



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# Robert M. Gates takes charge at Pentagon

*Robert M. Gates was sworn in as the nation's 22nd secretary of defense in a ceremony at the Pentagon Monday. After President Bush introduced Gates as "an experienced and thoughtful leader," Vice President Richard B. Cheney administered the oath of office. Gates was officially sworn in at the White House earlier Monday in a private ceremony.*

*The following is Gates' acceptance speech.*

It is an honor, and a humbling responsibility, to take the helm of this department in a time of war and to lead men and women who have dedicated their lives to protecting our country. In the coming weeks, I will visit some of the key military posts and commands at home and abroad, as well as consult with this department's senior civilian and military leaders and staff. I look forward to meeting and hearing from the Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Marines who are the true heart and strength of America's armed forces. As the president has asked for my unvarnished advice, I expect the same of you.

Over the years of leading big institutions, I have learned something important: leaders come and go, but professionals endure long after the appointees are



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gone. The key to successful leadership, in my view, is to involve in the decision making process, early and often, those who ultimately must carry out the decisions. I will do my best to do that.

This department is always engaged in a host of different activities that aid our nation's defense. All are important; all are valuable. The most important issue we face is the situation in Iraq. By removing the brutal and dangerous regime of Saddam Hussein, and by confronting the extremists and insurgents who have sought to derail any progress since, the United States and our coalition partners have provided the Iraqi people a unique opportunity to have a decent future.

The violence in Iraq must be contained and reduced. Failure in that part of the world would be a calamity that would haunt our nation, impair our credibility, and endanger Americans for decades to come. A successful outcome in Iraq, one that will help protect our nation and serve her long-term interests, will require all elements of American's national power to work more effectively together, in cooperation with allies

and partners in the region.

Afghanistan has made great strides since being liberated five years ago, but that progress is now at risk. The United States and our allies have made a commitment to prevent the Taliban from taking over Afghanistan again. We intend to keep it. How we face these and other challenges over the next two years will determine whether Iraq, Afghanistan, and other nations at a crossroads will pursue paths of gradual progress, or whether the forces of extremism and chaos will become ascendant.

As we address these challenges, it is important that we carry forward the process of what has been referred to as defense transformation. President George W. Bush made it a priority at the beginning of his administration to help our military become more agile, more lethal, and more expeditionary. Much has been accomplished; much remains to be done. This task remains a necessity and a priority today. It is also essential that we make every effort to ensure that tax dollars are spent wisely and carefully, and we continue to maintain and enforce ethical standards of doing business.

In a department as large as this one, neither task will be done perfectly, but it is important that we strive to do our best. Our country is at war. I take this job with the knowledge that my decisions will have life-and-death consequences for America's troops, as well as their families. I have accepted that responsibility and I will never forget it.

To all of the men and women of the U.S. military: you serve in the finest traditions of those who have worn this nation's uniform these past 230 years. It is a high honor to serve with you as secretary of defense. May God bless you and may God bless the wonderful country we have sworn an oath to protect.

# Marshallese begin preparations for Christmas Day early in October

*(Editor's note: This article first appeared in The Hourglass in December, 1999. Pat Cataldo is a former Hourglass editor. The Rev. Elden Buck is a former chaplain on Kwajalein and he and his wife, Alice, translated the Bible into Marshallese.)*

Preparation for Christmas in the Republic of the Marshall Islands begins in October, when singing groups, called jebta [chapters], are called together. These groups are mostly gathered around the landowner on whose land they live, although on Ebeye there are also island chapters, made up of people from Alilinglaplap, Jaluit or Kapinmento – the western and northern islands of Lae, Ujae, Bikini, Wotho, Rongelap, Eniwetok and Ujelang. Kapinmento means “those at the edge of the sea.”

Everyone is involved in the singing groups, with old people and small children included in the same jebta. On Ebeye, the groups may have as many as 40

or 50 members.

By the time of the first rehearsal, songs will have been selected by the iroij [chief], alap [landowner] or appointed director. Some of the songs are new and original each year; some have new words for old tunes. Twenty or 30 years ago, all the songs were new every Christmas, and there were no traditional Marshallese Christmas songs.

Americans would have a hard time recognizing Marshallese music. There is no clef, no staff – in fact, there are no notes. Instead, the four-part harmony is written in a number system: Do=1 and 8, Re=2, Mi=3 and so on. The singers sight-read.

All through November and December, the jebta rehearse almost every evening, meeting from about 9 p.m. until as late as 2 or 3 a.m., in schoolrooms, living rooms, on porches – and even outside.

Rehearsals don't much resemble an American choir practice. It is common to see some members sleeping, others conversing, and children playing noisily, while

some people study the numbers and others learn from the better sight-readers. The cacophony doesn't seem to disturb the director or those concentrating on the music.

Selection of the songs is carried on in great secrecy, but rehearsals are not. In fact, there is exciting competition, and it is considered special fun when two groups can hear each other while rehearsing. Each group is eager to have the best songs, and the more verses, the better. Often one jebta learns 10 songs.

