

Hello again, our old friends

Buck family visits Kwajalein after Bible dedication

The laughter of one person was missing when the Buck family stopped on Kwajalein after participating in the dedication of the completed translation of the Kosraean Bible on Kosrae, Aug. 9. That person was Alice Buck, the same woman instrumental in getting the Bible translated into the Kosrae language.

Elden Buck, Alice's husband and the Kwajalein Protestant chaplain for 18 years, and 19 family members of the Buck clan were treated to a dinner in their honor by the Protestant Chapel congregation on Monday.

"When I was here two years ago several of you said, 'Why don't you stop on Kwaj with your family,'" Elden said, laughing. "When I mentioned it to Lisa and Lauren they were ecstatic because they had been here all through school...it was just too important a place to land and then take off again."

Alice and Elden are beloved people on Kwajalein and on Ebeye, where Alice worked 18 years translating the Marshallese Bible and Elden pastored and headed up the church school. The Buck family spent Tuesday evening on Ebeye, touring the island and showing the youngest family members where they grew up.

But the sole purpose of their trip was to celebrate the dedication of the completed translated Kosraean Bible, a project Alice had nurtured and guided since 1992. Twenty-one family members and friends made the trip to Kosrae together to witness the completion of Alice's painstaking work.

"Because Alice had been so concerned and excited about the whole family being in Kosrae, and when she died so suddenly, the family wanted very much to honor her by going ahead with what she had hoped for," said Elden.

"Part of me was thinking she should have been here to hear all of these accolades and the joy and experience, but really she was in very many ways. She was smack in the middle of it, not just being mentioned by name but in our hearts."

Unfortunately, Alice was unable to experience the completed work. She finished revising the spelling in March and was almost finished with the glossary when she died of stomach cancer in June, 2004.

"She worked at her computer up until four days before she died, trying to complete the glossary. I walked into her office and she was shaking. She was very, very ill. I told her that I thought she should rest," said Elden. "And she turned to me and said something which she had never said before, and that was, 'You know Elden, I think you can finish this.'"


"We were just thrown for a loop when she died," continued Elden. "It was a sad time for the whole family, and the Kosraean church." Having worked together for all of the 49 years they were married, Buck agreed to pick up where Alice left off when the Kosraeans asked for his help. He continued work on the glossary by e-mail from his computer in Claremont, Calif.

Although 9,000 copies of the translated Bible have been printed, only 96 Bibles made it to Kosrae. The Bible Society could not guarantee to have the Bibles ready and shipped in time for the dedication. Only after a little prodding from Elden, was a shipment airmailed to Kosrae where they arrived the day before the event.

A 1,000 people attended the dedication service that was both exciting and bittersweet for the Buck family. On that day Lisa Haley, Alice's daughter, hung her mother's necklace around her neck, while her sister wore one of Alice's rings.

"Part of me was thinking she should have been here to hear all of these accolades and the joy and experience, but really she was in very many ways. She was smack in the middle of it, not just being mentioned by name but in our hearts," said Lauren Buck-Medeiros, another daughter. "I just looked around at the students she taught, the elderly people who mentored her, the ones who really impassioned her for this work, everything felt very right that it was finally happening."

"She loved working on this project. It was so important. It wasn't like working on a needlecraft kind of a hobby," said Buck-Medeiros. "This is going to plant a seed and have an impact for generations to come." At the end of this month, 9,000 Kosraeans will have the chance to read the entire Bible in their own language, a lifetime of work come full circle thanks to Alice Buck.

Responding to a great need

U.S. Pacific Command funds school repairs

29th Engineer Battalion team is excited to make a difference by repairing Enniburr School

The Enniburr school facility will undergo extensive building repairs in the next five months thanks to a humanitarian assistance project authorized by the U.S. Department of Defense.

The U.S. Pacific Command, the multi-service combatant command responsible for overseeing all DoD operations in the Pacific region, green lighted the \$65,000 project to repair the deteriorating school

where approximately 250 of the children living on Enniburr Island are educated.

