



How my big worry turned into big relief

I usually work on Sundays and this was another Sunday that I was off to work, but I wasn't going to church, I was going to school; not my school, Katie's school.

I was dreading this day, but not for the reasons you might suspect. Sunday, Aug. 13, was the day my youngest moved into her dorm room.

Volunteerism keeping island activities alive as more families decide to leave Kwajalein

The Cub Scouts almost died on Kwajalein.

It would have been the first time in over 40 years such a lapse would have occurred.

More and more families are leaving as insane insurance rates, a double-digit rise in the cost of participating in activities and a skyrocketing cost of living on Kwajalein make it harder to justify staying.

Our host nation friends should also pay close attention to this trend as the effects will most certainly be felt in many areas that are positively influenced by our presence. Activities such as the Micronesian Shop; Bargain Bazaar; Carlos, Ennibur, Ebadon and Majetto gift drops; the Parent/Teacher Organization for Ebeye students; Yokwe Yuk Women's Club and numerous other areas where volunteerism benefits so many would be adversely impacted.

I don't know if I subscribe to the rumor that this is part of a planned process designed to reduce our 'footprint' on Kwajalein, so that only people who are willing to accept

whatever conditions they are subjected to, will remain.

But I do know that whatever the reasons may be, our homes, workplaces and community are literally crumbling around us. At least, we are getting a new U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll headquarters.

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Lurking danger

SAR pass conditions can lead to serious accidents

Dangerous swells make navigating the Search and Rescue pass difficult, highlighting the need for boat operators to be aware of conditions when transiting the SAR pass.

Complications in traversing the man-made SAR pass have resulted in three boating accidents, causing serious damage to two of the boats and necessitating a rescue in one incident.

The extremely narrow and shallow SAR pass was created by blasting through the reef to create a short passageway from Kwajalein to the ocean. Boat operators should be alert to the moment-by-moment fluctuating sea conditions in this area. Waves seemingly appear from nowhere, and the current in the pass is exceptionally strong.

“During the summer months, when we get south swells, waves can break in the pass,” said Paul McGrew, Small Boat Marina supervisor. “During the windy season, the pass can have confused water making it very bumpy and uncomfortable to navigate through.”

Confused water result from the collision of currents from different directions creating very steep, choppy waves and hazardous conditions.

Swells in the pass are capable of stalling and killing engines, “leading to a total loss of power, leaving the boat at the mercy of the water,” according to McGrew, or worse, completely overturning a boat and tossing the crew into the water.

In the most recent accident, “the boat was ‘pooped’, a sailor’s term for a wave coming over the stern of the boat and flooded within seconds,” said McGrew.

The smallest misjudgment when transiting can lead to a serious accident. The Small Boat Marina staff cautions boat operators to time their SAR pass entry/exit with the conditions of the waves. They insist boat captains keep to the center of the lane by maintaining an observant eye on the buoys lining the pass.

“If it is too rough, they need to be able to make the captain’s call and state that it is too dangerous,” said McGrew, “and go through South Pass as another option.”

“Operators need to know when to accelerate and to slow down to avoid the waves crashing onto the boat. It is not a place to be speeding through just to get through, and is not a place to be going at a snail’s pace,” said McGrew. “Boat operators need to be vigilant of the dangerous conditions that can suddenly change while boating through the pass.”

The teen years

Kwajalein's teenagers feel pressures of living in a fishbowl existence

By the time children reach their teenage years, you know without a doubt the parenting manual you never received in the hospital delivery ward would have been completely useless anyway. Parenting a teenager is often bewildering and frustrating. There is no roadmap for parenting a teen.


The Hourglass interviewed families who live on Kwajalein and have already raised a family or are trying to sort through that process. The names of these families have been changed to protect their privacy.

Three factors, existing simultaneously, contribute

to the uniqueness of raising a teen on Kwajalein. Start with a three-mile island and a population under 2,000. A teen literally runs out of room to roam. Add to this the freedom most children are granted

at a very early age and the entitlement they expect as they grow older. Throw in the fact that where you live is also where you work, and the consequences of bad choices can affect both environments, and you have the difficulties of parenting on Kwajalein.

