Ebeye residents face daily hardships

Who I am, does not matter as much as whom I will try to speak for. My intent is to be very open and frank with you regarding some personal issues to me, but more importantly to all residents living on Ebeye. Conditions on Ebeye at this very moment, while I write this to you, are desperate, seemingly hopeless. My intentions are not to write this to play on your sympathy, nor do I wish to sound negative, because I am keenly aware of world events and the horrors of war that effect so many places. Why I am writing this is just to let you know first hand, from someone who endures daily, with my neighbors, the labors of our daily existence and trials. I am a very optimistic person and thinker, always trying to see the positive in every situation.

With that let me first begin by giving you an update on living conditions on Ebeye. Many of you may be already aware of our conditions on Ebeye, but to truly appreciate its gravity, you must come to visit. Most of your neighbors do not see what efforts an Ebeye worker goes through just to make it to their workplaces. I can only hope you and you neighbors could come to an understanding of the tremendous odds that an Ebeye resident had to face before stepping on that early morning LCM that eventually lands them on your shore for their day at work...it is getting harder and harder to live in the conditions that we are forced to live in on Ebeye. Is

it possible that you could understand the difficulty of waking in the morning, stepping into you bathroom, turning on the faucet and not having a single drop of water to wash yourself in preparation to go to work. We are all fending for just the basic necessities of life like water and power. For instance, finding clean clothes to wear to work or food to eat that does not require refrigeration. My question I ask myself is, "shouldn't I, with all my human powers of planning ahead, be able to come to work every day but without having to endure such struggles?" Ebeye has been suffering with the power outage for more than a month now. At times, we go completely without power, black out of the whole island, like we are experiencing at this very moment. What no power on Ebeye means is no power to pump in salt water to our toilets for flushing. We have to take an empty bucket to the ocean, fill it with water from the ocean or lagoon, carry the bucket back to the toilet, fill the tanks and then flush out the toilets. No power also means there is no fresh water coming in from the fresh water tanks. Most of the population has to get in line for hours every day to fill containers from one water storage source on Ebeye. That water is very limited and if

Troops seize weapon cache in Iraq

Suspected terrorists also detained, held for questioning

U.S. Soldiers in Iraq seized several large weapons caches and detained eight terrorist suspects in operations Thursday.

Multinational Division Baghdad Soldiers from the 172nd Stryker Brigade Combat Team seized a large weapons cache during a cordon-and-search operation in northern Baghdad shortly before 1 p.m. The weapons cache included 21 AK-47 assault rifles, 55 magazines of 7.62 mm ammunition, 2 PKC machine guns, a Russian sniper rifle, tens of thousands of rounds of 7.62 mm ammunition, a fragmentary grenade, four jihadist propaganda magazines, and a martyrdom recruitment poster.

Earlier yesterday, Soldiers from 7th Squadron, 10th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division, detained six suspected terrorists north of Baghdad at about 3:30 a.m. The Multinational Division Baghdad Soldiers conducted a search of several houses. The suspects are being held for questioning.

Elsewhere, Soldiers from 172nd Stryker Brigade Combat Team, assigned to Multinational Division Baghdad, detained two suspected terrorists and seized a massive weapons cache in a warehouse during a search of Nur and Ghazalyia yesterday in support of Operation Together Forward.

The weapons and munitions seized included 272 120

mm mortar rounds, 212 82 mm mortar rounds, 99 60 mm mortar rounds, 33,800 14.5 mm rounds, 5,000 7.62 rounds, 90 5.56 rounds, 165 19 mm rounds, 104 rocket-propelled grenades, 240 23 mm rockets, 200 60 mm primers, 22 107 mm rockets, nine 069B rockets, 11 RPG rounds, two landmines, a .30 caliber shape charge, a crater charge, 11 fragmentation grenades, a machine gun, two AK-47s, a PKC machine gun, an RPK machine gun, two 14 mm machine guns, 20 full AK-47 magazines, ammunition drums, various loose ammunition, 5,000 feet of detonation cord, three bayonets, five 82 mm tubes, four 60 mm tubes, three 60 mm mortar bipods, four 81 mm mortar bipods, two 60 mm mortar bases, an 81 mm base, two land mines, an 81 mm mortar base, an aiming circle, two aiming poles, 54 rocket motors, and various bomb-making materials.

The suspected terrorists were detained for questioning. All munitions and weapons were confiscated for destruction. Five hundred buildings were searched during the operation.

Operations have taken place in Doura, Shula, Ghazaliyah and Ameriyah from Aug. 7 to 16. During this time, Iraqi army, Iraqi police and coalition soldiers have cleared more than 23,000 buildings, 21 mosques, detained 54 suspected terrorists, seized 326 weapons, registered 341 weapons, found 10 weapons and munitions caches, and removed 900 tons of trash.

Flag football games start off new school year, introduce new faces

Kwajalein Range Services Child and Youth Services kicked off the 2006-2007 school year with two flag football games and a dance Saturday night.

The two games, one for females, one for males, were held at Brandon Field.

The Bold and Beautiful, behind the power-house arm of quarterback Andee Criste, defeated Appetite For Destruction 6-0. Men's teams KPD GUNS tied with K-Town Heat 6-6. The teams were combinations of youth and adult players.

Catlin Layton, 17, Carrie West, 14 and Kaitilyn Phillips, 14 announced the play-by-play of the games.

The theme for the evening and this year's program is making the right choices.

The staff at CYS has been brain storming on how to improve services and provide the island's young people with alternatives to boredom and mischief.

Cardale Tademy, teen center director, said, "I be-

lieve the CYS department is trying very hard to provide avenues that are very positive for young people. I think the CYS staff is trying, truly trying hard to say, 'Give us a chance to provide a place for your children to be and you don't have to worry about them.'"

