

Yeah, things are mighty good in the oil business right now.

But it doesn't seem to be good in other areas of the economy.

I saw recently that another American icon is biting the dust.

Even if you don't know about guns, no doubt you've heard of Winchester rifles made by Repeating Arms.

You know, the rifle that John Wayne and the pioneers used to win the West.

Repeating Arms at one time had 20,000 people working for them. At last count there were 200. Those few are now going to lose their jobs because Repeating Arms has been sold to a company in Belgium. More American jobs down the tubes.

Repeating Arms said the reason for selling out was the same as many other American companies—they couldn't compete with the world market because of their pension and health care benefits.

It's just another in a long, and getting longer, line of big and small U.S. companies singing the blues over worker benefits.

Just recently, we got another rude reminder that pensions and health care benefits are going the way of the dinosaur.

Huge companies like International Business Machines, Alcoa, Inc., and Sprint Nextel Corporation have announced they are freezing their benefit and pension plans which will affect the retirement plans of millions of American workers.


If giant corporations like these are doing away with traditional benefits, how long will it be before every company in the country does away with them?

Right now, it is estimated that 45 percent of American workers age 47-64 are in a traditional benefit plan.

It's predicted by many economists that within the next 20 years, the only people who will have traditional pensions and health care will be government employees.

That's why it's so important for workers whose employers offer a 401(k) plan to take advantage of it. These plans are normally less generous than the traditional set amount pension and they entail the risk of investment, but it's becoming the only way to build any kind of nest egg for retirement.

I talk to my family and friends in the states as I'm sure you talk to your family and friends. I don't know what your family tells you, but mine tell me



of their fear of losing jobs and benefits. No one I talk to feels the slightest bit of security. Middle class and poor people are really hurting.

Wages are not keeping pace with the rising costs of energy, health care, gasoline, heating oil and everyday living.

Friends of mine who retired several years ago find themselves having to go back to work (if they can find jobs) to supplement their income because they can no longer make it on just their pensions or Social Security. Some of them have had their pensions and health care yanked out from under them. It's heart wrenching to go from what they thought was going to be a well-earned retirement to going back to work.

But, the economy is doing well they say. We hear 4.6 million new jobs have been created in the past few years. Of course, you have to learn to ask, 'Do you want fries with that?'

Yeah, things are awesome in the economy right now.

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Sequoia maintains Kwaj buoys, navigational aids

People who operate boats in Kwajalein waters may not even think about who maintains their navigational aids, but somebody has to do it. The people who do are members of the U.S. Coast Guard.

The Coast Guard Cutter *Sequoia* and its 51-member team spent three weeks servicing the 49 buoys in the Kwajalein Atoll.

According to Lt. j.g. Collin Bronson, operations officer, the 225-foot Juniper Class Buoy Tender, based out of Guam, makes a trip to Kwajalein once a year but they are working on coming twice a year. "It would be nice to break up the work," Bronson said.

Bronson explained the reason their job is important; the buoys aid in navigation as well as mark hazardous and good waters. Not having buoys or having them in the wrong place could be dangerous

for mariners.


Crewmembers spend an average of two to three weeks out at sea, Bronson said. While out, the crew replaces any missing aids and performs routine servicing, such as replacing batteries on existing ones. "We keep ships in safe waters," he added.

A large crane on board the ship, which can lift up to 40,000 pounds, is used to bring the buoys in and out of the water so the deck crew can service and replace them. In a 12-hour working day, an average of five to eight aids are serviced.

Though buoy tending is an important mission, according to Bronson, the crew also performs search and rescues as needed, law enforcement and training to marine police and

firefighters. "If we are needed for search and rescue, we drop everything and deal with that," he said.

Bronson described the 1-year-old *Sequoia* as one of the most technology advanced in the world. While docked at Kwaj, the crew invited residents to tour the boat.

Canvasback medical team's skill benefits Ebeye's people

Standing room only was the way it was Wednesday at the Ebeye hospital. Residents lined the hallways waiting for free healthcare offered by Canvasback Missions.

Canvasback Missions, out of Be-

nia Calif., brought an 11-person team to help with medical needs of Ebeye residents. The team consisted of eight ear, nose and throat doctors and three obstetrics and gynecology doctors, all volunteers. The team spent a total of 10 days on Ebeye.

"Ebeye hospital has never had an


ENT [ear, nose and throat] team before," said Jacque Spence, co-founder of Canvasback Missions.

According to Spence, the team treated more than 1,000 patients, seeing more than 100 a day and performing 10 plus surgeries a day.