“Teens are trying to discover who they are,” said, Cardale Tademy, Teen Center director “and to put them in a box and make them conform...I think kids run from that. They want to be able to experience their own world.

“They know that space is limited and they know that everybody sees and knows what goes on here,” continued Tademy.

“I think it would be rough to be a teen on Kwaj. Sure, it’s great to not have your parents drive you everywhere, but because the island is so tiny, everybody knows who you are,” said Mrs. Green. “You can’t make a mistake without the whole island finding out. What does that say? ‘Be perfect, or else.’ I couldn’t live up to that.”

Although it would seem that there is quite a lot to do on Kwajalein, that doesn’t crossover into the teenage world. On a small island things get old very quickly and eventually boredom sets in.

“I’ve always thought that the younger kids have it pretty much made. They pretty much have died and gone to heaven out here, they’ve got so many different things offered to them,” said Mr. Smith. “After a while the kids have played all the sports, done the different things, they get bored. That’s the challenge, how do you keep them preoccupied or challenged without getting bored?”

“These are kids with stuff going off inside of them and they are on a three-mile long island, and a half mile wide, they’ve exhausted this whole island in a very short time,” said Tademy, “and I think as a responsible community, we’re fooling ourselves to think that teenagers are not going to do stupid stuff. They are going to.”

Rumor and general consensus is that teenagers on Kwajalein get into trouble, big trouble. The parents and community leaders interviewed point to underage alcohol drinking and theft. Without statistics it is difficult to

say if this is ‘just kids being kids,’ an eschewed public perception, or reality.

“Serious trouble considerations are underage drinking, unlawful entry into quarters, theft of private or personal property, and damage to government property. These are just some of the past incidents that have landed juveniles in hot water,” said U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Provost Marshall, Maj. Johnny Davis.

One thing is for sure, the consequences of getting into trouble have a serious ripple effect.

“Consequences to a family for a teen who gets into serious trouble can range from no action to the family and the child is placed on suspension, probation or barred from island, or where the sponsor and dependents will be asked to depart USAKA in the best interest of the community,” said Davis. “The final decision will rest with the Commander or the Deputy Commander along with the recommendation from the Juvenile Review Board.”

“I saw it happen, and it was very difficult on the parents. I knew the parents and I knew that they were decent people. But after multiple warnings, the range has no other recourse but to basically take drastic measures,” said Mr. Brown. “And it affects the job; it affects your daily living. Sometimes one parent has to go and stay with the kid off island while the other one has to stay back and work. It really breaks up the

family completely.”

Some parents try to troubleshoot this teen idea of nothing-to-do, no-place-to-go by opening their home to the friends of their children and giving them a place to let their guard down. Parents benefit, too, by knowing in advance what is going on before it blows up into a serious issue and by being available.

“You have to set the ground rules up front, knowing full well that the kids have easy access to your house because you have an open-door policy. You know the kids and you know the parents, so it’s easy to grant them access to the house,” advised Mr. Brown. “And by giving them access, one thing that also works in your favor is the fact that you can observe them from a distance.”

“Keep it real with your kids; stay involved with them,” agreed Tademy. “Listen to what they are saying; listen to how they are talking to the friends they are hanging out with. Watch what they are doing as far as what time are they coming home.”

“One advice that I would like to give a new parent with a teenager on this island is get involved with the school system as much as you can,” added Mrs. Brown. “By getting involved, you get to know the parents, and you also get to know the other students,”

“Parents do not give them [teens] time, physical, intimate time.

And at this level, that’s when communication should be strong; involvement should be strong,” said Tademy. “That’s not the time to say, ‘Let them do their thing.’”

Parent availability and parent involvement appear to be key to finding a way through these perplexing

teenage years regardless of where on the globe you call home. Both parent and child can benefit, said Kwajalein High School Principal Steve Howell, when parents “take an active part themselves in their kids’ lives, because it really will only last so long and be over before you know it.”

