



Today is my oldest daughter's 20th birthday. Kelly was born at Fort Rucker, Ala. where I was stationed in the Army. Our chaplain at Fort Rucker was Scott Tomlinson and he and his wife Helen were the parents of a very healthy and happy little boy, Scotty IV. We moved, Kelly and Scotty grew up and life progressed as normal. During her teen years, Kelly enjoyed and exercised that extraordinary gift of adolescence – brilliant wisdom without the muddled, antiquated advice of adults. Parental input for the issues of life was unnecessary and probably detrimental to her well-being.

Well, you can imagine my shock and disbelief when she called from college the other day and I gave my typical reply, "How much?" And she said, "No, dad, I don't want money. I want advice." Advice?!? From me? Your father? Now, lots of people come to me for spiritual advice and even relationship advice and from their responses I have the sense that I'm at least adequate. But for my very own daughter to break down and actually ask me a question and fully listen to the answer was beyond my imagination. That definitely warrants an entry into the journal.

I spoke to my daughter today about



turning 20. She said she feels a lot older. How does that make me feel? Her decisions and desires will have less to do with us and more to do with others from this point on. For

Getting it wrong is not a good option

I love my country. I swear I do. I love being an American.

That's why I want us to get things right and avoid costly mistakes.

Take the recent missile strike made in Pakistan where, if you can believe the news reports, at least 18 innocent people, mostly women and children, were killed.

For the past two months or so, Americans were beginning to maybe, just maybe, turn the tide of public opinion in that country. Our efforts to aid the victims of the earthquake were doing a lot to give Pakistanis a favorable view of Americans, especially in the mountain tribal areas hardest hit by the earthquake, where support for Al-Qaeda has been the strongest. If we could somehow get those people on our side, to trust us, how important would that be? But then we go and do that air strike based on what might be faulty intelligence.

From what I read, Pakistani officials say that four or five terrorists may have been killed in the strike. According to news reports, a top aide to Bin Laden may have been killed. Hopefully, that's true. The question would be is it worth the problems being caused by doing it?


It's creating major concerns for Pakistan's president Musharraf who is already walking a dangerously thin line in helping the U.S. We'd be in bad shape if his government was overthrown.

How many new terrorists were created among the thousands of Pakistanis who angrily demonstrated in the streets shouting death to America? How many young Pakistanis who might have been on the fence have now become our enemies? How many times will Al-Jazeera show video of dead women and children to the Muslim world as a recruiting poster for terrorists?

We don't seem to be very adept at winning hearts and minds. We didn't do it in Vietnam and I don't think anyone can say we're doing a great job now.

If we had actually gotten the number two guy in Al-Qaeda we were after, it may have been worth it. But it's not like this is the first time we shot missiles at somebody who turned out not to be there and killed a lot of other people.

My younger brother is a police officer in a large mid-western city and he's been involved in two shootings.

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Calendar approved for 2006-2007 session

The 2006-2007 school year might begin Aug. 18 and end June 16. The 'yellow,' or late start version one calendar was approved at Wednesday's School Advisory Council meeting with a 5-2 vote.

Additionally, an exception to policy was declined with a 5-3 vote.

Both decisions will be forwarded to COL Beverly Stipe, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll, for approval.

The recommended school calendar was one of three reviewed for the coming year.

The most common reasons for supporting this calendar version were:

- Professional development for the teachers in the summer. This version dates coincided best with course work in the states.

- Attendance: Many felt that parents would not ensure students would be available for an early start date.

- College schedules: this version coincides with college start dates in the states so families with college students don't have to choose between supporting their children at the beginning of the college year and being on Kwajalein for the beginning of the school year.

The exception to policy concerned administering the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills to Kwajalein second graders next month. School Superintendent Dan Frazier recommended not administering the test to second graders because, in his opinion and a consensus of the teachers he spoke with, the test was not an effective tool for evaluating the students' skills. He said the test was extremely time consuming, as teachers had to read the test questions to the students and give them time to answer. He added the test does not have a time limit on it so it might take teachers days to administer it. He said when students are tested in the third grade on they read their own tests and data gathered from the tests is useful. The council voted to keep the testing in place.

