



## Water sports safety regulation changed

Many U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll residents find time to participate in water related activities. For those people the rules are a little different now; USAKA Regulation 385-9 Recreational Water Safety has been changed and went into effect Sunday.

According to Mike Moore, USAKA Installation Safety manager, the old regulation was written

by divers

- Requiring two lights per diver for night dives
- Listing Republic of the Marshall Islands water taxi vessel safety and rules of the road information, etc.

Changing the regulation has been a year-long process. "Within the last year, recommendations for change were brought to me from both government and KRS agencies and private clubs. Research and coordination took the greatest amount of time to complete," Moore said. "The chal-

lenge is integrating what exists and what requires change plus contacting and working with everyone who has an interest in the regulation. There are many interested parties affected by this regulation including USAKA, KRS, KPD [Kwajalein Police Department], Small Boat Marina and a host of private club organizations."

Moore explained that KPD can issue citations, the small boat marina can take action to prevent usage of vessels and equipment, persons found driving under the influence while operating watercraft can be charged and have privileges revoked and private club memberships can be temporarily suspended or totally revoked, etc.

the rules - rather follow and use them to ensure personal, equipment and environmental safety," Moore said.

Moore described the process of changing the regulation as a great opportunity to interact with people in the Kwajalein and Roi-Namur communities. "I received a lot of help from private clubs and would like to thank David Seelye from the Kwajalein Board Sailors; Bill Williamson, Sharon Hurst, Lisa Shier, Ron Gamble



in 1995. "The intent was to help the Kwajalein community and maintain water safety. The previous regulation was outdated. The new regulation is easier to read, has hyperlinks to regulatory guidance and provides explanations on abbreviations, special terms and definitions," he said.

Kwajalein Range Services employees can access it through KARDS under USAKA Policies and Regulations. Excerpts will be incorporated into the 2006 Kwajalein Telephone and Island Directory. USAKA personnel have access through the J: Drive

Some changes include:

- Extending the B-boat range
- Clarifying usage of snorkel vests and personal floatation devices
- New Kwajalein Board Sailors safety rules
- Providing environmental, fishing, and archeological information
- Permitting persons 18 and older to swim alone at their own risk in the Kwajalein Adult Pool and Roi-Namur Pool
- Prohibiting feeding of sharks

Moore explained that KPD can issue citations, the small boat marina can take action to prevent usage of vessels and equipment, persons found driving under the influence while operating watercraft can be charged and have privileges revoked and private club memberships can be temporarily suspended or totally revoked, etc.

"The main idea is not to break

He recommends that all recreational water activity participants review not only the new regulation but all supporting Standard Practice Instructions and related safety documents.

"The majority of folks respect the environment we live in and take the time to think about the real or potential hazards they might encounter during recreational water activity. The safe water activity participants check their vessels and equipment, plan for the unexpected, and watch out for one another to ensure their safety and the well-being of others," Moore added.



# Many new classes offered by Community Education

## Hourglass reports

Community Education classes begin next week and offer a variety of programs from fitness to military history.

Registration for Community Education classes takes place at the Elementary School Administration Building from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

A new series offered this session is called Travel Log Tuesdays. These classes feature island residents who will share their travel experiences and will be in the Elementary Music Building Classroom.

- Destination: Diving Chuuk – instructor Peter Barbella will teach this 30-minute session at 7 p.m. on Tuesday. This session is free and Barbella will share information on accommodations, types of diving experiences and other Chuuk experiences.

- Destination: Bali – Caroline Eggers and Kate Feldman will introduce the travel options of Bali from 7 to 8:30 p.m. on Jan. 17. Eggers and Feldman will provide a slideshow, refreshments and information on geography, culture, religion, architecture and local people. The cost for this class is \$10.

- Destination: Australia and New Zealand – Tarah Yurovchak will present information on traveling to Cairns, Australia as well as seeing New Zealand by motor home from 7 to 8:30 p.m., Jan. 24. The cost for this class is \$10.

- Destination: China – Wendy Peacock will introduce Beijing to the community in her one-hour presentation beginning at 7 p.m., Feb. 21. The cost for this class is \$5.

Class categories for the upcoming session are Cooking, Woodworking, The Great Outdoors, Health and Fitness, Sewing, Quilting and Candle Making, Language Study and Miscellaneous.

Scheduled cooking classes, which are held in the High School Home Economics Room, are:

- Learning to Cook – this class is for students in Grades 5 through 12 and teaches young people how to prepare a four-course meal. Yurovchak is the instructor and for the 5 – 8:30 p.m. class on Feb. 25.

The cost is \$50.

- Italian Night – Two Italian Night classes are scheduled with instructor Gina Sansone. The courses are \$35 each and will be from 4:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Jan. 22 and 29. Each class offers a different menu.

- Cooking with the Portable Gourmet – Chef Ken Hulme, a graduate of the U.S. Personal Chef Association Culinary Academy, offers four \$30 courses. The Chicken Challenge will be from 5:30 to 9 p.m., Jan. 28; A is for Appetizers will be from 5:30 to 9 p.m., Feb. 11; A Soupcon of Soups will be from 4:30 to 8:30 p.m., Feb. 12 and Puff the Magic Pastry will be from 4:30 to 8:30 p.m., Feb. 26.