Since the hospital does not have an ENT doctor, the team brings every piece of equipment as well as all the clinical and surgical supplies. Supplies not used were left at the hospital for future use.

Spence said the team came to Ebeye because she knew there was a need. "We are seeing lots of kids who have had ear infections for years, people with polyps in their noses and people with thyroid problems," she said.

One member of the team, Robert Veder, is an audiologist. Veder has been practicing audiology for more

than 40 years.

He treated over 100 patients. According to him, about 30 were operated on and are expected to have better hearing and 29 were fitted with hearing aids and given six months worth of batteries.

“Some of these people have been deaf since they were 13 or 14 years old; they don’t even know what it’s like to hear anymore,” he said.

Veder said he has seen a much higher rate of profound deafness on Ebeye than in the states, which he said could be caused by untreated high fevers.

When asked why he volunteered to come with the team, he said, “It just feels good. They light up like Christmas trees.”

Veder brought 50 donated hearing aids and 40 boxes of batteries with him; what was not given out stayed at the Ebeye hospital for other

residents. “We traveled here heavy and we will leave light,” he said.

Jim Reese, an ENT doctor on the team, said, “There is a lot of need here. We do what we can. It is a lot of fun and a lot of hard work, but it is very rewarding.”

The OB/GYN team performed Pap tests and breast exams. The Paps will be sent to Loma Linda Medical Center in California to be read. The results will be sent back to the patients through the mail.

According to Spence, while on Ebeye the team provided close to \$500,000 in care.

All the team members had nothing

but good things to say about Kwaj. “The people on Kwaj have been so good to us. The hospitality has made it really special to us. Kwaj makes it possible to sustain such an intense mission,” Spence said.

Black History Month

Many made history outside spotlight, headlines

We have all heard the stories of Martin Luther King Jr., Jackie Robinson, Frederick Douglass, Harriet Tubman and Booker T. Washington.

No doubt each of these people deserves a place in history. They each fought for a cause and ultimately changed the face of our nation.

But, I want to take a look at some African-Americans who don't receive headlines like those above. These people have also made an important contribution to history. They're just not as widely known as they should be.

Sgt. Carney earned Medal of Honor

Sgt. William H. Carney was the first African-American to receive the Medal of Honor. He was awarded it for his actions on July 18, 1863 at Fort Wagner, S.C. while he was a member of the 54th Massachusetts Regiment in the Civil War.

During the battle, Carney noticed that the man carrying the American flag was wounded. So Carney bravely rescued the flag and carried it for him.

He delivered it safely to his regiment and reportedly shouted, "Boys, the old flag never touched the ground."

The movie *Glory* depicts the struggles and hardships members of the 54th endured during the Civil War.

Although it doesn't exactly point Carney out, it depicts the battle at Fort Wagner and shows the sacrifices the men of the 54th made for freedom.

Davis pioneered path for pilots

Next is Benjamin O. Davis Jr., who was shunned at West Point for four years. Other cadets would only speak to him for official reasons. He had no roommate and ate his meals in silence. Those who caused this shunning had hoped to drive Davis from the academy, but their actions only made him more determined to succeed.

He graduated 35th out of 276 in the class of 1936. Upon graduating, he became one of only two African-American line officers in the U.S. Army at the time – the other was his father, Benjamin O. Davis Sr., who was also the first African-American to attain the rank of general.

The younger Davis was one of the first five

African-Americans to graduate from training at Tuskegee Institute, Ala., and become pilots in the Army Air Corps. He later commanded the 332nd Fighter Group during World War II.

While based in Italy, the group flew over 200 bomber escort missions. Through all of the missions, the 332nd never lost one bomber to enemy fire.

Williams performed open heart surgery

Daniel Hale Williams is another African-American who made history.

On July 9, 1893, James Cornish was injured in a bar fight, stabbed in the chest with a knife.

By the time he was transported to Provident Hospital (which Williams established two years earlier) he was getting closer and closer to death, having lost a great deal of blood and having gone into shock.

Williams was faced with the choice of opening the man's chest and possibly operating internally, which was almost unheard of in that day in age.

Internal operations were unheard of because any entrance into the chest or abdomen of a patient would almost surely bring with it resulting infection and therefore death.

Williams made the decision to operate and opened the man's chest. He saw the damage to his pericardium (sac surrounding the heart) and sutured it, then applied antiseptic procedures before closing his chest.

