience and vigilance. "The inconveniences occur because we will take the steps necessary to protect the American people," he said.

Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff said Friday that the investigation into the bomb plot is ongoing.

"This plot appears to have been well planned and well advanced, with a significant number of operatives," Chertoff said. He described the plot as sophisticated in nature and "suggestive of an al Qaeda plot."

Chertoff said the arrests in Britain have significantly disrupted a major threat. "But we cannot assume that the threat has been completely thwarted or that we have fully identified and neutralized every member of this terrorist network," he added.

Reports indicate that U.S. and British intelligence agencies continue to search for 10 additional suspects.

The United States raised the nation's threat level for commercial flights originating in the United Kingdom and bound for the United States to its highest alert level of Severe or Red. The threat level for all other flights was raised to High or Orange.

Airport security notice

Carry on luggage will undergo hands-on inspections until further notice according to the Maj. Johnny Davis, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll provost marshal. The inspections are in response to heightened air travel risks. Davis said that passengers will not be allowed to carry containers holding liquids, gels, aerosols, perfumes or toothpaste, including bottles of water. Airport security personnel will search carry on luggage, "When things are identified they will be taken out of your luggage," Davis said. Baby formula, bottled breast milk, prescription drugs with the patients name on the label and insulin will be allowed in carry-on luggage.

V for Vendetta Based on the graphic novel by Alan Moore, *V for Vendetta* takes place in an alternate vision of Britain in which a corrupt and abusive totalitarian government has risen to complete power. During a threatening run in with the secret police, an unassuming young woman named Evey (Natalie Portman) is rescued by a vigilante named V (Hugo Weaving) — a caped figure both articulate and skilled in combat. V embodies the principles of rebellion from an authoritarian state, donning a mask of vilified would-be terrorist of British history Guy Fawkes and leading a revolution sparked by assassination and destruction. Evey becomes his unlikely ally, newly aware of the cruelty of her own society and her role in it.

Benchwarmers Three guys with little athletic ability strike a blow for everyone chosen last at recess in this comedy. Clark (Jon Heder), Gus (Rob Schneider), and Richie (David Spade) are three geeky guys who have spent most of their lives being humiliated by bullies and taunted by people with greater hand-eye coordination than they possess (which is nearly everyone). While the three guys love baseball, they've been treated like losers on the diamond ever since their days riding the pine in Little League. One day they stop by a softball field at a local park and a bunch of kids practicing for Little League tryouts try to heckle them into going home. Clark, Gus, and Richie challenge the kids to a game — three against nine — and miraculously don't entirely humiliate themselves. Mel (Jon Lovitz), a guy with an athletically-challenged son of his own, is impressed with the nerdy trio's nerve, and offers to set up a tournament in which the three inept grown-ups will take on the best Little League teams from around the state. Clark, Gus, and Richie accept the offer, and they soon become unlikely heroes to the bullied, clumsy, and awkward everywhere.

American Dreamz The president of the United States (Dennis Quaid) seems to be having a nervous breakdown after picking up a newspaper for the first time in four years, and when his chief of staff (Willem Dafoe) determines to get the commander in chief out of his pajamas and back into the spotlight, the stage is set for a talent contest that the nation will never forget.

Honoring fallen heroes

The following 12 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism

Sgt. Joshua A. Ford, 20, of Wayne, Neb., died on July 31 during combat operations in Al Numanayah, Iraq. Ford was assigned to the Army National Guard 189th Transportation Company, 485th Corps Support Battalion, Norfolk, Neb.

Petty Officer 2nd Class Marc A. Lee, 28, of Hood River, Ore., was killed on Aug. 2 during combat operations while on patrol in Ar Ramadi, Iraq. Lee was an aviation ordnance man and a member of a West Coast-based SEAL Team.

Lance Cpl. Kurt E. Dechen, 24, of Springfield, Vt., died Aug. 3 from wounds received while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province, Iraq. Dechen was assigned to 1st Battalion, 25th Marine Regiment, 4th Marine Division, while attached to Regimental Combat Team 5, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Sgt. George M. Ulloa Jr., 23, of Austin, Texas, died Aug. 3 from wounds suffered while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to 2nd Tank Battalion, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Staff Sgt. Daniel A. Suplee, 39, of Ocala, Fla., died on Aug. 3 at James A. Haley Veterans Hospital, Tampa, Fla., of injuries sustained on April 1 in Kabul, Afghanistan, when his HMMWV was involved in a traffic accident. Suplee was assigned to

the National Guard 153rd Cavalry Squadron, Ocala.

Staff Sgt. Clint J. Storey, 30, of Enid, Okla., and Sgt. Bradley H. Beste, 22, of Naperville, Ill., died in Ar Ramadi, on Aug. 4, when an improvised explosive device detonated near their HMMWV while conducting combat operations. Both Soldiers were assigned to the 1st Cavalry Regiment, 1st Armored Division, Friedberg, Germany.



now or fight them later. But either way, the fight is here and it's in the form of bombs on subways, bombs on airplanes, suicide bombers or other terrorist acts. And it's never, never going to stop. Anyone who thinks it will is in a dream world.

The basic problem is that European countries have large Muslim populations that they are scared to death of. But France and the rest of the Europeans face a decision. Is their way of life and their cultures worth fighting for or

aren't they? Are they ready to act to rid the world of the biggest danger its ever faced? If they aren't, they're just playing a dangerous waiting game that the terrorists will win.

Now, as I was writing this, came the news of the British breaking up a terrorist operation that would have brought down 20 or more airplanes and killed hundreds or perhaps thousands of people. The world owes British intelligence a great debt for stopping it.

I don't know what could make it

any clearer that we are in a world war with an enemy whose goal is a world dominated by Islam and who will stop at nothing to achieve that goal. They know they have the western world's weakness and unwillingness to confront them on their side.

This has been called the 'long war.' That's pretty worrisome because the Islamic radicals don't care how long it takes.

Time is their best friend and it's our worst enemy.

In addition, almost all liquids have been temporarily banned from commercial flights, and several states have enhanced airport security measures by deploying National Guard troops there.

"I have ordered the re-deployment of security assets to high priority locations to respond to this threat -- these assets include bomb-sniffing dogs, the California National Guard, and the California Highway Patrol, in concert with local and federal law enforcement agencies," Calif. Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger said in a written statement.

Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney ordered the Massachusetts National Guard to bolster airport security in the commonwealth.

"We've done this mission before, and we're ready to do it again," said Brig. Gen. Oliver J. Mason, the adjutant general of the Massachusetts National Guard. The commonwealth's Guard units helped secure its airports after the Sept. 11 attacks.

The role of the National Guard in airport security is to support or augment, not replace, airport security and law enforcement authorities, Guard officials said.