"The school is near closure due to structural concrete damage," said Floyd Corder, KRS Roi-Namur operation's manager. A hazard for its students and teachers, the school principal voiced concern asking if and when the school would undergo renovation "before someone was going to be injured," according to Noda Lojkar, representative of the government of the Republic of the Marshall Islands.

"Since the 1999 renovation, the school's east cinderblock wall, which is very close to the windward shore line of the island, has significantly deteriorated as evidenced by cracks and spalling concrete," said James Landgraff, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll engineer. The damage is the results of untreated rebar reacting with salt air, swelling the concrete to the point of cracking.

The funds will be used to repair the ocean-side retaining wall, replace the ceiling at the eaves, fix and reinforce the roof, and replace the window sills and jams as well as cover the costs of manpower, materials, equipment rental and troop sustainment.

USAKA enlisted the aid of Sol-

diers from the 29th Engineer Battalion, the same team that worked on the Palm Bachelors Quarters explosive reduction.

Unlike their work on Kwajalein, the Soldiers demolished the specified school walls completely by hand using sledgehammers, pick axes and shovels. The Soldiers had to refrain from using any heavy machinery to avoid unnecessary damage to the school building.

These young men are excited about serving this community, in particular the children of Enniburr, and plan to build a rope swing when the demolition is complete. Commenting on the circumstances of the Enniburr community Cpl. David Yadon said, "You see it on TV and you don't really know. And then you get here and see it, and bam." He continued, "It's great coming over hear and helping out. The kids come out and watch us."

Still in the early stages, completion of the Enniburr school repair project rests on the collaborative efforts of the USAKA Public Works department, the Host Nations Activities office and Kwajalein Range Services. From start to finish the project is estimated to take from 60

to 90 days according to Corder.

Corder identified the deterioration of the Enniburr school to the HNA office in July 2005, which reported it as a possible aid project to PACOM. "While this project is very important to us, the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan have been receiving priority in funding and manpower; in the current overall world picture, we are relatively a lower priority," said Alan Taylor, the RMI Relations specialist with the HNA office. "The fact that we had a project ready to go and that we could execute it in a relatively short timeframe worked in our favor."

The success of this project has immediate consequences regarding employee retention on Roi-Namur. "If the school closes the employees will be forced to move to Ebeye or Majuro to educate their families," said Corder. "If the employee retention is affected then USAKA ends up picking up the cost for re-training and education of a new workforce."

The repairs on Enniburr, home to nearly 120 employees of Roi-Namur, will have a lasting impact as well for USAKA, as the children of these workers will one day replace their parents in the USAKA

workforce.

"Roi-Namur will benefit in the long term if the residents who live on Enniburr are well educated. The ability of our work force to read, write and perform basic mathematical operations is essential to the continued operation on Roi," said Taylor. "The RMI government benefits as it can complete a currently unfunded project much sooner and at no cost allowing for future spending on other school construction projects."

Originally built in the 1960s by the North Dakota National Guard, the school underwent an initial refurbishing campaign by the North Carolina National Guard in 1999. That project cost \$100,000 and paid for structural repairs, replacement of the roof and window repairs.

When the school repair project is completed the children of Enniburr, according to Corder, "will see a repaired facility that will be safe to occupy," putting the focus back on learning. As Lojkar said, "It is going to improve the education of the children of Enniburr dramatically...and strengthen the relationship of our two nations."

Which Grace Sherwood is witch?

Were you puttering around your quarters, half listening to the news when the words 'Grace Sherwood' and 'Virginia witch' shook you out of a daze? Grace Sherwood, hey, is that our Grace Sherwood of the Kwajalein Grace M. Sherwood Library fame? Nah, don't kid yourself. Nothing that juicy would ever be part of the Kwajalein folklore.

