

In 1968, new legislation changed the national commemoration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. It soon became apparent, however, that November 11 was a date of historic significance to many Americans. Therefore, in 1978 Congress returned the observance to its traditional date.

This Veterans Day weekend, remember our fallen comrades, spend time talking to family and friends in the states, enjoy the weekend and have an enjoyable, accident free holiday. Tell a veteran 'thank you' for the service provided to their country and for protecting our way of life, but above all, "be safe."

Band of brothers

Iraq veterans share their experiences



On Veterans Day Americans are called upon to commemorate the sacrifice and dedication of servicemembers, both dead and living, who have served in the military.

The Hourglass pays tribute to three Kwajalein residents who served in Iraq in support of the Global War on Terror and share their thoughts about their deployment with the Kwajalein community.

Scott Phillips

"I live life to its fullest, as if tomorrow may not come," Scott Phillips said reflecting on his 11 months deployed in Baghdad, Iraq with the 3rd Ordnance Battalion, Explosive Ordnance Disposal.

A little more than a year after 9/11, Phillips' unit headed to Iraq. Today Phillips is retired from the Army and is Unexploded Ordnance lead for Mission Operations; in Dec. 2003, he was Master Sgt. Phillips, Battalion Operations non-commissioned officer.

The 3rd Battalion planned, coordinated and supervised the operations of seven EOD companies in Baghdad and southern Iraq.

"The battalion's mission was to task each EOD company with neutralizing and destroying enemy caches of arms and ammunition in support of the war effort," Phillips said. "We managed, gathered intelligence and ran Improvised Explosive Devices incidents within Baghdad."

Every time Phillips interacted with Iraqi nationals, they would express their thanks for the military's presence in Iraq.

"Daily we would see them rebuilding their community. All were a little concerned with what the future would bring," Phillips said, "however they all knew it would be better than under Saddam."

Phillips would like to remind the Kwajalein community to "not forget that evil is all around us; be supportive of our troops and elected officials on the tough decisions that they face daily."

Darcy Mixon

The chances of Darcy Mixon going back to Iraq or somewhere in the Middle East are, as she would say, "decent." Mixon and her husband Tony are members of the 154th Air Control Squadron, Hawaii Air National Guard; it's likely their unit will be tapped to supply personnel for upcoming deployments.

Mixon, a Kwajalein Range Services Network engineer with Information Technology, spent five months at Kirkuk Regional Air Base in summer of 2004, by way of Elmendorf Air Force Base, Alaska. "The mission of Kirkuk was, and is, to provide continuous airspace coverage and command

and control at the forward edge of the battle area for Northern Iraq," said Mixon.

At Kirkuk, Mixon maintained existing data/voice services and extended these services in support of Army and Air Force personnel. "We also maintained the satellite links that kept us 'talking' to the rest of the world," Mixon said.

Although her contact with the Iraqi people was limited, Mixon believes that all military personnel, regardless of their job, had an impact on helping the people of Iraq.

"Schools opened for children to attend, inoculations have been made available to countless Iraqi citizens, clean drinking water runs through newly constructed pipes, infrastructure has been rebuilt; good things were and are happening still today," Mixon continued.

Some of Mixon's downtime in Iraq was spent volunteering with Operation Crayon, a program that packages donated notebooks, crayons, markers and other school supplies in goodie bags to distribute to Iraqi children.

"My time in Iraq will always have an impact on my life because it was my first deployment to the Middle East and one of the most unique learning experiences," Mixon said. "You see the news and read the papers, but to actually be a part of what was happening over there and to support the positive changes being made to better the Iraqis quality of life was incredible."

It's Mixon's hope this Veterans Day that "We all take a moment to reflect upon the Soldiers, Sailors and Airmen who have volunteered to defend our freedom and make sacrifices so that we can continue to live our way of life. I am grateful to have served and continuing serving with so many fine men and women, and I will forever feel proud to be an American."

Mike Tracy

As busy as he was in Iraq, Mike Tracy still managed to shoot off e-mails to his friends in Kwajalein and keep them current with his adventures. Tracy, a RTS maintenance management lead with KRS, returned to Kwajalein in January after a year-long deployment to Iraq with the Hawaii Army National Guard, HHC 29 Support Battalion, 29 Brigade Combat Team.

The brigade provided base security for Ballad Air Base as well as security patrols in the city of Ballad and surrounding villages, an area more commonly known as the Sunni Triangle, just north of Baghdad.