- Cake Decorating – Laurie Mann will teach a cake decorating class from 6 to 8 p.m., Feb. 13. The cost is \$25.

Two woodworking classes are offered this session.

- Parent/Child Woodworking Workshop – Doug Hepler will teach students in Grades 2 through 6 and their parents how to make an unfinished Douglas fir coffee table. The four classes are from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m., Tuesdays beginning Jan. 31. The cost is \$100 per pair, includes all material. The class will be held at the hobby shop.

- Build and Play the Appalachian Dulcimer – Humle will teach this class at the Elementary School Music Building Classroom. The first class is from 6:30 to 8 p.m., Jan. 26. Future meetings will be arranged between the instructor and student. Cost for the class is \$50 including material fee.

The Sewing, Quilting and Candle Making classes include:

- Basic Sewing – Lora Kendrick will teach this class at the Elementary School Library. Class time is from 7 to 9 p.m. on Wednesdays through Feb. 22. The cost is \$35 and the class is open to people 15 and older.

- Quilting for Beginners – Diane Hamill will teach the basics of quilting in the classes held from 6:30 to 8 p.m. on Fridays through Feb. 24. The class will be held in the Elementary School Music Building Classroom.

- Candle Making – Trina Tiffany will teach a two-night class on can-

dle making from 7 to 8:30 p.m. on Feb. 9 and 23 in the High School Home Economics Classroom. The cost for the class, including material fee, is \$20.

Courses in Marshallese and Spanish will be taught this session.

- Conversational Marshallese – Pam Duffy and Joe Pedro will teach basic Marshallese conversation skills in a seven session course from 5 to 6 p.m., Wednesdays through Feb. 22. The classes will be held in the Elementary School Music Classroom.

- Spanish – Angie Sinnott offers Spanish language classes for youth from kindergarten to second grade. In Beginning Spanish students are exposed to basic phrases. This class will meet from 3:30 to 4 p.m. Jan. 18, 24, 31 and Feb. 7 and 14. Almost Beginning Spanish is for students who have had some exposure to Spanish. This class will meet from 3:30 to 4 p.m. on Thursday, Jan. 19 and 26 and Feb. 2 and 9. The classes will be held at the Elementary School Room 6 and are \$35 each.

Deep sea fishing and astronomy classes will be taught in The Great Outdoors segment of this session's Community Education program.

- Sky Watching – Instructors Dr. Lisa Shier and Joe Lauben will teach the two-part class on stars, constellations, legends, motions of the sky and star charts. The classes will be from 7:30 to 9 p.m., Feb. 1 and 8 at North Point. The cost is \$50 for adults and \$25 for students 18 and under.

- Deep Sea Fishing – Jan Paget and Tish Kuskulis offer three sessions on the ins and outs of deep sea fishing. The classes will be: 8 a.m. – 12:30 p.m., Feb. 6 and 1 – 5:30 p.m. Feb. 12 and 19 at the Small Boat Marina. The classes are limited to four people each and cost \$40 each.

There are six classes offered in the Health and Fitness segment.

- Water Aerobics – Jo Bolen will teach water aerobics from 6 to 7 p.m. on Fridays through Feb. 24 at the Adult Pool. Cost is \$20.

# Local resident competed in Honolulu Marathon

Being the 3,063rd person to cross the finish line may not sound impressive until you hear that 24,295 people completed the race. John Vannoy ran the 33rd Annual Honolulu Marathon on Dec. 11.

Vannoy, an Army major assigned as a test director at Reagan Test Site, started running in junior high and never quit.

"I initially ran the 800 meter and 1 mile, while in school. I never ran greater than a 10k competitively until I was 32-years-old. While working on my masters degree in Monterey, California a friend convinced me to try triathlons. Once I found I liked sprint and Olympic distance triathlons, I branched out into half-marathons and now marathons," he said.

Vannoy was the only Kwaj resident to participate in the Honolulu Marathon; however, three residents completed a marathon-length race on Kwaj the same day. "I couldn't pass up the challenge of running this race, and it gave me a great goal to focus my training on," Vannoy said.

Training for a marathon is no walk in the park. "I modified a workout developed by Hal Higdon. Higdon is a well-known, long-distance running coach. My training consisted of three and a half months of preparation to include various running workouts to include hills, tempo runs, track work and a lot of road miles. I completed over 500 road miles, primarily here on Kwaj, during this race training cycle. My longest training runs were 20 miles. I also used swimming and biking as cross training workouts to reduce

the chance of injury and to provide some variety," Vannoy said. "The training for a marathon is difficult to

balance with work-related travel, but I always pack my shoes and GPS and run as much as I can wherever I find myself working."