Missing pilot's remains are identified

The Department of Defense POW/Missing Personnel Office (DPMO) announced today that the remains of a U.S. serviceman, missing in action from the Vietnam War, have been identified and returned to his family for burial with full military honors.

Maj. Burke H. Morgan, U.S. Air Force, of Manitou Springs, Colo., was buried Sept. 7 beside his wife, Mary, at the U.S. Air Force Academy. The service coincided with his U.S. Air Force Academy graduating class' 45th reunion.

On Aug. 22, 1967, Morgan and a fellow officer took off from Nakhon Phanom air base, Thailand, in their A-26A *Invader* on an armed reconnaissance mission over Laos.

The crew had radio contact on their mission shortly after midnight, but were neither seen nor heard from again. Electronic and visual searches of their last-reported location in

Xiangkhoang Province, as well as over the planned flight path, did not locate the missing aircraft.

A joint U.S.-Lao People's Democratic Republic team traveled to the province in 1993 to interview three informants about various crash sites. The men recalled the 1967 crash, as well as the burial of the crew members.

They also stated that one of the bodies was disinterred by unknown persons in 1986.

Four years later, another joint U.S.-Lao team resurveyed the original crash site and requested that the Lao government conduct a unilateral investigation. The Lao government was able to confirm that some remains were exhumed in the mid-1980s, and promised to continue its investigation.

Then in 2002, Lao government officials reported that the remains had been turned over to a Lao official in 1987 or 1988, but that the official had since died. His driver, however, had possession of those

remains and had been holding them in safekeeping awaiting directions from authorities.

Scientists of the Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command were able to identify those remains using a variety of forensic methods, including analysis of skeletal and dental remains.



Blowin' in the wind

A waterspout was spotted under a dark, flat-bottomed cloud oceanside of SAR pass Saturday afternoon.

Waterspouts are not a common occurrence in Kwajalein Atoll. The last official sighting of a water spout in the area was almost exactly a year ago on Sept. 15, near Bigej.

Waterspouts are formed when light winds at ground level meet up with stronger winds above and create a wind shear. The updraft from a rain shower or a thunderstorm helps to tilt the shear vertically, creating a funnel similar in appearance to a tornado.

"Although the waterspouts we get around here are pretty cool and innocent looking, they are still dangerous and should be avoided," said Tom Wright, Chief Meteorologist for 3D Research Corporation. "Winds can exceed 100 mph inside the funnel and waterspouts have been known to overturn boats and cause injuries or even fatalities."

Stick II A cocky teenager learns some important lessons about playing by her own rules in this comedy drama. Haley Graham (Missy Peregrym) is a gifted 17-year-old gymnast with a strong rebellious streak — strong enough that she walked away from her teammates on the eve of a major international tournament because she'd had enough of the rigid regimentation of Team U.S.A. After experiencing a scrape with the law with her extreme-cycling friends, Haley is given an unusual sentence — attending the Vickerman Gymnastics Academy, a world-class training facility run by Burt Vickerman (Jeff Bridges), who has led some of the world's greatest gymnasts to championship status. Haley makes no secret of her dislike of life at Vickerman's, and her fellow athletes aren't about to forgive her just yet for letting down her teammates. But while Vickerman makes clear things are to be done his way, he respects Haley's talent, and together she shows him and her new teammates how to follow the rules while still expressing individuality.

X-Men: The Last Stand The explosive X-Men motion picture trilogy officially draws to a close with this release that finds Rush Hour director Brett Ratner stepping in for Bryan Singer to tell the tale of a newly discovered mutant "cure," and the polarizing effect it has on mutant/man relations. With the pressure on mutants to give up their powers and pledge alliance with the human race reaching a critical turning point, Professor Charles Xavier (Patrick Stewart) urges tolerance and understanding as his nemesis Magneto (Ian McKellen) gathers a powerful resistance in preparation for the ultimate war against humankind.