Early in the rehearsal schedule, the jebta appoints a committee to decide upon and purchase material for uniforms, dresses and shirts, all made of the same fabric. Often, a jebta will have three or four uniforms.

Each jebta decides early, usually in October, upon a theme for its presentation in church on Christmas Day. The themes frequently seem to have little to do with Christmas, in fact, they may be on a subject such as firing a missile, and yet, they are always ingeniously brought around to a spiritual yuletide application.

Scripture verses are often repeated in unison, and verses of scripture and prayers are included in each chapter's presentation.

A member is assigned to oversee the building of props to carry out the theme. The props can be elaborate and inventive, with moving parts, break-aways, small explosive devices, and many surprises for the audience. For example, a group might bring in a large cross, march around it singing and at a given signal, pull a wire that causes the cross to split into halves, from which a Christmas tree rises to the ceiling. At a second signal, several verses later, the Christmas tree breaks apart, and dollar bills float to the floor.

While all of the plans and props are being made, another committee decides what gifts the chapter will bring to the church and collects money for the cash gift. On Ebeye, it isn't unusual for a chapter's cash gift to the church to reach \$800 or \$1,000, in addition to cases of soda, 100-pound bags of rice, cases of soya or laundry soap, bolts of material and island handicrafts. The group also decides what small presents they will throw to the audience during their performance.

On the outer islands, chapters give stalks of bananas, pandanus, breadfruit, coconuts and live chickens and pigs.

During the Sundays of Advent, chapters sing following morning worship service, as a hint of what they will perform on Christmas day. On Ebeye, one chapter or

weto [section of property] is chosen each Sunday in December to sing at the church. On its Sunday, the group cleans up, decorates and prepares food. This is also the day the group's gift to the pastor is presented. After the regular service, the congregation enjoys the food.

Sometime during the two weeks before Christmas, each group dresses in its uniforms and goes out, seldom before midnight, to sing and present gifts to the iroij, pastor, missionary and other village or island dignitaries.

One Sunday, usually the last Sunday before Christmas, is designated 'singing Sunday,' and all or most of the groups sing at church. It is a sort of dress rehearsal for the main performance on Christmas. But the big surprises in the presentations will be kept secret until Christmas day. The groups have a uniform, shirts and dresses all made of the same fabric and usually in the same style, for 'singing Sunday' and

another for Christmas.

On Christmas Eve, the pastor and one or two church elders are expected to visit each chapter to sample the whole program, make suggestions as to propriety (sometimes recommending that part of the presentation be made outside the church) and see that the dances are not too lively.

At this time, the chapters draw straws for order of appearance. No chapter wants to be first, in fact, the later the better.

After this final rehearsal, the chapters march around the island singing. On outer islands, this is done on foot by lantern light. On Ebeye it is often done from the backs of trucks. Whenever one chapter meets another, it is exciting and hilarious.

On Christmas day, the church is cleared of most benches, with only a few seats left around the edge for older people and guests. The celebrations begin about 10 a.m., when all the chapters come to hear the Christmas story read from the scriptures and offer their special thanks in prayer and worship.

The celebration goes on until all the chapters have performed. On Ebeye, this can mean a 12- to 14-hour observance, or even a second day.

Each jebta leader begins by bringing into the church his group's gifts of food and supplies and the props for its presentation. The jebta, gathered out of sight at some distance, begins singing its marching song and slowly approaches the church. This procession is actually a sort of dance, including intricate over-

under and serpentine patterns. The leader, and sometimes the whole group, waves a flag or scarf, and all singing is done at the greatest possible volume. [Technology has added electronically-enhanced music to the performance.]

The entrance march ends with the group in singing position, sometimes facing the audience, but more often facing the pulpit, and the presentation begins.

Between songs, there are speeches by the iroij, the alap and any other dignitary accompanying the group. Each jebta has some member of an iroij family as its sponsor.

The climax comes when the theme is explained, and the props are put into action. One year, a chapter chose "Paul's Shipwreck" as its theme. They built a 25-foot float shaped like a ship and pulled it to the church. There the flat fell apart on purpose, spilling gifts to all onlookers.

Should a prop not work or a jebta make an obvious mistake in harmony or words (all singing is done from memory), there is much laughter, clapping and friendly name-calling from the audience.

During the 'giving song' the jebta marches past the altar, piling on cash. During this time, the singers throw gifts to the audience, including bars of soap, boxes of matches, gum, thread, candy, pieces of material, rolls of pandanus, and so forth, while the women lavishly spray cologne and perfume over onlookers. Gifts are seldom thrown to anyone in particular, although it is not un-

usual for a woman to be wearing several dresses and remove the top one to give to a friend or leader.

A chapter deliberately works toward hypnotic excitement in the giving song and march, increasing its singing volume while clowning outrageously. The greater this excitement, the more likely it is that the members of the audience will jump up, join the circle, and add more cash to that of the performing group.

At the close of the day, the pastor leads a brief worship service. By that time, the church is completely littered with gum wrappers, match boxes, leaves, ribbons and parts of the props. The altar area is jammed to the ceiling with food. It remains there for several days until leaders gather to divide it, a process that can also take several days.