Living on Kwaj can make training difficult. "I planned my runs so that two thirds of the miles were completed prior to sunrise. The environment here dehydrates you quickly so it's key to have a plan for regular water and sports drink stops throughout your training run. Also, because Kwaj is so flat it's hard to prepare for a race that has varied elevations throughout the course. The increased winds during the raining season help counterbalance our lack of hills to some extent. With the wind you get a simulated hill due to the increased effort to forge through the wind as you head north on the island," he said.

Vannoy said he started running simply to compete in an individual sport. "In running there's no one to blame if you lose, but yourself. But as I got older, I modified my intent and objectives to using the time to just think, to maintain my cardiovascular fitness at a high level, and to focus my personal fitness goals by providing an event to work towards." What better goal to work for than a marathon?

To show for his efforts, Vannoy had a time of 4:13, which placed him 349th in his division and 3,063 overall. There were roughly 29,000 entrants. "It's a great feeling to focus and train for an event and complete it within your predicted time window. I believe two of marathoning's key tenets are perseverance and determination. With that in mind, I'm happy that I persevered in this race and after examining both the good and the bad I learned from this challenge, I'm determined to achieve a new personal best in my next race."

**Rebound**, A man hoping to make his way back to the big time starts by heading back to middle school in this comedy. Roy McCormick (Martin Lawrence) is one of the most successful coaches in college basketball, but he's just as famous for his hair-trigger temper as he is for molding winning teams. When an outburst of anger during a game escalates into an embarrassing public indecent, McCormick loses his job and is banned from college sports. Looking for a way to rehabilitate his image, McCormick takes a job coaching the basketball team at the middle school he used to attend, only to discover his players are a handful of misfits and losers with no skill on the court. Can McCormick mold the kids into a winning team — and make himself into a better man along the way?

**Wedding Crashers**, Two guys find out the hard way that sneaking into the wrong party can cause serious problems in this comedy. Jeremy Klein (Vince Vaughn) and John Beckwith (Owen Wilson) are a pair of longtime friends who work for a law firm, helping contentious couples mediate their divorces. Their job has given them a cynical attitude about marriage, and as a hobby each weekend the two make a point of crashing weddings reception, where they load up on free food and booze and try their luck at seducing the bridesmaids. When William Cleary (Christopher Walken), the nation's Secretary of the Treasury and a possible candidate for the Presidency, announces his daughter is to wed, the nuptials are billed as the social event of the year, and Jeremy and John decide they must attend the reception. # Honoring fallen heroes

The following 19 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism.

**Spc. Anthony O. Cardinal**, 20, of Muskegon, Mich., died Dec. 25 in Baghdad, Iraq, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat operations. Cardinal was assigned to the 3rd Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart, Ga.

**Spc. Sergio Gudino**, 22, of Pomona, Calif., died Dec. 25 in Baghdad when an improvised explosive device detonated near his M1A1 tank during combat operations. Gudino was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 64th Armor Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart.

**Spc. Dane O. Carver**, 20, of Freeport, Mich., died Dec. 26 in Khalidiyah, Iraq, when his HMMWV came under attack by enemy forces using small arms fire. Carver was assigned to the Army National Guard's 1st Battalion, 125th Infantry Regiment, Saginaw, Mich.

Two Soldiers died Dec. 26 in Baghdad when their Apache helicopter collided with another military aircraft in mid-air and then crashed. Both soldiers were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 4th Aviation Regiment, Aviation Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood, Texas. Killed were: **Chief Warrant Officer Richard M. Salter**, 44, of Cypress, Texas and **Chief Warrant Officer Isaias E. Santos**, 28, of Ancon, Panama.

**Sgt. Dominic R. Coles**, 25, of Jesup, Ga., died Dec. 26 in Baghdad when his HMMWV came under attack during combat operations by enemy forces using small arms fire, rocket-propelled grenades and mortars. Coles was assigned to the 5th Engineer Battalion, Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

Two Soldiers died Dec. 27 in Baghdad when an improvised explosive device detonated near their dismounted patrol. Both Soldiers were assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 8th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood. Killed were: **Spc. Lance S. Sage**, 26, of Hempstead, N.Y. and **Pvt. Joshua M. Morberg**, 20, of Sparks, Nev.

**Pfc. Jason D. Hasenauer**, 21, of Hilton, N.Y., died Dec. 28 near Kandahar, Afghanistan when his HMMWV accidentally rolled over during patrol operations. Hasenauer was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 504th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C.

**1st Sgt. Tobias C. Meister**, 30, of Jenks, Okla., died Dec. 28 south of Asadabad, Afghanistan, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat patrol operations. Meister was assigned to the Army Reserve's 321st Civil Affairs Brigade, San Antonio.

**Spc. Aaron M. Forbes**, 24, of Oak Island, N.C., died Dec. 28 in Baghdad when an im-

provised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat operations. Forbes was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 67th Armored Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood.

**Pfc. George A. Lutz, II**, 25, of Virginia Beach, Va., died Dec. 29 in Fallujah, Iraq when his dismounted patrol was attacked by enemy forces using small arms fire. Lutz was assigned to the Army's 9th Psychological Operations Battalion, 4th Psychological Operations Group, U.S. Army Civil Affairs and Psychological Operations Command, Fort Bragg.