Poseidon Set adrift in the vast waters of the North Atlantic for a luxury New Year's Eve party staged in the ship's magnificent ballroom, the massive ocean-liner Poseidon receives an unexpected jolt when a rogue, 100-foot wave rolls it completely upside down, forcing the surviving passengers to fight their way to safety. Trapped beneath the waterline and implored by the captain to remain in place until a rescue team arrives, the panicked survivors struggle to keep their cool as the water begins to rush in, infernos blaze all around, and a loss of electricity plunges the doomed vessel into total darkness.

The following 13 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism

Sgt. Jason L. Merrill, 22, of Mesa, Ariz., and **Pvt. Edwin A. Andino II**, 23, of Culpeper, Va., died on Sept. 3 in Baghdad, Iraq, of injuries suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near their vehicle during combat operations. Both Soldiers were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 26th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division, Wurzburg, Germany.

Sgt. John A. Carroll, 26, of Ponca City, Okla., died Sept. 6 in Ar Ramadi, Iraq, of injuries sustained when he came in contact with enemy forces using small arms fire during a dismounted security patrol. Carroll was assigned to the Army 1st Battalion, 6th Infantry Regiment, 1st Armored Division, Baumholder, Germany.

Pfc. Vincent M. Frassetto, 21, of Toms River, N.J., died Sept. 7 while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province, Iraq. He was assigned to 1st Battalion, 10th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Sgt. Luis A. Montes, 22, of El Centro, Calif., died Sept. 7 in Brooke Army Medical Center, San Antonio, Texas, of injuries suffered on Sept. 1 in Abu Ghraib, Iraq, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his vehicle during combat operations. Montes was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 22nd Infantry Regiment, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

Sgt. David W. Gordon, 23, of Williamsfield, Ohio, died Sept. 8, in Baghdad, of injuries sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat operations. Gordon was assigned to the Army's 3rd Battalion, 16th Field Artillery Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood.

Sgt. 1st Class Merideth L. Howard, 52, of Alameda, Calif., and **Staff Sgt. Robert J. Paul**, 43, of The Dalles, Ore. died Sept. 8, in

Kabul, Afghanistan, when a vehicle-borne improvised explosive device detonated near their HMMWV. Both Soldiers were assigned to the Army Reserve's 405th Civil Affairs Battalion, Fort Bragg, N.C.

Sgt. Nathaniel B. Lindsey, 38, of Troutdale, Ore., died Sept. 9 in Shajoy, Afghanistan, of injuries sustained when his HMMWV came in contact with undetermined ordnance during combat operations. Lindsey was assigned to the Army National Guard's 41st Brigade Combat Team, Portland, Ore.

Cpl. Johnathan L. Benson, 21, of North Branch, Minn., died Sept. 9 from wounds suffered on June 17 while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Pfc. Anthony P. Seig, 19, of Sunman, Ind., died Sept. 9, in Baghdad of injuries sustained when he encountered indirect fire from enemy forces while on base. Seig was assigned to the Army's 118th Military Police Company, 519th Military Police Battalion, 16th Military Police Brigade, Fort Bragg, N.C.

Spc. Alexander Jordan, 31, of Miami, died Sunday in Baghdad, of injuries suffered when he encountered enemy forces using small arms fire during combat operations. Jordan was assigned to the 4th Battalion, 23rd Infantry Regiment, 172nd Stryker Brigade Combat Team, Fort Richardson, Alaska.

Sgt. Jeremy E. DePottey, 26, of Ironwood, Mich., died Monday in Asadabad, Afghanistan, of injuries suffered in a single vehicle accident. DePottey was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum, N.Y.

Capt. Matthew C. Mattingly, 30, of Reynoldsburg, Ohio, died Wednesday in Mosul, Iraq, when he encountered enemy forces using small arms fire during combat operations. Mattingly was assigned to the 1st Squadron, 17th Cavalry Regiment, 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C.