Fifty-one days later, James Cornish walked out of Provident Hospital completely recovered and would go on to live for another 50 years.

Many more made history

These are only three of a handful of African-Americans who created history in our country. There are so many more people who completed famous firsts.

For instance, Vanessa Williams became the first African-American Miss America in 1984; Hattie McDaniel was the first African-American to receive an Oscar for her supporting role in *Gone With the Wind*; and Thurgood Marshall was the first African-American to sit on the Supreme Court.

Jan. 16 incident stresses danger of intoxication

Rules for drinking and boarding the LCM though Dock Security Checkpoint are put in place and enforced for the safety of passengers, workers and intoxicated persons.

Persons who are legally intoxicated are not permitted to board the LCM. According to Lt Christi Bowman, Kwajalein Police Department, the safety of the crew and passengers could be placed in jeopardy by allowing intoxicated persons to board U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll vessels. "Such individuals can take the crew's focus away from their assigned duties, distract the captain, make the ride unbearable for other passengers, and cause difficulties during emergency procedures," she said.

While the officers at the dock can not always tell how much someone has been drinking, the appropriate actions are taken. "Some folks hold their liquor better than others and may appear to function normally when others who've had the same amount are clearly intoxicated. A person should be able to put on their own life vest in an emergency and be able to understand and follow the directions of the crew. The captain may also request that a person not be allowed to board the vessel, Bowman explained.

An incident occurred in early January at the dock that stressed the importance of these rules. According to Bowman, at approximately 11:30 p.m. on Jan. 16, Jorion Ninjine, an Ebeye resident, ran past Constable Wallace Keju toward LCM 8614. Keju pursued Ninjine shouting for him to stop and return to DSC. Ninjine stopped briefly by the boarding point and stepped off in an attempt to board the LCM and missed, falling into the water between Pier E and the LCM.

Keju called for help and went to assist Ninjine. Sgt. Christopher Mosetti, KPD, arrived shortly after to assist and discovered Keju on the edge of Pier E next to the LCM keeping Mr. Ninjine above water

using a length of hose. Mosetti summoned further police assistance as well as support from the fire department and emergency medical services.

Mosetti grabbed the life ring on the pier and threw it down to Ninjine to help keep him afloat. Constable Willie Bieo arrived during this time and was instructed to open the vehicle gate for use by responding units. Mosetti then retrieved a life ring from LCM 8614, cut the ties fastening the rope to it and threw it down to Ninjine. Keju instructed the subject, in Marshallese, to let go of the hose and put himself inside of the life ring. Ninjine had to be told numerous times to do so, but managed to get himself in such a position where he could be pulled out from between the LCM and the pier to avoid major injury from being caught between the two. Mosetti and Keju began pulling him toward the ladder located at the top of Pier E, assisted by Sgt Michael Jones, KPD, upon his arrival.

When Ninjine was near the ladder, Keju climbed down to try and help get Ninjine onto the pier. Ninjine was not responsive and his head went under water twice for a few seconds each time and blood was observed coming from his mouth. Bieo was instructed to swim from Pier 1 to the ladder while Keju held Ninjine's head out of the water by his collar. When Bieo was in place, Mosetti and Jones used the rope to pull Ninjine and Bieo to Pier 1. During this time the fire department and EMS arrived, examined Ninjine for injuries, and then transported him to Kwajalein Hospital via ambulance. Ninjine was released from Kwajalein Hospital at 3:40 a.m. and transported to the police station. Ninjine was tested for the presence of alcohol in his blood at Kwajalein Hospital which yielded a positive result of 0.429 blood alcohol content which is way over the legal limit of .08 BAC.

Had the rules been adhered to, this unfortunate event may not have happened.

Dock workers have procedures to help avoid these types of inci-

dents. If someone appears to be legally intoxicated and attempts to pass through DSC, certain steps are taken. "For Ebeye residents, if the individual is cooperative he is kept at DSC until he is sober and able to get on the LCM. This could be a matter of a few hours or overnight. If they are not cooperative or disturb other waiting passengers, they are arrested and placed in the detention cell at the police station until they are under .08 BRAC [breath alcohol content] and are charged under the Marshall Islands Revised Code. Americans undergo the same procedures with the exception they are released to their spouse, co-worker or sent on their own recognizance to return home when their BAC/BRAC is below .08," Bowman explained.