The tale of two Sherwoods is that one was convicted of being a witch, and the other was a benevolent Rhode Island librarian and lyricist.

The Witch of Pungo, as Grace Sherwood was called, was pardoned by Virginia Governor Timothy M. Kaine on July 10, 300 years after she faced a trial by ducking. The ducking test was simple, if she floated she was guilty, if she didn't she was - dead. It was commonly believed that water



was pure and would not permit a witch to sink.

Sherwood's thumbs were tied to her feet and she was thrown into the Lynnhaven River. Too bad or maybe not too bad, who knows, but Sherwood bobbed on the water and was thereafter labeled a witch, and whisked off to prison for the next seven years.

Our Miss Sherwood was Rhode Island's State Librarian during World War II until she retired in 1962.

The library on Kwajalein was named after Dr. Grace M. Sherwood because of her generous book donating activities. This Grace collected stacks and stacks of books and then sent them to service men overseas as part of a war project called the Book Pool for the Armed Forces. Even after the war the project continued and books were sent to Army posts and Naval bases from Germany to Alaska. Funny but, none of Grace's book boxes ever made it to Kwajalein, huh?

Airport security notice

Carry on luggage will undergo hands-on inspections until further notice according to Maj. Johnny Davis, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll provost marshal. The inspections are in response to heightened air travel risks. Davis said that passengers will not be allowed to carry containers holding liquids, gels, aerosols, perfumes or toothpaste, including bottles of water. Airport security personnel

will search carry on luggage, "When things are identified they will be taken out of your luggage," Davis said. Baby formula, bottled breast milk, prescription drugs with the patients name on the label and insulin will be allowed in carry-on luggage.

Global War on Terror

Honoring fallen heroes

The following 13 U.S. service-members have died in the Global War on Terrorism

Staff Sgt. Tracy L. Melvin, 31, of Seattle, died of injuries sustained on Aug. 6, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat operations in Ar Ramadi, Iraq. Melvin was assigned to the Army's 2nd Battalion, 6th Infantry Regiment, 1st Armored Division, Baumholder, Germany.

Sgt. Steven P. Mennemeyer, 26, of Granite City, Ill. and **Sgt. Jeffery S. Brown**, 25, of Trinity Center, Calif. were declared Duty Status Whereabouts Unknown on Aug. 8, when their UH-60 Blackhawk crashed into a lake in the vicinity of Korean Village in Rubtbah, Iraq. Their remains were recovered on Aug. 9 and 10, respectively. Both Soldiers were assigned to the 82nd Medical Company (Air Ambulance), Fort Riley, Kan.

1st. Sgt. Aaron D. Jagger, 43, of Hillsdale, Mich., **Spc. Ignacio Ramirez**, 22, of Henderson, Nev. and **Spc. Shane W. Woods**, 23, of Palmer, Alaska died Aug. 9 in Ar Ramadi when an improvised explosive device detonated near their HMMWV during combat operations. The Soldiers were assigned to the Army's 1st Battalion, 37th Armor Regiment, 1st Armored Division, Friedberg, Germany.

Lance Cpl. Jeremy Z. Long, 18, of Sun Valley, Nev., died Aug. 10, while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province, Iraq. He

was assigned to 1st Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Twentynine Palms, Calif.

Spc. Rogelio R. Garza, Jr., 26, of Corpus Christi, Texas, **Pfc. Andrew R. Small**, 19, of Wiscasset, Maine, and **Pfc. James P. White, Jr.**, 19, of Huber Heights, Ohio died Aug. 11 in Nangalam, Afghanistan when their platoon came in contact with enemy forces using rocket-propelled grenades and small arms fire during combat operations. The Soldiers were assigned to the Army 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry), Fort Drum, N.Y.

Staff Sgt. Kenneth A. Jenkins, 25, of Fouke, Ark., died Sunday in Balad, Iraq of injuries sustained when he came in contact with enemy forces using small arms fire during combat operations. 