"We secured the base repelling all attempts at breaching perimeter, maintained security of the local villages from insurgents," Tracy said, "and conducted hundreds

Pirates of the Caribbean 2 Captain Jack Sparrow (Johnny Depp) returns to the screen for another round of supernatural adventures on the high seas in this spirited sequel to the 2003 Disney hit, which re-teams original director Gore Verbinski with original screenwriters Ted Elliott and Terry Rossio. As Will (Orlando Bloom) and Elizabeth (Keira Knightley) prepare to exchange vows at the altar, their wedding plans hit rough waters with the arrival of sea-bound scallywag Jack Sparrow. It seems that Sparrow owes a substantial blood debt to half-octopus sea captain Davy Jones (Bill Nighy), and that the only way for the flamboyant sea rover to elude the wrath of his otherworldly pursuer is to seek the aid of mysterious and powerful Voodoo priestess Tia Dalma (Naomie Harris), whose ability to resurrect the dead and gaze into the future may provide just the advantage needed to avoid a waterlogged fate in the locker of his legendary nemesis.

Miami Vice Writer and director Michael Mann updates the groundbreaking television crime series he created in the 1980s with this stylish thriller. Ricardo Tubbs (Jamie Foxx) and Sonny Crockett (Colin Farrell) are two police detectives working undercover in Florida; Tubbs is smart, cool, and resourceful, while Crockett has his own way of doing things, though he stays close enough to the rules to stay out of trouble. Their latest assignment is to get the goods on Arcangel de Jesus Montoya (Luis Tosar), a local drug kingpin whose men are believed to be responsible for a handful of recent murders. In order to infiltrate Montoya's operation, Tubbs and Crockett pose as powerboat racers willing to use their talents to pilot drug-smuggling ships for the right price.

The Ant Bully A kid who hates ants finds himself living among the six-legged critters in this computer-animated comedy-adventure. Lucas Nickle (voice of Zach Tyler Eisen) is a ten-year-old boy whose family has just moved to a new town, and Lucas isn't enjoying it much — he hasn't made any friends yet, his big sister ignores him, his parents (voices of Larry Miller and Cheri Oteri) are occupied with their upcoming vacation in Mexico, and his loving but slightly crazy grandmother (voice of Lily Tomlin) is convinced space aliens are casing out the neighborhood.

Sloan and Ocegüera were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum, N.Y. McClain was assigned to the 3rd Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum.

Pfc. Kevin J. Ellenburg, 20, of Middleburg, Fla., died Nov. 1 in Baghdad, Iraq, of injuries suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near his Bradley Fighting Vehicle. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 22nd Infantry Regiment, 1st Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

Pvt. Michael P. Bridges, 23, of Placentia, Calif., died Nov. 2 in Taji, Iraq, from a non-combat related incident. Bridges was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 66th Armor Regiment, 1st Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood.

Lance Cpl. James E. Brown, 20, of Owensville, Ind., died Nov. 2 while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province, Iraq. He was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Lance Cpl. Luke B. Holler, 21, of Bulverde, Texas, and **Cpl. Michael H. Lasky**, 22, of Sterling, Alaska, died Nov. 2 while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province. Holler was assigned to Marine Forces Reserve's 4th Reconnaissance Battalion, 4th Marine Division, San Antonio, Texas. Lasky was assigned to Marine Forces Reserve's 4th Reconnaissance Battalion, 4th Marine Division, Elmendorf Air Force Base, Alaska.





of outside-the-wire missions involving logistics transportation of everything from drinking water to ammo and repair parts."

Within his Guard unit, Chief Warrant Officer Tracy is the Battalion Maintenance officer.

Tracy's team of men and women installed protective vehicle armor and repaired vehicles, weapon systems and power generation equipment.

"I guess you could say that with my 39 guys and gals we are the battalion's and sometimes the brigade's pit crew," said Tracy. "Often we are tasked with moving supplies in convoy throughout the Sunni Triangle and recovery operations broken vehicles throughout our area

of operation."

In Tracy's estimation, the news reports published in the United States early in his deployment didn't completely reflect his experiences in Iraq.

"During our time in Iraq, things seemed to have improved; when we arrived we were receiving mortar attacks daily," Tracy said. "Towards the completion of our deployment, the attacks were reduced to couple of times a week or less."

Tracy's battalion was also involved in establishing security around polling stations during the Iraqi constitution and presidential elections.

"During construction of the polling stations, we worked with the local police and the Iraqi army at which time the civilian population were extremely curious, often wanting to talk to us in the streets, causing a very tense situation. You were always on guard not knowing if the people were friend or foe," Tracy said.

Tracy encouraged the Kwajalein community to "just take time to remember the troops that are serving in difficult situations. Even more so, remember the families and friends that have suffered the loss of loved ones."