The pastor and church leaders divide the money among themselves, the iroij and school teachers, traditionally returning some of the food to the chapter.

Midnight on the 25th does not signal the end of Christmas for the Marshallese. The chapters continue meeting, often until the middle of January, to sing and visit those village leaders they missed before Christmas, and especially to make plans for the great feast and party each chapter holds.

With the jebta parties, the long holiday season ends. Christmas in the Marshall Islands in a thanksgiving festival, celebrated joyously to commemorate the coming of Christ.

**Snakes On a Plane** Forget terrorists or hijackers — there's a handful of deadly assassins aboard a jet liner and they don't even have arms or legs in this airborne thriller. Neville Flynn (Samuel L. Jackson) is an FBI agent handling what seems like a routine assignment — serving as bodyguard for Sean Jones (Nathan Phillips), a Hawaiian surfer dude who is flying to California to testify in a high-profile criminal trial after witnessing mobster Eddie Kim (Byron Lawson) murdering one of his underlings. However, Flynn's job gets a lot more challenging when he discovers Kim's associates don't want Jones to talk, and have devised a unique way to ensure his silence. A cache of highly dangerous poisonous snakes has been hidden on board the jet, and is released using a timed mechanism once the flight is well underway.

# Global War on Terror Honoring fallen heroes

The following 19 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terror

**Pfc. Albert M. Nelson**, 31, of Philadelphia, and **Pfc. Roger A. Suarez-Gonzalez**, 21 of Miami died Dec. 4 in Ar Ramadi, Iraq, of injuries suffered from small arms fire while conducting security and observation operations. The incident is under investigation. The Soldiers were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 9th Infantry, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, Fort Carson, Colo.

**Spc. Nicholas P. Steinbacher**, 22, of La Crescenta, Calif., died of injuries suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV in Baghdad, Iraq, on Dec. 10. Steinbacher was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 5th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Brigade, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

**Maj. Gloria D. Davis**, 47, of St. Louis, Mo., died Dec. 12 in Baghdad, from a non-combat related incident. The incident is under investigation. She was assigned to the Defense Security Assistance Agency, Washington, D.C.

**Staff Sgt. Theodore A. Spatol**, 59, of Thermopolis, Wyo., died on Dec. 14 of a non-combat related illness in Thermopolis. Spatol was assigned to the 1041st Engineer Company, Rock Springs, Wyo.

**Lance Cpl. Matthew W. Clark**, 22, of St. Louis, Mo., and **Lance Cpl. Luke C. Yepsen**, 20, of Kingwood, Texas died December 14 due to injuries suffered from enemy action in Al Anbar Province, Iraq. Clark was assigned to 2nd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, 3rd Marine Division, III Marine Expeditionary Force, Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii. Yepsen was assigned to 1st Tank Battalion, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Twentynine Palms, Calif.

**Pfc. Paul Balint Jr.**, 22, of Willow Park, Texas, died Dec. 15 in Ar Ramadi, of injuries suffered when his unit came in contact with the enemy using small arms fire during combat operations. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 37th Armor Regiment, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 1st Armored Division, Friedberg, Germany.

**Staff Sgt. Joseph E. Phaneuf**, 38, of Eastford, Conn., died Dec. 15 in Mehtar Lam, Afghanistan, of injuries suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat operations. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 102nd Infantry Brigade, Hartford, Conn.

**Staff Sgt. Henry K. Kahalewai**, 43, of Hilo, Hawaii, died Dec. 15 at Brooke Army Medical Center, San Antonio, of

wounds suffered Nov. 21 in Baghdad, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his Stryker vehicle. He was assigned to the 1st Squadron, 14th Cavalry Regiment, 3rd Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division (Stryker Brigade Combat Team), Fort Lewis, Wash.

**Pfc. Joe L. Baines**, 19, of Newark, N.J., died Dec. 16 at Taji, Iraq, of wounds suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV. He was assigned to the 1st Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Brigade, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood.

**Lance Cpl. Nicklas J. Palmer**, 19, of Leadville, Colo., died Dec. 16 while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to the 1st Combat Engineer Battalion, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

**Staff Sgt. David R. Staats**, 30, of Pueblo, Colo., and **Spc. Matthew J. Stanley**, 22, of Wolfeboro Falls, N.H., died Dec. 16 in Taji. Pfc. Seth M. Stanton, 19, of Colorado Springs, Colo., died Sunday in Balad, Iraq. The Soldiers died of injuries suffered when their HMMWV struck an improvised explosive device while on mounted patrol Dec. 16 in Taji. They were assigned to the 1st Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Brigade, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood.

**Capt. Kevin M. Kryst**, 27, of West Bend, Wis., died Monday from wounds received while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to Marine Light-Attack Helicopter Squadron 267, Marine Aircraft Group 39, 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing, I Marine Expeditionary Force Camp Pendleton.

**Staff Sgt. Brian L. Mintzloff**, 34, of Fort Worth, Texas, died Monday in Taji, from injuries suffered when his Bradley Fighting Vehicle rolled over. The incident is under investigation. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 8th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Brigade, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood.