Mary Beth Clark, an audience member, raised a concern about slippery concrete at the elementary school. She said her daughter slipped and fell on wet concrete in August. She was concerned that the concrete had not been repaired. She added that she knew the same issue had been resolved at the high school and asked why it had not been done at the elementary school. She said that another child fell in the past week on

slippery concrete at the elementary school. Kevin Finn, vice president/deputy program manager Kwajalein Range Services community services, said ensuring the concrete is safe is a priority and that the process used to do so requires a special top coat which he said is on order. High School Principal Steve Howell added that another way to score the concrete is with a machine. He said the plan had been to complete all of the school-related concrete work over the Christmas holidays but that the work at the high school had taken a lot more time than expected.

Issues covered in the section reports included:

- Pam Duffy, Ebeye parents' representative, said that in the past girls in the guest student program had not attended the Father/Daughter dance because in traditional Marshallese families it is inappropriate for the father to slow dance with the eldest daughter.

This year Ebeye mothers were invited to attend with their daughters. Duffy said this concession was greatly appreciated by the Marshallese families.

- Steve Howell, high school representative, said there will be a public meeting in February for parents to review the new curriculum.

- The National Honor Society will hold its variety show on Feb. 5.

- Young people from Child and Youth Services are working with American Forces Network to create a public service announcement on alcohol awareness.

- Members of the National Honor Society went to Ebeye Wednesday and delivered gifts to Calvary, Jabro, Father Hacker and Seventh Day Adventist high schools.

- Cardale Tademey is the new youth services activities direc-

tor. He arrived Jan. 7 and is from Long Beach, Calif.

- Community Education is reviewing the possibility of combining a Winter B and Spring A session.

- Community Education is researching computerized exams for firefighter recertification and training.

- The Winter Ball, for Grades 9-12, will be Sunday. It is sponsored by Grade 10.

- Class meetings will be held on Friday.


- ITBS tests are scheduled for the week beginning Feb. 7.

- The fourth grade readover will be Sunday evening.

- A chairperson is needed for the PTO-sponsored Math/Science Exploratorium.

Several types of actions may be taken to ensure discipline, order on island, including barring

Law enforcement authorities with the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll use the Hawaii criminal statutes, the laws of the Republic of the Marshall Islands and the Uniform Code of Military Justice to characterize offences.

“The administrative bar process employed at Kwajalein is the tool the Command uses to insure good order and discipline on the installation,” Dennis O’Connell, USAKA command counsel.

The Kwajalein Police Department enforces the bar process. “We process bar actions, but the offender’s organization HR [human resources] representative serves it,” Capt. Jeff Mullin, KPD

deputy chief, said.

According to Mullin there are different kinds of bars, which are administered according to the offense and based on an individual’s (adult or juvenile) prior record here on island.

- **Suspended Administrative Bar** - The amount of time an individual will be barred if any further misconduct occurs. As an example, for a 180-day suspended administrative bar, the individual is allowed to remain on island, come and go, and/or continue work during this time period, but if there is any misconduct by that individual they will be barred for the remainder of the time or a specified amount of time. A 10-day administrative bar may be suspended for 180 days, but if there is any misconduct dur-

ing this time frame, they will automatically be barred for 10 days. “Behaviors which warrant this type of bar depends on the individual’s prior history. This could be anything from a water safety violation to public intoxication or traffic violation,” Mullin said.

- **Administrative Conditional Bar** - The amount of time for an Administrative Conditional Bar is specific. For example a one year administrative bar results in an individual being administratively barred from entering USAKA for any reason during that time. “Continued behavior which warrants this type of administrative bar can also depend on the individuals’ prior history. Promoting liquor to a minor, public intoxication, larceny, and malicious mischief are just a

few examples," Mullin added.

- **Administrative Permanent Bar** – This type of bar could be the result of drug offenses, promoting liquor to a minor, repeated trespass violations, public intoxication, drunk and disorderly, assault, larceny, etc.

According to O'Connell, "An administrative bar is a prohibition or limitation of access or activity on a military installation. It is administrative in nature because it does not depend on a code of laws or on the operation of a criminal justice system. It stems from a commander's inherent authority to regulate behavior on a military base. The scope of a bar action can range from a mere letter of warning or restriction from activities, to permanent removal from Kwajalein."

There are many possible situations on how the bar takes effect, but most fall into one of the following three scenarios:

1. Off-island hire who is not a threat – hiring organization en-

sures offender's departure off island.

2. Off-island hire who is a threat – KPD ensures offender's departure off island.

3. Local national – KPD ensures offender is escorted to dock and departs.

KPD tracks and vets access violations for barring actions, and the extent of the bar is based upon past offenses, the seriousness of the offense, and extenuating circumstances. The Provost Marshal's Office determines the extent of the bar for all other offenses.

