

# *I wonder why I wonder about what I wonder about*





# Food service concerns addressed at meeting

*Unaccompanied patrons of Café Pacific express frustrations with food inconsistency, unhealthy choices, concerns for lack of special diet needs*

Unaccompanied Café Pacific meal card holders voiced their dining frustrations at an impromptu public meeting with Kwajalein Range Services food service managers on Saturday.

Approximately 60 residential diners shared their dissatisfaction with unhealthy menu choices, sanitary conditions, inconsistencies in food preparation, lack of concern for dietary needs and inadequate food line supervision in a meeting organized by Steve Cummings, Dining Services manager, Café Pacific Manager Dave Nobis and Sunrise Bakery Manager Jennifer Aakre, and attended by Steve Beuby, Com-

munity Services deputy program manager.

The need for a public forum stemmed from an email requesting the availability of whole wheat bread on a regular basis but illuminated the bigger issues of quality of life and morale for unaccompanied status personnel. Meal card holders were adamant that their grievances were not a reaction to the Pacific Dining Room renovation but long-standing concerns.

“As soon as I determined that there were issues two days ago we planned this meeting,” said Cummings. “And anytime there are issues, I plan to find out from you all what you think.”

The civil but frustrated meal card holders were quick to vocalize their thoughts, as food services

managers listed the diners’ grievances, requests, and suggestions on a flip-chart in an effort to identify and resolve concerns.

“I really would like to get back together again and answer each and every one of these things,” said Cummings. “And I really would like to do some regular meetings so we can have free conversations back and forth. Our hope is that you see that we’re paying attention to your thoughts.”

The assembled group of meal card holders agreed to hold a future meeting to give the dining staff time to institute changes and address the concerns aired.

The next public forum with Café Pacific dining managers is 6:30 p.m., Saturday 16, at the Café Pacific dining room.

# To honor Labor Day, we present some Kwajers who have worked on island for more than 25 years



Labor Day was the brainchild of Peter McGuire, the leader of the carpenters union, and originated as a day to acknowledge working men and women.



**Gordon Oyamot**

Gordon W. Oyamot, Electronic technician 2 with telemetry, 34-year resident.

When Oyamot first arrived on Kwajalein he was impressed with the population of the island. "For such a tiny island, 6,500 bachelors and families were breathtaking to say the least. Second, came when I worked for Radio Communications of America up on Roi-Namur. Taking part on tracking the very first missile experimental with ten warheads

and spending over twenty hours with delays and protesters at California has to be memorable for me. Last, but not least, I would have to say my taking part on tracking the very first interceptor launched from Meck island, and taking out an incoming RV launched from California."



**Bonnie Oyamot**

Bonnie Oyamot, Kwajalein Jr. and Sr. High School Math instructor, 34-year resident.

"The best part of my profession always happens when I receive personal letters or emails from former students telling me thanks for believing in them, for making math understandable for them, and for holding them to high standards of performance. I feel lucky to have touched the lives of so many people in positive ways. The art

of teaching consists in helping students feel that although you may stand in front of them, you're really behind them."

The idea picked up support from other labor unions, and they selected the first Monday in September to celebrate the day because it fell in between Independence Day and Thanksgiving. Twelve years after McGuire floated the idea, President Grover Cleveland designated it a federal holiday in 1894.




**Wally Burbine**

Wally Burbine, Antenna lead, 33-year resident.

When I was working for the TPQ18 [Ground Transport Radar, Special Purpose], the first shuttle that went up broke down. When it broke down we had six minutes to find out what the problem was. So I told them, 'Hey, standby. I'm going to take off and go up the antenna.' So I went up and found the problem, a loose cable. I put the cable together and held it and told them,

'Go for it.' So we saved the mission. They didn't know what to do, give me a medal or fire me.



**Bob Sholar**

Bob Sholar, Information Technology programmer/analyst, 27-year resident.

"My favorite good work memory [is] being given the chance to prove myself as a software programmer. [My] most notable other-than-good work memory [is] the 1987/88 Kwajalein contract transition. The contractor transition from Global Associates and Kentron to Pan Am World Services and DynCorp was traumatic for many of us. I had never been

through a transition before. Kwajalein had not been through a major one in almost 25 years. I assumed there would be a carefully thought out plan for basic things like continuity of payroll and supply chain from outgoing to incoming companies. Turns out there was not — the 'Emperor had no clothes.' In the end, there was a huge scramble, and the pressure on us to keep essential business processes working was intense. I aged at an accelerated pace in 1987 and 1988. It also made me stronger and wiser."