He continued, "We are able to provide situations, activities, opportunities, events and things of that nature for kids to participate in. We can't make kids participate in those things; kids have got to say, 'I want to participate in those things.' We, as a staff in CYS, are saying that we're trying to connect with the kids to say, 'What is it that you want to do? What are some things that you would enjoy doing?' And then try to offer those things to these children."

The CYS staff isn't on its own when it comes to building a better program.

"Actually, kids and the youth have a huge impact [on the CYS program]. We take their feedback. They are part of our committees where they plan the activities. They are part of planning our schedules, our daily schedules and our weekly and monthly sched-

ules they have input into that,” Jodi Yancey, CYS coordinator, said.

“You see people who have a genuine desire to do some things that are going to support this community, that are going to enrich the lives of these children,” Yancey said of the staff and community.

Jon Welchman is the CYS technology specialist. He said that the community on Kwajalein is similar to one stateside. “Most of them [the young people] are pretty carefree. Honestly, I consider them pretty much the same as any other kid as anywhere else in the world. They are pretty open to new things. Most kids that come out here don’t come out and do the same things they usually come out and try a little something different. They are always open to trying new things,” he said.

While children are similar the world over, opportunities aren’t. Darcy Hammond, a CYS program lead, said, “It’s not a very normal place to live, they have limited sports, limited places to go, just limited things to do. When I first got here there was a big lack of numbers coming through the door. Things started to change when we held a New Year’s Eve dance. And then we started implementing more and more programs. And instead of shying away and not doing anything people started becoming more and more involved.”

Some of the programs offered through CYS are standards to young people, such as 4-H Club. “People can relate to 4-H whether they come from Iowa, California or Florida. Everyone has heard of 4-H. It’s a free program. People know of 4-H on island because there’s good word of mouth, the volunteer leaders spread the word,” Megan McAndrew, assistant director of the teen center.


Some programs scheduled this year are:

Promise Passport

Started by Colin Powell six years ago, Promise Passport is an opportunity for children, 2-18, to volunteer. The young people keep a log with the hours they volunteered. At the end of the year they are recognized for their volunteerism. For example, preschoolers earn promise points by putting crayons away. The program is designed

to grow with the child.

School Age Tech Program

The School Age Tech Program is a 4-H Club, two-week program, from 5-6:30 p.m. on Wednesdays and Saturdays. It is for elementary-age children. The children learn to work with computers, digital and video equipment.

Youth Center Tech

The Youth Center Tech program is for teens. The young people work with computers, digital cameras, video and editing. They are producing a program for AFN.

Youth Sponsorship Program

The Youth Sponsorship Program is a way to welcome young people coming to Kwajalein. The packet describes various CYS activities. Incoming teens are matched up with a Kwaj teen prior to arrival, so when they arrive they will have friend with similar interests.

Fishing Club

The Fishing Club is for young people 7th grade and up. Every two weeks the anglers go fishing with adult volunteers.

a person is lucky enough to work on Kwajalein, they have permission to carry one gallon of drinking water everyday to Ebeye. Additionally, if an employee is lucky they can wash clothes before work or after work (maybe just one load a day to allow enough time to head for the dock security check-point). Certainly, I understand that it is not an issue for you or the Kwajalein community; it is an issue for our Marshallese local and national government leaders on Ebeye. We really don't know who is to blame for all of this, but we do know that there is no power and no running water. We wake up at 5:30 a.m. by candlelight to get our loads of dirty laundry ready for washing, ready ourselves as best as we can for work. We prepare a small meal for breakfast from canned foods, which I know is not very healthy for my kids, but at least it is something in times like these.

Oh, really this has nothing to do with my work, because I do feel blessed to have my job and I am sure if it was not for the culture and the basic backbone of the Marshallese way of life things would be so much worse. As always, Marshallese people respect others and are very patient as a people. Under the current conditions it would be easy to get so stressed out and turn on each other; instead they have so much YOKWE (love, aloha) in them that this never crosses their minds. We all try not to let it get in the way of our professional life.

Thank you for your attention and sensitive ear. Do think of us as your grateful neighbors, happy to have the opportunities to work with you. But, also appreciate our struggles and pray for our relief soon.

Bechtel computer supplier recalls batteries

Public Service Announcement

Dell, one of Bechtel's computer suppliers, has identified a potential problem associated with certain batteries sold with Dell Latitude™, Inspiron™, XPS™ and Dell Precision Mobile Workstation™ laptop computers.

Under rare conditions, it is possible for these batteries to overheat, which could pose a risk of fire. In response to this risk, Dell is recalling certain Dell-branded batteries. Potentially affected batteries were sold with the following models of Dell computers:

- Latitude: D410, D500, D505, D510, D520, D600, D610, D620, D800, D810;
- Inspiron: 6000, 8500, 8600, 9100, 9200, 9300, 500m, 510m, 600m, 6400, E1505,

700m, 710m, 9400, E1705;

- Dell Precision Mobile Workstations: M20, M60, M70 and M90; and
- XPS: XPS, XPS Gen2, XPS M170, and XPS M1710.

What should you do?

You may continue to use your computer safely by turning the system off, ejecting the battery, and using the AC adapter and power cord to power your system until it is determined if your battery is affected (see below).

Is your battery model affected?

To determine if your battery is affected, please turn off your computer and eject it from a docking station. Remove the battery. Find the "UPC" symbol and find the five-digit code as it appears in the image below. Note: Even if your

battery matches one of the five-digit codes, it is not necessarily part of this recall. Contact IS&T's Global Helpdesk if your battery's code matches, and the helpdesk team will help determine the safest appropriate action.