There is no independent code of offenses or infractions that is used for the purposes of enforcement. "The U.S. Congress enacted legislation with language to the effect that an offense that is punishable under the laws of the State of Hawaii, would also be punishable in the areas of the Republic of the Marshall Islands where the United States has jurisdiction," the USAKA attorney said.

"If John Q. Public commits a crime on Kwajalein and transfers to seek employment at any other DoD installation, his record will follow to haunt him; however, even though we enforce the Hawaii Revised Statutes, there will be no state record of his crime(s) on Kwajalein — unless it is a major crime that is picked up by the FBI, DEA, U.S. Attorney, etc."

Infractions of USAKA regulations may also result in administrative bar actions. As one example, a violation of the water safety regulation could result in a bar from recreational activities, or, misconduct at a sporting event could result in a bar from participation. "Everyone within USAKA is subject to these standards. Employers may apply sanctions of their own against their employees who commit offenses, independent of any action by the command," O'Connell said.

According to O'Connell, the command considers the context and circumstances of the offense, the impact on the community and the prior record of the offender in determining the appropriate administrative action in any particular case. "Generally, repeat offenses or offenses committed under aggravated conditions are considered more serious," he said.

Juvenile misbehavior is also subject to administrative bar action; however the identities are protected just as they would be in the United States. Because sponsors are held accountable for their family members behavior, juvenile misconduct could result in bar action against a parent.

The USAKA commander is the ultimate authority for bar actions within USAKA. For less serious offenses, that authority is delegated to the deputy garrison commander


Big Strike tournament draws 125 anglers




In memoriam

He's had to kill criminals in the line of duty and he went through hell proving he was 'sure' before he pulled the trigger and that the shootings were justified. Our government, military and intelligence agencies should be able to pass that kind of test, too.

There's a heck of a lot riding on being right these days. We can't just shrug our shoulders and say oh, well. The consequences of being wrong are monumental.

Terrorism or insurgency, however you wish to define it, can never be defeated if the local population supports the insurgents and gives them aid and comfort. Without the locals behind us, it's almost game over.

History has shown how not winning people to our side worked against us in Vietnam, against the French in Algeria and against the British in Northern Ireland.

Winning hearts and minds is a daunting, if not downright hopeless task. We don't need to make it harder. I hope the next time we're thinking of launching a long range missile attack, we're sure of what we're shooting at or we don't shoot at all. I know it's easy for me to say that, and I'm glad I'm not the one making the call.

But is killing four or five terrorists of questionable importance going to help us if we make four or five hundred new enemies who will harbor the ones we are after or take the places of the ones killed? That's the million dollar question.

Don't get me wrong. I want every terrorist in the world dead. They have to be hunted down and killed. The only way that can be accomplished is if they can't find a safe place or support anywhere and the local people are with us and help find them.

We may be in a very bad, no win situation. We want to give terrorists the message that no matter where they are, we can and will kill them. But do we also want to say that if they are in a village filled with people, that will afford them no safety or protection. We will kill them no matter what and if innocents are killed too, so be it. How can we do that and win hearts and minds, too?

Some say the War on Terror will last for generations. If the Western world can't turn the tide of hate and opinion in the Muslim world, that prediction will be true. So getting it wrong is not an option we can afford, but getting it right may just be impossible.

Flightplan, A woman is forced to prove her own sanity to save the life of her daughter in this taut thriller. Kyle Pratt (Jodie Foster) is a successful aircraft designer who has recently been dealing with the traumatic death of her husband. After traveling to Berlin on business with her six-year-old daughter, Julia (Marlene Lawston), Kyle falls asleep on their flight back to New York, only to discover that her daughter has gone missing. While not knowing where Julia has gone is troubling enough, even more disturbing is the insistence by pilot Carson (Sean Bean) and Air Marshall Rich (Peter Sarsgaard) that no records indicate that the child ever boarded the jet. As Kyle becomes increasingly desperate to find her daughter, she must prove to the men in charge that her daughter did in fact board the plane with her, and that this turn of events is not a product of her imagination.