Not only can drinking excessively be dangerous to yourself and others, it can get you in a lot of trouble that could otherwise be avoided. "We don't determine if a person is legally intoxicated until we obtain a breath sample; we can suspect a person of being above the legal limit by observing any number of their actions; i.e. unsteady gait and balance, slurred speech, twitching bloodshot eyes, strong odor of alcoholic beverage emitting from their breath, etc. We then place the suspect into custody, transport them to the station, title all appropriate charges, conduct processing and either place them in the detention cell or release them. The charges are vetted by the USAKA Provost Marshal, Maj. John Davis, for determination of punishment; if further action is required or recommended by Davis, then the charges are forwarded to USAKA legal for decision, she added.

"USAKA/Reagan Test Site will not tolerate behavior of this nature. Individuals who continue to drink past their limitations are a safety risk and liability to the good order and discipline of the installation. Barring actions will come swift and lengthy for those who choose to follow this path. Families will be affected should an employee lose his job. Think before you take the next drink," Davis said.

The Weather Man. A man struggles to get a grip on a life that's spinning out of control in this emotional comedy drama. Dave Spritz (Nicolas Cage) is a television weatherman on a high-profile Chicago news program. Professionally, Dave is doing just fine — he makes great money for a job that demands little effort, and he has a shot at an assignment with a network morning news and chat show. But Dave's personal life leaves a lot to be desired — his father, respected author Robert Spritzel (Michael Caine), is in failing health, he's divorced from his wife, Noreen (Hope Davis), and his relationship with his children is tenuous at best, especially his overweight daughter, Shelly (Gemmenne de la Pena). If Dave is to land his new job, he'll have to move to New York City, and with his time in Chicago running short, he dedicates himself to trying to salvage his ties with his family before it's too late, though he discovers this is even harder than he imagines.

Elizabethtown. A young man in need of a fresh start gets one under highly unexpected circumstances in this emotionally resonant comedy drama from writer and director Cameron Crowe. Drew Baylor (Orlando Bloom) is considered the big success story in his family, having moved away from the small Kentucky town where he was born to California, where he works as a designer for Mercury, the nation's biggest athletic shoe company. But success has begun to elude Drew — his most recent design was a resounding flop that has cost him his job, and his girlfriend, Ellen (Jessica Biel), has given him his walking papers. Drew is contemplating suicide when he gets word that his father has died, and that he's needed back home in Elizabethtown, KY, to help organize the funeral.

Staff Sgt. Jerry M. Durbin Jr., 26, of Spring, Texas, died in Baghdad, Iraq on Jan. 25, when an improvised explosive device exploded near his dismounted patrol during combat operations. Durbin was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 502nd Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 101st Airborne Division, Fort Campbell, Ky.

Lance Cpl. Hugo R. Lopezlopez, 20, of La Habra, Calif., died Jan. 27 at Brooke Army Medical Center, San Antonio, from wounds sustained from an improvised explosive device while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Rawah, Iraq on Nov. 20, 2005. He was assigned to 2nd Battalion, 11th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif. During Operation Iraqi Freedom, his unit was attached to 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, (Forward).

Lance Cpl. Billy D. Brixey Jr., 21, of Ferriday, La., died Jan. 27 at Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, Germany, from wounds received as a result of an improvised explosive device while traveling in a convoy in Afghanistan on Jan. 25. He was assigned to 1st Bat-

talion, 3rd Marine Regiment, 3rd Marine Division, III Marine Expeditionary Force, Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii. During Operation Enduring Freedom, his unit was attached to 3rd Marine Logistics Group, III Marine Expeditionary Force, Okinawa, Japan.

Cpl. Felipe C. Barbosa, 21, of High Point, N.C., died Jan. 28 from a non-hostile vehicle accident in Fallujah, Iraq. He was assigned to 2nd Battalion, 6th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Sgt. David L. Herrera, 26, of Oceanside, Calif., died in Baghdad on Jan. 28, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat operations. Herrera was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 506th Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 101st Airborne Division, Fort Campbell.





Range operation scheduled for Thursday

A range operation is scheduled for Thursday. Caution times are 11 a.m. through 5 p.m. In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within the Kwajalein Atoll.

The caution area is bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr Island on the west reef. On the south, the area is bounded by a line drawn north of Bigej on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni on the west reef.

Bigej, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not part of the mid-atoll corridor.

Omelek, Eniwetak and Gellinam are designated as evacuated islands. All mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands. Additional areas specified outside the mid-atoll are designated as caution areas. See maps.

In order to ensure clearance of non-mission personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, Kwajalein Police Department island clearance procedures will begin at approximately 7:30 a.m. on Monday and continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all


air and seacraft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following days.