Serenity is based on Joss Whedon's television show *Firefly*, in which interplanetary travel has brought about colonization of the planets, leading to a combination of sci-fi and Western tropes. The film picks up where the short-lived series left off, following the exploits of a crew of small-time criminals and outcasts who eke out a living on the edge of space, performing illegal smuggles and transports aboard a *Firefly* class cargo ship named *Serenity*. Led by a quick-witted veteran from the losing side of an interstellar war, Captain "Mal" Reynolds (Nathan Fillion), the crew is comprised of a rag-tag assortment of characters who, despite having their differences, are mostly loyal to one another, the closest thing that many of them have to a family. The stability of the crew is challenged, however, by the revelation that two of the passengers aboard, a brother and sister, are fugitives, wanted by the Interplanetary Alliance with a hefty reward on their heads.

Global War on Terror

Honoring fallen heroes

The following seven U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on terrorism.

Sgt. Michael J. McMullen, 25, of Salisbury, Md., died at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C., on Jan. 10 of injuries sustained in Ramadi, Iraq on Dec. 24, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his position. McMullen was assigned to the Army National Guard's 243rd Engineer Company, Baltimore. **Lance Cpl. Jonathan K. Price**, 19, of Woodlawn, Ill., died Jan. 13 from wounds received as a result of enemy small arms fire while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Ar Ramadi, Iraq. He was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 10th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Two Soldiers died near Al Sukar, Iraq, on Jan. 13, when their OH-58D Kiowa Warrior helicopter came under attack by enemy forces using small arms fire. Both Soldiers were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 10th Aviation Regiment, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum, N.Y. Killed were: **Chief Warrant Officer Mitchell K. Carver, Jr.**, 31, of Charlotte, N.C. and **Chief Warrant Officer Kyle E. Jackson**, 28, of Sarasota, Fla.

Pfc. Michael Anthony Jordan, 35, of Augusta, Ga., died in an automobile accident Jan. 13 in Manama, Bahrain. Jordan was assigned to Destroyer Squadron 50, Bahrain.

Pfc. Kasper A. Dudkiewicz, 22, of Mangilao, Guam, died in Mosul, Iraq, on Jan. 15, when his HMMWV was involved in a vehicle collision. Dudkiewicz was assigned to the 511th Military Police Company, 91st Military Police Battalion, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum.

Spc. Dustin L. Kendall, 21, of Conway, Mo., died in Baqubah, Iraq on Jan. 15, when his HMMWV accidentally struck an M1A2 Abrams tank and rolled over. Kendall was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 68th Armor Regiment, 3rd Heavy Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Carson, Colo.

and to the provost marshal. Anyone charged with an offense by law enforcement is notified that they may be subject to a bar and has an opportunity to present any information they wish, to explain the circumstances. An appeal process is available from any bar action taken by the command.

Certain behaviors could result in house arrest or a night in jail. "House arrest is when the commander orders residents restricted to their quarters for a given period of time either to permit the completion of an investigation or in anticipation of eviction off island. When this occurs, restricted residents must use designated support persons to deliver supplies. The commander may opt to permit attendance at religious services or any other specified event," Mullin said.

Any offense in which the offender is deemed a threat to him or herself or others could end with a night in the big, well, little house. "Most personnel on Kwajalein are detained for safety reasons due to a high state of intoxication. Before a person is detained, they are vetted by fire and emergency services personnel and then checked on regularly. We administer measured tests to determine a detainee's breath alcohol content; when a detainee submits a BAC which measures .08 BAC, he/she is determined safe for release to their own recognizance or escorted off island," Mullin explained. Police

personnel will monitor the offender's quarters from the exterior.

Not only can inappropriate behavior result in jail time or expulsion from the island but it can affect the pocketbook as well.

"The individual is charged with any costs associated with his/her detention. In the event an off-island hire is deemed safe for release past the departure of the last boat, KRS [Kwajalein Range Services] will pay up front for their employee to be billeted on island until they can be escorted off, and then they'll be billed by KRS directly," Mullin said.

An individual's record could follow them after they leave USAKA. Mullins explained that any time a person is arrested within USAKA, their information is recorded into the Centralized Operations Police Suite or COPS system, which is a DOD-wide database of all incidents, crimes, arrests, etc. from DoD installations worldwide. "If John Q. Public commits a crime on Kwajalein and transfers to seek employment at any other DoD installation, his record will follow to haunt him; however even though we enforce the Hawaii Revised Statutes, there will be no state record of his crime(s) on Kwajalein—unless it is a major crime that is picked up by the FBI, DEA, U.S. Attorney, etc.," Mullins said.






